From the Board of Estimate and Apportionment—Calling attention to request as required by resolution of Board of Estimate and Apportionment of January 14, 1910, in regard to Corporate Stock needed for improvements in 1910. On file.

From the Board of Estimate and Apportionment—Returning letter and statement of September 3, 1909. On file.

From Civil Service Commission—Stating that Maurice P. Sullivan has passed a non-competitive examination for position of Mate, and may be employed temporarily, under paragraph 3, Rule XII. of the Civil Service Rules. M. P. Sullivan appointed Mate temporarily.

From Civil Service Commission—Secretary states that the transfer of Edwin A. Malone, Clerk, to a similar position in the Department of Public Charities, has been approved by the Civil Service Commission. Approval acknowledged. Eligible list asked for.

From the Comptroller—Calling attention of Heads of City Departments to section 419 of the New York City Charter in relation to contracts. Provisions of the law should be carried out in the spirit as well as in the letter. Attention called to cases where aggregate of open orders, in a year, have been in excess of one thousand dollars, etc. Receipt of circular letter acknowledged. The Department of Correction lives up to the requirements of the law.

From the Comptroller—Returning proposal of James D. Brown for groceries, with approval of the sureties. Award to be made and contracts drawn.

From the Comptroller (Audit)—Enclosing voucher for \$417, in favor of Manhattan Trap Rock Company, for rock furnished for use on Harts Island, and which has been charged against special fund, "City Prisons, Penitentiaries, etc., Chapter 173, Laws of 1905." Deputy Comptroller does not think this a proper charge against such special fund. Receipt acknowledged. Attention called to section 7 of chapter 173, as above, in which the Commissioner of Correction is authorized to disburse this fund at his discretion. Also enclosing copy of resolution of Board of Estimate and Apportionment of February 5, 1909. Also, as voucher No. 420 for rock for similar purposes was charged to this fund, which voucher was paid by the Finance Department, it would appear that this is a proper charge against the fund created under the provisions of chapter 173, Laws of 1905.

From the Comptroller—Comptroller transmits copy of an opinion received from the Corporation Counsel, under date of February 1, 1910, in matter of claims of Jennings & Wetstead, for work at City Prison, Brooklyn. On file with General Bookkeeper and Auditor.

From the Comptroller—Referring to Claim No. 59998, filed by Victor M. Osborn, for \$5,000 for damages sustained by him while at City Prison. Copy of report made by the Warden sent to Comptroller.

From State Commission of Prisons—Secretary of State Commission transmits reports of inspections made by Commissioner Solomon: (1) Visit made on January 19, 1910, to Penitentiary, Blackwells Island, and (2) visit made on January 22, 1910, to Fourth District Prison. Receipt acknowledged. Recommendations made by Mr. Solomon will be fully considered.

From Heads of Institutions—Reporting that meats, fish, bread, milk, etc., for week ending February 5, 1910, agreed with specifications of the contracts. On file.

From Heads of Institutions—Reports, census, labor, hospital cases, punishments, etc., for week ending February 5, 1910. On file.

From City Prison, Manhattan—Report of fines received during week ending February 5, 1910: From Court of Special Sessions, \$2; from City Magistrates' Court, \$15. Total, \$17. On file.

From City Prison, Manhattan—Department Physician at City Prison recommends that service at that prison be supplemented by consultation with an ophthalmologist in cases where advice is required. Copy of Physician's letter sent to Department Medical Board, etc.

From District Prisons—Report of fines received during week ending February 5, 1910: From City Magistrates' Courts, \$530. On file.

From District Prisons—Census report for month of January, 1910. On file.

From Penitentiary, Blackwells Island—List of prisoners received during week ending February 5, 1910: Men, 36; woman, 1. On file.

From Penitentiary, Blackwells Island—Warden reports that a large water meter was left on Blackwells Island by men working on the Queensboro Bridge, and asks that it be removed. Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity asked to have this meter removed.

From Workhouse, Blackwells Island—Reporting that fines received at Workhouse during week ending February 5, 1910, amounted to \$54. On file.

From Workhouse, Blackwells Island—Warden reports main dock at Workhouse in very bad condition. Piles, sluiceway and planking all need renewing. 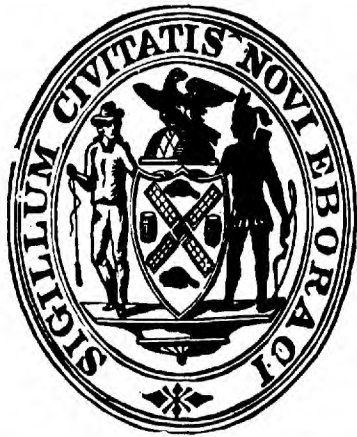

#### GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for the City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall transmit the same in a sealed envelope, addressed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and that the bidder or estimator has no collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business in which it relates or in any part thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be included in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either included in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.
