NYC EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT'S LATEST 'PREP TALK' PODCAST FOCUSES ON GEOGRAPHIC INFORMATION SYSTEMS

August 13, 2019 — Not sure where your hurricane evacuation zone is located? There's a map for that. On the latest episode of "Prep Talk," Josh Friedman, executive director of Geographic Information Systems (GIS) at NYC Emergency Management, discusses the utility of GIS mapping in the emergency management field. He shared his insight into how experts use mapping for situational awareness before, during and after emergencies, as well as how everyday New Yorkers utilize mapping during their daily lives.

During the episode, Friedman highlights the City's hurricane evacuation zone finder, a GIS mapping tool that allows New Yorkers to access information about the hazards associated with living in a hurricane evacuation zone and the resources available in the event of an evacuation order. The tool is a resource to help New Yorkers prepare for coastal storms particularly during the Atlantic hurricane season. "We really want to use GIS and the data we have available to us to encourage people to prepare in advance," **Friedman** said.
