Minor repairs, open market orders and check orders that are treated in the regular routine, are noted in tabulated form at the conclusion of the report. The larger and more important work accomplished during the quarter ending Dec. 31, 1915, will be detailed by buildings, as follows:

Municipal Building-Painted Rooms 743, 1240, 1446, 1716, 1717, 2051 and the Coroner's Court and Jury Room. Stained and varnished thirty chairs, twenty benches and two tables in the Coroner's Court. Stained and varnished two storm partitions on the twenty-first floor. Made two signs and finished in mahogany a bulletin board and a ladder for the Payroll division. Refinished furniture in Room 2150, and in Reception Room of offices of the Borough President. Bronzed one hundred radiators in the north and south elevator halls. Scraped and painted with two coats six water tanks. Covered the pipes, valves and fittings in the pump room with insulating material and canvas. Replaced damaged marble and reset loose marble where necessary through the building. Repaired four water meters. installed a two column radiator in place of the one column radiator in Room 1412. Made and installed black boards in various rooms as requested by the Committee on Municipal Courses. Installed large number of individual desk lights throughout offices of the building, as the light from the originally installed system has proved in some cases very unsatisfactory. Installed lighting fixtures and globes in elevator cars. Maintained in good repair and operation, exhaust fan motors, dictaphone system in the Bureau of Contract Supervision and an annunciator system in the Dept. of Public Charities. Removed shelving and cabinets from Room 853. Made necessary wiring for thermostat in Chemical Laboratory on twenty-first floor and installed new feed from the main panel board for the furnace and ovens in this laboratory. Placed an electric door opener on the Payroll division, Room 2138, partition door. Placed experimental extended signal lights on elevators Nos. 21 and 26. Changed buzzer system in Bureau of Weights and Measures. Installed temporary lighting in the tunnel from the Municipal Building to the Subway at Brooklyn Bridge. Cleaned all Cryer valves throughout the building. Installed metal shield over radiators in Comptroller's office, and repaired vault lights around the building.

City Hall-Cleaned the paint from the ceiling, walls and woodwork of the east and west wings of the Governor's Room, retouched the same where worn, and refinished the floors of these rooms. Removed the paint from the ceiling and painted ceiling and parts of the walls of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment Committee Room. Replaced some of the broken slabs in the marble floor of the rotunda. Removed iron rods and wiring from the face of the building. Moved the plaster statue of Thomas Jefferson from the second floor rotunda hall to the basement. Made changes in the call and light wires leading to the Mayor's desk. Erected wind shield at the telephone switchboard of the Mayor's office. Changed return piping in the tunnel to take care of the new radiators in the west wing. Repaired area railing. Arrangements were made for occupancy by the Mayor and his Secretaries of the remodeled and renovated quarters of the west wing of the building. Changed the pitch of the piping in the vault in the rear of the Child's Welfare Room to properly drain the risers. Maintained in good order the electric ventilating motors. Installed lamps in the ceiling of the Aldermanic Chamber and completed the hanging of fire extinguishers throughout the building. The awning squad placed in good

repair and condition all flags belonging to the building. Hall of Records-Scraped and painted with two coats, the railing of all four sides of the building. Repaired the terrazzo flooring on the sixth and seventh floors, after the removal of doors and partitions necessitated by the alterations. Reset loose roof tile and replaced broken ones: also reset loose metal trim on the seventh and eighth floors. Tested and corrected the crank shaft of No. 3 engine and installed a bushing to make a tight fit on the shaft. Shortened the main lifting cables of No. 2 elevator. Installed valves in fifteen new flush tanks in the boilers. Relined boilers Nos. 2 and 4, setting new arch blocks in boiler No. 4. Overhauled air compressors used in connection with the automatic sewage ejectors. Installed shafting and hangers and set up tools for new mackine shop. Placed new rods and liners in No. 2 boiler feed pump. Replaced defective steam line to Nos. 2 and 3 engines. Installed new cut-off cable on No. 4 elevator. Repaired the valve gear of the house pump and overhauled the gearing of the Johnson air compressor. Rebabbitted crank pin boxes of No. 3 engine. Installed oil chain and adjusted the main bearings of Nos. 1 and 2 engines. Repaired the cross head of the east blower engine and installed liners in one elevator pilot valve. Installed 900 feet of fire hose throughout the building. In connection with the work of alterations in the offices of the Commissioners of Records, electrical changes were made on the sixth, eventh and eighth floors and plans and specifications were prepared for a change in the electrical equipment on the fourth, fifth and sixth floors, which floors are to be occupied by the office of the Surrogate. All work of making alterations to the sixth, seventh and eighth floors progressed satisfactorily and in addition to the preparation of plans for the fourth, fifth and sixth floors, arrangements were made for the installation of new steel and wood furniture. Plans and specifications for alterations to the second, third and fourth floors, to be occupied by the Register, were prepared. The electrical clocks, exhaust motors, elevator signals, commutators, watt meters, etc., were kept in good repair and working order. Repaired the revolving entrance door. Installed new lifting cable on No. 3 elevator.

City Court—Grained, varnished and glazed the new storm entrance on City Hall Park side of the first floor. Also placed storm sashes for the winter in the windows on the west side of the building. Built a new vestibule entrance on the Chambers st. side at the top of the stoop. Placed new covers over cellar areas and

installed a radiator in the public telephone room. County Court House-The seven rooms in the top of the building which are occupied as the Janitor's apartment, were painted. This work involved kalsomining the ceiling and painting the walls, doors and windows. The cabinets and dressers were varnished and linoleum placed on the floor. A part of Room 109 was painted after changes were made by the County Clerk. Repaired elevator shaft gate locks. Increased the size of the heating mains for the southwest wing of the building Installed radiator in Room 209 and in ladies' toilet on the main floor. Removed some unnecessary piping and changed the pitch of the line through mason's shop. Installed radiators in Part IV and Part VIII of Special Term. Replaced wire screen and gate at the southwest stairway, fourth floor, with additional panel. Repaired the railing at the freight elevator. Maintained the electric fan lights, ventilating motors and elevators in good running condition; also electric lights in Room 122. Fitted up the Janitor's quarters with electric lights. Repaired the door windows in the public telephone booth, and installed storm windows in the building for the winter. Closed in with fire-retarding partition the remaining opening between the

lumber room and carpenter shop in the west wing of the basement. Shifted railing in Part VI. Special Term. Installed additional lights on the fourth floor for in offices of the County Clerk. Repaired portable vacuum cleaner. Turned down two 15 h. p. motor commutators on the second floor. Installed electric heater in the Criminal Branch of the Supreme Court, and overhauled steam piping in the west wing of the basement so as to provide better heating for the court rooms.

Criminal Court Building-Removed loose mirrors from elevator cars. Repaired roof at a number of places and also made repairs to the skylight over the dome. Reset electric floor box in Judge Rosalsky's chambers and laid a new rug. Relaid wooden flooring in the Judges' Chambers, Part VI, Special Sessions. Made repairs to the entrance doors. Repaired the guide rails on No. 6 elevator. Installed an operating tiller rope on No. 1 elevator. Painted toilet in offices of the Clerk of General Sessions, private toilet for Judges of Special Sessions, Probation officers' toilet and ante-room on the second floor, also Court Room of Part VI, General Sessions, ante-room and Clerks' rooms adjoining. Painted signs on the walls and doors of all General Sessions Court Rooms. Installed shaking and dumping grates in two boilers. Renewed governor rope on No. 4 elevator. Made and installed new keys for cut-off valve for No. 4 elevator. Overhauled vacuum cleaner. Renewed piston rods of No. 2 engine. Drew up plans and specifications for plumbing, for changes in Court Rooms to accommodate Special Sessions and its staff. Also commenced preparation of plans and specifications for changes necessary to provide a new Court Room for the Court of General Sessions.

New Children's Court—Painted the board fence on the east side of the driveway, also painted outside of casement sashes where carpenters had reset adjusters. Numbered the motors and switches in the cellar. Prepared plans and specifications for the installation of the vacuum cleaning plant. Installed electric lighting fixtures. Maintained the elevator machinery and elevator motors. Installed two mirrors and glass shelves in the Judges' private toilets. Bolted the casement sash holders, in place of screws originally installed. Reconstructed door to the ash hoist, so as to allow for runway. Erected shelving in the basement for court records, and put sheet metal

on the entrance gates to prevent intrusion.

Jefferson Market Court-Renewed 25 ft. of 6-inch cast iron leader line in the cellar. Painted the walls and kalsomined the ceiling, varnished the woodwork and stained the floors of the Janitor's apartment; also stained and varnished furniture for the Chief Clerk. Made and installed new Clerk's desk in the Magistrate's Court

West Fifty-fourth Street Court—Painted the prison pen ceiling, walls and bars. Painted dadoes of halls leading from the Court Rooms to the prison pens, also painted Clerks' toilet. Renewed 50 ft. of hot water piping in boiler room and record room. Repared the coal scales in the boiler room. Installed automatic temperature regulator for the hot water heater. Divided the window glass in the Magistrates' complaint room into smaller panes. Repaired the steam coil in the office of the Bureau of Highways. Maintained the electrical apparatus of the new elevator.

At 266 Madison Street—Replaced about 10 sq. yds. of loose plaster in the Record Room and Part IV Court Room. Rearranged lettering in various Court and Clerks' Rooms. Maintained the electric elevator machinery. Repaired roof leaks. Made runway for passing coal from the bunker to the fire room. Covered the grating in the court yard and removed ventilator from the sashes of the Clerk's office in the Judge's Chambers. Also issued open market order calling for the placing of safety treads on the iron entrance stairs and platforms.

At 54 Lafayette Street-Took up all carpets and linoleum preparatory to the removal of this Court to the new quarters at 146 Grand st. Also removed all elec-

trical fixtures and fans.

At 207 East Thirty-second Street Court-Constructed and installed a cabinet for

record books and legal forms.

Harlem Court-Installed braces in the railing at the corner of 121st st. and Sylvan pl. Extended partitions in the office of the Dept. of Water Supply, Gas and

At 49 Lafayette Street-Cleaned, plastered and kalsomined the ceilings and painted the walls, doors, etc., of the ninth and tenth floors. Varnished the windows and aluminumed the radiators. Cleaned, plastered and kalsomined the ceiling and painted and enameled the walls, doors, windows and partitions of a part of the sixth floor. Reset and tied the marble work of the main hall. Overhauled the plumbing of the seventh, eighth and tenth floors, supplying missing fixtures. Installed new lighting equipment on the ninth, tenth, eleventh and twelfth floors. Repaired and changed the lighting equipment on the sixth floor. Changed the freight elevator to a passenger car by installing a new cage and changing the doors in the shaft enclosure. Installed a brass railing in the Inspectors' Division of the Bureau of Licenses on the flfth floor. Maintained electric sump pump motor. Placed new lighting fixtures on the fifth floor. Also installed three straight-stem fixtures over the License Application desk and installed 12 pendant lighting fixtures at the north end of the sixth floor. Rebuilt desk drawers for the Dept. of Licenses. Repaired window chains throughout the building. Repaired flooring on the ninth floor. Repaired bells and lights in elevator cars and placed copper cornices on the roof of the building.

At 146 Grand Street-This building was practically completed for occupancy on Dec. 31, 1915. The electric elevator contract was approximately ninety-five per cent. finished and the car in operation. The lighting equipment work was ninety-two per cent. completed and the system placed in operation. The heating system was ninetynine per cent. completed and in operation. The building was ready for the use of the First District Municipal Court, and on Dec. 31 was put in proper condition for

occupancy on Jan. 3, 1916.

First Street and Second Avenue—Cleaned and plastered walls and ceiling of the men's and women's public toilets. Maintained the alternating current ventilating fan.

Furnished and set 10 sq. ft. of new marble in the men's pen toilet.

At 1128 St. Nicholas Avenue—Lettered Twelfth District Magistrate's Court on the front windows and on the entrance doors of this building, also made three signs on signboards. Made, installed, stained and varnished four stationery cabinets. 1nstalled a wood and glass partition at the entrance of the Judges' Chambers. This partition was stained and varnished. Installed a buzzer leading from the Court Room to the prison pens; a three-button annunciator on the Judge's desk, and 6-inch gong at the entrance door.

Miscellaneous Buildings-Repaired the platform of the stairs in the yard and also the steps leading from the yard to the cellar of the building at 5 Duane st. Repaired office floor in the Fifty-sixth st. Highway Yard office. Erected shelving for supplies in the Municipal Asphalt Plant at Nineteenth st. and Avenue A and made repairs in the office of Bureu of Sewers at Ninety-eighth st. and Amsterdam ave.

PUBLIC BATHS.

Allen Street Bath-Painted and enameled walls and ceilings of the second floor shower rooms and the men's waiting room. Scraped, painted and enameled the metal work of the skylights on the second floor and on the men's and women's side of the first floor. Varnished the shower room doors on the second floor. Painted and enameled the covered supply pipes on the second floor. Enameled the doors to the shower rooms on the men's side, first floor. Painted with aluminum the heating pipes, partition doors and grills, and all supply pipes and shower valve stems in the men's section of the first and second floors. Removed about 1,200 sq. ft. of old plaster from various shower rooms and about 200 sq. ft. in the women's waiting room. This was coated with waterproofing compound and replastered with Portland cement. Furnished new hose and installed new exhaust head on the roof. Prepared plans and specifications for new vestibule enclosure on the men's and women's entrances. Repaired heating coils in the men's shower rooms and installed new vault light glasses in front of the building.

Carmine Street Bath-Strengthened the bracing of the east wall by tieing it to the interior wall at six points. Tie rods were placed across two arches in the men's waiting room and timber braces and struts were placed under these arches. Repaired terrazzo floor in several portions of the building. Increased number and covered the

heating risers. Installed new hose in the bath. Cherry and Oliver Streets Bath—Installed new tubes in No. 1 boiler and caulked rivets in the bottom seam of this boiler. Placed new lighting fixtures in the waiting

Rivington Street Bath-Refinished with oil and rubbed the partitions and cabinets in the office. Removed two old lamp-posts from the foot of the men's and women's entrance stairways. Installed one charcoal iron boiler tube in No. 1 boiler. Moved the forced draft equipment to the rear of the cellar. Made new saucer and nut for 5-inch diaphragm stem valve of the water heater. Removed unnecessary piping. Furnished new hose for the shower rooms. Completed the installation of exterior lighting fixtures. Removed a short circuit on station 14 from the panel board. Connected a duct to the blower engine, also connected steam, exhaust and drip pipes to blower engine in its new position. Made inspections of the swimming pool and supervised the filtration of the water.

West Forty-first Street Bath-Painted and oiled the floor of the men's shower section on the first floor. Treated with cement filler the concrete floors of the shower room in the men's section of the first floor. Made and installed new valve rings and rod for No. 2 engine and a new valve rod for the ventilating fan engine. Repaired the coal scales. Prepared plans and specifications for new vestibule enclosures at the men's and women's entrances.

East Fifty-fourth Street Bath—Installed three new flush meters, piping, etc., in the toilet of the gymnasium. Installed a 2½-inch pipe and fittings for washing of filters and the sediment tank. Installed a drip pipe to carry off water from women's showers on the first floor. Furnished new hose. Installed two radiator screens. Placed new safety ropes in the plunge and repaired a number of shower room doors. All work in connection with the installation of two swimming pools in this bath was completed during this quarter. Routine inspections of the plunge and swimming pool were made.

West Sixtieth Street Bath-Renewed 40 ft. of hot water supply pipe leading up to the second floor shower rooms. Renewed a 2-inch hot water line connecting the shower and pool heaters. Installed new spring-board abutment. Furnished new hose for cleansing purposes. Installed three thermometers to register room temperatures. Installed radiator screens. Repaired ventilator hoods. Repaired clothes wringer. Replaced wooden slat doors with solid doors in the doorway leading from the waiting room to the swimming pool room. Made regular routine inspections of the swimming pool and filtration plant.

East Seventy-sixth Street Bath-Made a tool for refacing the discs of the shower mixing valves. Made repairs to the feed water meter.

East 109th Street Bath-Overhauled the governor of No. 2 engine. Installed clean-out doors at the bottom of the smokestack. Repaired front roof gutters and overhauled the skylight grating. Reset a large portion of loose roof tile. Prepared

plans and specifications for a new vestibule enclosure at the men's and women's entrances.

Rutgers Place Bath-Installed two new iron saddles in the men's and women's entrance doorways. Replaced missing vault light glasses over the engine room doors. Overhauled automatic damper regulator. Blanked up five unused ducts. Relined boiler No. 2, including new arch and check blocks and bridge wall complete. Reset loose marble partitions, trim, etc., and replaced broken parts wherever necessary throughout the bath. Made routine inspections of the filter plant and swimming pool. Installed hose and sediment hoe. Provided nets and made arrangements for sanitary operation of the swimming pool. Made plans for connecting the meter to test the rate of circulation of water through the plunge.

East Eleventh Street Bath—Installed new tubes in boiler. Repaired a number

of shower room doors and built new doors for several shower compartments.

East Twenty-third Street Bath-Repaired a leak through the wall of the swimming pool. This necessitated cutting out a 2-inch square section of outer wall reaching as far as the water-proofing. After this was done a coating of bonding and water-proofing compound was placed in the wall and a filling of a rich mixture of concrete was then put in. A number of missing tiles were replaced in the sides and bottom of the swimming pool. The brass railing around the pool was repaired, involving the use of 20 inches of heavy brass piping. Changes were made in the piping at the circulating pump to enable a meter to be inserted so that the circulation of the water could be measured. A new tube was installed in one boiler and arrangements made for four hot water connections to be used for hosing and cleaning purposes. Repaired revolving entrance doors and made routine inspections of the swimming pool and filtration plant.

West Twenty-eighth Street Bath-Specifications were prepared for five new floor drains and eighteen controlling valves for the first floor shower section. Painted the risers of the stairs and touched up the painting of the iron work in the waiting rooms. Installed a sterilizer to kill bacteria in the swimming pool water. Repaired defective lighting in the swimming pool room by installing a lead covered cable and rearranged the switches so that they could not be operated by members of the public. Installed three electric bells. Rewound the ash hoist motor armature. Installed a new iron grating in the sidewalk over the ash hoist. Made routine inspections of the filtration plant and conducted tests to determine the rate of circulation of the

swimming pool water.

FLOATING BATHS.

The six floating baths were closed to the public on the following dates: Battery Park, No. 1, Oct. 17; Battery Park, No. 2, Oct. 14; Pike st. and East river, Oct. 17; E. 5th st., Oct. 16; E. 96th st., Oct. 10; E. 123rd st., Oct. 9.

These floating baths provided, during the season, a total patronage of 1,318,341 baths.

Routine inspections of these baths were made for the purpose of examination of the condition of the water. The Bureau squads disconnected the baths from the Croton water supply pipes. These pipes were freed from water and made safe for the winter. The carpenter squad took down rails, platforms, gangway bridges before these baths were towed to their winter quarters.

COMFORT STATIONS.

Battery Park—Repaired the furnace grate and installed a new control rod, also made repairs to window catches, clothes hangers in the various toilets and chains and hangers on flush tanks.

Mail Street—Sixteen floor urinals were set by the plumbing squad. These were obtained from the Long Acre Square Comfort Station and the Hanover Square Comfort Station, where they were no longer required. They were connected with a new 3-inch waste line and with water line. Six tanks were installed and new marble partitions and floor slabs. Repaired leak on steam valves and maintained the electric ventilating motor.

Chatham Square—Replaced twelve large lights of glass in the kiosk. Maintained electric ventilating motors. Overhauled heating boiler and prepared plans and specifications for the installation of a larger ventilating fan and motor.

Sheriff and Delancey Streets-Dressed down the entrance steps to prevent slipping. Removed the water supply piping from seven toilets. Cleared stoppage and

replaced same. Maintained electric exhaust fan.

Hanover Square-Set new tile floor and wall and replaced plaster wall from which toilet in rear of station had been removed. This involved 2,000 floor tile and 1,800 wall tile. Maintained electric sump pump motors and placed heating system in good repair.

Abingdon Square—Painted and enamelled walls and ceilings, doors, windows and cabinets throughout the station. Also placed aluminum on the radiators and piping. Replaced clear glass in all windows with Florentine glass. Repaired five toilet doors and maintained electric fan motor.

Greeley Square—Painted and enamelled the walls, ceilings, doors, tanks, etc., throughout, also placed aluminum on the radiators and piping. Installed floor drains and cut a trench to drain leak coming through exterior walls. Floored over the woman attendant's room and installed a wood runway. Installed new cold water piping in the men's and women's side and in the boiler room, making new connection to all fixtures. Maintained electric exhaust fan motor and overhauled heating system.

Long Acre Square—Set new tile floor and wall from which toilets were removed. This involved the setting of 2,000 floor tile and fifteen wall tile. Installed gas line in the station with one hole hot plate. Set a new marble floor at the men's stairs. Covered the steam boiler and piping with asbestos. Tested and replaced steam gauge on boiler and safety valve. Repaired hand rail on men's side entrance. Maintained electric ventilating and blower motors.

At 125th Street and Park Avenue-Painted and enamelled the walls and ceiling, doors and windows throughout the station. Also covered heating pipes with aluminum and painted outside screens. Repaired outlet valve on boiler leading to women's side. Made and installed smoke stack on chimney.

At 129th Street and Third Avenue-Painted and enamelled walls, ceiling and tanks. Varnished doors, windows and cabinets and aluminumed the radiators and piping. Repaired the smoke pipe on hot water heater. Made two new bearings for two electric ventilating motors. Maintained the electric ventilating motors and overhauled heating system.

At 125th Street and Willis Avenue-Painted and enamelled the walls, ceilings, skylight, windows, iron work, doors and tanks of both the men's and women's buildings. Aluminumed the radiators and piping. Kalsomined the ceilings and walls of cellars. Repaired the hot water heater. Renewed the smoke pipe of the women's side. Repaired electric light fixtures and overhauled heating system.

Queensboro Bridge-Removed one toilet fixture, closed up the soil line and floored over one compartment on the women's side. Repaired leaking roof. Erected signs indicating public comfort stations.

Washington Market-Installed a clothes closet for the attendants. Put rubber weather strips on the men's and women's entrance doors.

MARKETS.

Washington Market-Painted the lower part of the outside of the market on all four sides and replaced all broken glass. Painted the walls, ceilings, pipes and equipment in the refrigerating plant in white enamel finish. Repainted where necessary the interior of the market. Installed a new 4-inch water gate on the Vesey st. side, shifting it from the middle of the roadway to the sidewalk and installing a valve box over the gate. Repaired concrete sidewalk around the market. Overhauled the drainage system, clearing many stoppages caused by mechanics working in the market. Finished running the gas mains throughout. Laid a concrete finish on the under floor of the condenser room. Supervised the starting up and test of fifty-ton refrigerating plant during October. Since October this plant has been in continuous operation supplying refrigerating brine to the individual boxes, display cases and showcases of the merchants throughout the market. Changed the electric lighting fixtures to conform to the architectural requirements at the market by removing the shades and sockets and installing ball globe fixture at each point. Installed new storm doors on the four main entrances. Maintained in repair the elevator. Removed the electric meters from over the stand in the middle of the market and installed them on the mezzanine floor on the west side. Removed all electric fittings from the temporary sheds. Installed and connected twenty-two new fixtures below the mezzanine floor. Installed 600 temporary electric lights for the opening of the market. On Oct. 25 the work of remodeling and reconstructing the interior of the market was completed. This work, which covered a period of several years, involved a total expenditure of \$111,493.39. The work accomplished during this time embraces the construction of new concrete and terrazzo floors throughout the market and new drainage and water supply systems, refrigerating plant, a new mezzanine floor, new roofing and flashings and the installing of a lighting system. This work was done on contract and under the supervision of an architect and engineer from this office.

West Washington and Gansevoort Market-Removed eight entrance archways at the following locations: Gansevoort st. and Lawton ave., Grace ave. and West st., Thompson ave. and West st., Hewitt ave. and West st., Loew ave. and West st., Grace ave. and Thirteenth ave., Thompson ave. and Thirteenth ave., Hewitt ave. and Fifteenth ave. Repaired the brick work of the face into which these arches bonded and pointed this brick work to match the adjoining portion of the market. Took down and reset ten chimneys on top of one of the market buildings. Replaced about one hundred sq. yds. of disintegrated plaster. Repaired a number of roof and gutter leaks and also installed a number of sash chains in doors.

Jefferson Market-During this quarter the contract work of constructing new entrance doors and store fronts, installing new drainage system and new concrete floors and making repairs to the roof and to the masonry of the building, progressed slowly. At the end of the quarter the drainage was sixty per cent. completed, while the repairs to the masonry of the faces were twenty-five per cent. completed.

OPEN MARKETS.

Manhattan-One hundred market stands were set and secured to the concrete pavement. Hose and hydrant wrenches were furnished for use at this market. Queensboro Bridge-Prepared contract drawings and specifications for this mar-

ket with iron and glass and for proper drainage and water supply systems. Hose

and hydrant wrenches were also supplied to this market.

Harlem Market-Prepared contract plans and specifications for enclosing this market with walls and doors and also for proper drainage and water supply systems. General—The following completed jobs were executed by the Bureau's various squads: Carpenter, 198; electrical, 166; plumbing, 125; steamfitting, 33; painting and varnishing, 120; roofing, 69; masonry, 45; awning, 53; and machinist, 25. Total, 834. There were 440 requisitions and open market orders issued, and 439 check orders drawn against miscellaneous monthly orders. The patronage of the interior baths for October was 378,536, November 334,596, and December 405,941, making a total patronage for the quarters ending Dec. 31, of 1,340,936 baths.

Bureau of Topography.

Changes in City map, comprising improvements in the street system, opening new streets, widening existing streets, extension of avenues, creating public places, etc. Surveys, studies and maps, and reports made for the Local Board or Board of Estimate and Apportionment. Croton pl., and a Public Park north of W. 165th st., between Amsterdam ave. and Audubon ave., closing and discontinuing, and laying out Croton st., north of 165th st., between same limits. Twelfth ave., from 29th to 36th sts., further reports and studies, in re laying out. Fifth ave., extension south, from Waverly pl. to W. Fourth st., through Washington Square Park, street layout. Final maps filed. Minetta st., report and maps in re petition to widen. Dyckman House Park, layout and maps filed. W. 143d st. and W. 144th st., from near Lenox ave. to Exterior st., closing and discontinuing, and laying out new streets east of Lenox ave., between W. 142d and W. 143d sts., and between W. 144th st. and W. 145th st., maps transmitted. Riverside Drive extension, revision of tentative maps in accordance with report of City Plan Committee (in progress). Chittenden ave. and adjacent parks, revision of original layout.

Monumenting, including the monumenting of the upper part of the Borough within the area bounded by 155th st., the Hudson river, the Harlem Ship Canal and Broadway. Computations and co-ordination of monuments. Various resetting and relocation of existing monuments, at different locations. The monuments in the Marble Hill section were tied in to our primary system. This involved the turning of twenty-one primary angles and 10,232 lin. ft. of primary chaining. Thirty-six old monuments were located for old references and tied in to main lines. Owing to numerous accidents and inconvenience connected with iron covers over monuments, they have been discontinued and all monuments are set flush with the walk. This practice has given good results. We have instituted a system of making concrete monuments in preference to using marble ones. Forms for these have been made by departmental labor, and the molding is being done at the asphalt plant. Thus far, thirty monuments have been made. All this has been accomplished with departmental labor. The cost per monument, including overhead, etc., is 75 cents, as compared with \$3 which we paid formerly for the marble ones.

Bench Marks, comprising the establishment of a system throughout the Borough, in connection with the primary points previously established by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. Due to the pressure of the other activities mentioned, very little progress in this direction was made.

Borough survey and street line determination, comprising the completion of and mapping studies, investigations of titles, etc., and the establishing of true building lines. The work is precise and final in its determination. All the individual sections worked up, as required, will be combined eventually with the official map of the borough. Area bounded by Spruce st., William st., Wall st. and Broadway. (Progress in computing and mapping). Area bounded by Wall st., Broadway and East River. (Progress in computing and mapping). Area bounded by Broadway, Fulton St., West St. and Worth St. (Progress in surveying and computing). Area bounded by Eighth ave., Fifty-fourth st., Sixth ave. and Fifty-eighth st., street lines determined. Area bounded by Coenties Slip, South st., Broad st. and Front st., street lines determined. Area along North River, from Fifty-first to Fifty-fourth sts., in progress. Area bounded by First ave., Fifty-third st., Second ave. and Fifty-fifth st., street lines determined.

In connection with the above, twenty-one blocks were surveyed. This involved the establishing of 23,215 lin. ft. of building lines, the chaining of 39,220 lin. ft. of tertiary traverses, and the turning of seventy-two angles of twelve repetitions each.

Subsurface Survey-Surveys made of pipes, etc., exposed in excavations made by various corporations. These surveys are indexed and filed for reference and are used whenever such information is needed. Other studies, designs for construction below the surface were made. Investigation and report on plan of the Borough of Queens to regulate the substructures in the city streets, as requested by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. Investigations of ducts requested by Public Service Commission in connection with the Dual System, estimates, etc. There were 597 street openings surveyed for use in subsurface study.

Franchise Matters-Investigations, reports, etc., upon various petitions referred to the Borough President by the Bureau of Franchises: 212th st., near Harlem River, coal scale; Lewis st., Grand to Houston, track franchise data.

Title proceedings, including necessary surveys, preparation of damage and benefit

maps for streets laid out on the City map, but not yet acquired; also reports, estimates, etc.: Additional reports on acquiring title to Service st. along Riverside drive, from about 168th st. to W. 178th st., and a Public Park. Check survey and computations for Court House site, in connection with Damage map, for consequential damages. City Plan Committee, layout map of title to all streets in Borough. Historical statistics of streets in Borough.

Change of grade, including propositions petitioned for or suggested, both in new sections and in areas that are developed: Area bounded by Broadway, 218th st. and Harlem River Ship Canal, progress in mapping.

Encroachments, development of street lines, with reference to the removal of existing encroachments, surveys, studies, maps, estimates, costs, etc.: Second ave., Sixth to Seventh sts., where already widened.

Vaults, surveys, computations, checking, reports, investigations, relative to the application for permits, new, old and unpaid vaults, also in roadway widening propositions. Special reports and plans for lawsuit, at 176 Broadway, N. Y. Central Railroad Company vault refund report. Forty-two vaults were surveyed; twenty-four plans for new permits and twenty-eight plans for repairs to vaults were received from the Division of Permits, and were computed and checked for compliance with ordinances, etc., and then referred to the Bureau of Sewers for possible interference with sewer construction. The total area involved in these plans amounted to 20,131 square feet. In doing this, it was necessary to write thirty-three reports to the Permit Division, calling attention to infringements upon the ordinances, etc. Fourteen certificates by City Surveyors were referred by the Permit Division for survey and checking; the area involved was 1,086 square feet; ten reports were made, based upon surveys by this Bureau; the area involved was 2,332 sq. ft. Seven cases of excess area were found, amounting to 773 sq. ft.

Corporation Counsel-Surveys, maps, reports upon accident cases, where the City of New York is defendant, and in other suits in which the City is concerned, also testimony in court: Twelve surveys were made. Twenty-seven plans submitted to the Corporation Counsel for miscellaneous surveys. Encroachment survey for Corporation Counsel of Fifty-third st., Fifty-fourth st., Fify-fifth st., First ave. and Second ave. (in progress). Historical maps traced in part covering area from Thirtyninth st. to Forty-first st. and Twelfth ave. Exterior st., 106th st. to 107th st., his-

Miscellaneous investigations and reports, including unclassified surveys, estimates, reports, maps, etc. Map showing public markets in Manhattan. Map showing aldermanic and congressional districts in Manhattan. Operating chart for building elevators. Subway traffic curves. Profiles of Bolton and River roads on Inwood Hill for Dept. of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity. Changes in plans of Park ave. viaduct near Forty-second st., due to diagonal subway connection between Park and Lexington aves. Topographical map of the territory bounded by 165th st., Riverside drive, 177th st. and Haven ave. Property of City of New York in Yorkville Advisory district. Subway shoring surveys of timbering, etc., maps and estimates in connection with the subway cave-in. New York Central Railroad improvement at Depot Lane, and through Ft. Washington Park, plans and profiles. Copy of original map laying out streets in the territory bounded by 181st st., Broadway, Dyckman st. and Riverside drive. Borings, test levels in connection with the Court House site. West Side improvement, in relation to the relocation of the N. Y. Central railroad tracks from Seventy-second st. to the Harlem River Ship Canal; complete surveys and maps and estimates for construction were made, alignment studies, profiles, borings, designs for tunnel and cut and cover. Real estate maps also were prepared.

Map and Record Division-This division controls the filing and indexing of all plans, records, books, notes for the entire department, all blue printing, press printing and title printing. Two hundred and nine current maps were filed and indexed; thirty foreign maps were filed and indexed; forty-three miscellaneous maps were filed and indexed; 114 vault plans were filed and indexed; 4,346 blueprints were made; 500 litho. prints were made; 6,920 cards were press printed; sixty-four titles were press printed on maps; seventy-eight notes were press printed on maps.

There were about forty telephone calls per day for information, and 158 calls from contractors for plans advertised. The total amount received therefor was \$243. Also messenger service, co-ordinating the various bureaus with the general work of the Bureau of Topography.

The surveying division furnished all the surveys for the above mentioned work. Its work was somewhat handicapped by the assignment of some of the force upon snow removal work.

Gordon, Clerk in that department, appeared in favor of the proposed amendment in so far as it referred to the positions of Tailor and Cutter. Dr. George O'Hanlon, General Medical Superintendent, Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, appeared in favor of the amendment in so far as it referred to the position of Painter. There were no other appearances and the Chair declared the hear-

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the classification by striking from the Exempt Class, under the heading "Department of Public Charities," the lines: 7 Superintendents of Training School, 10 Deputy Superintendents of Training School, and substituting therefor: 8 Superintendents of Nurses, 12 Assistant Superintendents of Nurses. George G. Thomson, Third Deputy Commissioner, Department of Public Charities, and Clifford J. Gordon, Clerk in that department, appeared in favor of the proposed amendment. There were no other appearances and

the Chair declared the hearing closed. A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the classification of positions in the Non-Competitive Class, under the heading, "Positions in the Department of Public Charities, at compensations not exceeding the amounts set forth below," by striking therefrom, under the sub-heading, "With Maintenance," the following: Tailor, \$720 per annum; Housekeeper, \$900 per annum, and by including therein the titles: Matron, \$780 per annum; Head Overseer, \$960 per annum; also by including therein, under the sub-heading, "Without Maintenance," the following: Overseer, \$780 per annum. George G. Thomson, Third Deputy Commissioner, Department of Public Charities, and Clifford J. Gordon, Clerk in that department, appeared in favor of the proposed amendment. There were no other appearances and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the classification of positions in the Non-Competitive Class, under the heading, "Positions in the Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, at compensations not exceeding the amounts set forth below," and under the sub-heading, "With Maintenance," by including therein the following: to the Court of Special Sessions. 

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale When the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expira-

tion of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the pur-chase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the pur-chaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances between the time of the sale thereand the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly vacated of all tenants. The sale and delivery to purchaser will be made as nearly together as the circumstances of vacating the structures of their tenants will

All the material of the buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurte-nances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foun-dations and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area, shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their founda tions shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean

earth. The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply. Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Department

of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed. The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street and the openings of the main sewer in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the

work has been properly performed.

from the day of possession will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances or portions as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed, and the cost and expense thereof charged against

the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the day of possession, and the suc-cessful bidder will provide and furnish all materials of labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the ma-terials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate pur-

chasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furrings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam holes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent build. clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent build-ings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed

by the operations of the Contractor.

"No buildings, parts of buildings, fixtures or machinery sold for removal under these terms and conditions shall in any case be re-located or re-erected within the lines of any proposed street or other public improvement, and if any such buildings, parts of buildings, fixtures or machinery, etc., shall be re-located or re-erected within the lines of any proposed street or other public improvement, title thereto shall thereupon become vested in The City of New York and a resale at public or private sale may be made in the same manner as if no prior sale thereof had

The Comptroller of The City of New York reserves the right on the day of sale to withdraw from sale any of the buildings, parts of buildings and machinery included therein, or to reject any and all bids; and be it further

Resolved, That while the said sale is held under the sunervision of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller is authorized to cause the sale to be advertised and to direct

to cause the sale to be advertised and to direct the sale thereof as financial officer of the City.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its depart-ments, bureaus or officers, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement tor the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according

to law as soon thereafter as practicable.
Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting another extended to the contracting and the second contracting and the se tracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the recepion or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or Na-tional banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or cor-porate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the pro-

posals or instructions to bidders and shall not be

in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be in closed in the envelope containing the bid or esti-mate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Depart-

ment, President or Board, or submitted personally appn the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department. No bid shall be accepted from or contract

awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any

obligation of the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids o estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon applica-
