Re: Local Law 53 and 58 Noise Reports for Calendar Year 2023

Dear Mayor Adams:

Attached are the Local Law Noise and Air Reports for Calendar Year 2023 as required by Local Laws 53 and 58 of 2018.

Local Law 53 documents the number of noise inspections, with a focus on the number of noise complaints received by the Department of Environmental Protection related to after-hours noise complaints and response time to those complaints as well as the number of summonses issued. The numbers remained fairly consistent with a total of 48,459 noise complaints last year, and 51,793 this year. After hours complaint violations remained static with 123 summonses last year and 137 summonses this year.

Local Law 58 details the number of idling violations issued by the Department of Environmental Protection as well as the number of citizen complaint filings and the civil penalties imposed for each enforcement action. The summonses have more than doubled since the last Calendar Year, 2022 report, from 36,261 to 72,053 and the imposed summons amount have risen from \$8,365,950 to \$37,395,760.00. It should also be noted that the City has collected approximately \$30 million since the program started in 2018.

Local Law 58 Annual Report Calendar Year 2023

This report details the number of idling violations issued by the Department of Environmental Protection as well as the number of citizen complaint filings and the civil penalties imposed for each enforcement action.

The answers below describe the status of the DEP's implementation of the law and respond to the specific questions posed in the legislation.

1. What are the number of notices of violation filed with OATH, including the penalties for such violations?

There were 72,053 summonses issued in CY 2023. This includes summons from 311 idling complaints and from citizen complaints. The amount imposed was approximately\$38 million for CY 2023. Since the beginning of the program in 2018 through early December 2023, the City has collected approximately \$30 million In revenue.

2. What are the number of 311 idling complaints disaggregated by borough?

3. What are the number of citizen complaints filed with DEP (disaggregated by borough)?

As shown in the two above tables, the distribution of complaints does not match where 311 complaints are received. In 2024 DEP will be deploying a smartphone application that will simplify the complaint process and make using this tool more accessible to more people

Citizen participation has greatly increased over the past few years. The charts below reflect the success of this program both in terms of complaints submitted and the summons amounts imposed.





As seen above, both the number of complaints received, and summonses imposed have increased exponentially over the past few years. This has led to both settlement agreements with several large companies including Amazon, Verizon, Con Edison, and potential future settlements with FedEx, Brinks Incorporated, and Garda CL Atlantic, Inc.

In addition to settlement agreements, several armored trucking companies have sought variances to the air code to be exempted from idling violations. As part of their variance applications, they are making commitments to install anti-idling technology or electrify their trucks.
