COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at a Meeting Held in Room 16, City Hall, at 11 o'clock a. m., on Wednesday, September 20, 1911.

Present: Francis P. Bent, Acting President, Board of Aldermen; Douglas Mathewson, Deputy and Acting Comptroller; Robert R. Moore, Chamberlain, and Frank L. Dowling, Chairman, Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen.

The Minutes of the meeting held August 2, 1911, were approved as printed.

The following communications were received from the Commissioner of Docks relative to a lease of property at the foot of Garrison avenue, on the westerly side of the Bronx River, Borough of The Bronx, to Gleason & Egan:

June 23, 1910.

Hon. WILLIAM J. GAYNOR, Mayor, and Chairman of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Sir—On March 10, 1909, an application was submitted to this Department by Gleason & Egan for a lease of the premises under the jurisdiction of this Department at the foot of Garrison avenue, on the westerly side of the Bronx River, in the Borough of The Bronx, with permission to construct, in accordance with the rules of the Department, a platform at the foot of said avenue. No action was taken in regard to this application, owing to the fact that the President of the Borough of The Bronx at that time was considering the street lay-out and the fixing of the bulkhead line along the Bronx River. This plan has now been finished, and under date of June 10, 1910, Gleason & Egan renew their application.

After consideration of the matter I am of the opinion that the interests of the City will be best served by the granting of a lease to them of the property under the jurisdiction of this Department at the foot of Garrison avenue on the westerly side of the Bronx River, in the Borough of The Bronx, for a term of five years, commencing on the first day of the month next succeeding the date upon which the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approve said lease, at a rental of \$200 per annum, with privilege of renewal for a further term of five years at a rental to be fixed by appraisal.

The lease to provide that the lessee shall build a good and substantial bulkhead across the foot of the street in accordance with plans and specifications to be approved by this Department; and also to contain a provision that in case the City requires the property for the improvement of the waterfront under the "New Plan" the lease may be cancelled.

The remaining terms and conditions of the lease to be similar to those contained in leases of wharf property now in use by this Department.

The applicants are engaged in making streets and building operations and improving the section of The Bronx in which Garrison avenue is located.

Sir—Referring to the communications addressed to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, under date of June 23, 1910, and December 5, 1910, recommending the granting of a lease to Gleason & Egan of the bulkhead at the foot of Garrison avenue, Borough of The Bronx, I beg to recommend that a provision be added thereto to the effect that the bulkhead shall be maintained as an open bulkhead for general wharfage purposes, and that not more than the legal rates of wharfage fixed by statute shall be charged for the use of same.

In connection therewith the Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution:

September 11, 1911.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—On June 23, 1910, the Commissioner of Docks requested the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to approve of a lease to Gleason & Egan of property under the jurisdiction of the Department of Docks and Ferries, at the foot of Garrison avenue, on the westerly side of the Bronx River, in the Borough of The Bronx, for a term of five years, commencing on the first day of the month next succeeding the date upon which the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approve said lease, at a rental of \$200 per annum.

The proposed lease provides that the lessee build a good and substantial bulkhead across the foot of the street, in accordance with plans and specifications to be approved by the Department of Docks and Ferries; and also to contain a provision that in case the City requires the property for the improvement of the waterfront under the "New Plan," the lease may be cancelled.

The remaining terms and conditions of the lease are to be similar to those contained in leases of wharf property now in use by the Department of Docks and Ferries.

On December 5, 1910, the Commissioner added the provision that bulkhead authorized to be built by lessees shall revert to and become the property of the City at the expiration or sooner termination of the lease, or any renewal thereof.

The Commissioner on April 25, 1911, further amended his recommendation that provision be added to the effect that the bulkhead shall be maintained as an open bulkhead for general wharfage purposes, and that not more than the legal rates of wharfage fixed by statute shall be charged for the use of same.

The Corporation Counsel has advised that the lease can legally be made; also the terms and conditions are satisfactory to the President of the Borough of The Bronx, and the rental is reasonable. Therefore, I recommend that the lease be authorized under the terms proposed by the Commissioner of Docks as set forth in his communications dated June 23, 1910, December 5, 1910, and April 25, 1911.

The attached resolution is transmitted for adoption.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of and consent to the execution, by the Commissioner of Docks, of a lease to Gleason & Egan, of property under the jurisdiction of the Department of Docks and Ferries, at the foot of Garrison avenue, lying between the prolongation of the northerly and southerly lines of said avenue, on the westerly side of the Bronx River, in the Borough of The Bronx, for a term of five years, commencing October 1, 1911, at a rental of two hundred dollars (\$200) per annum, with the privilege of renewal for an additional term of five years, at a rental to be fixed by appraisal; the lease to provide that the lessee shall build a good and substantial bulkhead across the foot of the street in accordance with the plans and specifications to be approved by the Department of Docks and Ferries. During the term of said lease the bulkhead shall be maintained as an open bulkhead for general wharfage purposes, and that not more than the legal rates of wharfage fixed by statute shall be charged for the use of same; such bulkhead to revert to and become the property of The City of New York at the expiration or sooner termination of the lease or any renewal thereof; and also to contain a provision that in case the City requires the property for the improvement of the waterfront under the "New Plan," the lease may be cancelled. The remaining terms and conditions of the lease to be similar to those contained in leases of wharf property now in use by the Department of Docks and Ferries, and as recommended by the Commis-

sioner of Docks in communications dated June 23, 1910, December 5, 1910, and April 25, 1911.

The report was accepted, and the resolution adopted, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution, relative to a renewal of the lease to the city of premises at 417 East 85th street, Borough of Manhattan, for use of the Board of Education:

September 15, 1911.

To the Honorable, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—A. Emerson Palmer, Esq., Secretary to the Board of Education, in a letter to your Honorable Board under date of May 25, 1911, states that at a meeting of the Board of Education held May 24, 1911, the following resolution was adopted:

"Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be, and they are hereby, requested, subject to financial ability, to approve of and consent to the execution by the Board of Education of a renewal of the lease of the basement and extension, yard and rear yard, of the premises No. 415 East 85th street, Manhattan, occupied as an annex to Public School 77, for a period from October 7, 1911, to July 1, 1913, with the privilege of renewal for an additional year, at an annual rental of \$600, which is considered fair and reasonable, otherwise on the same terms and conditions as contained in the existing lease. Owner, Mrs. Frances Gold, No. 417 East 85th street, New York City." (Mistake, should be No. 417 and rear yard of No. 415.)

The Comptroller, in a communication to your Board under date of February 10, 1911, the City then being a holdover tenant, recommended a renewal of this lease for a period of one year from October 7, 1910, at a rental of \$600 a year, the same as now asked and the same as paid by the City for the previous five years.

Deeming the rent reasonable and just and for the best interests of the City under all the circumstances, I respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution authorizing a renewal of the lease of the basement and extension of the premises No. 417 East 85th street, Borough of Manhattan, occupied as an annex to Public School 77, for a period from October 7, 1911, to July 1, 1913, with the privilege of renewal for an additional year upon the same terms and conditions, at an annual rental of \$600, payable quarterly, the lessor to pay taxes and water rates, make inside and outside repairs, supply heat, light and janitor service and water, including hot water supply, the lease also to include the use of the rear yard of 415 East 85th street, 12x60 feet, used for school gardens and playground, the lessee to make such interior alterations as it may deem necessary. Lessor, Mrs. Frances Gold, 417 East 85th Street, Manhattan.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of and consent to the execution, by the Board of Education, of a renewal of the lease to the City, of the basement and extension of premises No. 417 East 85th street, Borough of Manhattan, occupied as an annex to Public School 77, for a period from October 7, 1911, to July 1, 1913, with the privilege of renewal for an additional year, upon the same terms and conditions, at an annual rental of Six Hundred Dollars (\$600), payable quarterly; the lessor to pay taxes and water rates, make inside and outside repairs, supply heat, light and janitor service and water, including hot water supply; the lease to also include the use of the rear yard of 415 East 85th street, 12x60 feet, used for school gardens and playground; the lessee to make such interior alterations as it may deem necessary; Lessor, Mrs. Frances Gold; the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the said rent fair and reasonable and that it would be for the interests of the City that such lease be made.

The report was accepted, and the resolution adopted, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution, relative to a renewal of the lease to the City of premises at 627 Hudson street, Borough of Manhattan, for use of the Department of Street Cleaning:

September 14, 1911.

To the Honorable, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—Honorable William H. Edwards, Commissioner of the Department of Street Cleaning, in a communication to your Board under date of August 22, 1911, says:

"I request the consent and approval of your Board for a renewal of the lease from the Village Realty Company (James F. Bragg, Secretary and Treasurer, 181 Eighth avenue), of the store and front basement of 627 Hudson street, Borough of Manhattan, for another term beginning November 1, 1911, and ending May 1, 1913, at the same annual rental of \$780 per annum, payable quarterly, and otherwise upon the same terms and conditions contained in the existing lease.

"The above rent is, in my opinion, the lowest that can be obtained for suitable property in that neighborhood."

The premises mentioned consist of a store 18x54 feet, with front basement 18x30 feet, in the four-story and basement, brick, cold water tenement building 25x56 feet on lot 25x88 feet 9 inches, by 25 feet 2 inches by 86 feet 9 inches, at 627 Hudson street, west side, between Jane and Horatio streets, Borough of Manhattan. It is used as a section station for Sections 11 and 13, having a total of 66 men, and has been occupied by the Department of Street Cleaning for many years, the rent for the past four years being \$780 a year, the same as now asked for this renewal. The lessor pays taxes and water rates, and the lessee furnishes heat (stove), light and janitor service, and makes such interior alterations and repairs as it may deem necessary:

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(The property was sold at Executor's Sale in 1907 for \$20,000.)

The rent of the three upper floors is \$30 a month each, or \$1,080 a year, making the total rent of the building \$1,860 a year. This is 10.94% on the assessed value, 10.1-3% on the Tax Department valuation and 9.3-10% on the appraised value by the Division of Real Estate.

For comparison, 629 Hudson street, adjoining, a four-story brick building 25x40 feet, with one and three-story extension 25x45 feet, on lot 25x90 feet 9 inches by 25 feet 2 inches by 88 feet 9 inches, is assessed:

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The store in this building 18x85 feet rents for \$900 a year, and the three upper floors for \$756, making a total rental for the building of \$1,656 a year. The building at 627 Hudson street, however, is a taller and deeper building than 629, but has no extension, and is kept in better order and brings higher rents upstairs.

Commissioner Edwards states that the rent is, in his opinion, the lowest that can be obtained for suitable property in that neighborhood.

Deeming the rent reasonable and just, and it being the same as paid by the City for the past four years, I respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution authorizing a renewal of the lease of the store 18x54 feet, and front basement 18x30 feet, in the four-story and basement, brick, cold water tenement building at 627 Hudson street, Borough of Manhattan, for use as a section station by the Department of Street Cleaning, for a period of eighteen months from November 1, 1911, to May 1, 1913, at an annual rental of \$780, payable quarterly, with privilege of renewal for an additional year upon the same terms and conditions; the lessor to pay taxes and water rates and make outside repairs; the lessee to furnish heat, light and janitor service, and to make such interior alterations or repairs as it may deem necessary, otherwise upon the same terms and conditions as contained in the existing lease. Lessor, The Village Realty Company (James F. Bragg, Secretary and Treasurer), 181 Eighth avenue, Borough of Manhattan.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of and consent to the execution, by the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, of a renewal of the lease to the City, of the store 18x54 feet and front basement 18x30 feet, in the four-story and basement, brick, cold water tenement building at 627 Hudson street, Borough of Manhattan, for use as a section station by the Department of Street Cleaning, for a period of 18 months from November 1, 1911, to May 1, 1913, at an annual rental of Seven Hundred and Eighty Dollars (\$780), payable quarterly, with the privilege of renewal for an additional year upon the same terms and conditions; the lessor to pay taxes and water rates and make outside repairs; the lessee to furnish heat, light and janitor service and make such interior alterations or repairs as it may deem necessary, otherwise upon the same terms and conditions as contained in the existing lease; lessor, The Village Realty Company (James F. Bragg, Secretary and Treasurer); the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the said rent fair and reasonable and that it would be for the interests of the City that such lease be made.

The report was accepted, and the resolution adopted, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution, relative to a renewal of the lease to the City of premises 518 Fifth street, College Point, Borough of Queens, for use of the Fire Department:

September 14, 1911.

To the Honorable, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—Mr. Joseph Johnson, Deputy Commissioner of the Fire Department, in an undated communication to your Honorable Board received February 11, 1911, requests a renewal of the lease of the fire house premises 518 Fifth street, College Point, Borough of Queens, as quarters for Hose Company No. 9, for a term of one year from December 1, 1911, with the privilege of renewal for an additional year, at a rental of \$600 a year, payable quarterly, the same as previously paid, the lessor to pay taxes and make outside repairs, the City to pay water rates, furnish heat, light and janitor service and make such inside repairs as it may deem necessary.

This is a two-story and cellar, comparatively new, frame building, 24x40 feet, with a one-story feed house 12x12 feet in the rear, on a lot 25x100 feet. It has been occupied by the City since December 1, 1908, at a rental of \$600 a year, the lessors giving the City an option to purchase the property at a price of \$5,000 any time during the first year of the lease.

The owners will repaint the building and make outside repairs this year, amounting to \$150 or more.

As a result of negotiations by the Division of Real Estate of this Department, the owners, as shown by letter of May 8 herewith, have consented to renew the lease for a term of three years from December 1, 1911, at a rental of \$450 a year, payable quarterly, and to grant to the City an option to purchase the property at any time during the first year of said renewal at a price of \$4,500, which is \$500 less than the price named in the previous option.

The rent of \$450, which is a reduction of \$150 a year from that previously paid, is 10% of the appraised value by the Division of Real Estate and 14% of the assessed value and the Tax Department appraisal.

Deputy Commissioner Johnson states that the rent is the most reasonable that can be secured in the neighborhood for the purpose desired.

Deeming the rent reasonable and just, under the circumstances, I respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution authorizing a renewal of the lease of the fire house premises 518 Fifth street, College Point, Borough of Queens, for use as quarters for Hose Company No. 9, for a period of three years from December 1, 1911, at a rental of \$450 a year, the lessor to pay taxes and make outside repairs and to grant the City an option to purchase the property at any time within one year from December 1, 1911, at a price of \$4,500, upon giving sixty days' notice of its intention so to do, the lessee to pay water rates, furnish heat, light and janitor service and make such inside repairs as it may deem necessary. Lessor, Enterprise Social and Benevolent Association, John Kuhler, President; John P. Kraebel, Secretary, 408 12th street, College Point, Queens.

Kraebel, Secretary; the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the said rent fair and reasonable, and that it would be for the interests of the City that such lease be made.

The report was accepted, and the resolution adopted, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution, relative to a renewal of the lease to the City of premises at 90-92 West Broadway, Borough of Manhattan, for use of the Law Department (Bureau of Street Openings):

September 15, 1911.

To the Honorable, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—George L. Sterling, Acting Corporation Counsel, in a communication to your Board under date of May 11, 1911, says:

"The Bureau of Street Openings, in the Law Department, occupies the following rooms in the Gerken Building, 90 and 92 West Broadway, at the annual rental of \$16,075:

12th, 13th and 14th floors	\$13,500

Room 116—11th floor	600
Rooms 42 and 43—4th floor	425

"The leases of the above mentioned floors and rooms expire on October 1, 1911.

"I recommend that your Commission adopt a resolution that the City of New York obtain a lease from Mr. Frederick Gerken, the owner of the Gerken Building, expiring when the Municipal Office Building is ready for occupancy. Mr. Gerken has consented to the period of expiration."

The rooms in the Gerken Building occupied by the Bureau of Street Openings are now held by the City under three separate leases, all expiring October 1, 1911, one for the 12th, 13th and 14th floors, at a rental of \$13,500 a year; one for rooms 100, 101, 102 and 103, on the ninth floor, at a rental of \$1,550 a year; and one for room 116, on the eleventh floor, and rooms 42 and 43 on the fourth floor, at a rental of \$1,025 a year; total, \$16,075. There is an error, however, in the letter above quoted, in the rental items of the last lease, the rent of room 116 on the eleventh floor being \$425 a year, and the rental of rooms 42 and 43 on the fourth floor being \$600 a year. The total space occupied amounts to 9,572 square feet, at the rate of \$1.68 per square foot, and the rent of \$16,075 a year is the same as the City is now paying. It is expected that the new Municipal Building will be ready for occupancy on or before May 1, 1913, and will furnish accommodations for this Bureau.

The rent being reasonable and just, I respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution authorizing a lease of rooms 42 and 43 on the fourth floor, rooms 100, 101, 102 and 103 on the ninth floor, room 116 on the eleventh floor, and all of the 12th, 13th and 14th floors in the Gerken Building, 90-92 West Broadway, Borough of Manhattan, for use of the Law Department (Bureau of Street Openings), for a period of two years from October 1, 1911, with the privilege of renewal for an additional two years upon the same terms and conditions, at an annual rental of \$16,075, payable quarterly; the lessor to pay taxes and water rates, make all necessary repairs, and furnish heat, light, elevator and janitor service; the lease to contain a clause whereby the same may be cancelled by the City in the event of the new Municipal Building in Centre street being ready for occupancy before the expiration of the lease, upon giving thirty (30) days' notice of its intention so to do. Lessor, Frederick Gerken, 90-92 West Broadway, Borough of Manhattan.

The report was accepted, and the resolution adopted, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution, relative to an amendment to resolution authorizing a renewal of the lease to the City of a plot of land on the east side of 20th street, between 12th avenue and Albert place, in the Borough of Queens, for use as a garbage crematory, by the President of the Borough of Queens:

September 14, 1911.

To the Honorable, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—On April 26, 1911, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorized a lease from the Degnon Realty and Terminal Improvement Company, of a plot of land 100 by 100 and irregular, and described in the former lease as four lots on the east side of 20th street, between 12th avenue and Albert place, Third Ward, Borough of Queens, and now known as Lot 71A, Block 180, Ward 3, Queens, for use of the President of the Borough of Queens as a site for a garbage crematory plant, for a period of one year from May 1, 1911, with the privilege of renewal for an additional year upon the same terms and conditions, at a rental of \$200 per annum, payable quarterly; the lessor to pay taxes, and the City to pay water rates and furnish light, heat and caretaker, and to make such inside and outside alterations and repairs to the building as it may deem necessary.

In accordance with this resolution a lease was prepared by the Corporation Counsel, and transmitted to the Degnon Realty and Terminal Improvement Company for execution. They refused to execute the same, however, unless the conditions imposed in the former lease are also contained in the one authorized, namely, that either party can terminate the lease by giving the other party sixty (60) days' notice of its intention to so terminate it, and that the lessor is to pay the tax upon the land only, and not upon the improvement existing upon the land which belongs to the City of New York.

I therefore respectfully recommend that the resolution above mentioned be amended by adding thereto a clause to the effect that either party can terminate the lease by giving sixty (60) days' notice of its intention to so terminate it, and that the lessor is to pay the taxes upon the land only, and the City to pay whatever taxes may be assessed against the improvement existing thereon and belonging to the City of New York.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution relative to a renewal of the lease to the City of premises 277 Avenue C, Borough of Manhattan, for use of the Department of Health as a dormitory for female employees of Willard Parker Hospital:

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, City of New York:

Gentlemen—Mr. Eugene W. Scheffer, Secretary of the Department of Health, under date of May 11, 1911, states that at a meeting of the Board of Health of the Department of Health, held May 9, 1911, the following resolution was adopted:

"Resolved, That the Honorable, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, be and they are hereby respectfully requested to authorize and direct the Comptroller to execute a renewal of the lease to the City from Weil & Mayer, of the premises situated at 277 Avenue C, Borough of Manhattan, for the use of the Department of Health, for a period of one year from October 2, 1911, with the privilege of renewal for an additional year upon the same terms and conditions, at an annual rental of two thousand dollars (\$2,000), payable quarterly, otherwise upon the same terms and conditions as contained in the existing lease; the Board of Health deeming the said rent fair and reasonable, and that it would be for the interests of the City that such lease be made."

The Comptroller, in a communication to your Board under date of September 26, 1910, recommended a renewal of this lease for a term of one year from October 2,

The lessor pays taxes only, and the City pays for heat, light, water and janitor service and makes such inside or outside repairs as it may deem necessary.

Deeming the rent reasonable and just, and it being the same as paid for the past nine years, I respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution authorizing a renewal of the lease of the five-story brick store and tenement building, 277 Avenue C, northwest corner of East 16th street, Borough of Manhattan, for the use of the Health Department as a dormitory for the female employees of the Willard Parker Hospital, for a period of one year from October 2, 1911, with the privilege of renewal for an additional year upon the same terms and conditions, at an annual rental of \$2,000, payable quarterly; the lessor to pay taxes, and the City to pay for heat, light, water and janitor service, and to make such inside or outside repairs as it may deem necessary; otherwise upon the same terms and conditions as contained in the existing lease. Lessor, Weil & Mayer, 5 Beekman street, Borough of Manhattan.

To the Honorable, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—Eugene W. Scheffer, Secretary of the Department of Health, in a communication to your honorable Board, under date of May 11, 1911, states that at a meeting of the Board of Health of the Department of Health, the following resolution was adopted:

"Resolved, That the honorable, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, be and they are hereby requested to authorize and direct the Comptroller to execute a renewal of the lease to the City from Mr. Bernard Frank, of 702 3d avenue, Borough of Manhattan, owner of the premises, 3731 3d avenue, in the Borough of The Bronx, for the use of the Department of Health for a period of one year from December 14, 1911, with the privilege of renewal for an additional period of one year, upon the same terms and conditions, at an annual rental of \$2,425, payable quarterly; otherwise upon the same terms and conditions as contained in the existing lease, the Board of Health deeming the said rent fair and reasonable, and that it will be for the interests of the City that such lease be made."

The premises mentioned consist of a two-story and cellar brick building, known as the Somers Building, located at the southwest corner of 3d avenue and St. Pauls place, Borough of The Bronx. The City has been a tenant for the past six years, at a rental of \$2,000, the first lease being for five years.

On November 14, 1910, the Board of Health requested a renewal of the lease for a period of two years from December 14, 1910, with the privilege of renewal for an additional period of three years at a rental of \$2,340 a year. At that time it was believed that the new County Court House in the Borough of The Bronx would be completed and occupied before the close of the present year, and that the old court house now in use at the southeast corner of Washington avenue and East 162d street, would then be vacant and would furnish desirable quarters for the Health Department, if the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund so decided.

The owner of the Somers Building was induced to renew the lease of that building for a period of one year from December 14, 1910, at a rental of \$2,000 a year, the same as previously paid, but he insisted that if there was to be any further renewal, the rent would be increased to \$2,425 a year, and a clause to that effect, granting the privilege of renewal for an additional four years at a rental of \$2,425 a year, is contained in the existing lease.

The new court house is not completed as yet, but President Miller of the Borough of The Bronx informed the Department of Health that he expected to have it ready for occupancy before the close of 1912. The owner of the Somers Building has refused to renew the lease for a period of only one year from December 14, 1911, as asked for by the Health Department, but has agreed, as shown by the letter herewith from said Department dated July 15, 1911, to give a renewal for a period from December 14, 1911, to April 30, 1913, at a rental of \$2,425 a year, payable quarterly, and the Department of Health asks that such a lease be made.

The renewal of this lease for one year from December 14, 1910, at an annual rental of \$2,000, was favorably reported on by the Comptroller in a communication to your Board, dated December 2, 1910, and said report was approved and renewal of lease authorized at the meeting of the Sinking Fund Commission held December 7, 1910.

The rent now asked is an increase of \$425 a year, but the Health Department, as stated in the report of last year, has found it impossible to find any other suitable building for its purpose in that Borough at a less rental. Even if such a building could be found, the cost of moving and fitting up the new quarters would amount to more than the increase of rent.

Deeming the rent reasonable and just, under the circumstances, and the renewal of the lease being for the best interests of the City, I respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution authorizing a renewal of the lease of the premises consisting of the two-story and cellar brick building about 22 by 130 feet, at 3731 3d avenue, southwest corner of 3d avenue and St. Pauls place, Borough of The Bronx, for use of the Department of Health, for a period from December 14, 1911, to April 30, 1913, at a rental of \$2,425 a year, payable quarterly; the lessor to pay taxes and water rates and make outside repairs, including repairs to the roof; the lessee to supply heat, light and janitor service, and to make such interior alterations and repairs as it may deem necessary. Lessor, Bernard Frank, 702 3d avenue, Borough of Manhattan.

Gentlemen—Mr. Eugene W. Scheffer, Secretary to the Department of Health, in a letter to your Honorable Board under date of May 11, 1911, states that at a meet-

ing of the Board of Health of the Department of Health held May 9, 1911, the following resolution was adopted:

"Resolved, That the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be and they are hereby respectfully requested to authorize and direct the Comptroller to execute a renewal of the lease to the City from Tompkins Lodge, No. 471, F. & A. M., of the premises consisting of the second floor of the Masonic Temple, located at the corner of Bay and Sands streets, Stapleton, Borough of Richmond, for the use of the Department of Health, for a period of two years beginning November 1, 1911, with the privilege of renewal for an additional two years upon the same terms and conditions, at an annual rental of fifteen hundred dollars (\$1,500), payable quarterly; otherwise upon the same terms and conditions as contained in the existing lease; the Board of Health deeming the said rent fair and reasonable and that it would be for the interests of the City that such lease be made."

The premises in question consist of the entire second floor, 3,500 square feet, in the three-story and basement, brick and stone, Masonic Temple Building, 50x100 feet, on the plot of the same size, at the northwest corner of Bay and Sands streets, Stapleton, Borough of Richmond.

These premises have been occupied by the Department of Health for the past two years at a rental of \$1,500 a year, the same as now asked for this renewal; the lease including heat, light, water and janitor service.

The rooms have good light and ventilation, having windows on all sides, and the lessors allow the Health Department such storage space in the basement rent free as is needed for the storing of chemicals, disinfectants, etc.

For comparison, the Post Office pays a rental of \$1,800 a year for a part of the first floor, about 2,500 square feet, without any janitor service, and some living rooms in the rear of the Post Office are rented for dwelling purposes at \$276 a year without either light or janitor service, while the City's lease on the second floor covers steam heat, electric light, water and janitor service.

There is no other similar premises in the neighborhood with which comparison may properly be made, but it may be stated that the Health Department formerly occupied a store floor of 2,400 square feet at 54-56 Water street, Stapleton, at a rental of \$1,500 a year, the same as paid for the much superior quarters now occupied.

Deeming the rent reasonable and just, I respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution authorizing a renewal of the lease of the second floor in the Masonic Temple Building, a total area of 3,500 square feet, located at the northwest corner of Bay and Sands streets, Stapleton, Borough of Richmond, for the use of the Department of Health, for a period of two years beginning November 1, 1911, with the privilege of renewal for an additional two years upon the same terms and conditions, at an annual rental of \$1,500, payable quarterly; the lessor to pay taxes and water rates, make outside repairs and supply heat, light and janitor service, the lessee to make any inside alterations or repairs it may deem necessary, and otherwise upon the same terms and conditions as contained in the existing lease. Lessor, Tompkins Lodge, No. 471, F. & A. M. Trustees, William Seguire, Allen M. Beebe and William L. Hawkins. William Seguire is Secretary and Treasurer of the Board of Trustees, and his post office address is Box 45, Rosebank, Borough of Richmond.

Gentlemen—On January 25, 1911, the Armory Board adopted a resolution as follows:

Resolved, That the Armory Board does hereby appropriate the sum of \$19,000 for furnishing and installing a gymnasium, reconstructing stable and sewer connections (including Architects' fees), at the Armory of Squadron C, Bedford avenue, President and Union streets, in the Borough of Brooklyn, in accordance with the plans and specifications of Pilcher & Tachau; that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be requested to concur and to authorize the Comptroller to issue corporate stock to provide funds therefor.

The plans and specifications were, at that time, returned to the Armory Board and attention was called to several defects which required correction.

On June 1, 1911, the plans and specifications were resubmitted and are now satisfactorily corrected in accordance with the recommendations made.

The first item of the proposed work is as follows:

- (1) Erection of an extension to the building to be used for a gymnasium; estimated cost \$8,000 00

At the present time there is no gymnasium in connection with this Armory. The plans and specifications submitted provide for the erection of a one-story wing 72 feet by 61 feet, and the installation of the electric lighting of same; the gymnasium equipment to be provided for later. This work may properly be charged against the proceeds of corporate stock.

Item 2 consists of the following:

- (2) Reconstructing stables; estimated cost..... \$13,000 00

The proposed work involves the removal of the present concrete floor, gutters and drains and the replacement of same with a new concrete floor and new stall drains. The present stall partitions have been worn away by the horses and they are to be replaced with new partitions, with steel kicking plates and guards. A new wainscoting of wood is to be set on the brick walls of the stalls.

This work in the stable is necessary to remedy the present unsanitary and worn out condition; but in my opinion it is in the nature of replacement and repairs and as such should be paid for by funds other than the proceeds of corporate stock.

I, therefore, recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund concur in a resolution of the Armory Board, quoted above, to the extent of appropriating funds to the amount of \$8,000 for the purpose of erecting an extension to the Armory of Squadron C, to be used for a gymnasium, and that a copy of this report be transmitted to the Armory Board.

In order to carry out the above recommendations I herewith submit resolution for adoption. Respectfully,

Gentlemen—At a meeting of the Armory Board, held on January 25, 1911, the following resolution was adopted:

"Resolved, That the sum of \$17,500 be and is hereby appropriated for the purpose of furnishing partition work, steam heating work, furniture, etc., necessary to complete the Armory of the 69th Regiment, Borough of Manhattan; that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be requested to concur and to authorize the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock to the amount of \$17,500 to provide funds therefor."

6. Twelve new air-tight gun racks to be fitted with locks that will prevent opening without use of a key, each rack to hold 85 rifles, \$775.

The proposed lockers are to replace the present lockers, and are not properly chargeable against corporate stock.

7. A thorough overhauling of the hot water system, \$500.

Alterations and repairs; not properly chargeable against corporate stock.

8. Weather strips to be placed on windows throughout the building, \$100.

New additional work; properly payable from the proceeds of corporate stock.

9. A complete overhauling of hardware and locks throughout the building, \$50.

Repairs; not chargeable against corporate stock.

10. Construction of large storerooms for property of medical department, \$90.

Additional work; chargeable against corporate stock.

11. Erection of shelving and partitions in basement storeroom for City supplies, \$100.

Additional work; chargeable against corporate stock.

12. Storerooms for Company Commanders for storing property for which the Commanders are responsible, fourth floor, \$480.

Additional work; chargeable against corporate stock.

13. Wire partitions, with doors, in Quartermaster's Room No. 1, for the purpose of dividing room, \$50.

New equipment; chargeable against corporate stock.

14. Shelving in Quartermaster's room, \$100.

New equipment; chargeable against corporate stock.

15. Windlass in ambulance room to facilitate the manner of taking out and bringing back ambulance, \$150.

New equipment; chargeable against corporate stock.

16. Twelve lockers and furniture for the non-commissioned staff room, \$340.

New equipment; chargeable against corporate stock.

17. Twelve lockers and furniture for the staff room, with rug 30 by 15 feet, \$845.

Gentlemen—On the 26th day of November, 1907, the Board of Trustees of the College of The City of New York adopted the following preamble and resolution:

Whereas, The College of The City of New York now owns and possesses the old site of the college on Lexington avenue at 22d and 23d streets; and

Whereas, For the present, and perhaps for a short period of years to come, the 22d street portion of such premises is not required for the purposes of the college, such portion being described as follows:

Beginning at a point on the northerly line of E. 22d street distant one hundred (100) feet easterly from the point formed by the intersection of the northerly line of E. 22d street with the easterly line of Lexington avenue, and running thence northerly and parallel with Lexington avenue seventy-five (75) feet, thence easterly and parallel with E. 22d street one hundred (100) feet, thence southerly and again parallel with Lexington avenue seventy-five (75) feet to the northerly line of E. 22d street, thence westerly along the northerly line of E. 22d street one hundred (100) feet to the point or place of beginning.

Whereas, The Board of Trustees of the Normal College of The City of New York desires to use such 22d street portion of said building during the period during which the College of The City of New York shall not need to use the same; it is therefore

Resolved, That the College of The City of New York does hereby turn over to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund the said strip of land hereinbefore described with the buildings thereon for such use as the said Commissioners may deem advisable.

Thereafter and on the 4th day of December, 1907, your honorable Board adopted a preamble and resolution assigning to the Board of Trustees of the Normal College, for its use, the premises above described, said assignment to continue during the pleasure of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund. Thereafter the Normal College went into possession of and used the said premises until the 30th day of June, 1911. By resolution of the Board of Trustees of the Normal College, adopted May 24, 1911, your honorable Board and the Trustees of the College of The City of New York were notified that the above described premises would not be required by the Board of Trustees of the Normal College after June 30, 1911.

It has become necessary for the Board of Trustees of the College of The City of New York to use the above described premises and it is therefore respectfully requested that your honorable Board turn over to the Board of Trustees of the College of The City of New York the strip of land hereinbefore described, with the buildings thereon for the use of said Board. September 16, 1911.

To the Honorable, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—On November 26, 1907, the Board of Trustees of the College of The City of New York adopted a resolution requesting the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to turn over to the Normal College the 22d street annex of the old college building. In their resolution they recite that the premises will not be required for the purposes of the college for some years, and that the Board of Trustees of the Normal College of The City of New York desire to use the same during the period which the College of The City of New York shall not need the premises.

In accordance therewith, and on December 4, 1907, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund assigned the property to the Trustees of the Normal College, said assignment to continue during the pleasure of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

On May 24, 1911, the Board of Trustees of the Normal College of The City of New York adopted a resolution notifying the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund that the 22d street portion of the building of the College of The City of New York on Lexington avenue, 22d and 23d streets, Borough of Manhattan, which was assigned to them by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on December 4, 1907, will not be required by them after June 30, 1911.

In a communication dated July 20, 1911, James W. Hyde, Secretary, Board of Trustees of the College of The City of New York, states that it has become necessary for the Board of Trustees of the College of The City of New York to use these premises, and he respectfully requests that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund assign them to the Trustees of the College of The City of New York.

I therefore respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund assign to the Board of Trustees of the College of The City of New York the following described property:

Beginning at a point on the northerly line of E. 22d street distant one hundred (100) feet easterly from the point formed by the intersection of the northerly line of E. 22d street with the easterly line of Lexington avenue, and running thence northerly and parallel with Lexington avenue seventy-five (75) feet, thence easterly and parallel with E. 22d street one hundred (100) feet, thence southerly and again parallel with Lexington avenue seventy-five (75) feet to the northerly line of E. 22d street, thence westerly along the northerly line of E. 22d street one hundred (100) feet to the point or place of beginning.

—being the same premises which were turned over to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund by the Board of Trustees of the College of The City of New York by resolution dated November 26, 1907, and assigned to the Board of Trustees of the Normal College of The City of New York by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund by resolution dated December 4, 1907.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution, relative to lease of premises at Nos. 236 Duffield street and 503 Fulton street, Borough of Brooklyn, for use of the Stenographers of the Supreme Court.

September 16, 1910.

To the Honorable, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—On June 28, 1911, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopted a resolution authorizing a lease of premises at 236 Duffield street and 503 Fulton street, Borough of Brooklyn, consisting of 2,196 square feet on the fifth floor of the Offerman Building, for the use of the Stenographers of the Supreme Court of the State of New York, Second Department, for a period of five years from July 15, 1911, with the privilege of renewal for an additional term of five years, at an annual rental of \$1,425, payable quarterly.

On July 12, 1911, this resolution was amended by striking out the words "fifth floor" and substituting in place thereof the words "seventh floor." In accordance with the amended resolution, the lease was executed on August 1, 1911. The seventh floor, however, has not been available and will not be available for some time. The owners are therefore willing to cancel the lease and give possession of the fifth floor by October 1.

I therefore respectfully recommend, the rent being reasonable and just, that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution authorizing a lease from C. Henry Offerman, Lena Maria Rasche, Anna C. Schmidt, John Offerman and Theodore Offerman, of the premises at 236 Duffield street and 503 Fulton street, Borough of Brooklyn, consisting of 2,196 square feet on the fifth floor of the Offerman Building, for use of the Stenographers of the Supreme Court of the State of New York, Second Department, for a period of five years from October 1, 1911, with the privilege of renewal for an additional term of five years upon the same terms and conditions, at an annual rental of \$1,425, payable quarterly, the lessor to pay taxes and water rates, make inside and outside repairs, to furnish steam heat, light and

janitor service as well as elevator service at all hours of the day and night; also to erect partitions where required, install additional electric fixtures, redecorate the premises leased, all of which work is to be done to the satisfaction and under the supervision of the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices, provided the Bureau of Buildings shall certify that the premises are proper for the purposes for which they are required, that is, public offices. The lease to contain a clause, cancelling the lease executed for the seventh floor of the same building, in accordance with a resolution of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of June 28, 1911, as amended by resolution of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of July 12, 1911, and to relieve the City from any payment of rent under said lease.

Schmidt, John Offerman and Theodore Offerman, of the premises at 236 Duffield street and 503 Fulton street, Borough of Brooklyn, consisting of 2,196 square feet on the fifth floor of the Offerman Building, for use of the Stenographers of the Supreme Court of the State of New York, Second Department, for a period of five years from October 1, 1911, with the privilege of renewal for an additional term of five years upon the same terms and conditions, at an annual rental of one thousand, four hundred and twenty-five dollars (\$1,425), payable quarterly, the lessor to pay taxes and water rates, making inside and outside repairs, furnish steam heat, light and janitor service as well as elevator service at all hours of the day and night; also to erect partitions where required, install additional electric fixtures, redecorate the premises leased, all of which work is to be done to the satisfaction and under the supervision of the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices, provided the Bureau of Buildings shall certify that the premises are proper for the purposes for which they are required, that is, public offices. The lease to contain a clause, cancelling the lease executed for the seventh floor of the same building, in accordance with a resolution of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of June 28, 1911, as amended by resolution adopted July 12, 1911, and to relieve the City from any payment of rent under said lease; and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the said rent fair and reasonable and that it would be for the interests of the City that such lease be made the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized and directed to execute the same when prepared and approved by the Corporation Counsel, as provided by sections 149 and 217 of the Greater New York Charter.

The report was accepted, and the resolution adopted, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

The Select Committee to which was referred the matter of the application of the Brooklyn Academy of Music of the City of New York, for the exemption of its real property from taxation during the year 1911, presented the following report and offered the following resolution:

September 20, 1911.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—Your Select Committee to which, at the meeting of your Commission held on June 14, 1911, there was referred the matter of the application of the Brooklyn Academy of Music in the City of New York for the exemption of its real property from taxation during the year 1911, respectfully reports as follows:

Your committee has carefully considered the report of the Comptroller upon such matter under date of June 5, 1911, printed in full in the minutes of the meeting of your Commission held on June 14, 1911, and the law and facts in such report set forth. The law under which the exemption is asked through the action of your Commission (chapter 478, Laws of 1907; re-enacted as Subdivision 20, section 4, of the Tax Law), provides that the Sinking Fund or other chief financial board of any city of the first class may, in its discretion, by resolution, exempt from taxation for local purposes the real and personal property, or any part of it, of a corporation or association organized to maintain an academy of music, if, in the opinion of such board, the interests of the city require the maintenance of such academy of music, and it property which it is asked should be exempted "represents or was purchased with the proceeds of popular or general subscription for the erection of such academy music."

Your Select Committee believes that there is room for doubt as to whether the property which it is asked should be exempted "represents or was purchased with the proceeds of popular or general subscription for the erection of such academy of music."

It appears that the applicant is a stock corporation organized under the laws of the State of New York, and that its stock was sold by popular or general subscription, and furthermore, that such stock has a marketable value, although far beneath par, a sale of certain shares thereof having been held within the past year which realized twenty-six dollars (\$26) a share, the par value being one hundred dollars (\$100).

There was undoubtedly a general and public request for subscriptions to the stock, as there is in many cases of business corporations. In case of an authoritative judicial construction of the statute, it is quite possible that such a popular or general subscription for the stock, which has a value, and which indeed has inherent possibilities of profit, might not be held to constitute a popular or general subscription for the erection of the building.

In view of the doubt existing upon this point, your Committee prefers not to base its recommendation thereon, but on broader grounds, assuming the applicability of the statute to the property in question.

While it appears conclusively that the institution in question is conducted by public spirited citizens and is an enterprise beneficial to the city and its people, the same might be said of numerous other enterprises carried on upon property which is charged with its share of the annual taxes. In fact, it is a matter of common knowledge that other similar enterprises are carried on with a resultant deficit in each year far greater than in the case of the applicant.

Your Committee has been furnished with a statement of the receipts and disbursements of the Brooklyn Academy of Music for the year ending June 30, 1911, which is as follows:

It will be seen that that particular year produced a deficit of but \$8,077.35. It would further appear that in the preceding year there was a larger deficit, in the sum of \$8,691.32. It will be noted that among the items of disbursements is that for taxes in the sum of \$11,063.44. Had these taxes been remitted as requested in 1910, and as again prayed for, the deficit of \$8,077.35 would have been turned into a profit of \$2,986.09, either to be held as a surplus or distributable as dividends to the stockholders.

In the opinion of your Select Committee, the application should not be granted upon the particular circumstances involved in this application, and upon the further ground that the granting thereof would be a bad precedent, possibly, if not probably, leading to like applications and demands by other corporations similarly situated, and your Select Committee accordingly recommends the denial of the application.

MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

Minutes of meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of New York, held on Wednesday, June 21, 1911, at 10 a. m.

Present—President James Creelman and Commissioners Alexander Keogh and Richard Welling. The President, Mr. James Creelman, presided.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the classification by including in the Exempt Class, under the heading "Board of Water Supply of The City of New York," the title "Superintendent, Board of Water Supply Police." Hon. Charles Strauss, President of the Board of Water Supply, appeared in behalf of the proposed amendment. Mr. Elliot H. Goodwin, Secretary of the Civil Service Reform Association, also appeared.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the classification by striking from the Exempt Class, under the heading "Office of the Commissioners of Accounts," the title "Chief Clerk" and substituting therefor the title "Expert Accountant." Mr. Harry M. Rice, Chief Accountant in the Office of the Commissioners of Accounts, appeared in behalf of the proposed amendment. There was no opposition and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the classification by striking from the Exempt Class, under the heading "Department of Docks and Ferries," the title "Deputy Commissioner," and substituting therefor "2 Deputy Commissioners" (chapter 301 of the Laws of 1911). Mr. Francis J. Ryan, Assistant Secretary of the Department of Docks and Ferries, appeared in behalf of the proposed amendment. There was no opposition and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

After the Commission had gone into regular session the minutes of the meetings held June 14 and 20 were approved.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the Classification be and the same hereby is amended by including in the Exempt Class, under the heading "Board of Water Supply of The City of New York," the following title: "Superintendent, Board of Water Supply Police."

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the Classification be and the same hereby is amended by striking from the Exempt Class, under the heading "Office of the Commissioners of Accounts," the title, "Chief Clerk," and substituting therefor the following: "Expert Accountant."

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the Classification be and the same hereby is amended by striking from the Exempt Class, under the heading "Department of Docks and Ferries," the line, "Deputy Commissioner," and substituting therefor the following: "2 Deputy Commissioners."

The Secretary was directed to re-submit to the State Civil Service Commission the proposed amendments of Rule XIV. (subdivisions 2 and 3) and Rule XV. (subdivision 8) and to advertise a public hearing on the proposed amendment of Rule XI, subdivision 4, paragraph 4, to read as follows:

"An eligible who has declined appointment by reason of the insufficiency of the compensation offered shall not be again certified for a position at the same or any less compensation unless by order of the Commission, and when such declaration results in the appointment of an eligible not originally entitled to certification, the compensation of such appointee shall not be increased within one year thereafter beyond the amount offered to any person so declining unless the appointee, if not appointed, would have appeared at the time of the proposed increase as one of the first three upon the eligible list for the higher salary."

—also to confer with the departments affected, and with the Civil Service Reform Association, regarding the proposed amendments to the Non-Competitive Class.

Stephen D. Skidmore, of 590 E. 3d street, Brooklyn, appeared before the Commission, as directed, to show cause why his name should not be removed from the eligible list of Patrolmen under the provisions of paragraph 14 of Rule VII, it appearing from a report of Dr. James P. Warbasse, Chief of the Bureau of Physical Examinations, that after a re-examination of the candidate he was of the opinion that he should be rejected for light weight and round shoulders. After careful consideration, the matter was laid over for one week to admit of a conference with the Examiner.

The Secretary stated that Harry Rosenberg, of 1223 41st street, Brooklyn, who had been summoned to appear and show cause why his name should not be withheld from the eligible list of Process Server under the provisions of paragraph 14 of Rule VII, for unsatisfactory character, had failed to appear. The hearing was postponed for one week.

Edward G. Sexton, of 1316 Findlay avenue, Borough of The Bronx, appeared before the Commission, as directed, relative to his request that his name be removed from the blacklist. The request was granted.

Charles J. Dunne, of 337 West 18th street, appeared before the Commission, as directed, relative to his request that his name be removed from the blacklist. The request was granted.

D. J. McEvoy, of 298 East 140th street, appeared before the Commission, as directed, to explain why he had failed to state in his application for Inspector of Meters and Water Consumption that he had been dismissed from the position of Patrolman in the Police Department on May 29, 1901. After hearing the explanation of the candidate he was authorized to amend his application.

On the recommendation of the Committee on Transfers, the following transfers were approved:

James Dunn, from the position of Clerk, at \$1,800 per annum, in the Bureau of Buildings, Manhattan, to a similar position in the Bureau of Buildings, Borough of The Bronx.

Jane Ruoff, from the position of Stenographer and Typewriter, Third Grade, to that of Clerk, Third Grade, at a salary of \$1,200 per annum in the Board of Water Supply.

John F. Loughran, from the position of Clerk, at a salary of \$600 per annum in the Law Department, to a similar position in the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

Abraham Grallo, from the position of Clerk, at a salary of \$600 per annum, in the Tenement House Department, to a similar position, at \$900 per annum in the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

Robert E. Barrett, from the position of Assistant Engineer-Designer to that of Assistant Engineer in the Board of Water Supply, the persons on the preferred list for the latter position having waived their rights in the matter.

Harry V. Russell, from the position of Stenographer and Typewriter, at a salary of \$1,190 per annum, in the Board of Water Supply, to that of Stenographer to the First Deputy Commissioner (exempt), at a salary of \$1,500 per annum, in the Police Department.

James M. Mullen, from the position of Watchman, at a salary of \$2 per day, in the Department of Docks and Ferries, to a similar position, at \$900 per annum, in the College of the City of New York.

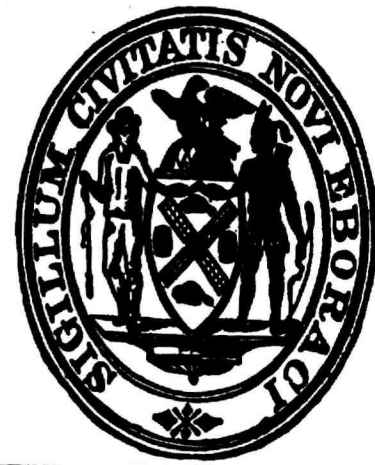

Franchise Matters.

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT at the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held this day, the following resolutions were adopted:

Whereas, The Union Railway Company of New York City, has under date of October 27, 1910, made application to this Board for the grant of the right, privilege and franchise to construct, maintain and operate a double track street surface railway as an extension to its existing tracks at the intersection of Aqueeduct and Boscebel avenues in the Borough of The Bronx, and thence upon and over the Washington Bridge and its approaches, and upon and along 181st street to Broadway, Borough of Manhattan; and

Whereas, Section 172 of the Railroad Law and Sections 72, 73 and 74 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapters 629 and 630 of the Laws of 1905, provide for the manner and procedure of making such grants; and Whereas, In further pursuance of such laws, this Board adopted a resolution on November 11, 1910, fixing the date for public hearing thereon as December 9, 1910, at which citizens were entitled to appear and be heard, and publication was had for at least fourteen (14) days in the "World" and "The New York Times," newspapers designated by the Mayor, and in the City Record for ten (10) days immediately prior to the date of hearing, and the public hearing was duly held on such day; and

Whereas, In further pursuance of such laws this Board adopted a resolution on March 2, 1911, entering on the minutes of the Board the proposed form of contract for the grant of the franchise or right applied for, ordering said contract advertised and fixing April 13, 1911, as the date for the final public hearing thereon; and

Whereas, This Board on April 13, 1911, at the request of the Company, adopted a resolution rescinding the resolutions adopted March 2, 1911, and

Whereas, The counsel for the Company has in a communication dated September 11, 1911, stated the terms and conditions on which the Company will accept the grant; and

Whereas, This Board has made inquiry as to the money value of the franchise or right applied for, and proposed to be granted to the Union Railway Company of New York City, and the adequacy of the compensation to be paid therefor; now, therefore, it is

Resolved, That the following form of the resolution for the grant of the franchise or right applied for by the Union Railway Company of New York City, containing the form of proposed contract for the grant of such franchise or right, be hereby introduced and entered in the minutes of this Board, as follows, to wit:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby grants to the Union Railway Company of New York City the franchise or right fully set out and described in the following form of proposed contract for the grant thereof, embodying all the terms and conditions, including the provisions as to rates, fares and charges, upon and subject to the terms and conditions in said proposed form of contract contained, and that the Mayor of The City of New York be and he hereby is authorized to execute and deliver such contract in the name and on behalf of The City of New York, as follows, to wit:

Proposed Form of Contract.

This contract, made this day of 1911., by and between The City of New York (hereinafter called the City), party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter called the Board), and the Union Railway Company of New York City (hereinafter called the Company), party of the second part, witnesseth:

In consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained, the parties hereto do hereby covenant and agree as follows:

Section 1. The City hereby grants to the Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the right and privilege to construct, maintain and operate a double track extension to its present street surface railway with the necessary wires and equipment, for the purpose of conveying passengers only in the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, in The City of New York, upon the following route, to wit:

Beginning at and connecting with the existing tracks of the Company in Boscebel avenue, at or near its intersection with Aqueeduct avenue, in the Borough of The Bronx; thence upon and along Boscebel avenue to Aqueeduct avenue; thence westerly upon and over the easterly approach to the Washington Bridge and upon and over the said bridge and its westerly approach to the intersection thereof with 181st street, Borough of Manhattan, and thence upon and along 181st street to the easterly side of Broadway, and to cross such other streets and avenues, named and unnamed, as may be encountered in said route.

The said route, with turnouts, switches and crossovers, hereby authorized is shown upon a map entitled:

"Map showing proposed extension of the Union Railway Co. of New York City, in the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, City of New York, to accompany petition dated October 27, 1910, to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment."

and signed by F. W. Whitridge, Receiver; Edward A. Maher, General Manager, and T. F. Mullaney, Chief Engineer, a copy of which is attached hereto, is to be deemed a part of this contract, is to be construed with the text thereof and is to be substantially followed, provided that deviations therefrom and additional turnouts, switches and crossovers which are consistent with the foregoing description and the other provisions of this contract may be permitted by resolution of the Board.

Nothing in this contract shall be construed as permitting the construction of more than one double-track street surface railway upon the route hereinabove described.

Section 2. The grant of this privilege is subject to the following conditions, which shall be complied with by the Company:
First—The consent in writing of the owners of half in value of the property bounded on said streets and avenues to the construction and operation of said railway shall be obtained by the Company within three (3) months from the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and a copy of such consents shall be filed with the Board within such time, or in the event that such consents cannot be obtained within such time, the Company shall within said three (3) months or within one (1) month thereafter, make application to the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court for the appointment of Commissioners in the manner provided by the Railroad Law, to determine if said railway ought to be constructed; otherwise this grant shall cease and determine.

Second—The said right to construct, maintain and operate said railway shall be held and enjoyed by the Company from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor until March 1, 1924, with the privilege of renewal of said contract for the further period of twenty-five (25) years, upon a fair revaluation of such right and privilege.

If the Company shall determine to exercise its privilege of renewal it shall make application to the Board, or any authority which shall be authorized by law to act for the City in place of the Board. Such application shall be made at any time not earlier than two (2) years and not later than one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract. The determination of the revaluation shall be sufficient if agreed to in writing by the Company and the Board, but in no case shall the annual rate of compensation to the City be fixed at a less amount than the sum required to be paid during the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract.

If the Company and the Board shall not reach such agreement on or before the day one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract, then the annual rate of compensation for such succeeding twenty-five (25) years shall be reasonable, and either the City (by the Board) or the Company shall be bound upon request of the other to enter into a written agreement with each other fixing the rate of such compensation at such amount as shall be reasonable, but in no case shall the annual rate so fixed be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, and if the parties shall not forthwith agree upon what is reasonable, then the parties shall enter into a written agreement fixing such annual rate and at such amount as shall be determined by three disinterested freeholders selected in the following manner:

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board; one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Company; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder, and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluation aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six (6) months prior to the expiration of this original contract, and their report shall be filed with the Board within three (3) months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may

base their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations, without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine any of the books of the Company and its officers under oath. The valuations so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties, but no annual sum shall, in any event, be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year of the original term of this contract. If in any case the annual rate shall not be fixed prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, then the Company shall pay the annual rate theretofore prevailing until the new rate shall be determined, and shall then make up to the City the amount of any excess of the annual rate then determined over the previous annual rate. The compensation and expenses of the said appraisers shall be borne jointly by the City and the Company each paying one-half thereof.

Third—The Company shall pay to the City for the privilege thereof the following sums of money:

(a) The sum of two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500) in cash on or before the date on which operation over any portion of the route hereby authorized is commenced.

(b) During the first term of five (5) years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than one thousand dollars (\$1,000), and which shall be equal to three (3) per cent. of its gross annual receipts if such percentage shall exceed the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000).

During the second term of five (5) years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than seventeen hundred dollars (\$1,700) and which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of seventeen hundred dollars (\$1,700).

During the remaining term expiring March 1, 1924, an annual sum which shall in no case be less than nineteen hundred dollars (\$1,900), and which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross annual receipts if such percentage shall exceed the sum of nineteen hundred dollars (\$1,900).

The gross annual receipts mentioned above shall be that portion of the gross receipts of the Company from all sources within the limits of the City as shall bear the same proportion to the whole gross receipts as the length of the extension hereby authorized shall bear to the entire length of the railway of the Company in operation within the limits of the City.

The annual charges shall commence from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

(c) For the use of the Washington Bridge and its approaches during the term expiring March 1, 1914, an annual sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000); during the succeeding term of five (5) years expiring March 1, 1919, an annual sum of one thousand two hundred and fifty dollars (\$1,250); and during the remaining term of five (5) years expiring March 1, 1924, an annual sum of one thousand five hundred dollars (\$1,500). The compensation herein reserved shall commence from the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

All annual charges as above shall be paid into the treasury of the City on November 1 of each year and shall be for the amount due to September 30 next preceding. Provided that the first annual payment shall be only for that proportion of the first annual charge as the time between the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor and September 30 following shall bear to the whole of one year.

Whenever the percentage required to be paid shall exceed the minimum amount as above, then such sum over and above such minimum shall be paid on or before November 1 in each year for the year ending September 30 next preceding.

The annual charges herein provided are intended to include the percentages of gross receipts now required to be paid by railway companies to the City pursuant to the Railroad Law as amended, and such charges as are required under chapter 340 of the Laws of 1892 to be paid by the Company for this extension if said act applies to or controls the Company in relation to the right and privilege hereby granted.

The City does not and shall not demand or require the payment by the Company of a percentage of gross receipts under the provisions of chapter 340 of the Laws of 1892 on the gross receipts earned on the extension constructed pursuant to this contract.

Any and all payments to be made by the terms of this contract to the City by the Company shall not be considered in any manner in the nature of a tax, but such payments shall be made in addition to any and all taxes of whatsoever kind or description, now or hereafter required to be paid by any ordinance of the City, or resolution of the Board, or any law of the State of New York.

Fourth—The annual charges or payments shall continue throughout the whole term of this contract (whether original or renewal), notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other railway or railroad company providing for payment for railway or railroad rights or franchises at a different rate, or no assignment, lease or sublease of the rights or privileges granted (whether original or renewal), or of any part thereof, or of any of the routes mentioned herein, or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this contract; and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said conditions as to payments, anything in any statute or in the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof or otherwise exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this contract.

Fifth—Nothing in any way this contract shall be deemed to affect in any way the right of the City to grant to any individual or other corporation a similar right or privilege, upon the same or other terms and conditions, over the route hereinafter described.

The use of the railway constructed by the Company under this contract, including the tracks, wires and other equipment, or any structures used in connection therewith, in streets and avenues, hereinafter described, shall be permitted by the Company to any individual or corporation to which the City may have granted, or may hereafter grant, the right or privilege to use such streets and avenues for street railway purposes, upon payment of an annual sum by such individual or corporation to the Company which shall equal the legal interest on such proportion of the actual cost of the construction of such railway and structures, and additions and betterments thereto, as the number of cars operated by such individual or corporation shall bear to the number of cars operated by the companies then using the same; and also such proportion of the cost of keeping the tracks and electrical equipment in repair, and the cost of additional laying and repairing of pavement and removal of snow and ice, and all other duties imposed upon the Company by the terms of this contract in connection with the maintenance or the operation of said railway so used, as the number of cars operated by such individual or corporation shall bear to the number of cars operated by the companies then using the same, together with the actual cost of the power necessary for the

operation of the cars thereon of such individual or corporation. Provided, however, that if, in the opinion of the Company, the legal rate of interest upon the cost of such railway shall be an insufficient sum to be paid for the use of such tracks, it may appeal to the Board and the Board may fix a percentage upon the cost to be paid to the Company, at a sum in excess of the legal rate of interest, if, in its opinion, such action is justified.

The Company shall not at any time oppose but shall upon the request of the Board, consent to the construction or operation of any street surface railway which may necessitate the use of any portion of the railway which shall be constructed by the Company, pursuant to this contract.

Sixth—The rights and privileges hereby granted shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall the title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Company, or by operation of law, relating under the provisions of the statutes of this city, without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in any way notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Seventh—Upon the termination of this original contract, or if the same be renewed, then at the termination of the said renewal term, or upon the termination of the rights hereby granted for any cause, or upon the dissolution of the Company before such termination, the tracks and equipments of the Company constructed, pursuant to this contract within the streets and avenues and upon the bridge shall become the property of the City without cost, and the same may be used or disposed of by the City for any purpose whatsoever, or the same may be leased to any company or individual.

If, however, at the termination of this contract as above, the Board shall so order by resolution, the Company shall, upon thirty (30) days' notice from the Board, remove any and all of its tracks and other equipment constructed pursuant to this contract and the said streets and avenues and the bridge shall be restored to their original condition at the sole cost and expense of the Company.

Eighth—The Company shall commence construction of the railway herein authorized within three (3) months from the date upon which the consents of the property owners are filed with the Board or from the date of the order of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court, made pursuant to section 174 of the Railroad Law, confirming the determination of the Commissioners appointed thereunder that such railway ought to be constructed, and shall complete the construction and place the same in full operation within six (6) months from the date of filing such consents or the date of such order, otherwise this right shall cease and determine, and all sums paid, and the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,000) deposited with the Comptroller of the City, as hereinafter provided, shall thereupon be forfeited to the City, to be expended for the period for commencement and the period for completion and placing the railway in full operation may be extended by the Board, but the total extension of time for either of such periods shall not exceed in the aggregate six (6) months; and provided further that when the commencement or completion of said construction shall be prevented by legal proceedings in any Court, or by works of public improvement, or from other causes within the control of the Company, the time for the commencement or completion of such construction may be extended for the period of such prevention, but no delay shall be allowed for unless the Court proceedings shall be diligently prosecuted by the Company, and provided further, that in no case shall such delay be deemed to begin until the Company shall have given written notice to the Board of any such Court proceedings or other occasion of delay, and deliver to the Board copies of any injunction or other orders of the Court, upon which the same shall have been granted, and unless upon the request of the Board the Company shall, in writing, consent that the Board, either in its own name as a party or in the name of the City as a party, may intervene in any such proceedings.

Ninth—Said railway shall be constructed and operated in the latest approved manner of street railway construction and operation, and it is hereby agreed that the Board may require the Company to improve or add to the railway equipments, including rolling stock and railway appliances, from time to time, as such additions and improvements are necessary, in the opinion of the Board. Upon failure on the part of the Company to comply with the direction of the Board within a reasonable time, the rights hereby granted shall cease and determine.

Tenth—Said railway shall be constructed, maintained and operated subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of the City who have jurisdiction in such matters, as provided by the Charter of the City.

No construction upon said railway shall be commenced until written permits have been obtained from the proper City officials.

In any permits so issued such officials may also impose such conditions, as a condition of the granting of the same, as are necessary for the purpose of protecting any structures in the streets and avenues and upon the bridge over which such officials have jurisdiction and the Company shall comply with such conditions.

The electrical equipment to be installed by the Company for the operation of the railway within the limits of the City, whether the same be upon streets and avenues, or upon the bridge and its approaches, or upon private property, shall be constructed and maintained under the supervision and control of the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

Eleventh—Said railway may be operated by overhead electric power substantially similar to the overhead electric system now in use by street surface railways in the Borough of The Bronx, or by any other motive power, except locomotive steam power or horse power, which may be approved by the Board, and consented to by the abutting property owners, in accordance with the provisions of law, and by the Public Service Commission for the First District of the State of New York.

Provided, however, that the Board, upon giving to the Company one (1) year's notice, may require the Company to operate its railway upon the whole or upon any portion of the route herein authorized to be constructed, except upon the Washington Bridge structure, by underground electric power substantially similar to the system now in use on the street surface railways in the Borough of Manhattan, or upon the whole or any portion of said route by any other practical motive power then in use which does not require the use of poles and overhead wires in the streets and avenues and upon the bridge and its approaches, and thereupon to discontinue the use of the overhead trolley system, and to remove its poles, wires and other structures used by it for that purpose from the streets, avenues and bridge of the City upon said route.

Twelfth—Upon six (6) months' notice by the Board to the Company, all wires for the transmission of power, except trolley wires, for the operation of the railway, upon all or any portion of the route hereby authorized, shall be placed in conduits beneath or alongside of the way. The Company shall provide in such conduits two

(2) ducts not less than three (3) inches in diameter for the exclusive use of the City. Such ducts shall be used only by the Company for the operation of its railway and by the City, as above.

Thirteenth—The rate of fare for any passenger upon said railway shall not exceed five (5) cents and the Company shall not charge any passenger more than five (5) cents for one continuous ride, from any point on its road or on any road, line or branch operated by it or under its control to any other point thereof, or any connecting branch thereof within the limits of the City.

The Company shall carry free upon the railway hereby authorized during the term of this contract all members of the Police and Fire Departments of the City, when such employees are in full uniform.

Fourteenth—No cars shall be operated upon the railway hereby authorized, other than passenger cars and cars necessary for the repair or maintenance of the railway, and no freight cars shall be operated upon the tracks of said railway.

Fifteenth—The Company shall attach to each car run over the said railway proper fenders and wheel guards, in conformity with such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter, during the term of this contract, be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities, or as may be required by resolution of the Board.

Sixteenth—All cars which are operated on said railway shall be heated during the cold weather, in conformity with such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter, during the term of this contract, be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities, or as may be required by resolution of the Board.

Seventeenth—All cars operated on said railway shall be well lighted by electricity, or by some lighting system equally efficient, or as may be required by resolution of the Board.

Eighteenth—Cars on the said railway shall run at intervals of not more than thirty (30) minutes, both day and night, and as much oftener as reasonable convenience and the public may require, or as may be directed by the Board.

Nineteenth—The Company, so long as it shall continue to use any of the tracks upon the streets and avenues or bridge in or upon which said railway shall be constructed, shall cause to be watered at least three (3) times every twenty-four (24) hours when the temperature is above thirty-five (35) degrees Fahrenheit, the entire width of the streets, avenues and bridge, except when the width of such streets, avenues and bridge shall exceed sixty (60) feet between curb lines, in which case the Company shall cause to be watered only sixty (60) feet in width of such roadway, and the Company shall provide for such purpose at least one tank car, the capacity of which shall be sufficient to supply such streets, avenues and bridge in a satisfactory manner.

Twentieth—The Company shall at all times keep the streets, avenues and bridge, upon which the said railway is constructed, between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and for a distance of two (2) feet beyond the rails on either side thereof, free and clear from ice and snow provided, however, that the Company shall, at the option of the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, enter into an agreement for each winter season, or part thereof, to clear an equivalent amount of street surface from house line to house line.

And provided further, that the Company shall, at the option of the Commissioner of Bridges, enter into an agreement for each winter season, or part thereof, to clean an equivalent amount of roadway upon the bridge and its approaches.

Twenty-first—As long as said railway, or any portion thereof, remains in any street or avenue, or upon the bridge, the Company shall repair and keep in permanent repair that portion of the surface of the street, avenue or bridge in or upon which the said railway is constructed, between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and for a distance of two (2) feet beyond the rails on either side thereof, under the supervision of the local authorities, whenever they may be required to do so, and in such manner as they may prescribe.

In case of the neglect of the Company to pave or repair the pavement on the streets after the expiration of thirty (30) days' notice to do so from the President of the Borough having jurisdiction, or in case of the neglect of the Company to pave or repair the pavement on the bridge after the expiration of thirty (30) days' notice to do so from the Commissioner of Bridges, said President or said Commissioner, as the case may be, may pave or repair the same at the expense of the Company. And the City shall have the right to change the material or character of the pavement of the street, avenue or bridge, and in that event the Company shall be bound to replace such pavement in the manner directed by the proper City official, at its own expense, and the provisions as to repairs herein contained shall apply to such renewed or altered pavement.

Twenty-second—Any alteration to the sewerage or drainage systems, or to any other subsurface or to any surface structures in the streets, required on account of the construction or operation of the railway, shall be made at the sole cost of the Company, and in such manner as the proper City officials may prescribe.

Twenty-third—It is agreed that the right hereby granted to operate a street surface railway shall not be in preference or in hindrance to public work of the City, and should the said railway in any way interfere with the construction of public works in the streets and avenues, or upon the bridge, whether the same is done by the City directly or by a contractor for the City, the Company shall, at its own expense, protect or move the tracks and appurtenances in the manner directed by the City officials having jurisdiction over such public work.

Twenty-fourth—Should the grades or lines of the streets and avenues in which the railway is hereby authorized be changed at any time after the railway has been constructed and during the term of this contract, the Company shall, at its own expense, change its tracks and appurtenances on the new grades and lines, and during the construction of any public improvement upon said streets and avenues the Company shall take care of and protect the tracks and appurtenances at its own expense, all to be done subject to the direction of the City official having jurisdiction over the construction of such change.

Twenty-fifth—Upon one (1) year's notice from the Board the Company shall, if the Board shall so determine by resolution, cease the operation of the sub-terminal at East 181st street and Broadway, and shall within sixty (60) days from the date of such notice make application to the Board for the right to construct, maintain and operate a loop terminal upon streets to be designated by the Board and shall on or before the expiration of said one (1) year enter into a contract for such loop terminal hereby authorized.

Twenty-sixth—The Company shall keep and maintain the tracks and the electrical equipment upon the bridge and its approaches necessary for the operation of cars thereon in good order and repair and in such manner as shall be approved and directed by the Commissioner of Bridges, and shall furnish all motive power required by the Commissioner of Bridges for the operation of its cars. If deemed necessary by the Commissioner of Bridges, the Company shall install and operate a system of signals to insure the safe and efficient operation of cars, such system to be approved by the Commissioner of Bridges. In the event of any necessity for changing the layout of tracks, curves, switches, sidings or platforms on the bridge in order to facilitate operation of cars by the Company, said Company must do all the work and furnish all the labor and tools necessary for effecting such changes, which shall all be made

under the control and direction of the Commissioner of Bridges, and no such changes or construction connected therewith, or relating thereto, shall be made unless the plan or plans for the same have been first submitted to the Commissioner of Bridges and approved by him.

Twenty-seventh—Before beginning the operation of cars, the Company shall file with the Commissioner of Bridges a statement for his approval and assent as to the type of car which it proposes to operate and a sketch showing clearance dimensions, weight on axles and wheel spacing or such other information as may be required by said Commissioner. All cars operated over the bridge by the Company and all equipment and appliances relating to such operation shall be subject at all times to the inspection of the Commissioner of Bridges or his authorized representatives, who shall have power to forbid the entrance to the bridge of cars which may for any reason be unsatisfactory, and who shall have power to direct the removal of any old or inadequate appliances and the substitution thereof of appliances of approved character.

Said Commissioner may adopt rules and regulations in regard to the number of cars to be operated over the bridge, the rate of speed of said cars, the movement and headway thereof, the type and weight of cars to be used and the condition thereof, the switching of cars and the use of platforms and the control of the electrical current used by the Company, and the said Commissioner may alter and amend any such rules and regulations so as to secure the safety and comfort of persons using the bridge and preserve the purposes for which the bridge was constructed, and, upon serving notice upon the Company that such rules and regulations have been made, amended or altered, the Company shall comply with all the requirements thereof.

Twenty-eighth—Nothing in this contract shall be deemed to affect in any way the right of the Commissioner of Bridges to make alterations or changes in the construction, operation or management of the bridge or to affect in any way the control of such Commissioner over such bridge, as provided by the Charter of the City.

Twenty-ninth—The Company shall submit to the Board a report not later than November 1 of each year for the year ending September 30 next preceding, and at any other time, upon request of the Board, which shall state:

1. The amount of stock issued, for cash, for property.
2. The amount paid in as by last report.
3. The total amount of capital stock paid in.
4. The funded debt by last report.
5. The total amount of funded debt.
6. The floating debt as by last report.
7. The total amount of floating debt.
8. The total amount of funded and floating debt.
9. The average rate per annum of interest on funded debt.
10. Statement of dividends paid during the year.
11. The total amount expended for same.
12. The names of the directors elected at the last meeting of the corporation held for such purpose.
13. Location, value and amount paid for real estate owned by the Company as by last report.
14. Location, value and amount paid for real estate now owned by the Company.
15. Number of passengers carried during the year.
16. Total receipts of Company for each class of business.
17. Amounts paid by the Company for damage to persons or property on account of construction and operation.
18. Total expenses for operation, including salaries—and such other information in regard to the business of the Company as may be required by the Board.

Thirtieth—The Company shall at all times keep accurate books of account of the gross receipts from all sources within the limits of the City, and shall, on or before November 1 of each year, make a verified report to the Comptroller of the City of the business done by the Company, for the year ending September 30 next preceding, in such form as he may prescribe. Such report shall contain a statement of such gross receipts, the total miles in operation within the limits of the City and the miles of railway constructed and operated under this contract, and such other information as the Comptroller may require. The Comptroller shall have access to all books of the Company for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness of its report, and may examine its officers under oath.

Thirty-first—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained, or with any orders of the Board or of the Commissioner of Bridges acting under the powers herein reserved, the franchise or consent herein granted may be forfeited by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel, on notice of ten (10) days to the Company, or at the option of the Board by resolution of said Board, which said resolution may contain a provision to the effect that the railway constructed and in use by virtue of this contract shall thereupon become the property of the City without proceedings at law or in equity. Provided, however, that such action by the Board shall not be taken until the Board shall give notice to the Company to appear before it on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why such resolution declaring the contract forfeited should not be adopted. In case the Company fails to appear, action may be taken by the Board forthwith.

Thirty-second—If the Company shall fail to give efficient public service at the rates herein fixed, or fail to maintain its structures and equipment as herein provided in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, the Board may give notice to the Company specifying any default on the part of the Company, and requiring the Company to remedy the same within a reasonable time; and upon failure of the Company to remedy such default within a reasonable time, the Company shall, for each day thereafter during which the default or defect remains, pay to the City the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250), as fixed or liquidated damages, or the Board, in case such structures or equipment which may affect the surface of the streets or of the bridge shall not be put in good condition within a reasonable time after notice by the Board as aforesaid shall have the right to make all needed repairs at the expense of the Company, in which case the Company shall pay to the City the amount of the cost of such repairs, with legal interest thereon, all of which sums may be deducted from the fund hereinafter provided for.

Thirty-third—The Company shall assume all liability to persons or property by reason of the construction or operation of the railway authorized by this contract, and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property on account of the same, and the Company hereby agrees to repay to the City any damage which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or default of the Company.

Thirty-fourth—This grant is upon the express condition that the Company, within thirty (30) days after the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred hereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of the City the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,000), either in money or securities, to be approved by him, which sum together with any and all sums of money or any securities heretofore deposited with the Comptroller by the Company under and pursuant to franchises heretofore granted to it by the City for the faithful performance

ance by the Company of the several franchises so granted, shall form a fund for the performance by the Company of all of the terms and conditions of this contract and compliance with all orders of the Board or of the Commissioner of Bridges acting under the powers herein reserved, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charges for the privilege hereby granted, the rendering of efficient public service at the rates herein fixed, the repairs of the street and bridge pavement, the repair and maintenance of tracks and equipment upon the bridge and its approaches, and the removal of snow and ice and the quality of construction of the railway and the maintenance of the property in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, and in case of default in the performance by the Company of such terms and conditions or compliance with such orders, or either or any of them, the City shall have the right to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished for the performance thereof after due notice, and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from the said fund without legal proceedings; or after default in the payment of the annual charges, shall collect the same with interest, from the said fund after ten (10) days' notice to the Company; or in case of failure to observe the said terms and conditions of this contract and orders of the Board hereunder, relating to the headway, heating and lighting of cars, fenders, wheel guards and watering of street pavements, the Company shall pay a penalty of fifty dollars (\$50) per day for each day of violation, and the further sum of ten dollars (\$10) per day for each car that shall not be properly heated, lighted or supplied with fenders or wheel guards, in case of a violation of the provisions relating to those matters.

The procedure for the imposition and collection of the penalties in this contract shall be as follows:

The Board, on complaint made, shall give notice to the Company, directing its President, or other officer to appear before the Board on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why the Company should not be penalized in accordance with the foregoing provisions. If the Company fails to make an appearance, or, after a hearing appears in the judgment of the Board to be in fault, said Board shall forthwith impose the prescribed penalty, or where the amount of the penalty is not prescribed herein, such amount as appears to the Board to be just, and without legal procedure direct the Comptroller to withdraw the amount of such penalty from the security fund deposited with him. In case of any drafts made upon the security fund the Company shall, upon ten (10) days' notice in writing, pay to the City a sum sufficient to restore said security fund to the original amount, and in default thereof this contract shall be cancelled and annulled at the option of the Board, acting in behalf of the City. No action or proceeding or right under the provisions of this contract shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to the City.

Thirty-fifth—The words "notice" or "direction," wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean a written notice or direction. Every such notice or direction to be served upon the Company shall be delivered at such office in the City as shall have been designated by the Company, or if no such office shall have been designated, or if such designation shall have for any reason become inoperative, shall be mailed in the City, postage prepaid, addressed to the Company at the City. Delivery or mailing of such notice or direction as and when above provided shall be equivalent to direct personal notice or direction, and shall be deemed to have been given at the time of delivery or mailing.

Thirty-sixth—The words "streets or avenues," and "streets and avenues," wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean "streets, avenues, highways, parkways, driveways, concourses, boulevards, bridges, viaducts, tunnels, public places or any other property to which the City has title or over which the public has an easement," encountered in the route hereinabove described, and upon or in which authority is hereby given the Company to construct a railway.

Thirty-seventh—If at any time the powers of the Board or any other of the authorities herein mentioned or intended to be mentioned, shall be transferred by law to any other board, authority, officer or officers, then and in such case such other board, authority, officer or officers, shall have all the powers, rights and duties herein reserved to or prescribed for the Board or other authorities, officer or officers.

Sec. 3. Nothing in this contract shall be construed as in any way limiting the present or future jurisdiction of the Public Service Commission under the laws of the State of New York.

Sec. 4. This grant is also upon the further and express condition that the provisions of Article 5, and the other provisions of the Railroad Law pertinent hereto shall be strictly complied with by the Company.

Sec. 5. The Company promises, covenants and agrees on its part and behalf to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms and conditions and requirements in this contract fixed and contained.

In witness whereof, the party of the first part, by its Mayor, thereunto duly authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City, has caused the corporate name of said City to be hereunto signed and the corporate seal to be hereunto affixed; and the party of the second part, by its officers, thereunto duly authorized, has caused its corporate seal to be hereunto signed and its corporate seal to be hereunto affixed, the day and year first above written.

Whereas, This Board has made inquiry as to the proposed modifications and amendments of said contract of October 29, 1909; now, therefore, it is

Resolved, That the following form of the resolution for the consent or right applied for by The Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company, containing the form of proposed contract for the grant of such right, be hereby introduced, and entered in the minutes of this Board, as follows, to wit:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby consents to certain modifications in the terms and conditions of the said contract of October 29, 1909, such modified terms and conditions being fully set forth and described in the following form of proposed contract for the grant thereof, embodying such terms and conditions as modify or alter said contract of October 29, 1909, which said contract otherwise remains unchanged as to all the other terms and conditions expressed therein, and that the Mayor of The City of New York be and he hereby is authorized to execute and deliver such contract in the name and on behalf of The City of New York, as follows, to wit:

Proposed Form of Contract.

This contract, made this day of..... 1911, by and between The City of New York (hereinafter called the City), party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter called the Board), and The Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company (hereinafter called the Company), party of the second part, witnesseseth:

Whereas, The City did by contract dated October 29, 1909, grant to the Company the right to construct, maintain and operate railroad tracks upon, across and under certain streets and avenues in the Borough of Richmond; and

Whereas, The Company has by a petition verified June 13, 1911, applied to the Board for a modification of said contract by extending for three (3) years the time within which to commence and complete the construction of one of said tracks, namely, across and upon Richmond Terrace in the Third Ward of the Borough of Richmond, authorized by said contract of October 29, 1909; now, therefore,

In consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained, the parties hereto do hereby covenant and agree as follows:

Section 1. The City hereby consents to such modification or amendment in and to said contract subject to the following conditions:

First—All the terms and conditions contained in the said contract dated October 29, 1909, shall remain unchanged except as follows:

Section 1, paragraph Sixth, is hereby amended so as to read:

Sixth—"The Company shall commence the construction of the tracks herein authorized under South street, First Ward, within three (3) years, and complete the same within five (5) years from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor, and shall complete the construction of the track herein authorized across Richmond terrace within five (5) years from such date, and shall commence and complete the construction of the other tracks herein authorized within two (2) years from such date, otherwise the rights herein granted shall cease and determine as to such tracks not so constructed. In the event of the rights so ceasing, the Company shall not be required to make any further payments for the privilege of constructing and maintaining said tracks under this contract, but shall continue paying to the City the sum fixed by this contract for each crossing which it constructs within the time limit herein fixed."

Section 2. The Company promises, covenants and agrees on its part and behalf to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms and conditions and requirements in this contract fixed and contained.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either of any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances between the time of the sale thereof and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly vacated of all tenants. The sale and delivery to purchaser will be made as nearly together as the circumstances of vacating the structures of their tenants will permit.

All the material of the buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All walls, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the De-

partment of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street, and the opening of the main sewer in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances, or portion as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed, and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the day of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials of labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against same and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furrings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam ends, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the contractor.

The Comptroller of The City of New York reserves the right on the day of sale to withdraw from sale any of the buildings, parts of buildings and machinery included therein, or to reject any and all bids; and it is further

Resolved, That, while the said sale is held under the supervision of the Commissioner of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller is authorized to cause the sale to be advertised and to direct the sale thereof as financial officer of the City.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be enclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either enclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
