Sir—In conformity with the requirements of section 119, chapter 466, Laws of 1901, Greater New York Charter, I transmit herewith the

RESULTS OF AN EXAMINATION OF THE RECEIPTS AND DISBURSEMENTS OF THE OFFICE OF THE CHAMBERLAIN FOR THE FOURTH QUARTER OF 1917.

I find that the balances in the city treasury, sinking funds and miscellaneous accounts on December 31, 1917, aggregated \$21,064,213.37, which agrees with the aggregate of the balances as shown by the Chamberlain's accounts and summaries accompanying this report. (See Exhibits "A," "B" and "C".)

The said balances were verified by the inspection of the certificates of the officers of the several depository banks of concurrent date. A schedule of the depositories, showing balances on December 31, 1917, at close of business, is appended under Exhibit "D."

An abstract of stock, bonds and notes issued and cancelled during the quarter ended December 31, 1917, is submitted under Exhibit "E."
