Dr W H Smith the General	Medical	Superintendent reported as follows	•

Dr. W. H. Smith, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows: From February 27 to March 12, inclusive, the following operations were performed, at all of which the Attending Surgeons or their Assistants were present, except in two instances, one at Bellevue and one at Gouverneur, the consent of the Attending Surgeon having been first obtained: Bellevue Hospital, 98; Gouverneur Hospital, 42; Harlem Hospital, 50, and Fordham Hospital, 61.

In accordance with the rules a fire drill was held at Bellevue Hospital on March 3 and 8, at Gouverneur Hospital on March 2 and 9, and at Harlem Hospital and Fordham Hospital on March 1 and 10.

Submitted herewith are the reports of attendance of the Visiting Physicians and Surgeons and their Assistants at the various hospitals during the month of February: Since the last meeting of the Board of Trustees on March 1 the following Special Nurses have been supplied: Two for Dr. Aikman, typhoid, 23 days; two for Dr. Curley, influenza, 2 days; seven for isolation cases, 37 days; five for post-operative critical cases, 14 days. This makes a total of 76 days' service by Special Nurses; cost, \$228.

Cleo Nicolls, a Nurse ill with scarlet fever, was sent to the Minturn Hospital on March 14. This Nurse was assigned to a patient in semi-isolation for a suspicious rash. The patient has been held under observation for the past two weeks and was not reported to the Board of Health. The child was seen yesterday by the Diagnostician from the Board of Health and removed, with a diagnosis of scarlet fever. It is safe to assume that the Nurse contracted searlet fever from this child, who has evidently been suffering from scarlet fever for the past two weeks and has been held in

this hospital. Mr. F. A. Ross, Fire Expert, recommends a third Watchman's clock for Bellevue Hospital; that the gas jets in the attic of the administration building be shut off permanently; that other gas jets be made safe, and that all holes in the floor of the attic be covered. It is recommended that the use of gas in the attics be discontinued and electricity installed, and that the other recommendations of Mr. Ross be approved.

The employees of this Department have not yet been paid for the month of February, except those on the General Administration roll. The certificates on the payrolls make it impossible for the Payroll Clerk to prepare the roll before the last day of the month, hence the delay. It seems unfair to our employees, and it is recommended that the matter be taken up with the Finance Department with the purpose of making different arrangements.

The General Superintendent of Training Schools reports that Mr. Charles B. Haves, Assistant Superintendent of the School for Male Nurses, has resigned to accept a position elsewhere.

It is recommended that the name of Cosmo D. O'Neil, Assistant Superintendent, be substituted for that of the former Assistant on the Board of Examiners for positions in the non-competitive class.

It is desirable to have certain fixed rules governing the payment of wages during illness. It is recommended that this be referred to the Committee on Officers and

Employees and the General Medical Superintendent. The Investigator has raised the question as to whether or not Policemen and Firemen should be charged for board and care while in Bellevue Hospital. A ruling is

The Supervising Nurse of Gouverneur Hospital reports that Mr. Hughes, Private Secretary to Second Deputy Police Commissioner Charles Kirby, recently inspected conditions at Gouverneur Hospital, and expressed the opinion that a police officer was absolutely necessary for detail in the Out Patient Department. It is recommended that this be brought to the attention of the Police Commissioner and that prompt action in this matter be urged.

Miss Stowers, Supervising Nurse of Gouverneur Hospital, asks for the privilege of finding a good place for two ambulance horses which have been worn out in the service. It is recommended that this privilege be granted.


