SIR—The Board of Assessors herewith submit their Quarterly Report ending March 31st. The inclosed summary, and the accompanying Schedules "A," "B," and "C," show the number of assessment lists, with the total cost of the work, received in this office, and passed upon by the Board for the quarter ending March 31, 1877.

From these statements it will be seen that of the 125 lists 47 were made up by the apportionment of the several amounts on the property benefited, leaving 78 lists still in this office on the 1st of April. Of these 78, there have been 20 additional made up, and are now advertised in the CITY RECORD, according to law, by the provisions of which they remain in the office of the Board of Assessors till the expiration of thirty days after their first publication in the above paper.

Large sea-going vessels, capable of going out to sea in any weather, freighted with the city's refuse, and depositing it in the Atlantic ocean, is also favorably entertained, and will probably be found, upon trial, to answer every requirement.
