## BOARD OF REVISION AND CORRECTION OF ASSESSMENTS.

A meeting of the Board of Revision and Correction of Assessments was held at the Comptroller's office on Tuesday, July 19, 1887, at 2.10 o'clock P. M.

Present—Edward V. Loew, Comptroller; Morgan J. O'Brien, Counsel to the Corporation; Frederick Smyth, Recorder.

The minutes of the meetings held May 7 and June 29, 1887, were read and approved.

The Comptroller presented the following assessment lists, received from the Board of Assessors under date of July 14, 1887, viz.:

1. One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street regulating, grading, curbing and flagging, from Eighth avenue to first new avenue west of Eighth avenue.
2. Receiving-basins on the northwest and southwest corners of One Hundred and First street and Third avenue, and on the northeast, northwest, southeast and southwest corners of One Hundred and Sixth street and Fourth avenue.
3. Fencing vacant lots on the block bounded by One Hundred and Ninth and One Hundred and Tenth streets, and Fifth and Madison avenues.
4. One Hundred and Thirty-third street sewer, between Eighth avenue and Avenue St. Nicholas.
5. Fencing vacant lot on the southeast corner of Seventh avenue and One Hundred and Twenty-second street.
6. One Hundred and Fifty-first street sewer, between Avenue St. Nicholas and Tenth avenue, and in Tenth avenue, east side, between One Hundred and Fiftieth and One Hundred and Fifty-first streets.
7. Fencing vacant lots on the northwest corner of Fourth avenue and One Hundred and Ninth street.
8. Fencing vacant lots on south side of Ninety-sixth street, between Second and Third avenues.
9. Fencing vacant lots on east side of Seventh avenue, between One Hundred and Twenty-first and One Hundred and Twenty-second streets.
10. Fencing vacant lots on south side of One Hundred and Twenty-eighth street, from Seventh to Eighth avenue, where not already done.
11. Fencing vacant lots on southwest corner of First avenue and One Hundred and Twenty-fourth street.
12. Alteration and improvement to receiving-basins on southeast corners Seventy-ninth and Eightieth streets; on northeast and southeast corners of Eighty-first street; on the northeast corner of Eighty-second street; and on the northeast and northwest corners of Eighty-third, Eighty-fourth, Eighty-sixth, Eighty-seventh and Eighty-eighth streets, and West End avenue.
13. Alteration and improvement to receiving-basins on southeast and southwest corners of Ninety-second, Ninety-fourth and Ninety-sixth streets; on southwest corner of Ninety-third street; on northeast and northwest corners of Ninety-sixth and Ninety-eighth streets, and on northwest corners of Ninety-ninth, One Hundredth, One Hundred and First and One Hundred and Second streets, and West End avenue.
14. Eighty-seventh street sewer, between Tenth and Riverside avenues.
15. Fencing vacant lots southwest corner Seventh avenue and One Hundred and Thirty-first street.
16. Morris avenue sewer from the summit between One Hundred and Thirty-ninth and One Hundred and Fortieth streets, to North Third avenue.
17. One Hundred and Sixty-fourth street sewer, between Washington and Brook avenues.
18. One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street sewer, from Brook to St. Ann's avenue.

The foregoing assessment-lists being in proper form and no objections having been received, on motion, the same were severally confirmed, all the members of the Board voting in the affirmative.

The Comptroller presented the following:

## CHAPTER 511.

An Act in relation to the expense of the paving of certain parts of Fourth avenue, in the City of New York.

Passed June 2, 1887, three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. The Board of Revision and Correction of Assessment Lists in the City of New York is hereby authorized and empowered to reconsider, on the merits, the assessments heretofore imposed for the paving of Fourth avenue, from Seventy-second to Ninety-sixth street, from One Hundred and Second to One Hundred and Sixteenth street, from One Hundred and Sixteenth to One Hundred and Twenty-fourth street, and from One Hundred and Twenty-fourth to One Hundred and Thirty-third street on the west side, and to One Hundred and Thirty-second street on the east side of said Fourth avenue in the City of New York, and to determine upon such proofs as have been or may be submitted to them; what amount or proportion of the expenses incurred by the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of said city for such paving should fairly and equitably have been assessed upon the persons and property that have been assessed therefor; and to consider, for that purpose, the public uses of said avenue, the bisection thereof, the grade of the avenue, the condition and slant of the pavement, the enhanced cost of the paving by reason of the concrete foundation thereunder, and such other facts and circumstances as in their judgment should fairly and equitably be considered in determining what proportion of the expense of such work should be borne by such persons or property. The said Board shall, within sixty days after the passage of this act, transmit to the Comptroller of said city a certificate setting forth the amount and proportion of the cost of said work, which, upon such revision, said Board shall determine to be the fair and equitable proportion to be assessed upon such persons or property.

Sec. 2. Upon the receipt of such certificate, the Comptroller of the City of New York shall forthwith alter and correct the record of the assessment for said work in his office, by reducing proportionately, in conformity thereto, the amounts heretofore assessed upon such persons and property respectively, and such reduced amounts shall be and become the assessments thereon; and upon the payment of any of such reduced assessments, with interest from the date of said certificate, the lien of such assessments so paid shall be thereby terminated and extinguished.

Sec. 3. The residue of the expense incurred for said work shall be borne by the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, and shall be included in the final estimates of said city for the year eighteen hundred and eighty-eight.

Sec. 4. All acts and parts of acts inconsistent with the provisions of this act are hereby repealed.

Sec. 5. This act shall take effect immediately.

Mr. T. H. Baldwin, attorney for various parties, was heard in opposition to the assessments referred to in the said act, and in favor of a reconsideration and reduction thereof by the Board of Revision and Correction of Assessments, and presented affidavits of Charles P. Depew and others as to the grade of the avenue, and the danger to teams on account of the slant of the pavement; also maps, photographs and papers as illustrations.

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT in compliance with the provisions of chapter 559, Laws of 1887, amending sections 350 and 921 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, passed June 9, 1887, the following changes are made in charging and collecting water rents:

1st. All extra charges for water incurred from and after June 9, 1887, shall be treated, collected and returned in arrears in the same manner as regular rents have heretofore been treated.

2d. In every building where a water meter or meters are now, or shall hereafter be in use, the charge for water by meter measurement shall be the only charge against such building, or such part thereof as is supplied through meter.

5th. Charges for so-called "extra water rents of every nature, imposed or incurred prior to June 9, 1881, will be canceled of record on the books of the Department.
