REPORT : That your Committee have carefully considered the application, have had several meetings at which all persons interested, both for and against the proposed measure, have been heard by coun-sel as well as in person, and have arrived at the conclusion that the establishment and operation of the railway, as proposed, will be providing a means of public travel, between the east and west sides of the city, that has been clearly shown to be a great public necessity. While your Committee, as provided in the law (chapter 252, Laws of 1884), have consulted the interests and wishes of the owners of property fronting on the streets through which the cars of this company are to pass, and have listened with much attention to the representatives of the advocates and opponents of the measure, it is, in their opinion, the first duty of the "local authorities" to con-sider the bearing of the question upon the interests and wishes of the public, who own the streets, in preference to the owners of property, who have simply an easement in them. If the construction and operation of the proposed railroad is in the interest, and for the benefit of the people of this city, then, in the opinion of your Committee, consent should be given by such local authorities, as the interest of the people is paramount to all other interests, and should be first considered by the Com-mon Council.

To the Honorable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment: GENTLEMEN—In accordance with law and with the request of the Comptroller, transmitted to me under date of August 25, 1885, I herewith forward the estimate of the Law Department for the year 1886. From the comparative statement in tabular form annexed hereto, it will be seen that I have endeavored, so far as is practicable consistently with an efficient conduct of the business of this Department, to reduce the budget as low as possible. I ask for \$3,450 less than the original appropriations for the year 1885 for this Department, and \$9,150 less than the total of such appro-priations as modified by subsequent transfers. I also present herewith as requested, a list of the names, official position and salaries of all officers, clerks, employees, and subordinates in the Department. Department.

The character of the work conducted by the Law Department is such that it is almost impos-sible to determine in advance what balance will remain unexpended at the end of the current fiscal year. Probably very little will be so left, the appropriation for this Department not being in excess of its requirements, but I am unable at present to report upon that subject. If desired I will later in the second s in the year, and before action is taken by the Board upon the Final Estimate (or at any other time), furnish the best information in my power.

In explanation of the various items of proposed expenditure, I beg leave to state as follows: First—I have asked for a very marked increase in the appropriation for salaries. This is done because my experience with the business of the Department has fully satisfied me that an increase of the permanent force will greatly increase its efficiency and will alone enable it, besides attending to the current business, to systematically and thoroughly cope with the arrears of work which have for years encumbered its registers. In this connection I would refer to the report of Mr. Horace E. Deming, made to the Mayor last May, upon the organization of the Department. It very clearly and forcibly points out the necessity of a reorganization and reinforcement of the permanent force. I feel the less hesitancy in asking for an increase of appropriation for this particular item of expendi-ture as, by economizing in other items, I shall, as will be seen from this estimate, be able to more than make up the sum required. I ask for an appropriation of \$6,000 for presenting evidence relating to frauds prior to 1872. In

The expense of the trial of these actions cannot, in my opinion, be borne by the present appropriation for contingencies, in view of the many calls upon that fund, without crip-pling the Department in its ability to handle the ordinary current litigation." Since that time considerable headway has been made in disposing of the old cases, and I think the close of the current year will see a material reduction of their number. Some, however, will still remain which must be tried, and for that reason the appropriation cannot, in my opinion, be entirely dispensed with for the year 1886. With regard to the appropriation relative to presenting evidence in regard to the new parks, I respectfully refer to my communication accompanying the Departmental Estimates for 1885, which will be found in the CITY RECORD of October 15, 1884. I therein set forth at great length the necessity for this appropriation, and asked for \$20,000. That sum was included in the Provisional Estimate for 1885. Subsequently, necessity arising for a special appropriation for counsel to assist in framing legislation, \$5,000 of this \$20,000 was withdrawn from the purpose to which it was originally devoted. The \$5,000 which I now ask will merely restore the appropriation to its original amount.

No appropriation is asked for special counsel to assist in framing legislation. This is not because the necessity has ceased, but because I expect hereafter to handle that branch of the business with the regular staff of the office. The practice of legislating with regard to the affairs of this city, under acts entitled simply as acts to amend the Consolidation Act, has greatly increased the labor necessary in keeping track of pending legislation. No explanation as to other items seems to be required—they sufficiently explain themselves. I send herewith the estimates of the bureau officers, which are included in the above Depart-mental Estimate.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen: GENTLEMEN—In compliance with section 189 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, I respectfully submit the estimate set out hereafter, of the amount required to conduct the public business under the charge of the Department of Street Cleaning for the year 1886, with the following introductory statement : The Board of Estimate and Apportionment appropriated the sum of \$1,050,000 for the pur-poses of the Department of Street Cleaning for the year 1885. The existence of an epidemic of cholera in parts of Europe, and the possibility of its being communicated to Great Britain, and thence (or through other channels) transported to this country, filled the authorities of New York with serious apprehensions, and aroused them to the necessity of adopting extraordinary precautions against a visitation of that dreadful scourge, and against its prevalence here should it unluckily be brought amongst us. To that end the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, having due regard to the grave responsibility resting upon them, and acting upon the concurrent views of the civic depart-ments immediately charged with the sanitation of this city, did, among other preventive measures, allot an extra sum of \$150,000 for the purposes of the Department of Street Cleaning. The wisdom of this course of action has been abundantly manifested in the practical, beneficial results effected. The cleanliness and the healthfulness of New York during the summer just closed, have been the subject of much favorable public criticism, not only locally, but also in many parts of this country, and it has been remarked that while the death-rate of several large cities in Europe and America was enhanced, and epidemics of the most malignant type prevailed in some of them, the rate of mortality in New York was lowered, even in the face of an ever-increasing population. Like-wise, the death-rate among infants, noticeably, has not been so high as in summers of the past, though the conditions

This highly satisfactory sanitary condition of the city has been publicly credited to the increased vigilance and activity of the Department of Street Cleaning, jointly with other co-operating city departments.

The following statistical figures illustrate the correctness of the foregoing statements as to the marked decrease in the rate of mortality :

There has been no abatement of the cholera in Europe, and the same good reasons advanced in support of taking extra precautionary measures for 1885, may be said to exist in equal force as to the year 1886. It is the opinion of our medical authorities, our most intelligent publicists, and the press (representing public opinion), that we should not relax our efforts in 1886 to prevent the invasion of cholera.

Labor—The increment in the amount asked for Laborer's wages is designed as a provision for the work south of Fourteenth street, now done by contract, to uphold the same standard of work performed this year, or to improve it. The increase is applied for for the further reason that a steady increase of work may be calculated upon during 1886, in the up-town districts, consequent upon an extended mileage of streets to be cleaned, in proportion as new streets are paved. Hired Carts—The increase in the amount for hired carts is designed to provide for the work south of Fourteenth street, and for the increase of work north of Fourteenth street. Carts and Machines—In order to keep up the present standard of work, and to provide for all the Department work without outside help, we shall need a number of new machines and carts. Harness—The stock is becoming much worm and will necessitate a greater outlay to keep it in good working order than was expended this year (1885); and the increase in the number of horses required to perform the work will call for continued repairs to the harness. WIILIAM H. KIPP, Esq., Chief Clerk, Police Department :

Sir—I am in receipt of your communication under date of October 9, 1885, transmitting resolu-tion of the Board requesting advice as to the proper construction to be placed upon the third para-graph of Civil Service Regulation 53, and asking as an illustration, whether in the case of a sergeant seeking promotion the certificate required by such regulation should be supplied by his captain (being the next ranking officer) or by the Board itself. The regulations of Municipal Civil Service bearing upon the subject of promotion, are these :

" REGULATION 26.

"Promotion to all positions included in Schedule 'C' shall be from the next lower grade, by "competitive examination."

"REGULATION 57.

" Promotion.

"Promotions from the lower grades to the higher shall be on the basis of merit and competition.'

"REGULATION 52.

"Except as herein otherwise provided the positions in the various schedules shall be filled, "when vacant, by the promotion of those in the service in similar or lower grades in the depart-"ment, office or institution in which the vacancy or vacancies may occur. Promotions shall be "made subject to the provisions of these regulations by the officer or officers having the power ot "appointment. If, in the judgment of such officer or officers, there be none found in the similar or

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"lower grades fit to perform the duties in such vacant positions, in that case, and in no other, " the positions may be filled in the same manner as is prescribed by these regulations for filling the "positions in the lowest grade of the same subdivision and class."

" REGULATION 53.

"Promotion shall, in all cases, be based upon the positive merit of the person promoted, and "upon his superior qualifications as shown by his previous service. "No person in the service who has not passed an examination under these regulations or those "heretofore prescribed shall be promoted or transferred to any position for which examination is "required without passing an examination under the regulations, of the same character as would an "applicant for appointment to that position in the service. "Fitness for promotion shall be determined by the actual work of the persons named therefor, "by the certificate of their immediate official superiors that their efficiency and conduct during "their past service has been in all respects satisfactory and entitle them to favorable consideration, " and by examination."

" REGULATION 54.

"No recommendation of any person for promotion shall be entertained unless made in the reg-"ular course of duty by his immediate official superiors, and the presentation of any recommenda-"tion other than that of such superiors will be considered an unwarrantable interference with the "public service, and the person so recommended may be required to show, before being certified "for promotion, that such recommendation was not made by his request or with his connivance." By the first quoted of these rules promotions are to be made from the next lower grade by competitive examination. In my opinion, however, this does not imply that the opportunity to com-pete in such examination is open to all those who are included in the lower grade. The responsi-bility of selection for promotion is, in a measure, left with the appointing power. By a refusal to promote those in the lower grade who, in the judgment of the officers having the power of appoint-ment, are unfit to perform the duties of the higher position, the number of candidates whose exam-ination is to determine the successful competitor may be materially reduced. In fact, only one person need be so selected, or the entire body of incumbents of the lower grade may be passed over and the selection made from outside. (Regulation 52.) Three things are essential to promotion, viz.: 1. A favorable judgment by the appointing power; 2. A certificate of the "immediate official superior" (referred to hereafter), and 3. Success in examination.

in examination.

All competition between persons whom the appointing power does not judge to be fit for pro-motion would, of course, be an idle and useless ceremony. It would therefore seem appropriate to require from each competitor some evidence that the appointing power does not judge him to be unfit for promotion. Otherwise, the time of the exam-iners might be wasted in determining the relative standing of candidates, all of whom might be thereafter rejected by the head of the department. In this option, as to the true construction of the rules. I am confirmed by the following circum-

In this opinion, as to the true construction of the rules, I am confirmed by the following circumstance

stance : These regulations were framed in 1884 and took effect upon the approval of the New York Civil Service Commission, in the summer of that year. It was the approval of this Commission which alone gave vitality to the regulations (chapter 410 of 1884, section 2). The Commission was at that time composed of Messrs. John Jay, Augustus Schoonmaker and Henry A. Richmond. These same gentlemen comprised the Commission when, in the same year (1884), it made its annual report to the Legislature. That report contains the following : "The Commission has been governed by the desire to not impair that responsibility for "administration by the principal officers upon which the efficiency of the public service depends. The "same motive shaped the rules as to promotion in the service, and competitive examinations have "not been enjoined for promotions. The selection has been imposed upon the head of the office "under whose observation all the subordinates in the daily discharge of their duties are undergoing "a competitive test. No other examination, no matter how carefully devised or conducted, can equal "this practical test in actual service as a measure of individual or comparative efficiency and con-"duct, and the fact that upon such an ordeal his promotion depends is, to every worthy official, a "duct, and the fact that upon such an ordeal his promotion depends is, to every worthy official, a "constant incentive to the highest endeavor in duty. The discipline and subordmation of the force in any office or department are only to be maintained by the assurance that power to reward or "punish is vested in the head of the office. Relieved from the unwholesome restraints and mflu-

"in any office or department are only to be maintained by the assurance that power to reward or "punish is vested in the head of the office. Relieved from the unwholesome restraints and mflu-"ences incident to the exercise of patronage and appointments, and supplied with new material of "approved fitness, to the heads of departments may be safely confided the power to promote and "discharge their subordinates. The rules in regard to promotion provide, in accordance with the "terms of the law, that such advancement shall be based upon positive merit and superior qualifica-"tions, as shown by previous service, being the simple formulation of the motive that would inspire "every head of an office, worthy of such position, since such a practice would raise the efficiency of "the service and redound to his personal credit as an administrator of the public concerns *** *** "The recommendation of persons applying for admission to the service is, to a certain extent, "proper and necessary, since vouchers as to character must in advance be required from those "unknown to the service. The rules recognize this necessity and provide for such vouchers, regu-"lating them as to number and extent. But recommendations for promotion, unless made by "officials in the regular course of duty, are manifestly improper. The assumption that any person "outside the office can judge of the needs of the service and the comparative merits of those serving "so much better than the head of the office. Such gratuitous intervention is an outgrowth of the "patronage system ; but it is a fair inference that no person would so harrass an official unless "made in the regular course of duty by his immediate official superiors; and the presentation of any "recommendation of any person for promotion shall be entertained or received unless "made in the regular course of duty by his immediate official superiors; and the presentation of any "recommendation was not made by his request or conniv-"ence with the public service, and the person so recomme

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" ance." It is reasonable to assume that the rules the Commissioners approved were framed in accord-ance with the views expressed in their report, and the interpretation of these rules hereinbefore given seems warranted by the letter of the rules and conforms to the spirit of the report. Regulation 53 contains the following : "Fitness for promotion shall be determined by the actual "work of the persons named therefor, by the certificate of their immediate official superior, that their "efficiency and conduct during their past service have been in all respects satisfactory and entitle "them to favorable consideration, and by examination." The Board of Police asks specially for a construction of this provision. construction of this provision.

construction of this provision. The regulation is easy of interpretation, but, in some cases, extremely difficult of application. Apparently, it does not refer to the head of the department. The use of the word *immediate* pre-cludes such a construction. In the report of the Civil Service Commission above quoted from, it is stated that the rule was devised in part to relieve officials from being harrassed, as in the past, with recommendations by persons outside the office. Manifestly the only persons needing such relief were those exercising the appointing (or promoting) power. Its object seems to be to require a certificate of good conduct from a superior officer whose official relations with the candidate have been so close as to enable him to testify of his own knowledge as to the manner in which such cardidate has discharged his duties. candidate has discharged his duties.

To determine, however, in each case as to who is the proper superior officer to give the certifi-cate is not always easy, or even practicable. For instance, in the case of an employee of one of the bureaus of the Law Department, the rule would require a certificate from the head of the bureau. With most of those employed in the office of the Counsel to the Corporation, however, I would be utterly at a loss to determine, under the rule as it now stands, who were their "immediate official superiors." With regard to the police force I am perhaps not sufficiently informed as to its organizasuperiors." With regard to the police force I am perhaps not sufficiently informed as to its organiza-tion and discipline to determine the question accurately. In the case proposed, viz., that of a sergeant, the captain of the precinct company, or other body in which he had served, would seem to be the proper one. In the case of a patrolman I do not know whether his duties are performed in any permanently organized body smaller than the precinct force and commanded by some officer of lower rank than the captain. Neither am I aware whether any single sergeant continuously holds towards all the precinct force the position which the first, or orderly, sergeant continuously company does towards the privates therein. If there is no permanent unit of organization smaller than the precinct company, and if there is no orderly sergeant, the captain would no doubt be the immediate superior (within the meaning of the rule) of all the roundsmen and patrolmen in his precinct. In the case of a captain seeking promotion his immediate superior would probably be the inspector in whose inspection district his precinct was permanently included. If, however, there was no permanent distribution of the precincts into inspection districts, the superior would be the efficiency or officers whose official relations with the captain have been the closest, and therefore best calcu-lated to enable such officer or officers to certify at first hand as to his efficiency, etc. or officers whose official relations with the captain have been the closest, and therefore best calcu-lated to enable such officer or officers to certify at first hand as to his efficiency, etc. You will readily perceive that the precise question propounded in your letter can only be answered by persons familiar with the organization of the police force in all its details. I therefore advise that whenever a specific case arises the Board apply the rule as above interpreted. If there is no difficulty in the application the question is answered. If it is found difficult or impracticable to apply the rule to the case in hand the subject should be brought to the attention of the Mayor, whose function it is (with the approval of the Civil Service Commission) to modify the regulations, with a request that Regulation 53 be made more definite and certain.

SIR—I beg to acknowledge your letter of the 6th instant, in which I am requested to furnish your Board an opinion as to what evidence is necessary to secure a conviction for pool-selling. The inquiry, I apprehend, is prompted by the matters referred to in the two enclosures contained in your letter, being (1) a communication addressed to the Board of Police by Superintendent Murray, dated October 5, 1885, and (2) a report made to Superintendent Murray by Captain Webb of the Fourth Precinct, in regard to certain arrests made by him of persons engaged in selling pools. From these papers it appears that on the 2d and 3d instant, certain officers attached to Captain Webb's command arrested one John B. Corrigan, one Thomas McDonnell and one Christian Miller, on the ground that each of these individuals had at different places within the precinct sold for cash to the officer making the arrest a pool-ticket upon a horse about to run in a certain race ; and that upon the prisoners being brought before the police magistrate, Mr. Justice Murray, they were by him discharged, he "deciding that the purchase of a pool-ticket was not legal evidence unless "the purchasers aw the horse run in a horse race."
The prisoners apparently were arrested under the provisions of chapter 178 of the Laws of 1877, now to be found re-enacted in section 351 of the Penal Code.
I have read that statute carefully, with the result that I cannot concur in the reported opinion of Mr. Justice Murray, that to secure a conviction under the law there must be, besides the proof of the purchase of a pool-ticket, proof of the actual running of the race upon the result of which the pool was sold.
It seems to up that the act intended to be prohibited by the statute is the selling, of pools : that

was sold.

was sold. It seems to me that the act intended to be prohibited by the statute is the selling of pools; that they are sold upon the result of a race would seem to be essential to the selling of pools at all. They can be sold upon no other theory. I think, therefore, that the proof of a purchase of appool-ticket makes out, to say the least, a prima facie case against the accused under the statute. I am not aware of any reported decisions on this question, so I only express my personal opinion. I have, however, made inquiry at the office of the District Attorney, and am informed that his view of the law coincides with my own. I am, sir, Respectfully yours, E. SIR—There were 543 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, October 3, 1885, which is a decrease of 57, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 66 less than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1884. The actual mortality for the week ending September 26, 1885, was 582, which is 37.2 below the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 21.47 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,409,325.


