There were 405 complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors and the Sanitary Police.
There were 197 complaints received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors and Sanitary Police for investigation and report.

There were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, 80 permits.

There were issued to consignees, to discharge rags (in bulk, under bonds), 5 permits.
There were issued, under the Sanitary Code, 13 miscellaneous permits.
There were issued to scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks, 43 permits.

The certificates of 670 births, 49 still-births, 274 marriages and 673 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, October 29, 1887. This shows a decrease of 95 births and 15 still-births, and an increase of 8 marriages and 57 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1886 there was a decrease of 55 births, 5 still-births and 21 marriages, and an increase of 6 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from small-pox decreased 1; meales, 2; whooping cough, 2; cryspelas, 1; malarial fevers, 5; puerperal diseases, 2; diarrheeal diseases, 7; maransus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 2; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 1; convulsions, 5; gastritis, gastro-netritis, enteritis, and peritionitis, 11; Bright's disease and nephritis, 6; premature and preternatural births, 7; surgical operations, 3; while the deaths from scarlatina increased 3; diphetheria, 18; croup, 2; typhoid fever, 4; cerebro-spinal fever, 2; alcoholism, 7; rheumatism and gout, 1; cancer, 2; phthisis pulmonalis, 16; bronchitus, 21; pneumonia, 17; heart diseases, 4; meningitis and encephalitis, 6; apoplexy, 3; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 5; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 7; cyanosis and atelectusis, 2; suicide, 2; drowning, 3. The number of deaths from manition was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 116 were in institutions, 381 in tenementhouses, 153 in houses containing three families or less, 8 in hotels and boarding-houses, 15 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 11 were on the basement floor, 127 on the first, 175 on the second, 117 on the third, 83 on the fourth, 28 on the fifth, 1 on the sixth; 654 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 19 non-residents; 94 were stated to be single, 191 married, 85 widowed, and the condition of 303 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 673; still births, 49; bodies in transitu, 12; of the total burial permits issued for city and still births, 73 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 670 births, 274 marriages, 49 still-births, 673 deaths; 12 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed and tabulated; 146 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 13 transcripts of the birth record, 7 of marriage, and 90 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending October 29, 1887, was 46.8 degrees Fahr.; mean reading of the barometer was 30.118; the mean humidity was 63, saturation being 100; number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,117, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.01 idepth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Obsatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 633 deaths and still-births, or 87.67 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 20; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 280; City pauper burial-ground (undenominational), 61; Greenwood (undenominational), 37; Luthers (undenominational), 22; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 22; Evergreen (undenominational), 34; Woodlawn (undenominational), 20; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 19; Union (Methodist Protestant), 1; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 14; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 5; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 7; Washington (undenominational), 21.

The actual mortality for the week ending October 22, 1887, was 607; this is 96 less than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1886, and 2.6 more than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 21.10 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,495,661.
