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## MAYOR'S COMMITTEE ON LIBERTY LOAN.

### SUBSCRIPTIONS BY CITY AND COUNTY OFFICIALS AND EMPLOYEES.

#### STANDING OF THE CITY AND COUNTY DEPARTMENTS.

The figures below are based upon subscriptions received up to 2 o'clock P. M. yesterday at the Comptroller's office, Room 851, Municipal Building, having been in the first instance turned in to the heads of the respective departments and by them transmitted to the Comptroller, as the Chairman of the Mayor's Committee. The Comptroller files a summary statement daily with the Commissioner of Accounts, as Chairman of the Executive Committee of the Mayor's Committee, and the latter calculates the departmental percentages upon the basis of one \$50 bond to the total payroll of each department, as provided in the 1917 budget, thereby fixing the base percentage for each department. In the interest of fairness the smaller boards, commissions, etc., have been grouped together for scoring purposes. Similarly certain county offices of each county have likewise been combined.

## COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

**Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at a Meeting Held in Room 16, City Hall, at 11 o'clock A. M., on Thursday, May 24, 1917.**

Present at Roll Call—Frank L. Dowling, President, Board of Aldermen; Albert E. Hadlock, Deputy and Acting Comptroller; Milo R. Maltbie, Chamberlain; Francis P. Kenney, Chairman, Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen.

His Honor the Mayor arrived later—see note.

### Dock Department—New Plan for Improvement of the Waterfront in the Vicinity of Conover St., Brooklyn.

The Chair called for a public hearing in the matter of the proposed plan for abolishing the new plan adopted by the Commissioner of Docks April 19, 1912, and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund May 22, 1912, in the vicinity of Conover st., Brooklyn, made and adopted by the Commissioner of Docks in accordance with law May 1, 1917.

Affidavit as to publication of notice of hearing in the CITY RECORD on file with the papers.

The following was received from the Commissioner of Docks:

Pier A, North River, May 1, 1917.

Hon. JOHN PURROY MITCHEL, Mayor, and Chairman of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Sir—I am transmitting herewith, with a recommendation for adoption, proposed plan with technical description for abolishing the "New Plan" adopted by the Commissioner of Docks April 19, 1912, and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund May 22, 1912, in the vicinity of Conover Street, Borough of Brooklyn. The action of the Sinking Fund recommended consists in:

First—Abolishing the marginal street, wharf or place extending west of the center line of Conover street a distance of about 224.42 feet, measured along the westerly prolongation of the southerly side of Reid Street from the center line of Conover street.

Second—Abolishing the proposed bulkhead line along the outshore side of said marginal street, wharf or place.

Third—The abolishing of two piers, all as shown on the above mentioned "New Plan."

The property affected by these changes is privately owned. The plan of April 19, 1912, approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund May 22, 1912, was proposed by my predecessor in office for the purpose of fixing the present physical status in the expectation that the City would acquire the property as a portion of the site for float bridges. This site I recommended be abandoned for that purpose on account of its proximity to the entrance to Buttermilk Channel. Such use would have meant congestion at that point, with resultant danger to navigation. The "New Plan" now imposed upon the property makes it impossible for the private owners to improve it for commercial purposes. I am in receipt of an application from William R. Grace & Company, the owners of the property, calling for the construction of a pier and bulkheads, and as a preliminary to granting a permit for the erection of the same it is necessary that the present "New Plan" should be removed.

No one appearing for or against the proposition, the Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution:

May 16, 1917.

To the Honorable Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—On May 1, 1917, the Commissioner of Docks adopted and recommended for approval a new plan for the waterfront improvement, abolishing the plan adopted by the Commissioner of Docks on April 19, 1912, and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on May 22, 1912, in the vicinity of Conover Street, Borough of Brooklyn.

The property affected is privately owned, and the layout adopted in 1912 was for the purpose of fixing the present physical condition of the water front in the expectation that the City would acquire the property as a portion of the site for float bridges.

The property has not been acquired by the City, and the site has been abandoned for float bridges on account of its proximity to the entrance to Buttermilk Channel, causing congestion at that point with resultant danger to navigation.

William R. Grace & Company, the owners of the property, having made application to improve the property for commercial purposes, with the "new plan" now imposed upon the property said improvements cannot be made until the plans as adopted in 1912 are abolished. In order that the Commissioner of Docks may be in a position to grant the application to improve the property for commercial purposes, I recommend, if the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approve the request, at the public hearing to be held, the adoption of the attached resolution.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve the new plan and layout for improving the water front and harbor of the City of New York by abolishing the "New Plan" adopted by the Commissioner of Docks on April 19, 1912, and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on May 22, 1912, in the vicinity of Conover Street, Borough of Brooklyn, adopted by the Commissioner of Docks on May 1, 1917, in accordance with law.

The report was accepted and the resolution adopted, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

### Dock Department—New Plan for Improvement of the Waterfront Between Canal St., Stapleton, and Maple Ave., Clifton, Richmond.

The Chair called for a public hearing in the matter of the plan for improvement of the water-front and harbor of The City of New York, between Canal st., Stapleton, and Maple ave., Clifton, Richmond, made and adopted by the Commissioner of Docks in accordance with law May 13, 1917.

The following was received from the Commissioner of Docks:

May 3, 1917.

Hon. JOHN PURROY MITCHEL, Mayor and Chairman of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Sir—I transmit herewith print and tracing, together with technical description, of proposed New Plan for the improvement of the harbor and water-front of the City of New York between Canal Street and a point between Maple Avenue and Sylvaton Terrace, extended, Borough of Richmond.

This New Plan has this day been adopted by me and is respectfully submitted with the request that it be approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

Mr. Edward L. Baylies, representing the Atlantic Mutual Insurance Company, was heard in regard to the matter and called attention to certain alleged inequities in the proposed plan.

The following were heard in opposition to the proposed plan.

Mr. Robert N. Neilson, representing the Staten Island Railway Company and the Staten Island Rapid Transit Company; Mr. John G. Clark, representing certain property owners; Mr. Jayberg in person, and Mr. Walter H. Merritt, representing the Atlantic Mutual Insurance Co.

After discussion, in which representations were made that the Commissioner of Docks had not given proper consideration to the rights of interested property owners, the Commissioner of Docks withdrew the plan from the consideration of the Board.

### Dock Department—New Plan for Improvement of the Waterfront in the Vicinity of Dyckman St., North River.

The Chair called for a continuation of the public hearing had at the last meeting May 17, 1917, in the matter of the new plan for improvement of the water-front and harbor of the City of New York in the vicinity of Dyckman st., North River, made and adopted by the Commissioner of Docks in accordance with law April 10, 1917, and transmitted to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for approval.

On motion, the hearing was again adjourned, to be continued at 11 o'clock in the forenoon on Thursday, May 31, 1917.

### Dock Department—Proposed Lease to the Vermont Hygeia Ice Company of Certain Land Under Water South of Dyckman St., Harlem River.

At the last meeting, May 17, 1917, the Committee to which this matter was referred, presented a form of lease and bond for the consideration of the Board.

Mr. Cyrus C. Miller, attorney for the Vermont Hygeia Ice Company, requested that the matter be laid over for one week in order that he may have an opportunity to take the matter up with the committee.

On motion, the matter was laid over until the next meeting.

### Health Department—Amendment to Resolution Authorizing a Lease for, of Premises at 95 Suffolk St., Manhattan.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution:

May 21, 1917.

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—On March 29, 1917, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopted a resolution authorizing a lease to the City from the Loretta Corporation of the single store and room on the southerly side of the first or street floor of the premises at No. 95 Suffolk Street, Borough of Manhattan, for use of the Department of Health, for a period of two years from April 15, 1917, with the privilege of renewal for a further term of two years upon the same terms and conditions, at an annual rental of \$456; the lessee to furnish heat, light and janitor service; the lessor to pay taxes and water rates and make certain repairs and alterations as mentioned in said resolution.

I am in receipt of a communication from the lessors, dated May 9, 1917, requesting that an additional clause be inserted in said lease providing that the lease shall be subject and subordinate in lien to any mortgages now on record or hereafter to be placed on record, not to exceed the sum of \$30,000, which request I deem to be reasonable.

I therefore respectfully recommend that the resolution adopted on March 29, 1917, and hereinbefore referred to, be amended by adding the following clause: "The lease to be subject and subordinate in lien to any mortgages now on record, or hereafter to be placed on record, not to exceed the sum of \$30,000."

Resolved, That the resolution adopted by this Board at meeting held March 29, 1917, authorizing a lease to the City of the single store and room on the southerly side of the first or street floor of the premises No. 95 Suffolk Street, Borough of Manhattan, for use of the Department of Health, for a period of two years from April 15, 1917, with the privilege of renewal for a further term of two years upon the same terms and conditions, at an annual rental of \$456; the lessee to furnish heat, light and janitor service; the lessor to pay taxes and water rates and make certain repairs and alterations as outlined in the resolution.

—be and the same is hereby amended by adding the following clause: "The lease to be subject and subordinate in lien to any mortgages now on record, or hereafter to be placed on record, not to exceed the sum of thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000)."

The report was accepted and the resolution adopted, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

### President, Borough of The Bronx—Renewal of Lease for, of a Strip of Land at 202nd St. and Webster Ave., Bronx.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution:

May 18, 1917.

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—The President of the Borough of The Bronx, in a communication to your Board under date of April 19, 1917, requests a renewal of the lease of the irregular plot of ground south of 202nd Street, between Webster Avenue and the tracks of the Harlem Division of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad, used for storage purposes, for a period of one year from June 1, 1917, at a rental of \$150 a year, and otherwise upon the same terms and conditions as contained in the existing lease.

The Comptroller, in a communication to your Board under date of April 27, 1916, recommended a renewal of this lease for a period of one year from June 1, 1916, at a rental of \$150 a year, the same as now asked, and said report was approved and renewal authorized at a meeting of your Board held May 4, 1916.

I therefore respectfully recommend, the rent being reasonable and just under the circumstances, and the same as previously paid, that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution authorizing a renewal of the lease to the City for use of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, of a strip of land described as follows:

Beginning on the westerly line of the irregular plot known on the tax books as Lot 14, Block 3330, Section 12, Borough of The Bronx, adjoining the property of the Jerome Park Railway Company, at a point 200 feet southerly from the southerly line of Webster Avenue; running thence easterly at right angles to the line between the property of the lessor and the Jerome Park Railway Company 10 feet; thence southerly parallel with said dividing line between the lands of the lessor and the Jerome Park Railway Company 100 feet; thence westerly at right angles to the above mentioned dividing line 10 feet; thence northerly along said dividing line 100 feet to the point or place of beginning, be the said dimensions more or less.

—said lease to be for a period of one year from June 1, 1917, at a rental of \$150 a year, payable quarterly; the lessee to have the right of ingress and egress for horses, vehicles and employees of the City over the lands of the lessors between Webster Avenue and the demised premises; the lessee to have the right to remove from the leased premises all improvements placed thereon at the termination of this lease or any renewal thereof, otherwise upon the same terms and conditions as contained in the existing lease. Lessors, George B. Raymond and Ferdinand V. Morrison.

Respectfully, ALBERT E. HADLOCK, Deputy and Acting Comptroller.

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized and directed to execute a renewal of the lease to the City, for use of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, of a strip of land described as follows:

Beginning on the westerly line of the irregular plot known on the tax books as Lot 14, Block 3330, Section 12, Borough of The Bronx, adjoining the property of the Jerome Park Railway Company, at a point 200 feet southerly from the southerly line of Webster Avenue; running thence easterly at right angles to the line between the property of the lessor and the Jerome Park Railway Company 10 feet; thence southerly parallel with said dividing line between the lands of the lessor and the Jerome Park Railway Company 100 feet; thence westerly at right angles to the above mentioned dividing line 10 feet; thence northerly along said dividing line 100 feet to the point or place of beginning, be the said dimensions more or less.

—for a period of one year from June 1, 1917, at a rental of one hundred and fifty dollars (\$150) a year, payable quarterly; the lessee to have the right of ingress and egress for horses, vehicles and employees of the City over the lands of the lessors between Webster Avenue and the demised premises; the lessee to have the right to remove from the leased premises all improvements placed thereon at the termination of this lease or any renewal thereof, otherwise upon the same terms and conditions as contained in the existing lease. Lessors, George B. Raymond and Ferdinand V.



Morrison; the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the said rent fair and reasonable and that it would be for the interests of the City that such lease be made.

The report was accepted and the resolution adopted, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

**President, Borough of Queens—Renewal of Lease for, of Premises 133 Seventh St., L. I. City, Queens.**

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution:

Gentlemen—At a meeting of your Board held May 17, 1917, there was presented a communication from the Armory Board, requesting the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to rent for a period of one week, at the rate of \$750 per week, the premises known as the Harlem River Casino, located on Second Avenue, East 126th and East 127th Streets, in the Borough of Manhattan, the purpose being the mobilization of the Fifteenth Infantry, N. G. N. Y., the commanding officer having been ordered to prepare and provide suitable quarters for the men, horses, etc., of said regiment.

#### First District Magistrates Court—Renewal of Lease for, of Premises at 115-117 Fifth St., L. I. City.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution:

*To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, City of New York:*

Gentlemen—The Chief City Magistrate in a communication to your Board under date of May 21, 1917, requests a renewal of the lease of premises occupied by the 1st District Magistrates' Court at No. 115 Fifth Street, Long Island City, for a period of one year from June 1, 1917.

The Comptroller, in a communication to your Board under date of May 16, 1913, recommended a lease of these premises for a period of five years from June 1, 1912, at an annual rental of \$1,500, the same as now asked, and said report was approved and lease authorized at a meeting of your Board held May 21, 1913.

Deeming the rent reasonable and just, and it being the same as previously paid, I respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution authorizing a renewal of the lease of rooms Nos. 1, 2, 3, 4, 6, 7 and 8 on the second floor of the premises known as the St. Mary's Lyceum Building, Nos. 115-117 Fifth Street, Long Island City, Borough of Queens, occupied by the First District Magistrates' Court, for a term of one year from June 1, 1917, at an annual rental

of \$1,500, payable quarterly; the lessor to pay taxes and water rates, supply light and make outside repairs; the lessee to furnish heat and janitor service and make such interior alterations and repairs as it may deem necessary; otherwise upon the same terms and conditions as contained in the existing lease. Lessor, Reverend William J. Dunne, 118 Fifth Street, Long Island City, Borough of Queens.

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized and directed to execute a renewal of the lease to the City of Rooms 1, 2, 3, 4, 6, 7 and 8, on the second floor of the premises known as the St. Mary's Lyceum Building, Nos. 115-117 Fifth Street, Long Island City, Borough of Queens, for use of the First District Magistrate's Court, for a term of one year from June 1, 1917, at an annual rental of fifteen hundred dollars (\$1,500), payable quarterly, the lessor to pay taxes and water rates, supply light and make outside repairs; the lessee to furnish heat and janitor service and make such interior alterations and repairs as contained in the existing lease; lessor, Rev. William J. Dunne; the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the said rent fair and reasonable and that it would be for the interests of the City that such lease be made.

The report was accepted and the resolution adopted, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

#### The following matters not on the calendar were considered by unanimous consent:

#### Dock Department—Issue of \$120,000 of Corporate Stock for Improvements at the New Pier Foot of W. 46th St., North River, Manhattan, Recommended to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

The following was received from the Commissioner of Docks:

Pier A, North River, April 25, 1917.

Hon. JOHN PURROY MITCHEL, Mayor, and Chairman of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Sir—In connection with the work of completing the pier at the foot of West 46th street, North River, Borough of Manhattan, this Department has prepared a contract calling for the installation of a double set of offices and waiting rooms, with a common heating plant, four passenger elevators, freight elevators and freight conveyors and two baggage conveyors. The work has been divided into three classes, each class to form a separate contract, as follows:

Class 1. Enclosures and equipment; estimated cost.....	\$106,000 00
Class 2. Heating; estimated cost .....	9,000 00
Class 3. Plumbing; estimated cost .....	5,000 00

Total estimated cost ..... \$120,000 00

I request that a resolution be adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund recommending to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that the Comptroller be authorized to issue Corporate Stock in the sum of \$120,000, the proceeds whereof to be used by this Department in carrying on the work outlined above.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment has today been notified of this request. Yours respectfully, R. A. C. SMITH, Commissioner of Docks.

In connection therewith the Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report of the Corporate Stock Budget Committee; and offered the following resolution:

May 2, 1917.

*To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:*

Gentlemen—On April 27, 1917, you referred to the Committee on Corporate Stock Budget a communication from the Commissioner of Docks, dated April 25, 1917, requesting \$120,000 corporate stock to provide means for installing a double set of offices and waiting rooms with heating plant, passenger elevators, freight elevators and freight and baggage conveyors, at the new pier, foot of West 46th street, North River, Manhattan.

The Bureau of Contract Supervision, to which the request was referred on April 27, 1917, reports thereon as follows:

"Corporate stock has been provided to the extent of \$1,652,500 for the construction of the new 1,000-foot pier at the foot of West 46th Street, exclusive of the acquisition of property. There now remains an unencumbered balance of \$89,624.46 in the several funds, all of which will be required to complete the pier and shed proper and do necessary dredging for which a part of the said balance was originally provided.

"In the opinion of the engineers in charge of the work the pier and shed will be completed and ready for occupancy during the present year.

"The work for which the amount now requested is needed consists of the installation of a double set of offices and waiting rooms, one on the north and one on the south side of the pier at the inshore end; a heating plant, common to both sets of offices; four passenger elevators and two baggage conveyors; four freight elevators and four freight conveyors.

"The layout of offices and equipment, as shown on a tentative plan submitted by the Department of Docks and Ferries, is in accordance with requirements should the pier be leased to one company or temporarily to more than one, as well as if held open as a marine terminal for any large ships that may want to use it. The pier is 150 feet wide, and if leased to two companies a partition might be constructed longitudinally in the center, in which case there would be a set of offices suitably located for each company, or, if the entire pier were leased to one company, the arrangement of offices and equipment would be equally suitable and not greater than would be needed.

"The estimate of cost is based on items of work necessary and current prices for labor and materials. The estimate is not excessive, and the work is necessary to complete the pier."

We recommend the adoption of the attached resolution, which will recommend to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment the authorization of \$120,000 corporate stock for the purpose stated. Respectfully,

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 180 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby recommend to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that the Comptroller be authorized to issue corporate stock of The City of New York in the manner provided by section 169 of the Charter to an amount not exceeding one hundred and twenty thousand dollars (\$120,000), the proceeds to the par value thereof to be used by the Department of Docks and Ferries for the construction and installation of enclosures, offices and other work and equipment in connection with the completion of the pier at the foot of West 46th Street, North River, Borough of Manhattan.

The report was accepted and the resolution adopted, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

#### Armory Board—Approval of Specifications and Estimate of Cost for Desks, Furniture, Equipment and Lighting Fixtures at the New 8th Coast Defense Command Armory.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution:

May 23, 1917.

*To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:*

Gentlemen—On May 3rd, 1917, the Armory Board adopted a resolution, as follows:

"Whereas, The Bureau of Contract Supervision, under date of April 18, 1917, reported to the Armory Board its modifications of the specifications for furnishing and equipping the new 8th Coast Defense Command armory, Jerome avenue and Kingsbridge road, Borough of The Bronx, i. e., Items 1B, Steel Furniture; 1C, Wood Furniture; No. 2, Floor Coverings, etc., and No. 4, Kitchen and Mess Hall Equipment; and

"Whereas, The architects, Messrs. Pilcher and Tachau, have now revised the drawings and specifications for said items in accordance with the recommendations of the Bureau of Contract Supervision; therefore be it

"Resolved, That the drawings and specifications, as modified by the architects, for furnishing and equipping the new 8th Coast Defense Command Armory, Jerome avenue and Kingsbridge road, as follows:

Item 1B, Wood desks, cases, shelves, etc.



Item 1C, Standard Furniture.  
Item No. 2, Floor Coverings.  
Item No. 4, Kitchen and Mess Hall Equipment.  
"—he and are hereby approved by the Armory Board, and that the Secretary of the Board be and is hereby directed to forward the same to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for their approval, and, when so approved by said Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Secretary be and is hereby directed to advertise for bids for said Items."

On September 1, 1916, bids were received for the completion of the new Eighth Regiment Armory. Bids for certain items of work to be performed were in some instances far in excess of the estimates of cost approved by your Commission on July 13, 1916, and were rejected by the Armory Board. The rejected items were as follows:

No. 1B, steel furniture; No. 1C, wood furniture; No. 2, floor coverings; No. 3, miscellaneous items; No. 4, kitchen equipment.

The sum available was insufficient to purchase all of the equipment scheduled under these items, but much of it should be provided in order that the new armory may be made ready for immediate occupancy.

Item 1B.

The plans and specifications for this item, which consists principally of desks, now provided for the substitution of wood furniture for all of the originally recommended steel furniture.

Item 1C.

The following items of furniture formerly included under this heading are not necessary at this time and have been eliminated from the plans and specifications:

C23, opera chairs; C27, 184 arm chairs at \$13.50; C11, 54 arm chairs at \$50; C26, 36 arm chairs at \$16.50; B1, 348 bookcase units; B1, 93 bookcase tops; B1, 93 bookcase bases; B1, 60 bookcase units, mahogany; B1, 15 bookcase tops; B1, 15 bookcase bases; S3, 16 settees; C2, 70 armchairs at \$11.50; mirrors; A5, 284 brass cuspidors; R14, 80 coat racks.

Except for this change, the plans and specifications are the same as those approved by your Board on July 13, 1916.

Item No. 2.

It was contemplated to retain only the linoleum in this item. The price of linoleum, however, has increased very materially since the specification was originally submitted and it is deemed advisable at this time to eliminate it as well as all the other articles included in this item.

Item No. 3.

Due to the lack of absolute present necessity for the items included herein, it has been agreed to eliminate them.

Item No. 4.

The plans and specifications, as revised, are identical with those approved by your Board on July 13, 1916, with the exception of all the laundry machinery. This machinery is to be procured from another source and these items may be permanently eliminated.

Lighting Fixtures.

These plans and specifications have not heretofore been submitted to your Board. They provide for furnishing of all labor and materials required for the installation of 1,361 lighting fixtures of various types, together with their shades, globes, reflectors and the necessary wiring and connections to place them in serviceable condition, also the making of certain minor changes and alterations in the conduits, and location of outlets, which additional work was not contemplated when the original contract was proposed and which will cost approximately \$250.

The types of fixtures proposed are suitable and recommended without alteration.

The number of fixtures of each type required, together with a detailed estimate of cost, follows:

The plans and specifications are satisfactory and have been approved by the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity. Owing to the continuing increase in the cost of the materials in the fixtures, it is recommended that the sum of \$15,000 be approved as the estimate of cost.

The equipment and the work specified are necessary in order to prepare the new armory for immediate occupancy, and the contract should be advertised as soon as possible, so that deliveries may be completed at an early date.

The report was accepted and the resolution adopted, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

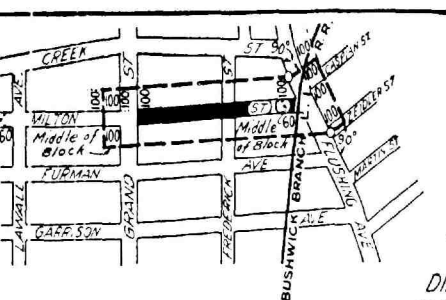

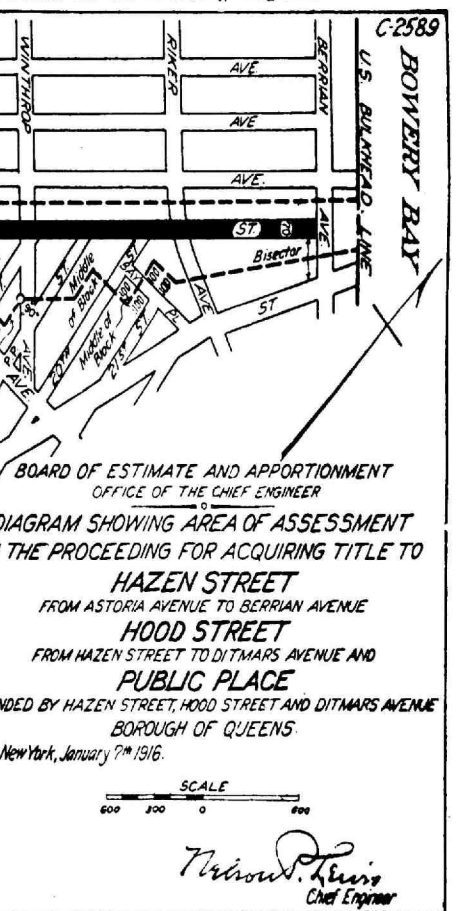

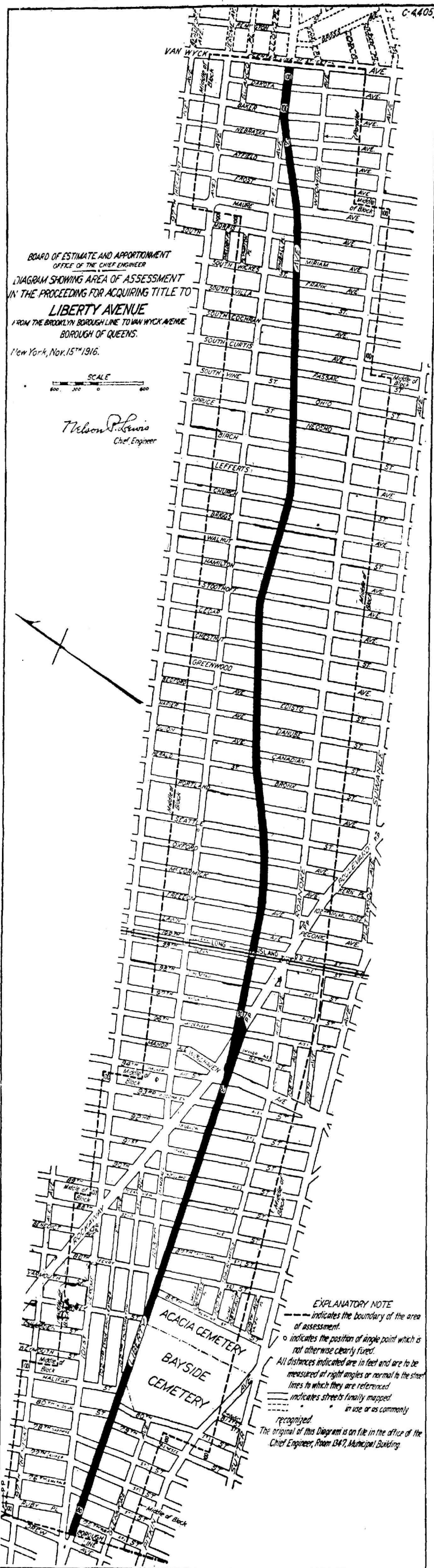

#### NOTICE TO BIDDERS AT SALES OF OLD BUILDINGS, ETC.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 will be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances, between the time of the sale thereof and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly vacated of all tenants. All the material of the buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations, and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area, shall be torn down and removed from the premises. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street and the openings of the main sewer in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS ON WORK TO BE DONE FOR, OR SUPPLIES TO BE FURNISHED TO THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

The person or persons making a bid for any service, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or officers, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the bids will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making a bid for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer or employee of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the bid that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true.

No bid will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of such bid, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of The City of New York, or a trust company of The City of New York, or a check of such bank or trust company signed by a duly authorized officer thereof, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

All bids for supplies must be submitted in duplicate.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids in addition to inserting the same in figures.
