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COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at a Meeting Held in Room 16, City Hall, at 2.30 o'clock p. m., on Wednesday, December 24, 1902.

Present—Seth Low, Mayor; Edward M. Grout, Comptroller; Elgin R. L. Gould, Chamberlain; Charles V. Fornes, President, Board of Aldermen, and Herbert Parsons, Chairman Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen.

The Comptroller again presented the report of the Engineer of the Department of Finance, relative to a request of the Department of Docks and Ferries for an amendment to the resolution adopted by this Board approving of terms and conditions of sale of the franchise for a ferry from the foot of East Forty-second street, Borough of Manhattan, to the foot of Broadway, Borough of Brooklyn (see pp. 31, 199, 259, 487, 621 and 649), which was referred back to the Comptroller for a more definite report as to the compensation.

The following communication was received from the Department of Docks and Ferries relative to a lease of bulkhead at the outer end of Sherman's creek, Harlem river, to the Fort George Coal and Lumber Company:

NEW YORK, December 5, 1902.

N. TAYLOR PHILLIPS, Esq., *Secretary to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:*

SIR—I beg to recommend to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund the approval of a lease to the Fort George Coal and Lumber Company of 359 feet of bulkhead, with a return of 80 feet, at the outer end of Sherman's creek, Harlem river, for a term of ten years, with the privilege of a renewal for a further term of ten years, the lessee to have the privilege of erecting hoisting and other apparatus for the handling of coal and lumber, and shed for the protection of same; the rental for the first term to be \$800 per annum, and for the second term to be fixed by appraisal, but to be not less than \$1,000 per annum.

There has been no revenue collected from this bulkhead for a number of years except \$21.40 wharfage collected there during the present year. Owing to its inaccessibility, the expenses of collecting wharfage at this point would be about as great as the amount collected. It has for some time past been used as a timber basin for the storage of piles and lumber by this Department, and the present lease is granted with a view of obtaining some revenue from the outer end of the bulkhead, as it is deemed that a sufficient portion has been retained to serve the purpose of a timber basin for the Department, as well as to afford ample facilities for wharfage purposes.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of and consent to the execution, by the Commissioner of Docks, of a lease to the Fort George Coal and Lumber Company, of 359 feet of bulkhead, with a return of 80 feet, at the outer end of Sherman's creek, Harlem river, for a term of ten years, with the privilege of a renewal for a further term of ten years, the lessee to have the privilege of erecting hoisting and other apparatus for the handling of coal and lumber, and shed for the protection of same; the rental for the first term to be eight hundred dollars (\$800) per annum, and for the second term to be fixed by appraisal, but not to be less than one thousand dollars (\$1,000) per annum, as recommended by the Commissioner of Docks in communication dated December 5, 1902.

The Comptroller presented the following report of the Engineer of the Department of Finance, and offered the following resolution, relative to a renewal of the lease of premises at No. 46 Jackson avenue, Long Island City, occupied by the First District Municipal Court:

SIR—Hon. T. C. Kadien, Justice of the First District Municipal Court, Borough of Queens, in communication dated November 24, recommends the renewal of the lease of the court room at No. 46 Jackson avenue, Long Island City, which lease expired October 15, 1902. The Judge states that the City is still in possession of the premises, and in consequence I would recommend that the lease be renewed for a term of one year from October 15, 1902, on the same terms and conditions as contained in the former lease, to wit, \$50 per month.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, *Comptroller:*

SIR—Hon. J. Edward Swanstrom, President, Borough of Brooklyn, in a communication dated December 11, 1902, requests the approval of the Commissioners of the

Sinking Fund to a lease of a store on the north side of Ninety-second street, between Fourth and Fifth avenues, 66 feet west of Fifth avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, for the use of the Bureau of Sewers, for a term of two years from December 15, 1902, at a rental of \$15 per month, with the privilege of a renewal for six months additional. The owner, Thomas Murray, Ninety-second street, near Fifth avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, to keep the outside of the premises in repair and to furnish janitor service.

In communication submitted by the Superintendent of Sewers it appears that these premises are required for the use of the Corps of Engineers which will be employed on the construction of the tunnel sewer in Ninety-second street, through the northern portion of Dyker Beach Park, between Eleventh and Seventh avenues, and from Seventh avenue to New York Bay.

It is further stated that the rental of these premises will be properly charged to the Street Improvement Fund, as a contingent upon the construction of this sewer.

I have caused an examination to be made, and find that the premises consist of a store, 13 feet by 34 feet, on the first floor of a three-story brick building, affording a floor space of 442 square feet, which, at the rental asked, will give a rate of about 40 cents per square foot per annum.

I am of the opinion that the terms of the proposed lease are reasonable and just, and may properly be approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The following communication was received from the Police Department relative to the payment of two months' rent of premises No. 211 Eastern Parkway, Borough of Brooklyn:

NEW YORK, December 8, 1902.

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN—The Police Commissioner this day directed the following proceedings: Whereas, The lease of premises No. 211 Eastern Parkway, Borough of Brooklyn, occupied for additional accommodations for the Police Force of the Sixty-fifth Precinct; expired May 1, 1902; and

Whereas, Said premises were occupied by the Police Department for such purposes during the months of May, June and July, 1902, and have since been vacated,

Ordered, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be and are hereby respectfully requested to authorize the Comptroller to pay the rent for the lease of such premises to Katie Finkelstein, who is now the lessor of the same, up to August 1, 1902, and that the Auditor of this Department be directed to transmit to the Comptroller for payment voucher for the months of June and July, 1902, amounting to \$60, still remaining unpaid.

The Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution relative to a lease of additional rooms in the Post Office Building, Main street, Westchester, Borough of The Bronx, for the Police Department:

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, *Comptroller:*

SIR—The Police Department, in communication under date of November 20, 1902, request the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to authorize the Comptroller to execute a lease with William Henderson for additional accommodations for the Police Force of the Thirty-eighth Precinct in the building known as Post Office Building, Main street, Westchester, a portion of such building being already occupied by the Police Department, said additional rooms to consist of one store on the ground floor at the rate of \$400 per annum and the entire third floor of said building for an additional sum of \$700 per annum, and that said lease be made to expire with the present lease, January 1, 1904.

Would report that the additional quarters consist of one store (17 feet 3 inches by 46 feet 6 inches) northerly and adjacent to the present store now occupied by the Police Department, and the entire third floor (46 feet 6 inches by 70 feet) in building known as the "Post Office Building," on westerly side of Main street (Borough of The Bronx), formerly Village of Westchester.

On September 23, 1896, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorized a lease for one year from January 1, 1896, for four rooms on the second floor of said building at \$50 per month, the owner to furnish heat. On February 8, 1897, a lease was authorized for one year from January 1, 1897, for four additional rooms on the second floor, and also the vacant store on the ground floor at \$1,200 per annum, owner to furnish heat. At meeting of May 13, 1897, the first lease was renewed for one year under the same terms.

The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at meeting of May 9, 1898, authorized a lease for a term of one year from January 1, 1898, at \$1,800 per annum for premises consisting of one store on the ground floor and eight rooms on second floor of said building, now used and occupied by the Police Department (these are the premises included in the two leases above mentioned), the terms and conditions to be the same as contained in said leases—i. e., heat to be furnished by the owner.

At different times this lease has been authorized to be renewed by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, and the present lease does not expire until January 1, 1904. The additional space being required for the Police Force of the Thirty-eighth Precinct and the rental, \$1,100 per annum, just and reasonable, I am of the opinion that this lease can be properly authorized by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the terms and conditions to be the same as the existing lease—i. e., the owner (William Henderson) to furnish heat and pay taxes; the City to pay water taxes. In order that this lease may expire with the existing lease, the term should be from date of occupation to January 1, 1904.

Resolved, That the Corporation Counsel be and is hereby requested to prepare a lease to the City, from William Henderson, of one store on the ground floor of the building known as the Post Office Building on the westerly side of Main street, Westchester, Borough of The Bronx, northerly and adjacent to the store at present occupied by the Police Department in the said building, and the entire third floor in the said building, for the use of the Police Department for a term from the date of occupation to January 1, 1904, at an annual rental of eleven hundred dollars (\$1,100), payable quarterly, otherwise upon the same terms and conditions as contained in the existing lease of the portion of said building now occupied by the Police Department, i. e., the owner to furnish heat and pay taxes; the City to pay water taxes; and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the said rent fair and reasonable and that it would be for the interests of the City that such lease be made, the Comptroller is hereby authorized and directed to execute the same when prepared and approved by the Corporation Counsel, as provided by sections 149 and 217 of the Greater New York Charter.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The following communication was received from the Department of Street Cleaning relative to an amendment to resolution authorizing a lease of premises at No. 231 Bowery, Borough of Manhattan (see p. 921.)

NEW YORK, December 5, 1902.

Hon. SETH LOW, Mayor, Chairman, Board of Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

SIR—Referring to my communication of the 4th instant, in reference to amendment to your resolution of November 5, 1902, consenting to a lease from Stephen G. Thomas, I hereby withdraw the same and request that said resolution of November 5, 1902, be amended to make the lease from "Stephen G. Thomas, as Receiver of the rents and profits of the premises Nos. 231 and 233 Bowery, New York City, appointed in the action of Alban R. Johnson, plaintiff, against Louise M. Mitchell and others, defendants, in Supreme Court of New York County, dated May 15, 1902"; (2) also to strike out the requirement that the lessor shall pay for the Croton water used on the premises and to substitute therefor the following provision: "It is expressly agreed that the party of the second part shall pay the proportionate share of the regular charge which is or may be assessed or imposed according to law upon the said premises for Croton water used by the tenant in each year during the term, and the same shall be added to the quarterly rent as above provided for"; (3) that the expression "etc." wherever appearing in said resolution after the words "freight hallway" be stricken out.

In regard to the payment of a proportionate amount of the water tax, I would state that it has never been the policy of the City to assume any such obligation, the usual practice being for the owner to install a meter at his own expense, the City to pay for the water used. I see no reason for departing from the usual rule in this case, and would recommend that such amendment be made to the lease.

Mitchell and others, defendants, in Supreme Court of New York County, dated May 15, 1902, of the rear store of premises known as No. 231 Bowery, Borough of Manhattan, with entrance thereto through the freight hallway, the lessor to put a partition around the stairway so as to inclose the said store from the hallway and stairway, and to place in said partition an ordinary door, for a term of one year from December 20, 1902, at an annual rental of eight hundred dollars (\$800), payable quarterly, the lessor to install a meter at his own expense, and the City to pay for the water used, and the lessor to furnish sufficient steam to heat the said premises—the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the said rent fair and reasonable, and that it would be for the interests of the City that such lease be made.

The following communication was received from the Department of Street Cleaning, relative to an amendment to resolution authorizing a lease of a plot of ground on the north side of East One Hundred and Sixteenth street, Borough of Manhattan (see p. 880.)

Hon. SETH LOW, Mayor, Chairman Board of Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

SIR—I request that your Board amend its resolution of October 22, 1902, consenting to a lease to this Department from the Estate of W. C. Andrews of the plot of ground on the north side of East One Hundred and Sixteenth street, etc., so as to omit the requirement "and to put and keep the fences and gates in repair, the City to pay for the Croton water used on the premises."

SIR—The Deputy Commissioner, Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, to whom was referred your communication of the 21st ultimo, calling attention to a report of the Engineer of the Department of Finance to the Comptroller dated November 18, 1902, regarding the request of this Department for a renewal of the lease of premises No. 1772 Eastern Parkway, Borough of Brooklyn, occupied by Engine Company 31, as follows:

"The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at a meeting held December 21, 1898, authorized a renewal of the lease of the premises for two years from January 1, 1899, at an annual rental of \$1,000, and on October 30, 1901, the lease of the premises was renewed on the same terms. By these renewals the premises are under lease to January 1, 1903. I still consider \$1,000 per annum an excessive rental, and, as reported by Mr. Withington, \$600 per annum is full, but if the Fire Commissioner will certify that he cannot make better terms or obtain other suitable quarters, I would suggest that the present lease be renewed, as requested by the Commissioner";

—and requesting to be advised in regard to the matter, has submitted to me a report on the subject, dated the 28th ultimo, recommending the renewal of the present lease for a term of one year, for the reason that there are no other buildings in the neighborhood at present available for the use of the apparatus company in question, notwithstanding that he deems the rental of \$1,000 excessive.

Under the circumstances I am constrained to approve the recommendation of the Deputy Commissioner and to request favorable action thereon.

Hon. THOMAS STURGIS, Fire Commissioner:

SIR—I am directed by the Deputy Commissioner to acknowledge receipt of your communication of November 25, inclosing communication from the Secretary of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund relating to the request for renewal of lease of premises No. 1772 Eastern Parkway, Brooklyn Borough, occupied by Engine Company 131, and, in reply to the telephone communication received to-day from Manhattan Headquarters, requesting that a report on the matter be submitted by Saturday, November 29, to state that these premises are located in what is known as Brownsville, a section peopled mainly by Hebrews and Poles. The buildings consist largely of frame structures, and the neighborhood is one requiring extra vigilance in order to prevent a conflagration in case of fire.

The property was formerly leased at \$1,200 per annum, which was reduced in 1899 to \$1,000. It is assessed at \$3,000.

The Deputy Commissioner is of the opinion that \$1,000 is an excessive rental, but, from so much of an examination as we have been able to make since receipt of your letter of the 25th instant, there are no other buildings in the neighborhood at present available for our purpose. A further examination might show us some properties which could be used.

The Deputy Commissioner recommends that, although the price is excessive, the present lease be renewed for one year.

The letter from the Department of Finance is returned herewith.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

SIR—The Board of Education by resolution adopted December 10, 1902, requested the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to authorize a renewal of the lease of premises No. 426 East One Hundred and Tenth street, Borough of Manhattan, for a term of three years from January 6, 1903, at an annual rental of \$1,400, with the privilege of renewal for an additional term of three years at the same rental—otherwise upon the same terms as contained in the existing lease. Owner, M. M. Canda, Third street and Gowanus canal, Brooklyn.

I have caused an examination of the premises to be made and would report that they consist of a two-story brick building 40 feet by 100.11 feet, situated on the south

side of East One Hundred and Tenth street, between First and Pleasant avenues. The building was constructed for a stable and used as such for many years. On January 6, 1898, it was leased by the Board of Education as a storehouse for old furniture, etc., for a term of five years at an annual rental of \$1,200 from Mrs. Lillian L. Canda of No. 585 Prospect place, Brooklyn.

It is this lease which expires January 6, 1903, that the Board of Education desire to renew in the name of M. M. Canda, assignee of Lillian L. Canda as owner, at an annual rental of \$1,400 instead of \$1,200, the rental now paid.

The Committee on Buildings reports that the City Superintendent of School Buildings has certified that it is absolutely necessary to have this property for the storage of old furniture, etc., and that the owner gives as his reasons for the advance in rent the fact that there is an increase of taxes of \$100 and an advance in the insurance rates, caused by the use of the building for storage purposes.

I find from the records of the Department of Taxes that the plot, 100 feet by 100.11 feet, on which the building stands, was assessed at \$13,000 in 1898, when the lease was made. To-day the same plot has an assessed valuation of \$16,000.

The building occupies about 40 per cent. of the area of the plot, and giving \$9,000 as a fair apportionment for the portion rented, I estimate the value of the premises to be about \$15,000, which, at 8 per cent., would give a rental of \$1,200.

I am of the opinion that \$1,200, the rent reserved in the present lease, is full, if not excessive; and, notwithstanding the increase of \$3,000 in assessed valuation on the entire plot, which would be about \$1,200 on these premises, or an increase on taxes of about \$25 per annum, I see no reason to approve of the advance of \$200 in the annual rental now demanded.

I would therefore recommend that the renewal be approved at an annual rental of \$1,200 for a term of three years, otherwise on the same terms as in existing lease.

The Comptroller presented the following, relative to the printing of the minutes of the meetings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund from 1844 to 1887:

December 24, 1902.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN—I desire to present for the consideration of the Board the question of the advisability of having printed in book form the minutes of the meetings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund prior to 1887. From 1844 to 1885 the minutes were written in the book kept for that purpose, and from 1885 to 1887 the minutes were cut out of the "City Record" and pasted in the book. From 1844 to 1887 there is but one set of minutes in existence. These minutes are very frequently used by the Title Insurance Companies, lawyers, and by the Corporation Counsel.

Volume 1, which contains the proceedings from 1844 to 1850, is the most frequently used, and is very much worn.

The advantage of having this done would be (1) the preservation of the original minutes; (2) proper indexes could be made so that matters could be easily found and read, and (3) the books could be distributed where they are needed.

These minutes could be gotten out in four volumes, and say 50 copies of each volume would cost about \$4,500. The expense could be paid from the Sinking Fund appropriation.

I have obtained bids from the Martin B. Brown Company and the Mail and Express Company, they being the only concerns familiar with this work, and they bid as follows:

The Martin B. Brown Company, for 50 copies of each volume, \$2.90 per printed page complete, including binding and compilation and preparation of the indexes.

The Mail and Express Company, for 50 copies of each volume, \$2.90 per page, including binding, but not the compilation of the index, which they say they are not prepared to bid for.

Brown Company for printing and binding the minutes of the meetings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund from 1844 to 1886, inclusive, in four volumes, one hundred copies of each volume, including the compilation and preparation of an index, at the sum of three dollars and twenty-five cents (\$3.25) per printed page, be and the same is hereby accepted, and

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized and directed to pay for the same from the appropriation for 1902, entitled "Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, Expenses of."

Which were unanimously adopted.

The Comptroller raised the question as to the power of the Board in the action just taken, and the Mayor said he would have it brought up for a concurrent vote by the Board of City Record at its next meeting.

The Comptroller presented the following report of the Engineer of the Department of Finance and offered the following resolution relative to the compensation to be paid by the H. B. Claflin Company for a pipe line privilege:

December 19, 1902.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

SIR—The Board of Aldermen, by resolution adopted December 2, 1902, and received from the Mayor, December 15, 1902, without his approval or disapproval thereof, therefore, as provided in section 40 of the Greater New York Charter, the same took effect as if he had approved it, grants permission to

The H. B. Claflin Company to lay and maintain a two-inch pipe under and across the carriageway of Worth street, in the Borough of Manhattan, said pipe to be used for the purpose of conducting steam from their premises, known as No. 20, to their premises on the opposite side of said thoroughfare and known as 21, provided that the said H. B. Claflin Company shall pay to The City of New York as compensation for the privilege such fee as may be determined as an equivalent by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

I would report that the distance between curb lines at this point is 30 feet 6 inches, and pursuant to the schedule of rules for determining the compensation to be paid for laying pipes (16 inches diameter or less) in streets or avenues, adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on July 17, 1902, \$61 per annum is the correct charge for the privilege, and \$15.25 fee for opening the street.

Resolved, That the compensation to be paid to The City of New York by The H. B. Claflin Company, for the privilege of laying and maintaining a two-inch pipe under and across the carriageway of Worth street, in the Borough of Manhattan, said pipe to be used for the purpose of conducting steam from their premises known as No. 20 to their premises on the opposite side of said thoroughfare and known as No. 21, shall be sixty-one dollars (\$61) per annum for the privilege, to be paid to the Department of Finance, and a fee of fifteen dollars and twenty-five cents (\$15.25) for opening the street, to be paid to the President of the Borough of Manhattan; compensation to commence from the date of the adoption of this resolution

and continuing until such time as the said The H. B. Claflin Company be granted permission to remove the said pipe and the pavement has been relaid to the satisfaction of the President of the Borough of Manhattan; the opening of the street and the relaying of the pavement to be done at the expense of the said The H. B. Claflin Company, under the direction of the President of the Borough of Manhattan, and subject to such conditions as he shall prescribe; provided, also, that the said The H. B. Claflin Company shall give a satisfactory bond for the faithful performance of all the conditions prescribed by the said President of the Borough of Manhattan, and by resolution of the Board of Aldermen adopted December 2, 1902, and received from the Mayor December 16, 1902; said bond to be approved by the Comptroller and filed in his office; and provided further that the right be reserved to revoke such permission at any future time, if necessary in the interests of the City.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The Comptroller presented the following statement and offered the following resolution relative to a transfer of five hundred dollars from "Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt No. 1" to "Interest on Surplus Fund, Borough of Brooklyn":

December 17, 1902.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

SIR—By statement submitted to Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at meeting held August 20, 1901, it was shown that moneys in bank to credit of "Surplus Fund, Borough of Brooklyn," have earned in interest, from date of consolidation to July 20, 1899, \$4,037.13 (printed Minutes, pp. 363-4), and that said interest had been deposited with general "Interest on Deposits" to credit of the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt No. 1.

Of this amount of interest earned there has been transferred to credit of City Treasury Account "Interest on Surplus Fund, Borough of Brooklyn," by resolution of Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

August 20, 1901.....	\$1,000 00
November 20, 1901.....	1,000 00
Total.....	\$2,000 00

—leaving available for the payment of interest on surplus that may be claimed of \$2,037.13.

The City Treasury Account is exhausted and it is necessary to make a further transfer, for which resolution is submitted herewith.

Resolved, That a warrant payable from the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt No. 1 be drawn in favor of the Chamberlain for the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500), to be by him deposited in the City Treasury to credit of "Interest on Surplus Fund, Borough of Brooklyn," said sum being a portion of the bank interest earned on the "Surplus Fund, 1885," of said Borough, and paid into said Sinking Fund, now transferred for the payment of interest on "Surplus" returned to purchasers of lands and tenements sold for taxes and assessments in the City of Brooklyn.

Which resolution was unanimously adopted.

The Comptroller presented reports of the Engineer of the Department of Finance relative to a proposition of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn for the assignment of rooms in the Borough Hall, Brooklyn, for the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court, and application of the Commissioner of Jurors for Kings County, for additional room in the County Courthouse.

On motion both matters were referred to the Comptroller and the Chamberlain.

Adjourned to meet at 2.30 p. m. on Wednesday, January 7, 1903.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested in it, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below. No bid or estimate will be considered unless accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contracts must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which with the proper envelope in which to enclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.

There shall be published daily, Sundays and legal holidays excepted, under a contract to be made as hereinafter provided, a paper to be known as the *CITY RECORD*. And said *CITY RECORD*, and the newspapers now by law designated as corporation newspapers in the present City of Brooklyn, shall be the only papers to be included within the term corporation newspapers, as the same is used anywhere in this act; There shall be inserted in said *CITY RECORD* nothing aside from such official matters as are expressly authorized. All advertising required to be done for the City, except as in this act otherwise specially provided, and all notices required by law or ordinance to be published in corporation papers, shall be inserted at the public expense only in the *CITY RECORD*, and the publication therein shall be a sufficient compliance with any law or ordinance requiring publication of such matters or notices. The Comptroller shall cause a continuous series of the *CITY RECORD* to be bound as completed, quarterly, and to be deposited with his certificate thereon in the office of the Register of Deeds of the County of New York in the County Clerk's office of said County, and in the office of the City Clerk, and copies of the contents of any part of the same, certified by such Register, County Clerk, or City Clerk, shall be received in judicial proceedings as prima facie evidence of the truth of the contents thereof.—§ 1526. *Greater New York Charter*.

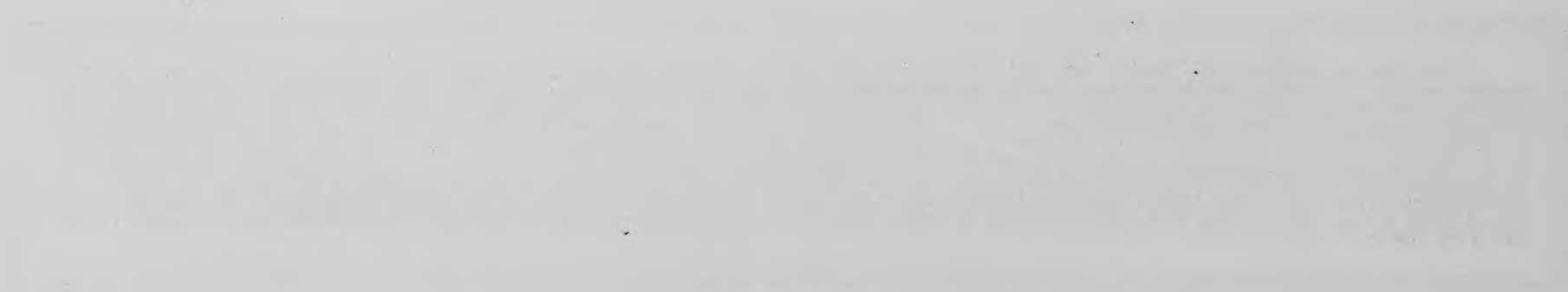
