FIRE DEPARTMENT.

July 31, 1913.

Hon. WILLIAM J. GAYNOR, Mayor, City of New York:

Sir—Pursuant to the provisions of section 1544 of the Greater New York Charter, I have the honor to transmit herewith report of the operations and action of this Department for the quarter ended June 30, 1913.

Financial.

The budget appropriations made to this Department in the several boroughs for the year 1913 aggregated \$8,945,945.40. Of this there was expended during the second quarter the sum of \$2,198,145.66 which, added to the expenditures for the first quarter (\$2,004,860.58), made a total of \$4,203,006.24 for the first six months, leaving available for use during the remainder of the current year a balance of \$4,742,939.16.

Uniformed Force.

On June 30, 1913, the membership of the uniformed force in all of the boroughs aggregated 4,506. On that date there were in service 269 apparatus companies, an increase of one over the number at the close of the preceding quarter. This addition is Hook and Ladder Company 134, located at 330 Central ave., Far Rockaway, Borough of Queens, and is assigned to the 47th Battalion.

During the second quarter 115 ununiformed Firemen were appointed, and 51, having satisfactorily completed their probationary period of service, were appointed as 4th grade Firemen. Promotions in the uniformed force, 31 in all, were made during the quarter, as follows: Lieutenant to Captain, 4; Engineer of Steamer to Lieutenant, 5; Firemen, 1st grade to Lieutenant, 6; Firemen, 1st grade to Engineer of Steamer, 16. The number of retirements, on half-pay, on own application, was 18; for disability there were, in all, 7 retirements, also on half-pay. The aggregate number of retirements was 25. The dismissals were 3, and the reinstatements likewise numbered 3. There were 7 deaths on the active list. The deaths of retired officers and men totalled 8. There occurred 372 cases of illness and 141 of injury, being 513 in all, and the time lost from each cause was 6,173 and 2,841 days, respectively, a total of 9,014 days.

Civilian Force.

The civilian force, on June 30, 1913, numbered 751.

Fire Alarm Telegraph.

At the close of the second quarter the fire alarm telegraph system in the various boroughs consisted in mileage of cable and conductor in subways, and of aerial conductor and circuit mileage—the latter both underground and aerial—of the following:

During the quarter there were tested at factories 3,129,666 feet of conductor and 20,702 of cable. Cable to the extent of 41,113 feet was installed, as were also 48,000 feet of tile duct. The Engineering Division of the Bureau supervised and inspected all work done under contract during the second quarter by the National India Rubber Company, The Waterbury Company, the Safety Insulated Wire & Cable Company and Henry E. Fox on the 3d ave. installation, Manhattan; Myrtle ave. installation, Brooklyn; Southwest Brooklyn installation and Central Office excavation and concentrating subways, Manhattan, respectively.

Fire Prevention.

As has been pointed out in previous reports, the successful prosecution of the work devolving upon the Bureau of Fire Prevention is seriously handicapped because of the inadequate number of the field and office forces assigned thereto, due to the insufficiency of the appropriations made for these purposes. Thus, the Bureau experiences great difficulty in following to completion orders already issued, in consequence of the meagre force available for reinspection work. The results achieved by the Bureau, however, since its establishment have demonstrated the feasibility of reducing in an appreciable degree the number of fires that occur annually in this city and the loss of life and property following in their wake, but, as a corollary, it has likewise been clearly evidenced that a largely augmented working force is necessary to develop and bring to fruition the full measure of good imbedded in the fire prevention law.

During the second quarter, throughout the various divisions of the Bureau, 32,238 inspections were made; 3,719 orders were served and the requirements of 2,830 thereof complied with. Below is a summary of the achievements of the various divisions of the Bureau.

Violations and Auxiliary Fire Appliances.

During the second quarter 12,434 inspections were made by the field force of the Division of Violations and Auxiliary Fire Appliances. Orders to the extent of 2,128 were served, of which 1,435 were complied with. The number of orders rescinded by the Fire Commissioner was 170. The total of applications granted for surveys was 10. Plans, 501 in all, for the installation of standpipes, sprinklers, fire escapes, etc., were examined and approved.

Places of Public Assembly.

The inspection force of the Division of Places of Public Assembly made 4,921 inspections during the second quarter, and served 290 orders of which 174 were complied with. There were made 435 visitations of theatres and 714 of moving picture shows. Examination was made of 4,743 theatre reports and of 2,343 moving picture show reports received from company commanders. Of standee violations there were 11 cases reported, 6 of the number remaining undisposed of at the close of the quarter. The vigilance and zeal of this Division have resulted in general compliance with the requirements of the standee ordinance at places of public amusement and thereby conducted to the safety of their audiences. Plans, 133 in all, were received and examined showing the seating arrangements and location of exits at various places of amusement, together with other essential data bearing upon the matter of the safe use of these resorts by the public.

Combustibles and Explosives.

In the Division of Combustibles, all boroughs, the total amount of receipts during the second quarter for licenses and permits was \$38,431.50. Surveys to the number of 3,377 were made on application to determine the fitness of premises for the storage of combustibles and explosives. Blasting operations, 3,795 in all, were supervised by the civilian blasting inspectors of the division, and 10,613 cases by members of the uniformed force, an aggregate of 14,408. Inspections totalling 14,349 were made; 1,301 orders were served of which 1,053 were complied with. There were rescinded by the Fire Commissioner 118 orders. A total of 3,904 permits was issued; 94 plans of various kinds were approved, and 46 bombs and other dangerous contrivances examined.

Fires and Losses.

In the Division of Fire Marshal, Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond, during the second quarter, there were 2,034 fires, with a total estimated loss of \$1,006,712, representing an average loss per fire of \$494.94. In the Division of Fire Marshal, Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, during the same period, there were 1,137 fires, with a total estimated loss of \$638,260, being an average loss per fire of \$561.35.

The total estimated fire loss for the second quarter of 1912 in all boroughs was \$1,774,610, and for the corresponding period of 1913, \$1,664,972, a decrease of \$129,638. The total number of fires for the second quarter of 1912, in the entire city was 3,739, and for the similar period of 1913, 3,171, a decrease of 568. This diminished loss would have been nearly a quarter of a million dollars greater but for the occurrence of two large fires—one on the 8th of June, in a paper manufacturing establishment at 199 3d st., Long Island City, Borough of Queens, entailing an approximate loss of \$217,600; the other, on the 21st of June, in a multiple manufacturing establishment at 10-14 Bleecker st., Manhattan, causing an estimated loss of \$62,000. In both of these buildings, the installation of sprinkler systems had been ordered by this Department, but the failure of the owners of the respective premises promptly to provide them deprived these structures of this essential measure of protection, with the resulting serious property loss, which might have been avoided had they been so equipped.

Arson, Etc.

During the second quarter of the current year, in the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond, there were 29 arrests for arson which, with 11 cases pending from the previous quarter, made 40 the number to be disposed of. There were 14 convictions, 1 committal to an insane asylum, 1 plea of guilty to burglary while charged with arson, 1 instance in which the Grand Jury failed to indict, and 2 cases of dis-

charge by Magistrates, leaving 21 alleged incendiaries under indictment and awaiting trial at the close of the second quarter. In the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens during the second quarter, there were 9 arrests for arson which, with 9 cases pending from the preceding quarter, made the number to be disposed of 18. Of this total there were 2 convictions, 1 acquittal, 1 discharge by a Magistrate and 3 dismissals of indictments, leaving 11 alleged offenders under indictment and awaiting trial at the close of the second quarter.

There were, in all boroughs, during the second quarter of 1912, 14 arrests for arson as against 38 for the like period of 1913, an increase of 24. The convictions, in all boroughs, during the second quarter of 1912, numbered 6 as against 16 for the like period of 1913. There were thus, during the second quarter of 1913, as compared with the corresponding period of 1912, an increase of 24 in the number of arrests for arson and of 10 in the number of convictions for this crime.

Prosecutions.

During the second quarter of the current year 312 cases were handled by the Legal Division, growing out of violations of the provisions of the fire prevention law, of which 64 were pending at the close of the first quarter. The disposition of these cases was as follows: Convicted and fined, 144; convicted and sentence suspended, 60; discharged, 3. There were withdrawn for various reasons 18 cases, 10 of that number on compliance with the requirements of the Department. In two cases the defendants failed to appear in court and warrants were issued to enforce their presence. There were pending and undisposed of at the end of the second quarter, 65 cases. The total amount of receipts for fines by this division, from all sources, was \$3,035. Inspections to the number of 534 were made and 168 of the orders issued were complied with.

Apparatus.

During the period covered by this report 16 pieces of motor apparatus were received, consisting of 13 second-size steam fire engines with Christie tractors, 1 85-foot hook and ladder truck and 2 5-ton delivery trucks.

Buildings.

During the second quarter contracts were awarded for erecting two new apparatus houses, 1 at Whitestone and the other at Woodhaven, Borough of Queens, and for the plumbing, gas-fitting and steam-heating work therefor, the total contract prices for all of the work being \$40,063 and \$21,126 in the case of their respective buildings; also for a sprinkler and test house in drill yard in the rear of headquarters building, Manhattan, at a cost of \$1,925. Contracts were likewise awarded for additions to the quarters of Hook and Ladder Company 127, Brooklyn, involving an outlay of \$4,960, and for repairs and new electric lighting systems at quarters of Engine Company 68, The Bronx, at an expense of \$2,350. Minor repair jobs, 530 in all, were done to buildings by Department mechanics, entailing an expenditure of \$21,014.63, and 89 by open market orders, at a cost of \$10,373.75.

Horses.

At the close of the second quarter there were 1,377 horses in service.

Contracts, Agreements and Open Market Orders.

Contracts executed for furnishing apparatus, fuel, supplies, erecting new buildings, additions and alterations to existing buildings, establishing and equipping extensions to the fire alarm telegraph system, and for other Department purposes, amounted, for the second quarter, to \$40,413.55, and agreements entered into, during the same period for the purchase of supplies in cases involving an expenditure in amount less than \$1,000 totalled \$11,227.31, an aggregate of \$421,640.86.

During the period covered by this report 209 contract orders were issued in the gross sum of \$170,207.71, and 1,020 open market orders involving an outlay of \$97,028.05. Respectfully,

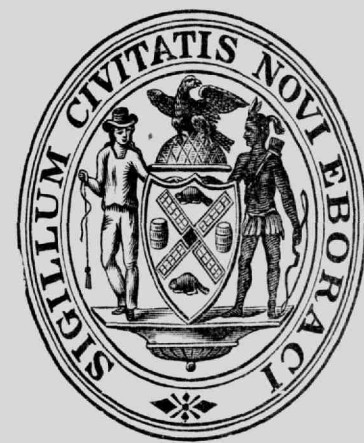

NOTICE TO BIDDERS AT SALES OF OLD BUILDINGS, ETC.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of the City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change of value which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or appurtenances between the time of the sale thereof and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly vacated of all tenants. The sale and delivery to purchaser will be made as nearly together as the circumstance of vacating the structures of their tenants will permit.

All the material of the buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street, and the opening of the main sewer

in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances, or portion as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed, and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the day of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials of labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless, The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furnishings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam-holes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for the City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of the City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement, to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
