### BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT.

#### EXTRACT FROM

MINUTES, BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT, CITY OF NEW YORK, MAY 21, 1909.

New York and Queens County Railway Company.

The public hearing on the proposed form of contract for the grant of a franchise to the New York and Queens County Railway Company to construct, maintain and operate a street surface railway beginning at and connecting with the existing tracks of the Company at or near the intersection of Debevoise, or Second, avenue and Pierce

avenue, thence southerly in, upon and along said Debevoise, or Second, avenue to and connecting with the existing tracks of the Company in Jackson avenue, Borough of Queens, was opened.

The hearing was fixed for this day by resolution adopted April 16, 1909.

Affidavits of publication were received from the "Long Island City Daily Star," the "Flushing Daily Times" and the CITY RECORD.

No one appeared in opposition to the proposed grant.

Arthur G. Peacock, of counsel for the Company, appeared in favor.

No one else desiring to be heard, the Chair declared the hearing closed.

The following was offered:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby grants to the New York and Queens County Railway Company the franchise or right fully set out and described in the following form of proposed contract for the grant thereof, embodying all of the terms and conditions, including the provisions as to rates, fares and charges upon and subject to the terms and conditions in said proposed form of contract contained, and that the Mayor of The City of New York be and he hereby is authorized to execute and deliver such contract in the name and on behalf of The City of New York, as follows, to wit:

This contract made this day of , 1909, by and between The City of New York (hereinafter called the City), party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter called the Board), and the New York and Queens County Railway Company (hereinafter called the Company), party of the second part, witnesseth:

In consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained, the parties hereto do hereby covenant and agree as follows:

Section 1. The City hereby grants to the Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinabove set forth, the right and privilege to construct, maintain and operate a double track extension to its present street surface railway, with the necessary wires and equipment, for the purpose of conveying persons and property, in the Borough of Queens, in The City of New York, upon the following route, to wit:

Beginning at and connecting with the existing tracks of the Company at or near the intersection of Debevoise, or Second, avenue and Pierce avenue; thence southerly in, upon and along said Debevoise, or Second, avenue to and connecting with the existing tracks of the Company in Jackson avenue.

The said route, with turnouts, switches and crossovers hereby authorized, is shown upon a map entitled:

"Map showing proposed street surface railway of the New York and Queens County Railway Company in the Borough of Queens, City of New York, to accompany petition dated December 4, 1908, to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment," and signed by W. O. Wood, Vice-President and General Manager, and T. H. Moyer, Engineer of Way, a copy of which is attached hereto, is to be deemed a part of this contract, is to be construed with the text thereof, and is to be substantially followed. Provided that deviations therefrom and additional turnouts, switches and crossovers which are consistent with the foregoing description, and the other provisions of this contract, may be permitted by resolution of the Board.

Sec. 2. The grant of this privilege is subject to the following conditions, which shall be complied with by the Company:

First—The consent in writing of the owners of half in value of the property bounded on said streets and avenues to the construction and operation of said railway shall be obtained by the Company within thirty (30) days from the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and a copy of such consents shall be filed with the Board within such time, or in the event that such consents cannot be obtained within such time, the Company shall within one month thereafter make application to the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court for the appointment of Commissioners, in the manner provided by the Railroad Law, to determine if said railway ought to be constructed; otherwise this grant shall cease and determine.

Second—The said right to construct, maintain and operate said railway shall be held and enjoyed by the Company for the term of twenty-five (25) years from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor, with the privilege of renewal of said contract for the further period of twenty-five (25) years upon a fair revaluation of such right and privilege.

If the Company shall determine to exercise its privilege of renewal it shall make application to the Board, or any authority which shall be authorized by law to act for the City in place of the Board. Such application shall be made at any time not earlier than two years and not later than one year before the expiration of the original term of this contract. The determination of the revaluation shall be sufficient if agreed to in writing by the Company and the Board, but in no case shall the annual rate of compensation to the City be fixed at a less amount than the sum required to be paid during the last year of this original contract.

If the Company and the Board shall not reach such agreement on or before the day one year before the expiration of the original term of this contract, then the annual rate of compensation for such succeeding twenty-five (25) years shall be reasonable, and either the City (by the Board) or the Company shall be bound, upon request of the other, to enter into a written agreement with each other fixing the rate of such compensation at such amount as shall be reasonable, but in no case shall the annual rate so fixed be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, and if the parties shall not forthwith agree upon what is reasonable, then the parties shall enter into a written agreement fixing such annual rate and at such amount as shall be determined by three disinterested freeholders selected in the following manner:

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board; one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Company; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder, and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluation aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six months prior to the expiration of this original contract, and their report shall be filed with the Board within three months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations, without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine any of the books of the Company and its officers under oath. The valuations so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties, but no annual sum shall, in any event, be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year of this original contract. If, in any case, the annual rate shall not be fixed prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, then the Company shall pay the annual rate theretofore prevailing until the new rate shall be determined, and shall then make up to the City the amount of any excess of the annual rate then determined over the previous annual rate. The compensation and expenses of the said appraisers shall be borne jointly by the City and the Company, each paying one-half thereof.

Third—The Company shall pay to the City for the privilege hereby granted the following sums of money:

The sum of five hundred dollars (\$500) in cash within thirty (30) days after the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the privilege hereby granted.

During the first term of five (5) years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than four hundred dollars (\$400), and which shall be equal to three (3) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of four hundred dollars (\$400).

During the remaining term of twenty (20) years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than seven hundred and fifty dollars (\$750), and which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross annual receipts if such percentage shall exceed the sum of seven hundred and fifty dollars (\$750).

The gross annual receipts mentioned above shall be that portion of the gross earnings of the Company from all sources within the limits of the City as shall bear the same proportion to such gross earnings as the length of the extension hereby granted shall bear to the entire length of the railway of the Company in operation within the limits of the City.

The annual charges shall commence from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

All annual charges as above shall be paid into the treasury of the City on November 1 of each year, and shall be for the amount due to September 30 next preceding.

Provided that the first annual payment shall be only that portion of the first annual charge as the time between the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor and September 30 following shall bear to the whole of one year.

Whenever the percentage required to be paid shall exceed the minimum amount as above, then such sum over and above such minimum shall be paid on or before November 1 in each year for the year ending September 30 next preceding.

The annual charges herein provided are intended to include the percentages of gross receipts now required to be paid by railway companies to the City, pursuant to the Railroad Law as amended.

Fourth—The annual charges or payments shall continue throughout the whole term of this contract, whether original or renewal, notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other railway or railroad company providing for payments for railway or railroad rights or franchises at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sublease of the rights or privileges hereby granted, whether original or renewal, or of any part thereof, or the route mentioned herein, or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this contract; and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said conditions as to payments, anything in any statute or in the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof or otherwise exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this contract.

Fifth—The rights and privileges hereby granted shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the company or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations, or otherwise, without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Sixth—Upon the termination of this original contract, or if the same be renewed, then at the termination of the said renewal term, or upon the termination of the rights hereby granted for any other cause, or upon the dissolution of the Company before such termination, the tracks and equipment of the Company constructed pursuant to this contract, within the streets and avenues, shall become the property of the City without cost, and the same may be used or disposed of by the City for any purpose whatsoever, or the same may be leased to any company or individual.

If, however, at the termination of this contract as above the Board shall so order by resolution, the Company shall, upon thirty (30) days' notice from the Board, remove any and all of the tracks and other equipment constructed pursuant to this contract, and the said streets and avenues shall be restored to their original condition at the sole cost and expense of the Company.

Seventh—The Company shall commence construction of the railway herein authorized within ninety (90) days from the date upon which the consents of the property owners are obtained, or from the date upon which the decision of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court that such railway ought to be constructed is rendered in lieu of such consents, and shall complete the construction and place the same in full operation within nine (9) months from the date of obtaining such consents or such decision, otherwise this grant shall cease and determine, and all sums paid, or which may be deposited with the Comptroller of the City as hereinafter provided, shall thereupon be forfeited to the City; provided, that such periods may be extended by the Board for a period or periods not exceeding in the aggregate six months each; and provided, further, that when the commencement or completion of said construction shall be prevented by legal proceedings in any court or by works of public improvement, or from other causes not within the control of the Company, the time for the commencement or completion of such construction may be extended for the period of such prevention, but no delay shall be allowed for unless the court proceedings shall be diligently prosecuted by the Company; and provided further that in no case shall such delay be deemed to begin until the Company shall have given written notice to the Board of any such court proceedings or other occasion of delay, and deliver to the Board copies of any injunction or other orders, and the papers upon which the same shall have been granted, and unless upon the request of the Board the Company shall in writing consent that the Board either in its own name as a party, or in the name of the City as a party, may intervene in any such proceedings.

Eighth—Said railway shall be constructed and operated in the latest approved manner of street railway construction and operation, and it is hereby agreed that the Board may require the Company to improve or add to the railway equipment, including rolling stock and railway appurtenances, from time to time, as such additions and improvements are necessary, in the opinion of the Board. Upon failure on the part of the Company to comply with the direction of the Board within a reasonable time, the rights hereby granted shall cease and determine.

Ninth—Said railway shall be constructed, maintained and operated subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of the City who have jurisdiction in such matters, as provided by the Charter of the City.

No construction upon said railway shall be commenced until written permits have been obtained from the proper City officials.

In any permits so issued such officials may also impose such conditions, as a condition of the granting of the same, as are necessary for the purpose of protecting any structures, in the streets and avenues, over which such officials have jurisdiction and the Company shall comply with such conditions.

The electrical equipment to be installed by the Company for the operation of the railway within the limits of the City, whether the same be upon streets and avenues or upon private property, shall be constructed and maintained under the supervision and control of the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

Tenth—Said railway may be operated by overhead electric power substantially similar to the overhead electric system now in use by street surface railways in the Borough of Queens, or by any other motive power except locomotive steam power or horse power, which may be approved by the Board and consented to by the abutting property owners in accordance with the provisions of law, and by the Public Service Commission for the First District of the State of New York.

Provided, however, that the Board, upon giving to the Company one year's notice, may require the Company to operate its railway upon the whole or upon any portion of its route, by underground electric power substantially similar to the system now in use on the street surface railways in the Borough of Manhattan, or by any other practical motive power then in use which does not require the use of poles and overhead wires in the streets and avenues, and thereupon to discontinue the use of the overhead trolley system, and to remove its poles, wires and other structures used by it for that purpose from the streets and avenues of the City.

And provided further that the Company shall not be required under the provisions of this contract to make such change upon the route hereby authorized until the existing line of the Company on Borden avenue and Jackson avenue, between the East River and Debevoise avenue, shall have been so changed.

Eleventh—Upon six months' notice by the Board to the Company, all wires for the transmission of power, except trolley wires, for the operation of the railway upon all or any portion of the route hereby authorized, shall be placed in conduits beneath or alongside of the railway. The Company shall provide in such conduits two ducts not less than three inches in diameter for the exclusive use of the City. Such ducts shall be used only by the Company for the operation of its railway and by the City, as above.

Twelfth—The rate of fare for any passenger upon said railway shall not exceed five (5) cents, and the Company shall not charge any passenger more than five (5) cents for one continuous ride from any point on said railway, or a line or branch

operated in connection therewith, to any point thereof, or of any connecting line or branch thereof, within the limits of the City.

The Company shall carry free upon the railway hereby authorized, during the term of this contract, all members of the Police and Fire Departments of the City, when such employees are in full uniform.

Thirteenth—No cars shall be operated upon the railway hereby authorized, other than passenger cars, cars for the transportation of express matter and cars necessary for the repair or maintenance of the railway, and no freight cars shall be operated upon the tracks of said railway.

The rate for the carrying of such property over the said railway upon the cars of the Company shall in all cases be reasonable in amount, subject to the control of the Board, and may be fixed by the Board after notice to the Company and a hearing had thereon, and when so fixed such rates shall be binding upon the Company, and no greater sums shall be charged for such services than provided for by it.

Fourteenth—The Company shall attach to each car run over the said railway proper fenders and wheel guards in conformity with such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter, during the term of this contract, be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities.

Fifteenth—All cars which are operated on said railway shall be heated during the cold weather in conformity with such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter, during the term of this contract, be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities.

Sixteenth—All cars operated on said railway shall be well lighted by electricity, or by some lighting system equally efficient, or as may be required by the Board.

Seventeenth—Cars on the said railway shall run at intervals of not more than thirty (30) minutes both day and night, and as much oftener as reasonable convenience of the public may require or as may be directed by the Board. Provided, however, that the Company, during the first five (5) years of this contract, shall not be required to operate its cars between the hours of 1 o'clock a. m. and 5 o'clock a. m. each day, unless the Board shall determine after a hearing had thereon that public convenience requires the operation of cars during said hours.

Eighteenth—The Company, so long as it shall continue to use any of the tracks upon the streets and avenues in which said railway shall be constructed, shall cause to be watered at least three times every twenty-four hours, when the temperature is above 35 degrees Fahrenheit, the entire width of the streets and avenues, except when the width of said streets and avenues shall exceed 60 feet between curb lines, in which case the Company shall cause to be watered only 60 feet in width of such roadway, and the Company shall provide for such purpose at least one tank car, the capacity of which shall be sufficient to water such streets and avenues in a satisfactory manner.

Nineteenth—The Company shall at all times keep the streets and avenues upon which the said railway is constructed, between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and for a distance of two feet beyond the rails, on either side thereof, free and clear from ice and snow; provided, however, that the Company shall, at the option of the President of the Borough of Queens, enter into an agreement for each winter season, or part thereof, to clean an equivalent amount of street surface from house line to house line.

Twentieth—As long as said railway, or any portion thereof, remains in any street or avenue, the Company shall pave and keep in permanent repair that portion of the surface of the street or avenue in which said railway is constructed, between its tracks, the rails of its tracks, and for a distance of two feet beyond the rails on either side thereof, under the supervision of the local authorities, whenever required by them to do so, and in such manner as they may prescribe. And the City shall have the right to change the material or character of the pavement of any street or avenue, and in that event the Company shall be bound to replace such pavement in the manner directed by the proper City officer, at its own expense, and the provision as to repairs herein contained shall apply to such renewed or altered pavement.

Twenty-first—Any alteration to the sewerage or drainage system, or to any other subsurface or to any surface structures in the streets, required on account of the construction or operation of the railway, shall be made at the sole cost of the Company and in such manner as the proper City officials may prescribe.

Twenty-second—It is agreed that the right hereby granted to operate a street surface railway shall not be in preference or in hindrance to public work of the City, and should the said railway in any way interfere with the construction of public works in the streets and avenues, whether the same is done by the City directly, or by a contractor for the City, the Company shall, at its own expense, protect or move the tracks and appurtenances in the manner directed by the City officials having jurisdiction over such public work.

Twenty-third—Should the grades or lines of the streets and avenues in which the right to construct the railway is hereby granted be changed at any time after the railway has been constructed, and during the term of this contract, the Company shall, at its own expense, change its tracks and appurtenances to conform with such new grades and lines, and during the construction of any public improvement upon said street the Company shall take care of and protect the tracks and appurtenances at its own expense, all to be done subject to the direction of the City official having jurisdiction over the construction of such change.

Twenty-fourth—The Company shall, within thirty (30) days after the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor, take the necessary proceedings under the provisions of the Railroad Law for the abandonment of that portion of its existing route, described as follows:

Beginning at the intersection of Pierce avenue and Debevoise avenue; thence westerly in, upon and along said Pierce avenue to Lockwood street; thence southerly in, upon and along said Lockwood street, Ridge road, Academy street and Jane street to the intersection of said route with the existing tracks of the Company on Jackson avenue, at or near the intersection of Jane street and Jackson avenue, and shall within sixty (60) days from the commencement of operation of the railway hereby authorized remove at its own expense all of its tracks, wires and other equipment from the above described streets and avenues, and restore the same to their original condition.

Twenty-fifth—The Company shall at all times keep accurate books of account of the gross earnings from all sources, and shall, on or before November 1 of each year, make a verified report to the Comptroller of the City of the business done by the Company for the year ending September 30 next preceding, in such form as he may prescribe. Such report shall contain a statement of such gross earnings, total miles in operation within the limits of the City and the miles of railway constructed and operated under this contract and such other information as the Comptroller may require. The Comptroller shall have access to all books of the Company for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness of its report, and may examine its officers under oath.

Twenty-sixth—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained, this contract may be forfeited by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel, on notice of ten (10) days to the Company, or at the option of the Board by resolution by said Board, which said resolution may contain a provision to the effect that the railway constructed and in use by virtue of this contract shall thereupon become the property of the City without proceedings at law or in equity.

Provided, however, that such action by the Board shall not be taken until the Board shall give notice to the Company to appear before it on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why such resolution declaring the contract forfeited should not be adopted. In case the Company fails to appear, action may be taken by the Board forthwith.

Twenty-seventh—If the Company shall fail to give efficient public service at the rates herein fixed, or fail to maintain its structures in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, the Board may give notice to the Company specifying any default on the part of the Company, and requiring the Company to remedy the same within a reasonable time; and upon failure of the Company to remedy such default within a reasonable time, the Company shall for each day thereafter during which the default or defect remains pay to the City the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250) as fixed or liquidated damages, or the Board, in case such structures which may affect the surface of the streets, shall not be put in good condition within a reasonable time after notice by the Board as aforesaid, shall have the right to make all needed repairs at the expense of the Company, in which case the Company shall pay to the City the amount of the cost of such repairs, with legal interest thereon, all of which sums may be deducted from the fund hereinafter provided for.

Twenty-eighth—The Company shall assume all liability to persons or property by reason of the construction or operation of the railway authorized by this contract,

and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property on account of the same, and the Company hereby agrees to repay to the City any damage which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or default of the Company.

Twenty-ninth—This grant is upon the express condition that the Company, within thirty (30) days after the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred hereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of the City the sum of fifteen hundred dollars (\$1,500), either in money or securities, to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by the Company of all of the terms and conditions of this contract, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charges for the privilege hereby granted, the efficiency of the public service rendered, the repairs of the street pavement, the removal of snow and ice and the quality of construction of the railway; and in case of default in the performance by the Company of such terms and conditions the City shall have the right to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished for the performance thereof after due notice, and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from the said fund without legal proceedings; or after default in the payment of the annual charges, shall collect the same, with interest, from the said fund after ten days' notice in writing to the Company; or in case of failure to keep the said terms and conditions of this contract relating to the headway, heating and lighting of cars, fenders, wheelguards and watering of street pavements, the Company shall pay a penalty of fifty dollars (\$50) per day for each day of violation, and the further sum of ten dollars (\$10) per day for each car that shall not be properly heated, lighted or supplied with fenders or wheelguards, in case of the violation of the provisions relating to those matters.

The procedure for the imposition and collection of the penalties in this contract shall be as follows:

The Board, on complaint made, shall give notice to the Company directing its President, or other officer, to appear before the Board on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why the Company should not be penalized in accordance with the foregoing provisions. If the Company fails to make an appearance, or, after a hearing, appears in the judgment of the Board to be in fault, said Board shall forthwith impose the prescribed penalty, or where the amount of the penalty is not prescribed herein, such amount as appears to the Board to be just, and without legal procedure direct the Comptroller to withdraw the amount of such penalty from the security fund deposited with him. In case of any drafts made upon the security fund the Company shall, upon ten (10) days' notice in writing, pay to the City a sum sufficient to restore said security fund to the original amount of fifteen hundred dollars (\$1,500), and in default thereof this contract shall be canceled and annulled at the option of the Board, acting in behalf of the City. No action or proceeding or right under the provisions of this contract shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to the City.

Thirtieth—The grant of this privilege is subject to whatever right, title or interest the owners of abutting property or others may have in and to the streets and avenues in which the Company is hereby authorized to operate.

Thirty-first—The words "notice" or "direction," wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean a written notice or direction. Every such notice or direction to be served upon the Company shall be delivered at such office in the City as shall have been designated by the Company, or if no such office shall have been designated, or if such designation shall have for any reason become inoperative, shall be mailed in the City, postage prepaid, addressed to the Company at the City. Delivery or mailing of such notice or direction as and when above provided shall be equivalent to direct personal notice or direction, and shall be deemed to have been given at the time of delivery or mailing.

Thirty-second—The words "streets or avenues" and "streets and avenues," wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean "streets, avenues, highways, parkways, driveways, concourses, boulevards, bridges, viaducts, tunnels, public places or any other property to which the City has title" encountered in the route hereinabove described and upon or in which authority is hereby given to the Company to construct a railway.

Thirty-third—If at any time the powers of the Board or any other of the authorities herein mentioned or intended to be mentioned shall be transferred by law to any other Board, authority, officer or officers, then and in such case such other Board, authority, officer or officers, shall have the powers, rights and duties herein reserved to or prescribed for the Board or other authority, officer or officers.

Sec. 3. This grant is also upon the further and express condition that the provisions of the Railroad Law pertinent hereto shall be strictly complied with by the Company.

Sec. 4. The Company promises, covenants and agrees on its part and behalf to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms and conditions and requirements in this contract fixed and contained.

In witness whereof the party of the first part, by its Mayor thereunto duly authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City, has caused the corporate name of said City to be thereunto signed and the corporate seal of said City to be thereunto affixed, and the party of the second part, by its officers, thereunto duly authorized, has caused its corporate name to be thereunto signed and its corporate seal to be thereunto affixed, the day and year first above written.

## NEW YORK PUBLIC LIBRARY.

## REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDING DECEMBER 31, 1908.

New York Public Library, Astor, Lenox and Tilden Foundations,  
Astor Library Building, No. 40 Lafayette Place,  
New York, May 1, 1909.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor of The City of New York:

Sir—In accordance with the provisions of an agreement entered into between The City of New York and the New York Public Library, Astor, Lenox and Tilden Foundations, relative to the gift by Andrew Carnegie of free circulating library buildings, bearing date July 17, 1901, and particularly in accordance with the provisions of Article 10 of the said agreement, I have the honor to submit herewith the sixth detailed report of the Trustees of the New York Public Library, showing the transactions of the Trustees for the year ending December 31, 1908.

## I.

As shown by the previous report, dated May 1, 1908, thirty-one sites for library buildings had been acquired in the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond,

and buildings had been erected on twenty-four of these sites prior to December 31, 1907.

During the calendar year 1908 buildings have been under construction upon the other seven of these sites. Four of these buildings were completed and opened to the public during the year 1908, and two were opened early in 1909; at this date buildings are completed and ready to open on one of these sites.

One additional site was acquired in 1908, and building operations are at the present time under way on this site. Thirty-two sites for library buildings have thus been acquired in the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond during the seven years and a half which have elapsed since the contract relative to this gift was entered into.

At the present time thirty buildings are open to the public and one building will soon be opened. Building operations are under way on one additional site.

The following tables ("A" and "B") show the condition of building operations during the calendar year 1908 upon sites acquired prior to that date and also upon sites acquired during the year:

## II.

During the year 1908 there were circulated for home use six and a half million books from the circulating libraries conducted by this corporation. Nearly a million and a quarter persons used the reading rooms. The sum of \$590,248.55 was expended for maintenance, of which \$538,702.35 was contributed by the City, and the balance of \$51,546.17 was expended from State and other contributions, and from the income of the corporation. Detailed reports with regard to these expenditures have been forwarded to the Comptroller of The City of New York.

The stock of books in the circulating libraries of December 31, 1908, consisted of 699,934 volumes.

The following table ("C") shows the circulation for home use from the various libraries, the number of readers, the attendance in the reading rooms and the number of volumes in the various branch libraries as of December 31, 1908. This table includes all of the branch libraries conducted by this corporation, the branches conducted in the library buildings constructed under the Carnegie gift being indicated by asterisk. Additional details appear in the several reports of the corporation heretofore published.

## REPORT OF THE COMMISSIONER OF PUBLIC WORKS FOR THE QUARTER ENDED MARCH 31, 1909.

Offices of Commissioner of Public Works, Manhattan,  
Nos. 13 to 21 Park Row, April 22, 1909.

Hon. JOHN F. AHEARN, President, Borough of Manhattan.

Dear Sir—Pursuant to section 1544 of the Greater New York Charter, I transmit herewith a report of the transactions of the various bureaus under my jurisdiction for the quarter ending March 31, 1909.

During this period there were 33 paving and repaving contracts; 9 sewer and receiving basin contracts; 5 regulating and grading, etc., contracts; and 15 miscellaneous contracts entered into. One paving contract was completed, and also 4 sewer and receiving basin contracts and 5 miscellaneous contracts, making a total of 62 contracts entered into and 10 contracts completed.

The report of the Superintendent of Highways states that the repair force of the bureau took up and relaid about 31,137 square yards of old stone pavement, besides investigating a large number of complaints made by citizens and various City Departments.

The Inspection Division reported 16,193 defects during the quarter, and caused 14,555 defects to be repaired by the responsible companies.

In addition to the usual inspection, painting and adjusting of street signs, the division in charge of this work reports that 136 electric street sign frames were erected; 105 electric street sign frames were repaired; 52 Welsbach signs were erected and 21 repaired, in conjunction with other work specifically described in the appended report of that division.

The report of the Division of Roads gives a detailed account of the work performed in the repair shops and on the unpaved streets and roads of this borough.

The report of the Chief Engineer of Highways shows that the number of permits issued for electric, gas, steam, water and other openings amounted to 3,942; and for the construction and repair of street railways, 758—making a total of 4,700 permits for street openings issued during the quarter. There were 19,627 feet of new mains laid and overhauled during the period in question.

The report of the Superintendent of Sewers states that 2,083 linear feet were added to the sewer system, making the total length of the sewer system in the borough at the end of the quarter, 520.60 miles. The total number of receiving basins on March 31 was 6,326. While the addition to the length of the sewerage system in the borough has not been large, the alteration and improvement, as well as the reconstruction of sewers, which was carried on to a large extent during the quarter, have made important improvements in the system.

The Chief Engineer calls attention to the fact that a comprehensive plan for reconstructing our drainage system is needed, in view of the great and important changes which are rendered necessary by the construction of subway railroads. He also states that in many cases, where the reconstruction of outlets has become necessary, this reconstruction cannot be undertaken, unless proceedings are initiated by or through the proper authority—which necessitates a petition by a property owner interested therein.

In view of the fact that the old outlet sewers under docks are necessarily constructed of wood and having served the district for years their rebuilding is absolutely essential: it having been found that the securing of such a petition as is above referred to is a very difficult matter, it is suggested by the Chief Engineer that measures be taken to ascertain whether it would be possible to proceed with the work of making surveys, preparing plans and letting contracts for outlet sewers without the usual petition of a property owner to the Local Board of Public Im-

provements, it being understood, of course, that the cost of such work would be assessed upon the property benefited.

The report from the Superintendent of Public Buildings and Offices states that the Carmine street public bath was completed during the quarter and has been accepted on behalf of the City.

From his observations and inspections, the Superintendent is of the opinion that there is no cause for serious anxiety with regard to the safety of the Criminal Court Building. Constant attention is being given in making repairs of a minor nature, and a system of daily inspection is being diligently followed. The attendance at the various public baths during the quarter numbered 752,333 persons.

The report of the Engineer in Charge of Street Openings shows in detail the work accomplished by his office in preparing reports, maps for filing, rule maps, profile maps, benefit and damage maps, and also the field work accomplished, maps filed and office work performed incidental to the functions of his office.

The report of the Chief Clerk shows that the administrative work of this department is progressing smoothly, and that the various changes made by me some time since have passed the experimental stage and have proved to be a decided benefit to the department. The new system installed in this department has been readily grasped by the various employees, and there has been no resultant confusion of any nature whatsoever.

## REPORT OF THE GENERAL OFFICE OF THE COMMISSIONER OF PUBLIC WORKS.

Offices of Commissioner of Public Works, Manhattan,

Mr. JOHN CLOUGHEN, Commissioner of Public Works:

Dear Sir—In accordance with your instructions, I transmit herewith a report of the transactions of the General Office for the quarter ending March 31, 1909.

Eight hundred and seventy-six requisitions were received from the various bureaus and after examination and approval, orders were issued covering same.

One hundred and seventy-four schedules, including 1,859 vouchers, were drawn on the Comptroller for the amount of \$1,197,266.50. Two hundred and forty-two bay window permits were issued, and seven permits for ornamental projections.

Invoices amounting to \$279,203.40 were received in this office and registered.

The new system of accounting, installed in this department by the Comptroller, was, I am pleased to say, mastered by this department at the outset, and while the various details incidental to the system occasioned more work than heretofore, our departmental business has progressed without interruption.

The idea inaugurated in this office of establishing a library of catalogues for keeping in touch with the lowest market prices, has, in conjunction with our system of examination and audit, referred to in our previous report, enabled us to thoroughly and intelligently examine the vouchers for payment transmitted to this office.

At this writing a thorough and systematic investigation into the unliquidated business of this department has been begun, and I hope to report to you in the near future that all old business, save that of the current year, has been entirely closed on our books in a manner satisfactory to the City's interests.

Appended hereto you will find financial statement of the quarter under the designation of Document "B," and also statement of the contracts entered into and completed during the quarter, under the designation of Document "C."

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## STATEMENT NO. 2.

April, 1909.

Hon. FRANK J. GOODWIN, Superintendent of Sewers:

Dear Sir—According to instructions from the Commissioner of Public Works, I hand you a report of the operations of the Bureau of Sewers during the first quarter of the year 1909.

It contains a statement of the work done in constructing new sewers and a statement of the work done in alteration and improvement of old sewers; with a summary of the contract work done under the appropriation for reconstruction and repairs to sewers.

Also a report of the work done by the Mechanics and Laborers of the Bureau, and of the new work in progress as well as the work projected for the betterment of the sewerage system of the Borough.

The total length of the sewerage system December 31, 1908, was 2,746,777 linear feet, or 520.21 miles, to which was added during the first quarter of 1909 2,083 linear feet, making the total length at the end of the quarter 2,748,860 linear feet, or 520.61 miles.

The total number of receiving basins in the Borough on December 31, 1908, was 6,325, and one was built during the quarter; thus the total number in use March 31, 1909, is 6,326.

The following sewers were completed during the quarter:

Sewer in One Hundred and Sixty-seventh street, between Amsterdam and Audubon avenues.

Sewer in Avenue A, between Eleventh and Twelfth streets.

Sewer in One Hundred and Sixty-second street, between Fort Washington avenue and Broadway. Built under permit from this Bureau.

Reconstruction of outlet sewer under Pier (new) 15, East River, and in South street, between Maiden lane and Burling slip.

Alteration and improvement, as well as reconstruction of sewers was carried on under contract during the quarter, and, while not adding to the mileage, did make an important improvement in the system.

The works under these heads are:

Alteration and improvement to sewer in One Hundred and Eighteenth street, between Third and Lexington avenues.

Reconstruction of outlet sewers in Twenty-eighth and Twenty-ninth streets, between East River and First avenue, and in First avenue, between Twenty-eighth and Twenty-ninth streets.

Reconstruction of outlet sewer under Pier (new) 15, East River.

Repairs to sewer in Park avenue, east side, between Eighty-first and Eighty-second streets.

Repairs to sewer at One Hundred and Forty-sixth street and Broadway, east side.

Repairs to sewer in Greenwich street, between Battery place and 200 feet north.

Repairs to sewer in Lenox avenue, between One Hundred and Forty-second and One Hundred and Forty-third streets.

There is still uncompleted one order for repairs, viz.:

First avenue, between One Hundred and Eighth and One Hundred and Ninth streets, etc., issued under contract for repairs to brick and pipe sewers for the year 1908.

There are now under contract and in course of construction the following works, viz.:

Sewer in Fifty-fifth street, between Avenue A and East River.

Sewer in West One Hundred and Forty-second street, from end of present sewer to Harlem River.

Sewer in One Hundred and Fifty-third street, between Riverside drive and Broadway.

Sewer in One Hundred and Sixty-third street, between Fort Washington avenue and Broadway. Built under permit from this Bureau.

Sewer in One Hundred and Sixty-fourth street, between Fort Washington avenue and Broadway. Built under permit from this Bureau.

Sewer in West One Hundred and Sixty-eighth street, between Fort Washington avenue and Broadway.

Sewer in West One Hundred and Sixty-ninth street, between Broadway and Fort Washington avenue.

Sewer in West One Hundred and Seventy-second street, between Fort Washington avenue and Broadway.

Sewer in Emerson street, between Vermilyea avenue and Cooper street, and in Broadway, both sides, between Emerson street and summit south.

Sewer in Broadway, both sides, between Isham and Emerson streets.

Alteration and improvement to sewer in One Hundred and Eighteenth street, between Third and Lexington avenues.

Reconstruction of outlet sewers in Twenty-eighth and Twenty-ninth streets, between East River and First avenue and in First avenue, between Twenty-eighth and Twenty-ninth streets.

Receiving basins on the northeast corner of Twenty-third street and on the southeast corner of Twenty-fourth street and Avenue A.

The contract prices for the above works payable from the Street Improvement Fund amount to \$57,466.38.

The contract payable from Corporate Stock amounts to \$43,586.50.

During the quarter bids were invited for the construction of a sewer in West One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street, from Fort Washington avenue to Riverside drive. These bids have been received and work can be begun as soon as the contract is awarded. Also for repairs to brick and pipe sewers in the Borough of Manhattan, during the year 1909.

In addition to the above, contract forms and specifications for the following works were completed during the quarter, and have been forwarded with the request that they be advertised and let, viz.:

Sewer in One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street, between Twelfth avenue and a point 275 feet easterly therefrom.

Sewer in West One Hundred and Seventy-fourth street, between Audubon and Wadsworth avenues.

Sewer in Emerson street, between Vermilyea avenue and summit east.

Receiving basin at northeast corner One Hundred and Eleventh street and Riverside drive.

Receiving basin on north side of Manhattan street, 87 feet west of Twelfth avenue.

Sewer in One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street, between Eighth avenue and Harlem River.

Sewer in One Hundred and Seventieth street, between Fort Washington and Haven avenue.

Sewer in Bennett avenue, between Broadway and One Hundred and Eighty-first street.

Extension of sewer in One Hundred and Twenty-fourth street and Harlem River.  
Extension of sewer in One Hundred and Twentieth street at East River.  
Receiving basin on northeast corner Avenue A and Twenty-second street.  
Sewer in One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street, between Audubon and St. Nicholas avenues.

Reconstruction of outlet sewer at the foot of Seventy-ninth street, East River.  
Outlet sewer, Harlem River, between One Hundred and Thirty-fourth and One Hundred and Thirty-fifth streets, and in Park avenue, between One Hundred and Thirty-fourth and One Hundred and Thirty-fifth streets.

Reconstruction of outlet sewer at the foot of Market street, East River.  
Reconstruction of outlet sewer at West and Albany streets.  
Rebuilding of sewer in Twenty-sixth street, between Fifth and Sixth avenues.  
Rebuilding of sewer in Liberty street, Greenwich to West street.  
Rebuilding of sewer in Liberty street, Nassau street and Maiden lane.  
Rebuilding of sewer in John street, Broadway to Pearl street.

Rebuilding of sewer in Cedar street, between Broadway and Nassau street.  
Alteration and improvement to sewer in Mercer street, between Spring and Prince streets, except portion recently repaired.

Extension of sewer in Eighteenth street and East River, and other work in connection with the same.

Sewer in One Hundred and Fifty-first street, between Broadway and Riverside drive.

Extension of box sewer under pier at Clarkson street.  
Sewer in Third avenue, west side, between Twelfth and Thirteenth streets.  
Outlet sewer, One Hundred and Eighteenth street and Harlem River.

Reconstruction of outlet sewer under Pier (old) 8, North River.  
The new work completed during the first quarter of 1909 has not been large; a depression in the building industry accounts for it partially. The system in the northern end of the Borough, as far as the same has been laid out, is nearly completed. There are, however, tracts of considerable extent not provided with a street system, which, in due time, will require sewers and some of these will require outlets over private lands to the Hudson and Harlem rivers.

The older portion of the Borough, however, demands attention in the reconstruction of its sewers which, by long use and disturbance by underground structures, require rebuilding, and following the practice in vogue for many years past, all outlets should go to the pier heads.

The recent suggestion that plants for the partial treatment of sewage should be installed at each outlet to prevent fouling of the waters of the harbor, does not seem to me to be feasible or necessary at the present time. The immense body of water surrounding this island has been and will continue to be for many years capable of assimilating and digesting, and thus finally disposing of the sewage of the Borough. The more immediate need is a comprehensive plan for reconstructing our drainage system in view of the great and important changes which are rendered necessary by the construction of subway railroads. This matter has been urged frequently by me but so far no decisive action has been taken since subway building has been held up for financial reasons.

In many cases where the reconstruction of outlets has become necessary, it would be but just to have the sewerage district or area contributing to the outlet bear the cost of the reconstruction of these new sewers. The old outlet sewers under docks are necessarily reconstructed of wood. They having served the district for years, have decayed through use and made rebuilding necessary. This reconstruction cannot be undertaken unless proceedings are initiated by or through the proper authority, which necessitates a petition by a property owner interested therein.

It having been found that such a petition is very difficult of procurement, I would suggest that you procure an opinion of the Corporation Counsel that will determine whether it will be possible to proceed with the work of making surveys, preparing plans and letting contracts for outlet sewers, without the usual petition of a property owner to the Local Board of Public Improvements, it being understood that the cost of such work will be assessed upon the property benefited.

If this proposition should be decided in the negative by the Corporation Counsel, it will be necessary that direct appropriation of funds be made to make these improvements, which in some cases amount to very considerable sums.

#### REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF PUBLIC BUILDINGS AND OFFICES.

Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices, Superintendent's Office, Nos. 13 to 21 Park Row, New York, April 8, 1909.

Mr. JOHN CLOUGHEN, Commissioner of Public Works:

Dear Sir—I have the honor to submit the following report of the transactions of this Bureau for the quarter ending March 31, 1909.

Requisitions to the number of 418, amounting to \$25,040.63 were drawn, covering items of repair and supply for the maintenance and care of the various public buildings, courts, offices, baths and comfort stations, and transmitted to your office for the authorization of orders thereon.

Vouchers amounting to \$514,267.45, and numbering 593, were prepared on claims on account of the payrolls, payments on contracts and bills rendered on open market orders. Each individual bill was subject to a careful investigation as to the delivery of supply, or the repair made, and the reasonableness of the charges by the various employees of this Bureau engaged in the inspection of mechanical work and supplies. Each claim was properly audited and transmitted.

Four hundred and eleven communications, covering various subjects affecting the transactions of the Bureau were transmitted.

The amount above mentioned on account of the vouchers includes one voucher amounting to \$85,312.80, prepared in accordance with the opinion of the Corporation Counsel with reference to the acquisition of the site for the Carmine Street Bath, and included, outside of the purchase price, the interest thereon to the date of payment.

The condition of the Criminal Courts Building, which has been subject to a continuous and increasing settlement for some time past on account of the excavations for subways, between Centre and Franklin streets, has been under daily inspection by the employees of the Bureau, and whenever the occasion warranted it, I have made inspections personally in order to be intimately informed in regard to the status of the building.

Mr. Rudolph P. Miller, the Consulting Engineer, has also been retained by the President of the Borough to act in conjunction with this Bureau, and he is keeping me informed regularly in discoveries that he may make concerning the safety of the structure. From our observations and inspections we are of the opinion that there is no cause for serious anxiety in regard to this matter. Constant attention is being given, from time to time, in making repairs of a minor nature that have been caused through the breakage of piping, plastering, etc., owing to the settlement of the building.

The spring work on the public baths, which consists in making a minute examination of each bath in order to determine the extent of the repairs and replacements required for the bathing season, and also to discover what repairs are to be performed by the men in the employ of the Bureau has begun. The employees of the Bureau have been on this work for some time past, and a specification covering the work of general repairs will be prepared, and bids advertised for, and a contract let. I have already requested the assignment of the various berths for the summer season.

It has been gratifying to me to feel that the markets are in such a satisfactory condition, as is evidenced from the almost total absence of complaints from the stand

holders. About this time last year the Bureau was the recipient of a large volume of complaints regarding the condition of roofs, floors and doors of the various stand holders, and I have made it a point since then to keep men constantly employed in these structures making necessary repairs, until now I find that the buildings are in as good condition as it is possible to make them under the circumstances.

Approximately 9,000 inspections of public buildings, baths, comfort stations and offices were made by the Inspectors, Foremen and other employees engaged in the supervision of the sanitary and physical condition of the public buildings and offices.

The Carmine Street Public Bath, situated at Nos. 83 and 85 Carmine street, was completed during the quarter, and turned over to this Bureau and accepted on behalf of the City. The building cost, exclusive of the site, \$137,449.20, and was constructed under the supervision, and in accordance with the plans and specifications prepared by Messrs. Renwick, Aspinwall & Tucker, architects. The builder for the construction, exclusive of the plumbing, was Charles H. Peckworth, and the plumbing work was performed by Messrs. Byrne & Murphy.

The building is built along pleasing architectural lines, which were approved by the Municipal Art Commission. The accommodations consist of forty-one showers and two tubs on the main floor of the bath for the use of males; twenty-two showers and two tubs on the women's side of bath, main floor. There are also twenty-four showers on the gymnasium floor for the use of males, and nine showers on this floor for the use of females.

In addition to the bathing facilities above mentioned, this building contains a running track, gymnasium and roof garden. There are several locker rooms, containing over three hundred lockers. It is proposed to provide necessary gymnastic apparatus, so that the gymnasium will be equipped in an up-to-date manner. This bath will be a beneficent institution, and will result in supplying healthful enjoyment to the public in this locality.

The contract for the installation of steel filing document cases, and general alterations in the Hall of Records Building, in the offices occupied by the Commissioner of Records and the Corporation Counsel, was let last year, and the work has been in satisfactory progress during the past quarter.

The contract for the rewiring of the City Hall Building, in order to place the same in a safe condition, and in accordance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, was let, and the work commenced and is now under way.

In addition to the work performed under the supervision of the Bureau upon open market orders and contracts, repairs and alterations have been made extensively to the various public buildings, baths, comfort stations, courts and offices, by the mechanics in the employ of the Bureau. Orders to the number of 355 were issued on this account during the quarter, and consisted of plumbing and electrical repairs, carpenter work, pipe covering, steam and gas fitting.

I submit herewith statistics of attendance at the various permanent baths during the quarter.

## Brooklyn Bridge.

During the quarter substantial progress was made in the work of substituting new steel stringers for the wooden stringers under the railway tracks.

A footwalk crossing, for pedestrians only, was constructed and opened to service across the easterly trolley approach north of the intersection of Concord and Washington streets, Brooklyn. This footwalk serves as a substitute for Concord street, which was closed by the trolley approach crossing below the grade of the street.

All other departmental contracts are rapidly nearing completion.

## Williamsburg Bridge.

Substantial progress has been obtained in all departmental contracts on this bridge and the effect of the improvements to the elevated train service is satisfactory and greatly facilitates the operation of the service.

## Queensboro Bridge.

On March 30, 1909, this bridge was opened to the public. All contracts are practically finished except the electric lighting and the electrical equipment and these are being hurried as much as possible.

## Manhattan Bridge.

The work of constructing the steel and masonry approaches on both sides of the river and the erection of the cable bands and suspenders has been completed and work has been commenced on the final wrappings of the cables.

The material is being delivered satisfactorily for the superstructure in Manhattan and about 70 per cent. of same has been erected. On the completion of the anchorage, which is progressing rapidly, the remaining portion of the superstructure will be erected.

The superstructure in Brooklyn is being hurried in every possible way and the material for same is at the site.

On the suspended superstructure, the material is being erected in remarkable time and is at present about 60 per cent. complete.

## New Madison Avenue Bridge.

Work is progressing rapidly on the foundations of the centre and rest piers and excavation commenced and progressing rapidly for the approach walls.

All other bridges have been maintained and operated satisfactorily, and, where necessary, plans have been made for the improvement of same.

Resolved, That the following form of the resolution for the grant of the franchise or right applied for by the United Electric Service Company, containing the form of proposed contract for the grant of such franchise or right, be hereby introduced, and entered in the minutes of this Board, as follows, to wit:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby grants to the United Electric Service Company the franchise or right fully set out and described in the following form of proposed contract for the grant thereof, embodying all of the terms and conditions, including the provisions as to rates, fares and charges upon and subject to the terms and conditions in said proposed form of contract contained, and that the Mayor of The City of New York be and he hereby is authorized to execute and deliver such contract in the name and on behalf of The City of New York, as follows, to wit:

**PROPOSED FORM OF CONTRACT.**

This contract, made this day of May, 1909, by and between The City of New York, hereinafter called the City, party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter called the Board), and the United Electric Service Company, a domestic corporation of the State of New York (hereinafter called the Company), party of the second part; witnesseth:

In consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained, the parties hereto do covenant and agree as follows:

Section 1. The City hereby grants to the Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinabove set forth, the right and privilege to lay, construct, maintain and operate suitable wires or other electrical conductors in conduits under the streets, avenues and highways within the territory comprised in the Borough of Manhattan, for the purpose of connecting by means of such wires, call boxes, or other signalling apparatus, to be placed upon the premises of the subscribers, with offices of the Company, and thereby maintaining and operating an electrical signal system for the calling of messengers, an electrical burglar alarm system and a fire alarm system, and for no other purpose whatsoever.

Sec. 2. The grant of this privilege is subject to the following conditions:

First—The rights, privileges and authority herein granted shall not be construed to in any way give the Company the right, privilege or authority to engage in a telephone business, or to render telephone service, and this contract is entered into on the mutual and express understanding and agreement by and between the parties hereto, that the Company will not in any way engage in a telephone business or render telephone service, or claim the right so to do under this contract and the rights, privileges and authority therein and thereby granted and conferred.

Second—The said right and privilege to lay, construct, maintain and operate wires or other electrical conductors in conduits for the purpose aforesaid shall be held and enjoyed by the Company, its successors or assigns, for the term of fifteen (15) years from the date when this contract is signed by the Mayor, with the privilege of renewal of said contract for a further period of ten (10) years upon a fair revaluation of said right and privilege.

If the Company shall determine to exercise its privilege of renewal it shall make application to the Board or any authority which shall be authorized by law to act for the City in place of the Board. Such application shall be made at any time not earlier than two years and not later than one year before the expiration of the original term of this contract. The determination of the revaluation shall be sufficient if agreed to in writing by the Company and the Board, but in no case shall the annual rate of compensation to the City be fixed at a less amount than that sum required to be paid during the year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract. If the Company and the Board shall not reach such agreement on or before the day one year before the expiration of the original term of this contract, then the annual rate of compensation for such succeeding ten (10) years shall be reasonable, and either the City (by the Board) or the Company shall be bound, upon request of the other, to enter into a written agreement with each other, fixing the rate of such compensation at such amount as shall be reasonable, but in no case shall the annual rate so fixed be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, and if the parties shall not forthwith agree upon what is reasonable, then the parties shall enter into a written agreement, fixing such annual rate at such amount as shall be determined by three disinterested freeholders, selected in the following manner:

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board; one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Company; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder; and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluation aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six months prior to the expiration of the original contract, and their report shall be filed with the Board within three months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine the books of the Company and its officers under oath. The valuation so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties, but no annual sum shall in any event be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract. If, in any case, the annual rate shall not be fixed prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, then the Company shall pay the annual rate theretofore prevailing until the new rate shall be determined, and shall then make up to the City the amount of any excess of the annual rate then determined over the previous annual rate. The compensation and expenses of the said appraisers shall be borne jointly by the City and the Company, each paying one-half thereof.

Third—Upon the termination of this original contract or if the same be renewed then at the termination of the said renewal term, or upon the termination of the rights hereby granted for any other cause, or upon the dissolution of the Company before such termination, the plant and property of the Company used for maintaining and operating an electrical signal system for the calling of messengers, an electrical burglar alarm system, and a fire alarm system within the streets and highways of the City shall become the property of the City without cost, and the same may be used by the City for any purpose whatsoever. If, however, at the termination of this grant, as above, the City, by the Board, shall so order by resolution, the Company shall on thirty (30) days' notice from the Board remove any and all of its wires, or other electrical conductors, or any portion thereof, from any or all of the streets and public places within the limits of the City.

Fourth—The Company shall pay to the City for the said privilege, the following sums of money:

The sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) in cash within thirty (30) days after the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor.
During the first five years of this contract an annual sum, which shall in no case be less than twelve hundred dollars (\$1,200), and shall be equal to two (2) per cent. of the gross receipts of the Company, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500).
During the succeeding five years of this contract an annual sum which shall in no case be less than four thousand five hundred dollars (\$4,500), and which shall be equal to four (4) per cent. of the gross receipts of the Company, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of four thousand five hundred dollars (\$4,500).
During the remaining five years of this contract an annual sum which shall in no case be less than four thousand five hundred dollars (\$4,500), and which shall be equal to four (4) per cent. of the gross receipts of the Company, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of four thousand five hundred dollars (\$4,500).

Upon written notification of the Board to the Company that such resolutions have been adopted the Company shall install such apparatus free of charge, and shall furnish service at rates not to exceed seventy-five (75) per cent. of the rates charged by the Company to any other individual or corporation for similar service.

Eighth—The Company shall construct, maintain, and operate its messenger and alarm system, subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of the City who have jurisdiction in such matters under the Charter of the City, and in strict compliance with all laws or ordinances, now in force or which may be adopted, affecting companies operating electrical conductors in the City.

Ninth—All cables and wires of the Company laid pursuant to this contract shall be placed in ducts, conduits or subways (referred to in this paragraph as subways). Such subways shall be leased from the company or companies having control thereof under the provisions of law, or from the City should it succeed to the rights of such company or companies. Tenth—The Company shall, within two years from the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor, have in operation at least two thousand (2,000) messenger call boxes, otherwise this grant shall cease and determine.

Eleventh—The Company shall file with the Board, on the first day of November in each year, a map, plan or diagram upon which shall be plainly marked and designated the streets and public places in which are then laid and also those proposed to be laid, during the succeeding year, the several conduits and ducts necessary for the cables and wires used and to be used by the Company, together with a statement showing the number of ducts in each street and wires in each duct occupied.

Twelfth—It is a condition of this contract that the Company shall bear the entire expense of all work undertaken by reason of this grant.

Thirteenth—During the term of this contract or its renewal, the Board shall have absolute power to regulate all charges or rates of the Company for this service, provided that such rates shall be reasonable and fair, but the Company shall not charge at any time during the term of this contract, or its renewal, rates for messenger service in excess of the following:

In any direction from a district office or central station:

Fourteenth—The Company shall not require nor receive from its subscribers any deposit or advance payment in excess of what is reasonably necessary to insure payment of current bills, and on such amounts so paid the Company shall pay interest at the statutory rate whenever such money is held for more than one month. Unpaid bills, unless due from its owner, shall never be charged against property, and no person not himself in arrears shall be denied service because any previous occupant of the same premises is in arrears to the Company for service.

Fifteenth—The wires of the Company shall be employed for no other purposes than those explicitly set forth herein, except by consent of the Board, and the Company binds itself not to lay, use, lease or operate wires for illegal purposes or to illegal places.

Sixteenth—The Company shall assume all liability to persons or property by reason of the construction or operation of the system authorized by this contract, and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property on account of the same, and the Company hereby agrees to repay to the City any damage which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or defaults of the Company.

Seventeenth—If the said Company, its successors or assigns, shall fail to maintain its structures in good condition throughout the full term of its occupancy of such streets the Board may give written notice to the said Company specifying any default on the part of said Company, and requiring said Company to remedy the same within a reasonable time, and upon the failure of the Company to remedy said default within a reasonable time the said Company shall for each day thereafter during which the default or defect remains pay to the City a sum of one hundred dollars (\$100) as fixed or liquidated damages, or to the said City, in case such structures which may affect the surface of the streets shall not be put in good condition within a reasonable time after notice by the Board aforesaid, shall have the right to make all needed repairs at the expense of the Company, in which case the said Company shall pay to the City the amount of

the cost of such repairs, with legal interest thereon, all of which sums may be deducted from the fund hereinafter provided.

If, for a period of three consecutive months the messenger, fire alarm or burglary alarm systems of the Company shall not be operated, or if the same shall not be operated for a period of six months out of any consecutive twelve months, the Board may declare the right and franchise and this contract terminated without further proceedings in law or in equity.

Eighteenth—The Company shall at all times keep accurate books of accounts and shall, on or before November 1 in each year, make a verified report to the Comptroller of the City of the business done by the Company for the year ending September 30 next preceding. Such report shall contain a statement of the gross receipts received from the operation of the systems hereby authorized from all subscribers served by the Company, together with such other information and in such form and detail as the Comptroller may require. The Comptroller shall have access to all books of the Company for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness of its reports and may examine its officers under oath.

Nineteenth—The Company shall submit a report to the Board not later than November 1 of each year, for the year ending September 30 next preceding, which shall state:

1. The amount of stock issued, for cash, or property;
2. The amount paid in as by last report;
3. The total amount of capital stock paid in;
4. The funded debt by last report;
5. The total amount of funded debt;
6. The floating debt as by last report;
7. The amount of floating debt;
8. The total amount of funded and floating debt;
9. The average rate per annum of interest on funded debt;
10. The amount of dividends paid during the year and the rate of same;
11. The amount paid for damage to persons or property on account of construction and operation;
12. The total income during the year, giving the amount from each class of business;
13. The total expenses for operation, including salaries;

—and such other information in regard to the business of the Company as may be required by the Board.

For failure to comply with the foregoing the Company shall pay a penalty of one hundred dollars (\$100) per day until such statement is rendered, which may be collected by the Comptroller without notice.

Twentieth—This grant is upon the express condition that the Company, within thirty (30) days after the execution of this contract, and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred thereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of the City the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000), either in money or securities to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by the Company of the terms and conditions of the contract, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charge for the franchise granted, in default of which payment of the annual charge the Comptroller, acting in behalf of the City, shall collect same with interest from such fund after five days' notice in writing to the Company. In case of failure of the Company to comply with the terms of this contract relating to the filing of annual statements and the commencement and increase of construction, or its neglect or refusal to comply with any demand or direction of the Board or other municipal officials, made pursuant to the terms of the contract, or under the authority of any laws or ordinances now or hereafter in force, in such case and in any of these events the Company shall pay to the Comptroller of the City a penalty of \$1,000 for each violation, and in case of any violation of the provisions relating to the illegal use of wires, the Company shall pay to the Comptroller of the City for each violation a penalty of not less than \$100, and not more than \$500, to be fixed by the said Comptroller.

The procedure for the imposition and collection of the penalties provided in the grant shall be as follows:

The Comptroller of the City, on complaint made, shall, in writing, notify the Company, through its president, to appear before him on a certain day, not less than five days after the date of such notice, to show cause why it should not be penalized in accordance with the foregoing provisions. If the Company fails to make an appearance, or, after a hearing, appears, in the judgment of the Comptroller, to be in fault, said Comptroller shall forthwith impose the prescribed penalty, or where the amount of the penalty is not prescribed herein, such amount as appears to him to be just, and without legal procedure withdraw the amount of such penalty from the security fund deposited with him. Twenty-second—If at any time the powers of the Board or any other of the authorities herein mentioned or intended to be mentioned, shall be transferred by law to any other board, authority, officer or officers, then and in such case such other board, authority, officer or officers, shall have all the powers, rights and duties herein reserved to or prescribed for the Board or other authorities, officer or officers.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be enclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.
