AN ORDINANCE to amend section 205 of article XVIII. of chapter 8 of the Revised Ordinances of

The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York do ordain as follows:

Section 1. Section 205 of article XVIII. of chapter 8 of the Revised Ordinances of 1880 is hereby amended by adding at the end thereof the following words: "But horses drawing post-office vans, wagons or other vehicles in which mail matter intrusted to the United States authorities

office vans, wagons or other vehicles in which mail matter intrusted to the United States authorities for transmission and transportation may be driven through the streets, avenues and thoroughfares of the City of New York south of One Hundred and Tenth street at a rate of speed not to exceed seven miles an hour," so that said section when so amended shall read as follows:

Sec. 205. No person shall ride or drive any horse or horses in the City of New York south of One Hundred and Tenth street with greater speed than at the rate of five miles an hour, or north of One Hundred and Tenth street with greater speed than at the rate of twelve miles an hour, under the penalty of ten dollars for each offense, to be recovered from the owner or driver thereof, severally and respectively. But horses drawing post-office vans, wagons or other vehicles in which mail matter intrusted to the United States authorities for transmission and transportation may be driven through the streets, avenues and thoroughfares of the City of New York south of One Hundred and Tenth street at a rate of speed not to exceed seven miles an hour.

Sec. 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed. Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.
