Appeal 58—New Building 200 of 1904, No. 181 Seventh avenue, Manhattan, H. E. Armstrong, appellant.

Wooden structure within fire limits is unlawful.

Coal pocket to be covered with corrugated galvanized steel, leaving a 12-inch air space between wood and corrugated steel.

Is not built against any other building.

Surrounding property belong to same estate.

Claim steel covering makes building fireproof.

Cheaper.

More practical.

On motion, referred to Chief Croker for examination and report with recommendation.

Appeal 59—New Building 96 of 1904, southwest corner Eighty-ninth street and Central Park, West, Manhattan, Robt. T. Lyons, appellant.

No. 1. Including pent-house, building is 13 stories and height exceeds 150 feet, so that it should be entirely constructed of non-inflammable material.

It is the belief of the appellant that the law was not intended to apply to pent-houses of reasonable area above the twelfth story.

Will the provisions of section 105 of the Code as to fireproofing for building above 12 stories and over 150 feet in height apply in this case.

The appellant's reasons for desiring a favorable decision on the question to be passed upon are as follows:

1. All walls at the terminals of pent-house will be carried up to the full height.
2. The floor will be furnished in cement.
3. Wire-glass will be used wherever glass is necessary.
4. Proper skylights will be provided.
5. The roof of pent-house will not be more than 150 feet above curb level.
6. All woodwork entering into the construction of pent-house will be fireproofed by the process which is fully accepted and approved by the Bureau of Buildings.
7. The pent-house will be constructed wholly fireproof.
8. Two standpipes with hose connections and outlets in the pent-house will be provided.
9. Pent-house will not cover more than 50.8 per cent. of the roof area.

Mr. Robt. T. Lyons appeared before the Board.

The rules and regulations of the President of the said borough, or the provisions of law or ordinances do not apply.

Shall the two electric elevators described in application, and furnished by A. B. See Electric Elevator Company, be installed in the observation tower as aforesaid?

The construction of the tower is sufficiently strong to permit of the installation and use of elevators, and there are no valid reasons why the elevators should not be permitted.

The building being fire-proof throughout, and as there are only two families on each floor, and as there is a fire-proof stairway in the building, and two elevators, the appellant sees no reason why the fire-escape should not be left off.
