# PROCLAMATION BY THE MAYOR.

#### S100 REWARD.

MAYOR'S OFFICE, NEW YORK, November 1, 1876.

ONE HUNDRED DOLLARS reward is hereby offered to any person who shall cause the arrest and conviction of any other person for illegal voting, by reason of having falsely registered his vote, under false personation; or of having given a false residence; or of registering himself or causing himself to be registered in more than one district; or of having registered himself when he was not a citizen, or not entitled to vote because of non-residence or of deficient term of residence; or of having committed perjury in respect to any act of registration; or for the arrest of any other person who may commit perjury in respect to the right of voting, or who shall have fraudulently tampered with any Registry Lists, or, generally, committed any offence against any of the Registration Statutes of this State, or who may commit any offence against any of the Election Laws of this State.

Said arrest and conviction to be had and obtained under and by virtue of the State Laws, and evidenced by the proper certificate of the District Attorney of the County.

# BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT.

BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT, CITY OF NEW YORK,
MAYOR'S OFFICE, CITY HALL,
Tuesday, October 31, 1876—11 o'clock A. M.

The Board met pursuant to an adjournment.

Present—All the members, viz.:
William H. Wickham, the Mayor of the City of New York; Andrew H. Green, the Comptroller of the City of New York; Samuel A. Lewis, the President of the Board of Aldermen; John Wheeler, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments.

The minutes of the meetings held October 23 and 25, 1876, were read and approved.

The Comptroller presented a resolution, accompanied by a Provisional Estimate for 1877; also the following statement:

CITY OF NEW YORK—FINANCE DEPARTMENT, COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE, October 25, 1876.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment :

Herewith I submit a statement showing the amount of unpaid assessments on city property, from the books of the Bureau of Arrears and the Bureau for the Collection of Assessments.

The amount of assessments which is actually due on city property, and should be provided for immediately, is \$276,331.14, which amount I recommend shall be now included in the estimate for 1877, and appropriated for the purpose of paying off those assessments, to the account of "Real Estate, Expenses of."

I also present a statement of assessments on the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty, for the expense of street improvements, where the assessed valuation of the property is insufficient to pay the cost, amounting to \$762,176.15.

I know of no way to pay this sum except it be included in the estimate for 1877, and I recommend an appropriation therefor under the title of "Costs of Street Improvements payable by city in excess of assessments of property benefited."

The sum of eighteen thousand (\$18,000) dollars from "Harlem River Bridges, Repairs, Improvements, and Maintenance," and the sum of three hundred and twenty-six dollars and sixty-six cents (\$326.66) from "Independence Day—Celebration of," all to "Maintenance and Government of Parks and Places; Maintenance of the Parks, including the wages of Foreman, Gardeners, Mechanics, and Laborers employed on works of maintenance, and including also the sum of \$30,000 for the keeping, preservation, and exhibition of the collection in the American Museum of Natural History and the Metropolitan Museum of Art, and also the maintenance of the Meteorological Observatory."

Estimate: Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, as provided by section 112 of chapter 335 of the Laws of 1873, and amendments thereto, do, by the affirmative vote of all the members, hereby make the following Provisional Estimate of the amounts required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business of the City and County of New York, in each Department and branch thereof, and the Board of Education, for the next ensuing financial year, to wit, for the year eighteen hundred and seventy-seven (1877), in which estimate is included such sum as is necessary for the payment of the interest on the bonds of the City and County which becomes due and payable within said year, and also such sum as is necessary to pay the principal of any bonds and stocks which become due and payable from taxes during the said year, and also so much as may be necessary to pay the proportion of the State Tax required to be paid by the City and County of New York, in said year.

Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor of the City of New York (Chairman), the Comptroller of the City of New York, the President of the Board of Aldermen, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments-4.

The Comptroller presented the following communication:

FINANCE DEPARTMENT—COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE, NEW YORK, October 31, 1876.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment :

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

At a meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, held December 21, 1875, I submitted an estimate of the receipts of the General Fund for 1876, amounting to \$3,204,800, and proposed that the sum of \$3,000,000 should be deducted from the Budget of 1876, as the product of the General Fund. Against a carefully compiled official statement of the total amount that could be reasonably estimated to accrue to the General Fund in 1876, from all sources of revenue, and in opposition to my earnest protest and representations upon the subject, the Board insisted upon increasing the amount of estimated revenues of the General Fund and deducted from the Final Estimate for 1876, to the sum of \$4,000,000 instead of \$3,000,000, as proposed by me.

That this amount was a large over-estimate of the revenues of the General Fund for 1876, is shown by a statement presented herewith of the actual receipts to September, and an estimate for the remainder of the year. By this statement it will be seen that the amount of revenues of the General Fund actually received, prior to September 30, is \$1,843,361.84, and the total amount for the whole year, including the estimated amount for the last three months of 1876, and the balance from 1875, is \$3,088,600, or nearly \$1,000,000 less than the amount deducted from the Budget of 1876.

There will therefore be a deficiency in the product of the taxes of 1876, on account of this overestimate of revenues of the General Fund, of the large sum of nearly one million of dollars.

The amount added to the Estimate by the Board of Supervisors "to supply deficiencies" in the product of the taxes of 1876, is only \$145,125,96, and as this sum is wholly inadequate even to meet the deficiencies in the collection of personal taxes, and for errors in assessments, etc., as represented by me at the time the tax levy was made, it will be seen that the deduction of \$4,000,000 from the Final Estimate for 1876, on account of revenues of the General Fund, was an err

serious consequences, as deficiencies of collections.

deficiencies of collections.

At the last session of the Legislature, two acts were passed reducing the rate of interest upon taxes and assessments in arrears, by which the revenues of the General Fund have been and will continue to be considerably reduced. These laws were enacted against my judgment and my representations; they are unwise and unjust to those prompt tax-payers who had paid their taxes and assessments, and operating only to the advantage of those persons who were delinquent. The argument used in support of the measure was, that it would afford so great a relief to property-holders that the taxes and assessments in arrears would be paid, and thus the treasury would be largely benefited immediately. This anticipation has been but very partially realized, and the improvidence of these laws is now very clearly seen.

I estimate the revenues of the General Fund for 1877 at \$2,650,000, and propose that the sum of \$2,500,000 be deducted from the estimate for 1877.

The amount added to the Final Estimate for 1876 to supply deficiencies in the product of the

taxes was \$145,125.96, and the Tax Levy amounted to \$31,109,521.60.

The rate of tax was 2.80 per cent.

If the same amount be added to the Estimate for deficiencies in 1877 the Tax Levy will amount to \$29,735,096.58.

And the rate of tax will be a fraction less than 2.68 per cent. upon the valuations of the present

year.

I present herewith a tabulated statement of appropriations for all purposes in 1876 and 1877; showing, also, the amounts asked for in the Departmental Estimates, and the amounts allowed in the Provisional Estimates for 1877.

The State tax for the County of New York in 1876 was \$7,233,189,48, and for 1877 it is \$4,162,883.85, making a reduction in this item of \$3,070,305.63.

Considerable reductions have also been made in the Departmental Estimates, and the total amount of the Provisional Estimate would have shown a great reduction upon the estimate for 1876, if it were not necessary to add several large sums for extraordinary appropriations—such as the item of \$700,000 for repaving and repairs of street pavements. This amount is an increase of \$550,000 over the appropriation for 1876 for these purposes. The importance of making adequate provision for the repairs of pavements is apparent to every one. An item of \$276,331.14 is also included for real estate expenses, to pay assessments on Corporation property, and an item for judgments of \$200,000. These items make an aggregate of over \$1,000,000.
