PROCLAMATION.

MAYOR'S OFFICE,
NEW YORK, Feb. 6, 1874.

Whereas, Nicholas Ryan and his sister Mary Ryan were found dead at their residence, No. 204 Broome street, on the 20th December last, and whereas the coroner's jury, from the facts elicited during the inquest, were unable to determine the manner of their death; and

Whereas, from such an examination of the case as I have been enabled to make, I am of the opinion that the said Nicholas and Mary Ryan were brutally murdered, at the time and place above stated, now,

I, WILLIAM F. HAVEMEYER, Mayor of the City of New York, do hereby offer a reward of one thousand dollars for the discovery and conviction of the party or parties who may have committed the deed, the said reward to be paid on the conviction of the said party or parties, and the certificate of the District Attorney that such conviction was had upon the testimony of the person or persons claiming the reward. But all claims not presented to the Mayor within twenty days after such conviction shall be disregarded.

AN ORDINANCE to prohibit the use of snow ploughs, by stage companies, in the streets of the City of New York.

The Mayor, Aldermen, Commonalty of the City of New York, in Common Council convened, do ordain, as follows:

Section 1. It shall not be lawful for any or either of the stage companies, or proprietors, within the limits of the City of New York, or their officers, agents, or servants to cause or allow any snow-plough to pass over the streets used by them within the said limits.

Section 2. Any of the companies or proprietors who shall violate the provisions of the above section, shall be punished by a fine not exceeding one hundred dollars for each offence, and the officers, agents or servants of such company, or proprietor, who shall violate the said provisions, shall be punished by a fine not exceeding one hundred dollars for each offence, and the same shall be recovered at law by an action to be commenced by the Corporation Attorney, on behalf of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York.

Section 3. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Section 4. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

REPORT:

That they have personally examined the building referred to, and the Committee find the work under progress and partly finished or completed. The building is enclosed with a brick wall 28 feet high, the inner construction is of frame work 35 feet high at the highest point, and the roof is to be covered with felt and gravel; the seats will cover a space about 50 feet all around the block, except the openings for entrances and egress, leaving a space in the centre of 140 feet by 340 feet of an opening for the performances and garden grounds. There is to be 12 or 14 large doors for egress in case of fire or a panic. The proprietors informed the Committee that there is no fire or heaters to be used in the building; gas is to be used, and all the woodwork near the gas-burners is to be covered with tin. There is to be hydrants placed in various parts of the building, and sufficient quantity of hose near at hand in case of fire.

Your Committee are therefore of the opinion that the building is perfectly safe from fire, and much better chances in case of a panic for egress than any other places of amusements.

And your Committee are further of the opinion that they have no jurisdiction in the matter. They therefore respectfully asked to be discharged

from further consideration, and that the resolution be placed on file.
