Affirmative-Commissioners Ten Eyck, Ryan, Power and Windolph-4. Whereupon there were present-The Mavor (Hon. Seth Low), the Comptroller (Hon. Edward M. Grout), Com-

missioners Ten Eyck (President), Ryan, Power and Windolph. The minutes of stated meeting of December 31, 1901, were read and approved.

Commissioner Power called up the matter of the report of the Board of Engineers and the supplemental reports of Elnathan Sweet and of Edwin F. Smith, of said Engineers, relative to the New Croton Dam and the Jerome Park Reservoir.

The Chief Engineer addressed the Commissioners relative to the report of the Board of Engineers appointed pursuant to resolutions adopted June 21, 1901, concerning the present plans of the New Croton Dam and of the Jerome Park Reservoir and as to the changes recommended by such Board of Engineers in connection therewith; also concerning the supplemental report of Mr. Edwin F. 
