

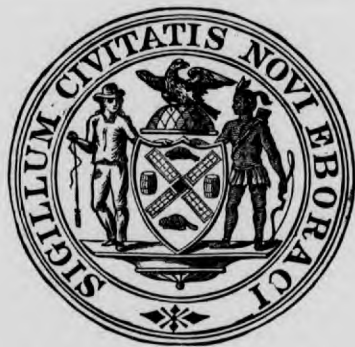

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## DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS.

Report for for Quarter ending June 30, 1888.

Hon. ABRAM S. HEWITT, Mayor:

SIR—In pursuance of the provisions of section 49, chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882, the Department of Public Parks hereby submits the following statement of its transactions during the three months ending June 30, 1888.

During the past quarter the Board of Parks has been reorganized by the retirement from the Presidency of Commissioner M. C. D. Borden, and the election of Commissioner J. Hampden Robb to that office.

Stevenson Towle, Esq., having been appointed a Commissioner of Parks on May 10 last, to fill the vacancy caused by the retirement of Commissioner Myers, was elected to the office of Treasurer, from which office Commissioner Borden (who had accepted the position temporarily) resigned on May 16, 1888.

Contracts for the following named works have been entered into by the Department:

For paving with granite blocks the roadway of One Hundred and Forty-eighth street, from Willis avenue to St. Ann's avenue. James Pollock, contractor; Michael Larkin and James Mulry, sureties.

For dredging and cleaning the Mott Haven Canal. James McSpirit, contractor; Thomas Potter and Joseph M. Potter, sureties.

For constructing a sewer and appurtenances in Morningside Park. Julius Figliuolo, contractor; P. J. Moran and Antonio Cuneo, sureties.

For paving with asphalt tile pavement the walks in Jeannette Park. James E. Nuttmann, contractor; W. L. Jenkins, Jr., and B. M. Hartshorne, sureties.

For constructing a sewer on the north side of the Southern Boulevard, between Willis avenue and the summit easterly thereof. John P. and James H. Kerrigan, contractors; Michael Casey and Michael Hughes, sureties.

For regulating, grading, etc., and flagging the sidewalks four feet wide in Sedgwick avenue, from Montgomery avenue to Van Courtland avenue. John J. Rogers and James Leeson, contractors; J. C. Rodgers and William Bostelmann, sureties.

For repairing and protecting the foundation and masonry of the Battery sea-wall. Thomas Hayden, contractor; Erastus Crawford and W. H. Morton, sureties.

For furnishing rock and earth-filling and building foundation walls on Morningside Park. Robert Hanna, contractor; Robert Murray and Stephen J. Wright, sureties.

For the renewal of the wood superstructure of the easterly approach to Central Bridge. John D. Walsh, contractor; James D. Leary and J. M. Cummings, sureties.

For repaving with mortar and concrete of Portland cement the walk adjoining the Battery sea-wall. John W. MacKnight, contractor; J. C. Lyons and Frank E. Smith, sureties.

The following contracts have been entered into by the Department, without public letting, under an ordinance of the Common Council:

For furnishing and erecting wall cases, leaf cases and pedestals therefor in the enlargement of the Metropolitan Museum of Art. Warren Ward & Company, contractors; G. P. Sherwood and Frank Rhoner, sureties.

For furnishing and erecting sixteen iron standards for leaf cases for the enlargement of the Metropolitan Museum of Art. The North American Iron Works, contractors; Thomas P. Rushby and Theodore Susemihl, sureties.

In pursuance of the provisions of chapter 721 of the Laws of 1887, an act authorizing the Department of Public Parks to alter the lines, grades and classification of certain streets in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, maps showing the following changes have been adopted and filed, after having been duly advertised and hearings given, as required by the act cited:

Map showing changes in lines, etc., of a portion of Brookline street, between Valentine avenue and Kingsbridge road, Twenty-fourth Ward.

Changes in the street system in the Fordham Heights District, between Sedgwick avenue and the Harlem river and extending from the lands of H. W. T. Mali to those of N. P. Bailey, in the Twenty-fourth Ward.

Alterations in the lines of Osborne place, between Loring place and Andrew's avenue, in the Twenty-fourth Ward.

Change of classification of East One Hundred and Sixty-fourth street, from Cauldwell avenue to Trinity avenue, in the Twenty-third Ward, from third to first class.

Change of classification of John street, from Brook to Eagle avenue, in the Twenty-third Ward, from third to first class.

Maps have been taken from file, amended by designating thereon grades, angles, distances, etc., and refiled in accordance with the provisions of chapter 577 of the Laws of 1887, as follows:

East One Hundred and Seventy-sixth street, between Carter and Third avenues, Twenty-fourth Ward.

East One Hundred and Seventy-third street, from Weeks street to Third avenue.

Maps showing the grade of the intersection of the Southern Boulevard and St. Ann's avenue, as altered and established, have also been filed as required by law.

Maps showing plan of drawing for Sewerage District No. 33 F, and a portion of Sewerage District No. 33 A, in the Twenty-fourth Ward, were adopted and filed in the several offices designated by law for the filing of such maps.

The Department having been advised by the Counsel to the Corporation that it still had the power to carry out the provisions of chapter 681 of the Laws of 1886, a map, showing street alterations under that act, has been adopted and filed.

The Board of Street Opening and Improvement has been requested to include in one proceeding, as authorized by chapter 721 of the Laws of 1887, an application for the opening of the following-named streets:

German place, from Westchester avenue to Brook avenue.

Rae street, from German place to St. Ann's avenue.

Carr street, from German place to St. Ann's avenue.

A plan for the depression of the tracks and changing the grades of that portion of the Port Morris branch of the New York and Harlem Railroad from East One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street to the junction with the main line at East One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street, temporary adjustment at Westchester avenue, and carrying certain streets, etc., in the Twenty-third Ward, over the said railroad, showing the proposed grades of said railroad and of the streets, avenues and roads for crossing the same, has been prepared and is now under consideration.

On May 31 the Board governing the Department passed the following resolutions:

Resolved, That One Hundred and Eleventh street, between Fifth and Sixth avenues, shall not be used for the purpose of any games, sports or exhibitions of any kind or description whatever, or for any purposes other than those which are consistent with the uses of a public street, and that no erections, structures or incumbrances shall be established, maintained or continued thereon, especially any fences enclosing or erected upon the same, and any other buildings or structures of any kind thereon, except as this Board may at any time hereafter, from time to time, otherwise order.

Resolved, That the Commissioner of Public Works be and he hereby is respectfully requested to notify the Superintendent of Incumbrances to cause the incumbrances now upon said street to be removed.

A petition of the Cathedral Church of St. John the Divine, for the closing of One Hundred and Eleventh and One Hundred and Twelfth streets, between Tenth and Morningside avenues, having been referred to this Department, for recommendation, by the Board of Street Opening and Improvement, the matter was duly considered and a favorable report thereon was rendered.

A statue of Garibaldi, presented to the City by the Garibaldi Monument Association, has been erected in Washington Square.

It has been decided to place the statues of Washington Irving and William Cullen Bryant, referred to in previous reports as having been presented to the City, in Bryant Park.

Several of the principal Park buildings have been insured, as follows:

Mount St. Vincent .....	\$30,000 00
Claremont .....	15,000 00
High Bridge Park Hotel .....	5,000 00

The licensees occupying the buildings insured were authorized to pay the premiums for the insurance, the amounts of which were credited on account of their license fees.

Licenses for the following-named privileges have been granted:

For conducting the boat service on the Central Park Lake for one year from January 1, 1888, to J. Clarence Dick; fee, \$750.

For conducting the boat service on the Harlem Meer in Central Park for one year from May 1, 1888, to William Keeler; fee, \$200.

For mooring a float and letting boats at the northerly end of the Third Avenue Bridge over Harlem river, for one year from May 1, 1888, to J. C. Cornet; fee, \$100.

For mooring a float and letting boats at the southerly end of Third Avenue Bridge over Harlem river, for one year from May 1, 1888, to William Anderson; fee, \$250.

For the sale of soda and mineral waters in Tompkins Square, to D. F. Cray; fee, 20 per cent. of gross receipts.

The consent of the Department has been given to the erection of bay or oriel windows, as follows:

On the house of L. H. Biglow, at the southeast corner of Seventeenth street and Rutherford place.

On five houses to be erected by Mary A. Pettit at the northeast corner of One Hundred and Twelfth street and Manhattan avenue.

On the apartment building of Thomas R. A. and William H. Hall at the southwest corner of Eighty-third street and Central Park, West.

On building of J. C. Lyon at the northwest corner of Park avenue and Fifty-sixth street.

On building of John J. Dennis, on Central Park, West, between One Hundred and Sixth and One Hundred and Seventh streets.

The following arrangement of Park Concerts has been made and is being carried out:

Central Park—Cappa's Seventh Regiment Band of 42 pieces, Saturday and Sunday afternoons.

Battery Park—Bayne's Sixty-ninth Regiment Band of 32 pieces, Friday evenings.

Tompkins Square—Eben's Military Band of 32 pieces, Tuesday evenings.

Mount Morris Park—Dodworth's Band of 32 pieces, Wednesday evenings.

Also occasional concerts at Paradise Park on Monday evenings by Bayne's Sixty-ninth Regiment Band of 21 pieces.

Plans have been prepared for the permanent landscape improvement of the section of Central Park lying between One Hundred and Second and One Hundred and Tenth streets and west of Fifth avenue. These plans have been approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, who have authorized the issue of bonds to the amount of \$45,000 for doing the work under the provisions of chapter 575 of the Laws of 1887.

Under this law plans have also been prepared and approved for erecting a park vertical wall on the southerly side of One Hundred and Tenth street, between Fifth and Eighth avenues, and for completing the side walls of Transverse Road No. 2 through the Central Park. Funds have been provided for carrying out these works, and they will shortly be commenced.

The Comptroller has been requested to provide, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 575 of the Laws of 1887, and in the manner described in said act, an additional sum of \$50,000 to carry on the work of the improvement of Morningside Park.

At the request of the Department the Board of Estimate and Apportionment has made the following transfers of appropriations:

The sum of \$27.27 from the appropriation for "Labor, Maintenance, Supplies," etc., 1887, to the appropriation "Zoological Department," 1887.

The sum of \$7,000 from "Police—Salaries, etc.," 1888, to "Police—Supplies," 1888.

On May 16 the following were adopted:

"Whereas, The Legislature, at its last session, passed a bill giving to the officers of the Park Police the same rights and privileges as already secured to the Patrolman of the force, providing that they shall be removed on charges only, and that they shall not be reduced from their present rank.

"Resolved, That said bill is a proper and just one in the premises, and that this Board approve the same and commend it to the Governor for his signature."

A committee of Engineers, consisting of General John Newton, Colonel E. B. Van Winkle, T. C. Clarke and George W. McNulty, having been requested by the Department to take into consideration the subject of a bridge or tunnel as a means of transit across the Harlem river at Seventh avenue and make a report of their conclusions, submitted a report in favor of a tunnel, which was approved and adopted by the Board of Parks.

### CENTRAL AND CITY PARKS.

#### Gardening Department.

The principal work of this Department has been the setting out of bedding plants in the various parks, the planting of trees and shrubs and the cutting out of dead or overcrowded trees.

171 such trees have been removed, nearly all from the Central Park.

3,112 trees and shrubs have been planted out at the following places:

Centre Drive, north of Sixty-fifth street Transverse Road, in the vicinity of the Carousel, at the lower end of the Green, around Conservatory Lake, at the loop in the Bridle Path, near Seventy-eighth street and Eighth avenue, at the north end of the New Reservoir, at the Boliver Statue.

Trees were planted on Eighth avenue, between Seventy-second and Eighty-first streets, and in vacant spaces along Fifty-ninth street, between Fifth and Eighth avenues.

20 choice Japanese maples, from Mr. James Hogg's place, at the foot of East Eighty-fourth street, have been transplanted to the upper part of Central Park, near One Hundred and Second street.

Jackson Square and Canal street parks have also been fully planted.

150,000 bedding plants have been set out in the various beds set apart for their use in the Central and smaller parks.

Over 100,000 plants and shrubs have been planted out for use at Morningside Park, in frames, at north end of the said park, and at the Greenhouse on Central Park, near One Hundred and Fourth street and Fifth avenue.

Water lilies have been planted in the fountain basins at Bowling Green, City Hall, Washington Square, Tompkins Square, Rutherford and Stuyvesant Squares, Terrace Fountain, Central Park, and at the Lily Pond.

In addition to the above, the necessary work of cultivating the various flower-beds, preparing and laying out of new beds at the Casino, and the watering of the shrubs, trees and plants has been attended to.

#### Park Maintenance.

This work is largely routine, and consists of the daily care of drives, bridle paths and transverse roads and walks.

It also consists of cleaning, on an average of once a month, of the road and walk basins. The hauling to the dump of the material removed from these basins is an important item of work.

The Ladies' and Gentlemen's Cottages throughout the Central and City Parks have been kept open in charge of attendants, on an average of twelve hours per day.

The work of rolling, scraping and sprinkling the drives has been considerable during the past quarter. In addition to which 4,027 cubic yards of gravel were received and spread on the drives and bridle roads.

During the past quarter the park lawns have been opened for the usual summer games and children's picnics. In the matter of picnics, over fifty thousand children have used the lawns of the Park. This entailed considerable work in cleaning lawns, attending to the children and preventing the destruction of Park property.

The lawns of the Park are now used for croquet, lawn-tennis, lacrosse, foot-ball and baseball playing and cricket.

During the past quarter, concerts have been given in the Central and City Parks, as follows:

On Mall, Central Park, twice per week; Tompkins Square, Battery Park and Mount Morris Park, once per week.



This matter of music causes considerable work, both in preparation and decoration of music stands and cleaning up after the concerts.

There were 1,230 cubic yards of manure received at the Sheepfold during the past quarter, a follows :

Hauled on the Park by outside parties.....	870 cubic yards.
From Menagerie.....	270 "
From Police Stables, Sheepfold.....	90 "

Considerable work has been done in the maintenance and improvement of the fences throughout the Department.

Over 100,000 square feet of sod were used in preparing the lawns and borders of the Central and City Parks.

About 1,500 cubic yards of mould were received and stored at the Sheepfold Yard. 886 cubic yards of mould were used in filling the tree holes along Eighth avenue, from Seventy-second to Eighty-first streets.

The lawns of the Park have been mowed from time to time, as required. The long grass cut has either been carted to the Menagerie for the use of the animals or sold. The short grass has been hauled to the dump.

Aside from the ordinary maintenance, as specified above, the following items of work were undertaken during the past quarter :

#### First Division.

The work of preparing and opening the small park at the junction of Ninth avenue Boulevard and Sixty-third street has been completed. This work required 7,000 square feet of sod. A man has been placed in charge of this park and settees furnished for the use of visitors.

The circle at Eighth avenue and Fifty-ninth street was repaired by the application of about 200 cubic yards of broken stone.

#### Second Division.

West Seventy-second street, from the Park to Riverside Drive (being a part of this division), has been cleaned and watered regularly.

#### Third Division.

During the past quarter the storing away of the skate building and the covering at the Terrace and Bethesda fountain have been completed.

The shores of the lakes and streams through the Ramble have been cleaned ; 280 cart loads of mud and refuse were removed.

The Fourth Avenue Parks (a part of this division), have received the necessary care and attention, also East River Park.

#### Fourth Division.

No work outside the ordinary maintenance has been undertaken in this division. Manhattan Square has been cared for and mowed as occasion required.

#### Stable Gang.

The force employed at the stables has been engaged in the care, etc., of 84 horses as follows :

The wear and tear on the harness of the Department has been met and provided for by the harness-maker.

#### Fifth and Sixth Divisions.

Very little outside the usual routine work was undertaken in this division, the chief work being the care and maintenance of the Lawn Tennis Grounds which are located here.

#### Seventh Division.

A large part of the force employed in this division is engaged at the greenhouses in the care and propagation of plants and shrubs.

The shores of Harlem Meer are cleaned almost daily, and the refuse carted to the dump.

#### Mount Morris Park.

The work performed in this park has been largely of a routine character.

Considerable work has been done at this park, in preparation for the Wednesday evening concerts, and in cleaning up after the concerts.

#### Eighth and Ninth Divisions.

These divisions comprize the City Parks below Fifty-ninth street.

Considerable work has been done at Jackson Square, preparatory to opening it for the use of the public. The work consisted of regrading lawns, laying-out walks, planting shrubs, etc.

The other squares, Bryant, Madison, Rutherford and Union Squares, and the various triangles have been cared for from time to time as necessary.

10,000 square feet of asphalt walks have been laid at the triangles, Thirty-second and Thirty-fifth streets, Sixth avenue and Broadway.

The work on the City Parks, composing the Ninth Division, has been as follows :

At Tompkins Square the lawns have been improved by the use of mould, Mapes' fertilizer and grass seed, and 1,175 feet of wire fence were erected.

At City Hall Park the lawns were treated in a similar manner, and 3,155 feet of wire fence erected.

At Battery Park similar treatment was pursued.

Considerable work was done in the preparation of Canal Street Park for the use of the public. The lawns were graded and walks laid out and asphalted.

The triangles at different points throughout the Department were cared for as occasion required.

#### Riverside Park and Drive.

The work at this point has consisted of cleaning basins and gutters and repairing same, repairing flag and gravel walks, repairing wash-outs, rolling, cleaning and watering drive, and mowing lawns and grass plots.

3,060 cubic yards of clean earth filling has been delivered west of the Drive in the Park, in the neighborhood of Ninety-first street, where it was used in grading the slopes. About 100 cubic yards of garden mould was received in the neighborhood of Seventy-ninth street.

#### Morningside Park.

The work at this park has consisted in grading the ground and laying foundations of walks.

#### Carpenter Work.

The chief items of carpenter work in Central Park have been the repair of the entire roof of the Arsenal building, the repair of floors, porch, etc., at Mount St. Vincent Hotel, and building of sheep paddock and new stalls at Police stable, Sheepfold.

Repaired music stand on Mall, put in new floor timbers, gate, etc.

Made incidental repairs at 11 cottages, 2 arbors and 3 base boxes on the Central Park.

At Riverside—Overhauled Claremont Hotel, and made repairs at Police sub-station.

At East River Park Building—Made necessary alterations incidental to fitting up a gentlemen's water-closet, put in 3 new closets and 4 urinals.

Built new boat landing with railing, etc., complete on Pond at Fifty-ninth street and Fifth avenue.

Erected and removed platform, etc., for Decoration Day services at Grant's tomb at Riverside, also erected and removed reviewing stand on Mall, on occasion of Police parade.

Built 636 linear feet of rail fence on sea-wall, East River Park, and 956 feet of board walk at Conservatory Lake, Central Park.

Took down skate building and platforms at large lake and also enclosure of Terrace Bridge and fountain.

Repaired 1,062 settees, as follows :

Also two sections of stationary seats on Mall.

Made 70 new signs and repaired 41 old signs for the Central and City Parks.

Made following repairs to the woodwork of bridges over the Harlem river :

At Third Avenue Bridge—Repaired dangerous places in bottom flooring.

At Central Bridge—Repaired draw.

Made the necessary repairs at Madison Avenue Bridge to meet ordinary wear and tear.

Repaired the woodwork of 55 pieces of rolling-stock, such as light wagons, dirt and grass carts, water trucks, etc.

#### Painters' Work.

Painted, grained and varnished inside of 8 cottages on the Central and City Parks ; also repairs of 12 others, and repairs of music stand on Mall.

Painted iron railings of Park Avenue Parks from Thirty-fourth to Fortieth street.

Painted 1,043 settees for the Central and City Parks and 150 stationary platform settees on Mall, Central Park.

Painted entire 18 pieces of rolling stock and the repairs on 19 other pieces.

Painted, lettered and varnished 455 signs for the Central and City Parks and 500 labels for use of gardeners.

Done necessary glazing where required at cottages and buildings on the Central and City Parks.

#### Mason Work.

Built 3 receiving-basins and set 50 feet of 8-inch pipe, one 10-inch and one 8-inch running trap, and laid 50 feet of concrete flooring in basement of Arsenal building.

Built 2 bridle-road basins and 2 walk basins, and laid 570 feet of 8-inch drain-pipe, connecting with brick sewer at North Meadow, near East Drive and One Hundredth street.

Built 2 new walk basins and laid 110 feet of 6-inch drain-pipe in Ramble.

Plastered and repointed coping of fountain at Terrace Bridge ; also repaired stone fountains at north end of Mall ; also concreted and repaired fountain at Washington Square.

Cut two doorways through brick wall, built jambs and turned arches in same, built two openings in brick wall 10 feet by 5 feet, regraded and relaid 900 square feet of blue-stone flagging, excavated and removed 65 cubic yards of old concrete floor, removed 1,800 square feet of flagging, and relaid the same with concrete flooring, excavated and laid 33 feet of drain-pipe with traps complete at Police stables, Sheepfold.

Laid 1,686 cubic feet of concrete, 20,000 rough brick ; split, cut and set 716 feet of granite ; built 1,820 cubic feet of stone foundation ; built two brick basins and laid 37 feet of 8-inch sewer pipe ; made three connections with sewer ; cut and set 38 granite fence-posts, and cut and set 140 square feet of blue stone flagging at hippopotamus tank, near Arsenal.

Recut and reset 317 feet of curb at triangle, Broadway, Sixth avenue and Thirty-fifth street.

Underpinned and pointed up 896 feet of bed and cross joints of stone piers at Madison Avenue Bridge.

Cut and set 10 granite posts ; repaired and pointed base and repaved street at drinking-fountain, Madison Square.

#### Machinist Work.

This force consists of engineers and men employed in operating the bridges over the Harlem river, horseshoers, blacksmiths, tool-dressers, etc.

The draw-bridges over the Harlem river have been operated satisfactorily.

Repairs have been made to the iron railings and urinals on the City Parks.

Attended to the shoeing of 86 horses employed on maintenance and police work.

Attended to the repairs of rolling stock, steam-pipes, tools, etc.

#### Plumbers' Work.

Put in three new water-closets and four urinals, with necessary connections, etc., at East River Park.

Repaired stop-cocks and fountains, iron urinals, street washers, hydrants, etc., on the Central and City Parks.

Put in water and gas fixtures at new stables, Sheepfold, and at the slaughter-house, at same place.

Attended to bursts in Croton pipes and stoppages in same at various places in the Central and City Parks.

#### Jeannette Park.

A contract for paving with asphalt tile the walks in the Park was executed May 9 last, and the work was completed June 25, 1888.

The quantity of pavement laid was 7,567 square feet.

#### Riverside Avenue.

The work of completing the unfinished portion of the avenue is being done under contract, and the mason work in the walls, etc., has been completed. The quantities of work done since December 31, 1887, are—

29 cubic yards retaining wall.

12 cubic yards parapet wall.

95 lineal feet coping set.

23 lineal feet dry stone culvert.

26,500 cubic yards filling furnished.

#### The Morningside Park.

The work being done under contract is the construction of a sewer, etc., the contract for which was executed May 8, 1888. The work is about completed. The contract for filling and building foundation walls, etc., was executed May 25, 1888. This work is now in progress.

The work done under the contract is—

334.50 lineal feet of brick sewer built.

300 cubic yards foundation walls.

1,500 cubic yards filling furnished.

The work being done by men in the employment of the Department and under the direction of the Superintendent since January 1, 1877, is approximately—

4,000 cubic yards excavation of earth and mould.

3,100 cubic yards filling.

565 cubic yards rock excavation.

310 cubic yards mould hauled from outside Park.

18 cubic yards walls for rustic work.

3,260 square yards of storm superstructure of walls.

190 lineal feet 6-inch and 8-inch drain pipe laid.

#### REPAIRS OF THE BATTERY SEA-WALL.

This was commenced on June 4, 1888, under a contract executed May 23, 1888, and is still in progress. The work done has been—

35 cubic yards wall taken down and rebuilt.

100 lineal feet wall under.

500 lineal feet wall pointed.

#### HARLEM RIVER BRIDGES.

No special repairs to the bridges at Third and Madison avenues have been made.

#### Central Bridge.

Special repairs to the draw span was commenced about the 1st instant, and are now in progress. The amount expended for labor has been \$850. A contract for the renewal of the superstructure of the easterly approach has been executed, and work was commenced on the 18th of June, and is now in progress.

#### Engineer Corps and Inspectors.

The present force is :

1 Engineer of Construction.

2 Assistants.

1 Draughtsman.

4 Axemen.

3 Inspectors.

During the past quarter the work of removing cocoons, egg-masses, bag-worms, webs, scale insects and masses of caterpillars at work on the foliage has been continued. The syringing of the elm trees for the goleruca has been carried on since the 5th of June, and the work can now be prosecuted in the best manner and six times as fast as formerly, with a saving of fully one-third of the spraying liquid with the excellent machine we have. With this machine we can throw a spray to the tops of the highest trees and completely poison the foliage for the destruction of leaf insects.

Owing to the lateness of the season and unfavorable weather for the development of the destructive elm beetle, they made their appearance two weeks later than usual. But few trees have been injured, and these were from the fact of our not getting the machine in time to spray them in the first stage or egg state. By carefully watching the elms and poisoning the trees as soon as the eggs appear the trees have in the past been kept in fair condition. The force employed has been one man with myself, and we have been constantly employed in removing the insects conspicuously in operation in all the parks of the city. A number of trees are quite badly defoliated already. As the force is insufficient to keep the myriads of insects in check, and as there are already 1,187 species of insects at work on the trees, shrubs and plants, it is evident as to the amount of care required to successfully combat them.

In the Central Park 370 trees have already been syringed for the elm beetle, 520 for scale insects ; 130 white pine trees have been cleaned of the pine eriosom, 212 of orygia cocoons. One week has been given entirely to the removal of the webs of hyphantria and chsiocampa, and much time to the destruction of ichthyura, so abundant on shrubs of all kinds. The work of destroying



those most apparent and active has been rigorously prosecuted, and all the cocoons, egg-masses, webs, etc., have been destroyed, amounting in the aggregate to many bushels of eggs, etc., representing countless myriads of insects in the embryo state.

In Washington Square 104 trees have been washed with the polysolve preparation for destroying scale insects, and during this month all the large trees will be sprayed with London purple for the destruction of the orgyia and elm beetle. Great quantities of the cocoons of the orgyia have been and are continually being taken from the trunks and branches of the trees in this park.

In Union Square the number of trees cleaned has been 187.

In Madison Square the number of trees cleaned and syringed was 146.

In Stuyvesant Square the trees have been cleaned of cocoons and washed with polysolve (25).

In Tompkins Square 192 trees have been treated for scale insects.

Abingdon Square—22 trees have been treated for the eriosoma.

In East River Park, 31 trees have been cleaned of cocoons of plotysamio cynthia.

In Mount Morris Park, 176 trees have been treated for scale insects and the elm beetle and all the shrubbery cleaned of bugworm cases, 1 bushel and 2 quarts of these cases having been taken from the west side of the park alone.

In Bryant Square, all the trees were thoroughly examined and 114 treated for scale insects.

Riverside Park—The trees have been examined in Riverside Park and all cocoons removed and infected ones cleaned of scales, and nearly half of the elms syringed for the elm beetle; those from Eighty-eighth street to Ninety-first street twice. The total number of trees treated, 287.

Eighth avenue, from Fifty-ninth street to Seventy-second street—104 trees on this avenue have been treated with polysolve for scale insects.

Plaza at Fifty-ninth street and Eighth avenue—All the trees surrounding this plaza have been treated for the scale insect. Total number, 17.

Plaza at Fifty-ninth street and Fifth avenue—All the horse-chestnuts have been cleaned of cocoons and scale insects. Total number cleaned, 9.

Fifty-ninth street, from Fifth to Eighth avenue—All the trees on Fifty-ninth street have been cleaned of scale insects and pulvoria, which is so abundant on these maples (47).

All the smaller parks and places have been given as much attention as was possible and the trees are in fair condition.

## TWENTY-THIRD AND TWENTY-FOURTH WARDS.

On all contracts in force during the quarter work has been prosecuted with more or less activity, several having been brought to completion and others nearly so.

An encouraging advance of the large main sewer in Webster avenue has been made in the quarter, conveying the hope of its early completion.

The regulating and grading, etc., of Sedgwick and St. Ann's avenues, has been rapidly forwarded, and good progress has also been made in general on the minor contracts for grading, curbing, flagging, etc., paving, and the construction of sewers.

The cleaning and dredging out of the Mott Haven Canal was begun and successfully finished in the quarter; the contractor's force working day and night without intermission, except when the state of the tide or the shifting of boats in the canal compelled a temporary cessation of operations.

This work required the utmost care and circumspection in its prosecution, owing to the decayed and insecure condition of the bulkheads and banks of the canal, threatening disaster which has been happily averted; and the result of the undertaking has given general satisfaction. In its accomplishment about 20,000 cubic yards of deposit has been dredged, removed, transhipped and dumped at sea.

Supervision has been given to the extension of the elevated railroad, especial attention being paid to the plans of the foundation piers, with regard to proper preservation of public underground structures.

The laying of a horse railroad in a portion of the Southern Boulevard, has also been carefully supervised and inspected.

Much has been done in preliminary work and surveys for new improvements, which will be put under contract as soon as practicable, and as the City acquires title to the streets.

The plans and specifications for the important outlet sewer in Railroad avenue, East, have been completed, and the work is to be put under control immediately.

This sewer will afford proper sewerage to a district standing pre-eminently in need of it, and surveys and plans are in progress for the further extension of the main and branch sewers to rapidly follow the opening of the streets and avenues.

Plans are under way for sewers in other districts and for various street improvements throughout the annexed district.

Great activity is manifested by the Harlem railroad in its work of depressing the tracks, a very fair beginning having been made, and with the advance of this work other improvements will be soon seen.

The work is, however, somewhat hampered by the City's want of title to streets; and the slow movement of street opening proceedings is delaying this, as it has heretofore all work of a public character in the district.

The depression of the tracks has been carried on with due regard to the public convenience, which necessarily is affected to some extent in a work of such magnitude.

The amount of the various items of work done under public contracts for sewers and street improvements in the quarter is given by the annexed schedules.

On motion of the Mayor, it was ordered that where proposals are invited by the Board of City Record, it shall be requested in the future that they be enclosed in sealed envelopes addressed to the Board.

Submitting the Provisional Estimate for 1889.

The Supervisor presented the following report, which after discussion was, on motion of the Commissioner of Public Works, laid over for future action:

OFFICE OF THE CITY RECORD, NO. 2 CITY HALL, NEW YORK, August 22, 1888.

Hon. ABRAM S. HEWITT, Mayor; Hon. HENRY R. BEEKMAN, Counsel to the Corporation; Hon. JOHN NEWTON, Commissioner of Public Works:

GENTLEMEN—I am in receipt of a circular letter from the Comptroller, under date 24th ult., requesting an estimate in detail of the amounts required to pay the expenses of conducting the business of this office for the year 1889.

In submitting such an estimate, I respectfully call attention to the condition of the present appropriations for "Printing, Stationery and Blank Books" and "Publication of CITY RECORD." Both are insufficient for the necessary demands on them, a condition of things not exceptional this year but the prevailing rule for many years.

"Printing, Stationery and Blank Books."

The amount of this appropriation for 1888 now remaining unexpended, \$14,196.12, is sufficient only to meet outstanding obligations and fixed monthly charges. The unexpended balances at the same date in 1887 and 1886 were respectively \$52,972.79 and \$50,743.18.

Whenever in the past this appropriation became exhausted, it has been the practice to permit the regular dealers in printing and stationery supplies to furnish at their own risk such printing and stationery as the departments, courts and bureaus imperatively needed for the remainder of the year. Up to 1886 the deficiencies thus created were made good at the close of each year by transfers from unexpended balances wherever the same might exist, or by allowing the dealer to sue and recover out of the judgment fund.

In that year the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted a new method and made the appropriation read for "Printing, Stationery, etc., etc., and including arrearages." This plan simplified the accounts and saved the city costs in litigation. In its actual operation, however, the amount of arrears continually increased because in making each annual appropriation the Board of Estimate and Apportionment failed to take into account the arrears that would exist when the new appropriation became available; thus this year's appropriation was depleted on the 2d day of January to the extent of \$25,793.93 for work and supplies neither performed nor delivered this year.

I have estimated the amount required for "Printing, Stationery and Blank Books—1889, including arrearages," at.....

This estimate is arrived at as follows:

This sum will, in my judgment, clear up all arrearages to close of 1889, as well as provide for the necessary books, printing and stationery for that year.

If the amount asked for is granted, the estimate for 1890 will not need to include either the item for arrears or the estimated deficiency for the current year, which together aggregate in this estimate over \$40,000.

In making the estimate for 1888, I adopted as a basis the amounts actually expended in the several departments and offices during the year 1886, the then last completed year. I now append tabular statements showing the expenditures in these different offices to July 31, 1888, as compared with same expenditures to same date in 1886, also the entire expenditures under like heads in the years 1886 and 1887.

"Publication of City Record."

In January of this year a transfer of \$4,233.42 was made from the appropriation "Publication of CITY RECORD—1888," to meet a deficiency of that amount in 1887. Excluding this, the expenditure to July 31, this year, is \$33,495.13, as against \$30,492.30 in 1887, and \$35,825.16 in 1886, for same months.

The cost of compiling and printing the Registry last year was \$8,351.37. I estimate the increase of the Registry this year at thirty-three per cent., and a consequent increased money expenditure of about \$2,800.

Resolved, That under the power conferred by law upon the Health Department, the following additional section to the Sanitary Code for the security of life and health, be and the same is hereby adopted and declared to form a portion of the Sanitary Code:

Section 219. In every public hospital and dispensary in the City of New York there shall be provided and maintained a suitable room or rooms and place for the temporary isolation of persons infected with contagious disease, who shall immediately be separated from the other persons and other patients at such dispensary or hospital. It shall be the duty of the physician or physicians, of the officers, managers and of every one in charge of a hospital or dispensary, and of every one who has any duty or office in respect to patients in the course of treatment, or persons who apply for treatment or care at a dispensary or hospital, to see that a report is immediately made to the Health Department of the City of New York of every person infected with a contagious disease who comes to their knowledge, and that such person or persons so infected are properly isolated and kept separate from other persons and other patients.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH of the Health Department of the City of New York, held at its office, No. 301 Mott street, January 27, 1888, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That section 18 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

SEC. 18. That no owner or lessee of any building, or any part thereof, shall lease or let, or hire out the same or any portion thereof, to be occupied by any person, or allow the same to be occupied, as a place in which, or for any one, to dwell or lodge, except when said buildings or such parts thereof are sufficiently lighted, ventilated, provided and accommodated, and are in all respects in that condition of cleanliness and wholesomeness, for which this Code or any law of this State provides, or in which they or either of them require any such premises to be kept. Nor shall any such person rent, let, hire out, or allow, having power to prevent the same to be used as or for a place of sleeping or residence, any portion or apartment of any building, which apartment or portion has not at least one foot of its height



and space above the level of every part of the sidewalk and curbstone of any adjacent street, nor of which the floor is damp by reason of water from the ground, or which is impregnated or penetrated by any offensive gas, smell, or exhalation prejudicial to health. But this section shall not prevent the leasing, renting, or occupancy of cellars or rooms less elevated than aforesaid, and as a part of any building rented or let, when they are not let or intended to be occupied or used by any person as a sleeping apartment, or as a principal or sole dwelling apartment.

GRANTS OF LANDS UNDER WATER.

The matter will shortly be presented to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for their consideration, and the adjustment of the basis of commutation, and application for releases should therefore be made at once.

REGULATIONS ESTABLISHING A SCALE OF WATER RENTS AND RULES GOVERNING THE USE OF WATER, FOR THE CITY OF NEW YORK, BY ORDER OF JOHN NEWTON, COMMISSIONER OF PUBLIC WORKS.

UNDER CHAPTER 410, LAWS 1882, SECTIONS 350, 351, 352 AND 353, and as amended by chapter 559, Laws 1887, as follows:

"The commissioner of public works shall, from time to time, establish scales of rents for the supplying of water, which rents shall be collected in the manner now provided by law, and which shall be apportioned to different classes of buildings in said city in reference to their dimensions, values, exposure to fires, ordinary uses for dwellings, stores, shops, private stables and other common purposes, number of families or occupants, or consumption of water, as near as may be practicable, and modify, alter, amend and increase such scale from time to time, and extend it to other descriptions of buildings and establishments. All extra charges for water shall be deemed to be included in the regular rents, and shall become a charge and lien upon the buildings upon which they are respectively imposed, and, if not paid, shall be returned as arrears to the clerk of arrears. Such regular rents, including the extra charges above mentioned, shall be collected from the owners or occupants of all such buildings respectively, which shall be situated upon lots adjoining any street or avenue in said city in which the distributing water-pipes are or may be laid, and from which they can be supplied with water. Said rents, including the extra charges aforesaid, shall become a charge and lien upon such houses and lots, respectively, as herein provided, but no charge whatever shall be made against any building in which a water-meter may have been, or shall be placed as provided in this act. In all such cases the charge for water shall be determined only by the quantity of water actually used as shown by said meters. \* \* \* \* \*

"The said commissioner of public works is hereby authorized to prescribe a penalty not exceeding the sum of five dollars for each offense, for permitting water to be wasted, and for any violation of such reasonable rules as he may, from time to time, prescribe for the prevention of the waste of water; such fines shall be added to the regular water rents."

The regular annual rents to be collected by the Department of Public Works shall be as follows, to wit:

The rent of all tenements which shall exceed in width fifty feet shall be the subject of special contract with the Commissioner of Public Works.

The apportionment of the regular rents upon dwelling-houses are on the basis that but one family is to occupy the same, and for each additional family, one dollar per year shall be charged.

METERS will be placed on all houses where waste of water is found, and they will be charged at rates fixed by the Department for all the water passing through them.

The extra and miscellaneous rates shall be as follows to wit:

BAKERS.—For the average daily use of flour, for each barrel, three dollars per annum.

BARBER SHOPS shall be charged from five to twenty dollars per annum each in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works; an additional charge

five dollars per annum shall be made for each bath-tub therein.

BATHING TUBS in private houses, beyond one, shall be charged at three dollars per annum each, and five dollars per annum each in public houses, boarding-houses, and bathing establishments. Combination stationary wash-tubs, having a movable division in the centre and capable of use for bathing, shall be charged the same as bathing tubs.

BUILDING PURPOSES.—For each one thousand bricks laid, or for stone-work—to be measured as brick—ten cents per thousand. For plastering, forty cents per hundred yards.

COWS.—For each and every cow, one dollar per annum.

DINING SALOONS shall be charged an annual rate of from five to twenty dollars, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

FISH STANDS (retail) shall be charged five dollars per annum each.

For all stables not metered, the rates shall be as follows: HORSES, PRIVATE.—For two horses there shall be charged six dollars per annum; and for each additional horse, two dollars.

HORSES, LIVERY.—For each horse up to and not exceeding thirty in number, one dollar and fifty cents each per annum; and for each additional horse, one dollar.

HORSES, OMNIBUS AND CART.—For each horse, one dollar per annum.

HORSE TROUGHS.—For each trough, and for each half barrel or tub on sidewalk or street, twenty dollars per annum; each trough is to be fitted with a proper half-cock to prevent waste.

HOTELS AND BOARDING HOUSES shall, in addition to the regular rate for private families, be charged for each lodging room, at the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

LAUNDRIES shall be charged from eight to twenty dollars per annum, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

LIQUOR AND LAGER BEER SALOONS shall be charged an annual rate of ten dollars each. An additional charge of five dollars per annum shall be made for each tap or wash-box.

PHOTOGRAPH GALLERIES shall be charged an annual rate of from five to twenty dollars, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

PRINTING OFFICES, when not metered, shall be charged at such rates as may be determined by the Commissioner of Public Works.

SODA, MINERAL WATER AND ROOT BEER FOUNTAINS shall be charged five dollars per annum each.

STEAM ENGINES, where not metered, shall be charged by the horse-power, as follows: For each horse-power up to and not exceeding ten, the sum of ten dollars per annum; for each exceeding ten, and not over fifteen, the sum of seven dollars and fifty cents each; and for each horse-power over fifteen, the sum of five dollars.

WATER-CLOSETS AND URINALS.—To each building on a lot one water-closet having sewer connection is allowed without charge; each additional water-closet or urinal will be charged as hereinafter stated. All closets connected in any manner with sewer shall be charged two dollars for each seat per annum, whether in a building or on any other portion of the premises. Urinals shall be charged two dollars per annum each.

WATER-CLOSET RATES.—For hoppers of any form, when water is supplied direct from the Croton supply, through any form of the so-called single or double valves, hopper-cocks, stop-cocks, self-closing cocks, or any valve or cock of any description attached to the closet, each, per year, twenty dollars.

For any pan closet, or any of the forms of valve, plunger, or other water-closet not before mentioned, supplied with water as above described, per year, ten dollars.

For any form of hopper or water-closet, supplied from the ordinary style of cistern filled with ball-cock, and overflow pipe that communicates with the pipe to the water-closet, so that overflow will run into the hopper or water-closet, when ball-cock is defective, or from which an unlimited amount of water can be drawn by holding up the handle, per year, each, five dollars.

For any form of hopper or water-closet, supplied from any of the forms of waste-preventing cisterns, that are approved by the Engineer of the Croton Aqueduct, which are so constructed that not more than three gallons of water can be drawn at each lift of the handle, or depression of the seat, if such cisterns are provided with an overflow pipe, such overflow pipe must not connect with the water-closet, but be carried like a safe-waste, as provided by the Board of Health regulations, per year, two dollars.

Cistern answering this description can be seen at this Department.

METERS.

Under the provisions of section 352, Consolidated Act 1882, water-meters, of approved pattern, shall be hereafter placed on the pipes supplying all stores, workshops, hotels, manufactories, public edifices, at wharves, ferry-houses, stables, and in all places where water is furnished for business consumption, except private dwellings.

It is provided by section 352, Laws of 1882, that "all expenses of meters, their connections and setting, water rates, and other lawful charges for the supply of Croton water, shall be a lien upon the premises where such water is supplied, as now provided by law."

All manufacturing and other business requiring a large supply of water will be fitted with a meter.

Water measured by meter, ten cents per one hundred cubic feet.

The rate charged for steam-vessels taking water daily or belonging to daily lines, is one-half cent. per ton (Custom House measurement) for each time they take water.

Steamers taking water other than daily, one cent per ton (Custom House measurement).

Water supplied to sailing vessels and put on board, twenty-five cents per hundred gallons.

All matters not hereinbefore embraced are reserved for special contract by and with the Commissioner of Public Works.

HYDRANTS, HOSE, TROUGHS, FOUNTAINS, ETC., ETC.

No owner or tenant will be allowed to supply water to another person or persons.

All persons taking water from the City must keep their own service-pipes, street tap, and all fixtures connected therewith, in good repair, protected from frost, at their own risk and expense, and shall prevent all waste of water.

The use of hose to wash coaches, omnibuses, wagons, railway cars or other vehicles or horses, cannot be permitted.

No horse-troughs or horse-watering fixtures will be permitted in the street or on the sidewalk, except upon a license or permit taken out for that purpose. All licenses or permits must be annually renewed on the first of May. Such fixtures must be kept in good order and the water not allowed to drip or waste by overrunning the sidewalk or street, or to become dangerous in winter by freezing in and about such troughs or fixtures.

No hydrant will be permitted on the sidewalk or in the front area, and any hydrant standing in a yard or alley, attached to any dwelling or building, must not be left running when not in actual use, and if the drip or waste from such hydrant freezes and becomes dangerous in winter, the supply will be shut off in addition to the penalty of five dollars imposed.

Taps at wash-basins, water-closets, baths and urinals must not be left running, under the penalty of five dollars for each offense, which will be strictly enforced.

Fountains or jets in hotels, porter-houses, eating-saloons, confectioneries or other buildings are strictly prohibited.

The use of hose for washing sidewalks, stoops, areas, house-fronts, yards, court-yards, gardens, and about stables, is prohibited. Where premises are provided with wells, special permits will be issued for the use of hose, in order that the police or inspectors of this department may understand that the permission is not for the use of Croton water.

Opening fire-hydrants to fill hand sprinklers or other vessels will not be allowed.

The penalty for a violation of any of the preceding rules and regulations will be five dollars for each offense, and if not paid when imposed will become a lien on the premises in like manner as all other charges for unpaid water rates.

PUBLIC NOTICE AS TO WATER RATES.

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT in compliance with the provisions of chapter 559, Laws of 1887, amending sections 350 and 321 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, passed June 9, 1887, the following changes are made in charging and collecting water rents:

1st. All extra charges for water incurred from and after June 9, 1887, shall be treated, collected and returned in arrears in the same manner as regular rents have heretofore been treated.

2d. In every building where a water meter or meters are now, or shall hereafter be in use, the charge for water by meter measurement shall be the only charge against such building, or such part thereof as is supplied through meter.

3d. The returns of arrears of water rents, including the year 1887, shall be made as heretofore on the confirmation of the tax levy by the Board of Aldermen, and shall include all charges and penalties of every nature.

4th. A penalty of five dollars (\$5) is hereby established, and will be imposed in each and every case where the rules and regulations of the Department prohibiting the use of water through hose, or in any other wasteful manner, are violated, and such penalties will be entered on the books of the Bureau against the respective buildings or property, and, if not collected, be returned in arrears in like manner as other charges for water.

5th. Charges for so-called extra water rents of every nature, imposed or incurred prior to June 9, 1881, will be canceled of record on the books of the Department.

NOTICE TO CROTON WATER CONSUMERS.

NUMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN made to this Department by citizens claiming reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through meters, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by defective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willful waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be turned on in full force in water-closets, sinks, etc., without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premises.

The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and unwarrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted.

Notice is therefore given to all householders that, in all further applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occupants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings.

House-owners are further notified that whenever their premises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is complied with no deductions in extra water rents will be allowed for any portion of one year.
