BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT,
NEW YORK, November 5, 1900.

To the Municipal Assembly of the City of New York:

GENTLEMEN—At a meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, held October 30, 1900, the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the Secretary of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and hereby is directed to transmit the budget for the year 1901 to the Municipal Assembly within ten days, as provided by section 226 of the Greater New York Charter.

In pursuance of said resolution, I hereby respectfully transmit the budget for the year 1901, as adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment October 30, 1900.

BUDGET FOR 1901.

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 226 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, by the affirmative vote of all the members thereof, makes this the Budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and one, being: First, the amounts estimated to be required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business of said city for the said year; secondly, the amounts estimated to be required to pay the State taxes and charges and expenses of the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, for the said year, and, thirdly, the amount audited pursuant to the provisions of chapter 525 of the Laws of 1897, and which, according to the provisions of said act, is to be raised by taxation levied upon the taxable property in the Thirty-second Ward of the Borough of Brooklyn, amounting in the aggregate to the sum of ninety-eight million one hundred thousand four hundred and thirteen dollars and forty-three cents (\$98,100,413.43).

CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS.

All such appropriations being made subject to the following conditions:
1. The accounts of all charitable institutions receiving public moneys shall be kept as to show the receipts of and disbursements from public moneys separately from the other funds of such institutions, and all institutions shall keep an exact record, to be corrected from time to time, in a form to be approved by the Comptroller, showing the addresses of the parents, guardians, or nearest relatives of inmates, and other information designed to facilitate inquiry into their financial ability to provide for such inmates.

3. Moneys received from the City Treasury shall be used by such institutions only for recurring expenses of "care, support and maintenance."

4. All institutions receiving public moneys shall be at all reasonable times open to the visitation and inspection of duly authorized representatives of the Department of Public Charities and the Department of Finance.

5. Upon it appearing to the satisfaction of the Comptroller that it would be to the public interest to withhold payments to any charitable institution for which an appropriation has been made, he shall give written notice to such institution of his intention to apply to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for authority to so withhold such payments, and upon the determination of said Board that such payments should terminate, the right of any such institution to receive payment for services rendered thereafter shall thereupon cease.

6. Except where appropriations are made in bulk and not upon a per capita basis, no payment shall be made for inmates of private charitable institutions unless the same shall have been accepted by the proper Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities as a proper charge against the City, and, except in emergency cases, Commissioners of Charities shall not accept as proper charges against the City inmates capable of paying for their own support or for whose care adequate provision can be made in public institutions. The City shall not become liable for any payment to a charitable institution in excess of the appropriation which may have been made to such institution, notwithstanding any per capita rates of payment that may have been fixed for the inmates thereof.

SIR—In reply to the action taken by the Board of Public Improvements referring for report a communication from the Commissioner of Highways, recommending that steps be taken to abolish the grade crossing over the tracks of the New York and Harlem and the New York and New Haven railroads at East Two Hundred and Thirty-third street, Borough of The Bronx, I have to state as follows:

East Two Hundred and Thirty-third street was laid out on section 19 of the Final Maps, filed in the Register's office December 17, 1895, and the grades established show that it was intended to construct an overgrade crossing.

This was done prior to the Grade Crossing Law, chapter 754 of the Laws of 1897, and it seems to me that the consent or decision of the State Railroad Commissioners is not necessary in this case. The Corporation Counsel in his letter of July 17, 1900, to the Commissioner of Highways, does not mention the fact that, under chapter 349 of the Laws of 1890, the overhead crossing was already established, and chapter 754 of the Laws of 1897 does not seem to be retrospective.

East Two Hundred and Thirty-third street, west of the Bronx river, was laid out 80 feet in width, and its eastern continuation (formerly Nineteenth street) is laid out 100 feet in width, and in order to give better access to the high ground east of the Bronx river I have prepared a sketch showing a viaduct from the Bronx river, to Second street, by which the heavy grade from the Bronx river can be avoided. The continuation of the viaduct will necessitate a widening of East Two Hundred and Thirty-third street, from the Bronx river to Second street, and since the Local Board of the Borough of The Bronx passed a resolution for the legal opening of East Two Hundred and Thirty-third street (or Nineteenth street), from the Bronx river to the Pelham Park, it becomes necessary that the matter whether such viaduct shall be built or not is determined.

I inclose the necessary plan and return the papers in the matter.

The estimated cost of a telford macadam pavement on Mount Hope place, between Jerome avenue and Anthony avenue, including maintenance for a period of six months, is \$10,000, and the assessed value of the real estate within the probable area of assessment is \$228,200.

DEAR SIR—Messrs. Thiemann & Smith, contractors, have applied to this Department for the cancellation of four hundred and seven days' overtime under their contract for regulating and grading One Hundred and Eighty-first street, from Kingsbridge road to Boulevard Lafayette, Borough of Manhattan.

The cancellation of this overtime is asked for on the ground that the contractors were delayed for a period equal to the overtime by the suspension of their work pending the debt limit question, by the construction of a sewer on Boulevard Lafayette, by the laying of water-mains and damage caused by breaks and leaks, by the erection of telephone poles and making repairs to damage done by the stoppage of hauling on Boulevard Lafayette, the only public road leading to the place at which surplus material could be deposited, and by buildings on the line of the street not having been removed.

I have made a thorough investigation, and after giving the matter careful consideration in all its bearings, I have come to the conclusion that the contractors have been delayed in the prosecution of the work under their contract as follows:
