Carpenters' Work.

At Second District Prison (work done by prison labor under supervision of staff)—Construction of a new sheet iron lined door at entrance to prison; material used, 350 feet $\frac{1}{2}$ -inch by $3\frac{1}{2}$ -inch yellow pine flooring, tongue and grooved boards; 6 pieces of

joist, 3 inches by 4 inches; 4 pieces of joist, 3 inches by 6 inches; 10 pounds of galvanized nails, 10 pounds of 10 penny wire nails and 10 pounds of 16 penny wire nails.

At Third District Prison—Repaired 5 benches, put in 3 panes of glass, 15 inches by 16 inches, in windows of Matron's room.

At Fourth District Prison—Put in 2 panes of glass, 13 inches by 15 inches, in windows, prison kitchen; 2 new sashes put in windows of male prison; 4 $\frac{1}{2}$ -inch hinges, 2 dozen 1-inch screws and 1 pound of putty.

At Fifth District Prison—Caned 4 office chairs.

Electricians' Work.

At Second District Prison (work done by staff)—Installing of an electric lighting plant throughout the prison; the following are the amounts of material furnished by the Department in making the improvement: 3,400 feet $\frac{1}{2}$ -inch loredated pipe, 100 $\frac{1}{2}$ -inch elbows, 2,600 feet No. 14 duplex wire, 106 Bossert boxes, 85 Edison sockets, 80 6-inch goose necks, 106 shade holders, 106 crimped porcelain shades, 15 $\frac{1}{8}$ -inch key sockets, 40 feet $1\frac{1}{4}$ -inch pipe, 200 feet No. 8 double braid wire, 10 pounds pipe clamps for $\frac{1}{2}$ -inch pipe, 1 gross 3-inch No. 8 wood screws, 5 gross 2-inch No. 8 wood screws, 5 gross 1-inch No. 8 wood screws, 5 pounds $2\frac{1}{2}$ -inch nails, 1 two-light combination fixture, 2-foot stem; $\frac{1}{2}$ -light combination fixture, 9-foot stem; 1 set of stock and dies, 1 pipe cutter from 1 inch up, 1 pipe vise, 1 hack saw and 2 dozen blades, 2 snakes, 100 feet each; 2 pounds wrought iron pipe hooks, 1 pound solder, 4 small screwdrivers, 5 pounds strip solder, 1 gallon gasoline, 20 1-inch T. & B. bushings, 20 1-inch T. & B. lock nuts, 400 16 candle power lamps, 110 volts; 4 chandelier hooks, 1 can of P. B. paint, 100 straight stems, $5\frac{1}{2}$ inches over all; 200 brass nuts, $\frac{3}{8}$ -inch; 4 fixture studs, 4 insulating joints, $\frac{3}{8}$ -inch by $\frac{5}{8}$ -inch, 25 1-inch T. & B. bushings, 25 1-inch lock nuts, T. & B.; 25 1-ampere cartridge fuses between centres, 100 10-ampere cartridge fuses, 12 rolls friction tape, 2 pounds 4-inch pipe hooks, 4 junction boxes for 1-inch pipe, 15 Bossert boxes, round, 4 inches by $1\frac{1}{8}$ inches; 200 lock nuts for $\frac{1}{2}$ -inch pipe, T. & B.; 200 bushings for $\frac{1}{2}$ -inch pipe, 8 pounds pipe hooks for $\frac{1}{2}$ -inch pipe, 3 G. I. screws, 50 Edison key sockets, 50 feet reinforced cord, 10 Bossert box covers with bushings in centre, 10 socket bushings for reinforced cord, 10 $\frac{3}{8}$ -inch Edison's key socket, 1 piece of band iron, $\frac{1}{2}$ -inch by $\frac{1}{4}$ -inch by 12 feet long; 2 pairs of side cutting pliers, 175 $2\frac{1}{4}$ -inch shade holders, 2 dozen 1-inch stove bolts, 85 blank covers with $\frac{1}{2}$ -inch hole in centre, 90 canopies, 350 large fibre washers, $\frac{1}{2}$ inch inside diameter; 175 fibre canopy rings, 4-inch by $\frac{1}{2}$ -inch; 2 packages brass escutcheon pins, $\frac{1}{4}$ -inch long; 100 feet $1\frac{1}{4}$ -inch pipe, 600 feet No. 5 B. & S. gauge double braid wire, 500 feet old code fixture wire, 3 scroll pulley outriggers, 2 small paint brushes, 1 dozen Edison key sockets, $\frac{1}{8}$ -inch, and 18 expansion bolts, 3-inch.

Plumbing and Tinsmithing.

At Third District Prison (paid labor)—Taking off and putting on new tin roof, repairing and painting extension roofs, and putting up new galvanized iron gutters and leaders; the three chimneys connected with the prison furnaces were overhauled and cleaned and made ready for use; repaired one ice box and new lining inserted.

At Fourth District Prison (paid labor)—Repaired leak on hot water Croton pipe; material used, gasoline, 2 boiler washers, 1 candle, 2 pounds solder, $\frac{3}{4}$ -day, plumber and helper. By unpaid labor—Put on 2 $\frac{3}{8}$ -inch brass faucets, 1 in sink in hall and 1 in sink in prison kitchen.

At Fifth District Prison (by paid labor)—Removed obstructions from shower baths' waste trap and forced good free outlet; material used, 3 pounds putty, plaster of paris, 2 candles, $\frac{3}{4}$ -day, plumber and helper.

Painters and Kalsomining.

At Second District Prison—Painting and renovating the interior of prison; material used, 600 pounds white lead, 20 gallons raw oil, 20 gallons turpentine, 5 gallons liquid dryers, 10 pounds chrome green, 10 pounds Indian red, 2 flat wall brushes, $\frac{1}{2}$ dozen pound brushes, $\frac{1}{2}$ dozen sash brushes.

At Third District Prison—Painting 27 cells on male side of prison; also painting dado thereat; 27 toilets given a coat of asphaltum varnish; 27 iron spring beds given a coat of dark green paint; the Matron's room was painted, and the woodwork given a coat of varnish; prison kitchen, pipes, tanks, etc., painted and varnished; the yard of north side of prison received a coat of whitewash; material used, 200 pounds white lead, 10 gallons raw oil, 10 gallons turpentine, 15 pounds chrome green, 3 gallons liquid dryers, 3 gallons asphaltum varnish, $\frac{1}{2}$ barrel lime, 5 pounds ultramarine blue, 2 whitewash brushes and 3 pounds kalsomine glue.

At Fourth District Prison—Whitewashing ceilings of 29 cells; material used, 2 whitewash brushes, $\frac{1}{2}$ barrel finishing lime, 5 pounds ultramarine blue and 5 pounds kalsomine glue.

At Fifth District Prison—Painting and renovating interior of prison; material used, 300 pounds white lead, 10 pounds yellow ochre, 10 pounds chrome green, 5 pounds chrome yellow, 10 pounds Indian red, 10 gallons raw oil, 10 gallons turpentine, 5 gallons dryers, 2 gallons inside varnish, 2 6s. pound brushes and 2 sash tools.

The prisons were cleansed of roaches, waterbugs, etc., by the services rendered by the P. M. Frank Disinfectant Company.

The usual amount of cooking, laundrying, cleansing and other general work done in all prisons by unpaid prison help.

Sir—I most respectfully forward the quarterly report, statistical tables, etc., of the above institution for the three months ending June 30, 1906.

During the above mentioned period the principal work executed has been as follows:

Finishing the circular road at the south end of the island.

Laying 360 feet of 8-inch sewer pipe from Pavilion No. 4 to the western shore.

Providing a new stoop on the west side of the Roman Catholic Church.

Thoroughly reflooring, renovating and redecorating Pavilion No. 5 on the upper and lower floors; likewise reflooring the first floor of Pavilion No. 4.

Laying and concreting the foundation wall of the new ice house building to be erected.

Installing window bars in basement of Pavilion No. 3 and fortifying the doors of Pavilion No. 4 with iron grill doors.

Installing new steamheating plant in the subway; also placing all electric wires in the same.

Installing the new fire protection system by means of standpipes in the different buildings so that a supply of Croton or salt water may be available at all times at the principal points on the island.

The cultivation of the farm, which is now in a thriving condition.

The burial of the dead by the City Cemetery prisoners, as well as other general work around the island.

The boys have been engaged principally in carting freight, lumber, stone and earth to assist in the various kinds of contract work.

The female prisoners have been employed in cleaning out buildings and in local laundry work.

Hon. FRANCIS J. LANTRY, Commissioner of Correction:

Sir—I respectfully submit herewith report of the transactions of the New York City Reformatory of Misdemeanants for the quarter ending June 30, 1906, the same being the second quarter of our existence.

On March 31 we had a total census of 96 inmates. There were fifty-two (52) commitments, eight (8) released on parole and one (1) discharged during the month of April; twenty-nine (29) commitments, twenty-one (21) released on parole and seven (7) discharged during the month of May, and forty-five (45) commitments and twenty-four (24) released on parole during the month of June, leaving a total of 161 inmates June 30, 1906.

All inmates except those who have received an advanced education were compelled to attend school half of each day and labor the other half, except Sundays and holidays.

Catholic, Protestant and Hebrew services were held at least once a week, and were well attended, although attendance is not compulsory.

Thirty (30) have been taught in the School of Telegraphy during the quarter, and twenty (20) can receive and send messages.

An average of ten (10) inmates have been engaged in painting inside of two dormitories and outside of workshop. Details of the work accomplished, such as rooms painted, etc., are submitted in the report of the Foreman Painter.

A number of inmates have been engaged in laying cosmoconcrete sidewalks. In all 3,176 square feet of walks have been laid. The construction of these walks consists in digging a trench 18 inches deep and 6 feet wide, which is filled in with 12 inches of cinders and ashes, 4 inches of grouting and 2 inches of cement facing.

A number of inmates have been engaged in excavating and laying concrete foundation for a 40-ton ice plant; also in digging trenches for underground telephone and electric lighting wires.

While most of the work performed has been outside labor, something has also been accomplished in the shops. During this quarter we have made 79 dozen pairs women's stockings and 137 dozen pairs of men's socks; have repaired 134 pairs of

inmates' shoes and cut from patterns 1,280 pairs men's brogans and 1,190 pairs of women's lace shoes.

Individual motors have been installed to machines in the shoe factory, and as soon as they are in running order work in shoemaking will be commenced.

Beside occasional military drills on week days the inmates are allowed to play baseball on Saturday afternoons and holidays. In this connection I desire to mention the fact that we have had quite a few volunteer entertainments given by outside friends of the institution, and a great minstrel entertainment by the Young Folks' League of Congregation Shaari Zedek of Brooklyn, consisting of a chorus of about forty voices, is worthy of special mention.
