The certificates of 565 births, 55 still-births, 186 marriages and 756 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, August 23, 1884. gitis and encephalitis, 8; convulsions, 4; direct effect of solar heat, 12; apoplexy, 1; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 20; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 3; gastritis, enteritis and peritontis, 6; suicide, 4. Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 127 were in institutions, 399 in tenement-houses, 212 in houses containing three families or less, 5 in hotels and boarding-houses, 13 in nvers, streets, boats, etc.; 12 were on the basement floor, 140 on the first, 197 on the second, 135 on the third, 83 on the fourth, 49 on the fifth, — on the sixth; 752 were stated to be residents of New York City and 4 non-residents; 66 were stated to be single, 157 married, 79 widowed, and the condition of 454 was not stated—these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 756; still-births, 55; bodies in transitu, 16. Of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births, 83 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 565 births, 186 marriages, 55 still-births; 756 deaths, 16 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated; 107 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 4 transcripts of the birth record, 6 of marriage, and 46 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending August 23, 1884, was 72.7 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 20.061, the mean humidity was 74, saturation being 100; the number of miles traveled by the wind was 648, and the total amount of rain-fall was 1.88 inches depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 143 were in institutions, 391 in tenement-houses, 142 in houses containing three families or less, 6 in hotels and boarding-houses, 9 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 14 were on the basement floor, 154 on the first, 154 on the second, 124 on the third, 66 on the fourth, 24 on the fifth, 3 on the sixth; 692 were stated to be residents of New York City, and — non-residents; 48 were stated to be single, 130 married, 65 widowed, and the condition of 449 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week is as follows, viz.: City deaths, 692; still-births, 60; bodies in transitu, 19; of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births, 68 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 600 births, 125 marriages, 60 still-births, 692 deaths; 19 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed and tabulated; 107 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 8 transcripts of the birth record, 8 of marriage, and 62 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending August 30, 1884, was 71.5 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.941, the mean humidity was 74, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,063, and the total amount of rain-hall was 2.63 inche depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Obser vatory, Central Park.

Whereas, By resolution approved December 23, 1876, all incorporated gas companies were permitted "to lay gas mains and pipes in the streets, avenues and public places in this city for the purpose of supplying gas to the City and its inhabitants, upon such conditions amy be first prescribed and approved of by his Honor the Mayor, the Comptroller, and the Commissioner of Public Works, who are now by law authorized to make provision for lighting the streets of the City; and, Whereas, Since the passage of the aforesaid resolution by the Common Council, several incorporated gas companies have obtained permission, under conditions prescribed and approved by the city officers therein named, to lay gas-pipes in many of the streets, avenues and public places, and have in good faith complied with the said conditions, and are now supplying, or are nearly ready to supply, gas to the City and its inhabitants; and

Whereas, At the General Term, May, 1884, of the Court of Common Pleas, in the suit of Elbert Ellery Anderson, appellant, against the Equitable Gas-light Company of New York and Hubert O. Thompson, respondents, it was held substantially that "there is no provision in the law useff authorizing them (the Common Council) to delegate this power, and that the case falls within the settled principle that powers of this description cannot be delegated," but must be regarded as "public powers and trusts, devolved by law or charter upon the Common Council, or governing body, to be exercised by it when and in such manner as it shall judge best, and cannot be delegated to others," and that "there is no provision of law authorizing the Mayor, Comptroller, and Commissioner of Public Works to decide the manner or upon what conditions the defendant corporation may open the streets to lay its mains, and any permit founded upon their action in the premises, confers no license, and is void;" and

Whereas, It would be manifestly unjust to the gas companies, who have acted throughout in good faith and have complied with the provisions
