Communications Received.

From the Mayor—Transmitting copy of the circular letter sent to heads of departments in regard to provisions of chapter 675, Laws of 1907, relating to duties of the Municipal Art Commission. On file.

From the Mayor—Request of the Mayor that, where it does not interfere with the proper working of the department, leave of absence may be granted to city employees who are veterans of the civil war to attend G. A. R. Encampment September 9-12, 1907; also leave of absence on September 8, 9 and 18 to employees of the Hebrew faith. On file.

From the Civil Service Commission—In regard to transfer of employees of Raymond Street Jail, Borough of Brooklyn, to the care of the Department of Correction. Notify the Secretary of the Civil Service Commission that details of transfer of jail have not as yet been arranged. Will communicate with the Civil Service Commission in regard to transfer of employees as soon as possible.

From the Civil Service Commission—Returning notice of appointment of Samuel H. Lesch as Automobile Engineer for signatures of two members of Board of Examiners, non-competitive class. Notice signed and returned.

From the Comptroller—Calling attention to resolution of Special Commission on the Budget for 1908, asking that Rents and Telephone Rentals be made separate items in estimates for 1908; that amounts now paid for same be given, with estimates for the coming year, etc. Report of General Bookkeeper:

From Department of Health—Stating that, if desired by the Department of Correction, the daily visits of the Board of Health Physician for vaccination and inspection of new prisoners for contagious diseases will be continued. On file.

From Department of Public Charities—Asking that, while steamer "Brennan" is laid up for repairs, the Minnahanonck be allowed to make the 7.30 a. m. trip with the crew of the "Brennan" for the purpose of delivering daily supplies to the Island institutions. Notify Commissioner of Public Charities that the "Minnahanonck" will make the trip as requested. Deputy Commissioner Meyer to make satisfactory arrangements.

From Heads of Institutions—Reporting that meats, fish, bread, milk, etc., for week ending August 31, 1907, agreed with the specifications of the contracts. On file.

From Heads of Institutions—Reports, census, labor, hospital cases, punishments, etc., for week ending August 31, 1907. On file.

From City Prison—Report of fines received during week ending August 31, 1907: From City Magistrate's Court, \$6. On file.

From District Prisons—Report of fines received during week ending August 31, 1907: From City Magistrates' Courts, \$397. On file.

From District Prisons—Report for month of August, 1907, census and disposition of prisoners. On file.

From Penitentiary, Blackwell's Island—List of prisoners received during week ending August 31, 1907: Men, 35. On file.

From Penitentiary, Blackwell's Island—Transmitting certificates of the Prison Physician in cases of George M. Bullis and Louis Beitsch, prisoners, who are supposed to be insane, and asks that examiners in lunacy may be appointed to inquire into the mental condition of these two prisoners. Ask the Corporation Counsel to comply with request.

From Workhouse, Blackwell's Island—Warden states that for the past five years a physician from the Department of Health has visited the Workhouse daily for the purpose of inspecting the newly-arrived prisoners for contagious diseases and for vaccinating them. During this time the institution has been exempt from smallpox and other contagious diseases. The physician has recently been withdrawn from this work. Copy of Warden's letter sent to Health Department with request that a doctor be detailed to continue this important work.

From Workhouse, Blackwell's Island—Fines paid at Workhouse during week ending August 31, 1907, amounted to \$32. On file.

From Workhouse, Blackwell's Island—Death at Workhouse on September 3, 1907, August Segel, aged thirty-two years. Friends notified. On file.

From the William Horne Company—Stating that it will be impossible to wait for the stone to be quarried on Blackwell's Island to match the coping and gables for north wing of Workhouse. An agreement was made on May 27, 1907, with the contractors, by which the Department was to supply this stone and to deduct \$250 from the amount of contract price. The William Horne Company now asks that said agreement be canceled, as a stone has been found which will match old work and which has been approved by Department Inspector. Agreement of May 27, 1907, with the William Horne Company is hereby canceled for the reason above stated, and to avoid unnecessary delay in the completion of this work.

STATEMENT No. 2.

Report of Chief Engineer Loomis.

Hon. WILLIAM J. BOYHAN, Superintendent of Sewers:

Dear Sir—In compliance with instructions I hand you herewith a report of the work done and in course of construction under my supervision for the quarter ending June 30, 1907, with a statement of work done by mechanics and laborers.

The present total length of the sewerage system in the Borough of Manhattan is 2,718,581 linear feet, or 514.88 miles, with 6,220 receiving basins, making the amount completed of new sewer during the quarter 3,308 linear feet of sewer and 13 receiving basins.

The following sewers have been completed during the quarter:

West One Hundred and Thirty-ninth street, between Riverside drive and Broadway.

Seventh avenue, west side, between One Hundred and Forty-fifth and One Hundred and Forty-sixth streets.

West One Hundred and Sixty-third street, between Broadway and St. Nicholas avenue.

Alterations and improvements to sewer in Thirty-ninth street, between Hudson river and Eleventh avenue, etc.

Alterations and improvements to sewer in West One Hundred and Fifty-second street, between Riverside drive and Broadway.

Reconstruction of sewer in Grand street, between Cannon and Columbia streets, etc.

Receiving basin southeast corner of One Hundred and Eighteenth street and Lenox avenue.

Receiving basin southeast corner of One Hundred and Forty-fourth street and Broadway.

Receiving basin southeast corner of One Hundred and Forty-fifth street and Broadway.

Sewer in Amsterdam avenue, east side, between One Hundred and Eighty-first and One Hundred and Eighty-sixth streets.

Extension of sewer in West Sixty-first street, between Central Park West and Broadway.

Alterations and improvements to sewer in First avenue, between Eighty-first and Eighty-fourth streets, etc.

There are now in active progress nine (9) contracts, payable from Street Improvement Fund, amounting to \$93,814.50. There are also four reconstruction contracts now in progress, payable from the appropriation Reconstruction of Sewers, Borough of Manhattan, amounting to \$74,668. A detailed statement of the above works appears in schedule annexed.

Reconstruction of outlet sewer at the foot of Seventy-fourth street, East river.

Sewer in Two Hundred and Fourteenth street, between Tenth avenue and Broadway.

Sewer in West Two Hundred and Fifteenth street, between the Harlem river and Ninth avenue.

Sewer in Vermilyea avenue, between Two Hundred and Eleventh and Dyckman streets, and in Hawthorne street, between Broadway and summit east of Vermilyea avenue.

An examination of the foregoing will show that a large amount of work is in contemplation. Several important works are delayed because the streets are not in proper condition to build the sewers therein.

In this class I might mention Bennett avenue, between Broadway and One Hundred and Eighty-first street, which is now being graded, and West One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street (Depot lane), between Haven avenue and Riverside drive. This street is at present a narrow roadway winding down the hillside between Haven avenue and Riverside drive, and until it is widened the full width it would be impracticable to build a sewer in it.

In this section of the City, say from One Hundred and Seventieth street on the south to One Hundred and Eighty-first street on the north, and between Broadway and Riverside drive, a large number of sewers have been built by private enterprise, property has been recently laid out and streets graded, and the owners of the same, being very anxious to put the property on the market and desirous of avoiding delays incident to the letting by public contracts, sought and received permission to build these works at their own expense.

I am not generally in favor of sewer work being done privately, for the reason that the construction of the same is not within the entire control of the Engineers of this Bureau, and we must rely upon City Surveyors and private Inspectors for the accuracy and proper carrying out of our specifications. Circumstances sometimes justify this method, but ordinarily all these works should be executed by the City's own officers and employees.

A small mileage of sewers remains yet to be built in the northern end of the City before the system is entirely complete. In cases where streets have already been mapped, some of them are graded and ready for work. In other sections the streets have not even been laid on the map, and, when improvements finally are made, we will be in position to undertake the drainage of the same.

In the lower part of the City considerable work is being done, and a large amount contemplated of alterations, improvements and rebuilding. This work is likely to be complicated to a very great extent by railroad tunnels and other works of private corporations.

In previous reports I have recommended a careful study of the situation by experts, so that the money which is expended in rebuilding our sewer system may result in works of a permanent character, but what the outcome of these studies will be it is impossible to say at present, but it will ultimately involve the expenditure of a very large sum of money.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF PUBLIC BUILDINGS AND OFFICES.

Offices of the Commissioner of Public Works,
 Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices,
 New York, July 3, 1907.

Hon. HENRY S. THOMPSON, Commissioner of Public Works:

Sir—In compliance with your instructions I have the honor to submit the following report of the transactions of this bureau for the quarter ending June 30, 1907.

Hall of Records Building.

The usual orders for Janitor's and Engineer's supplies, consisting of oils, step-ladders, toilet paper, wire, ash cans, soap powder, etc., were issued. Three Holophon clusters were furnished and installed in the offices of the Armory Board in the above building. Four large safes in the offices of Department of Taxes and Assessments were thoroughly cleaned, painted and decorated. The same work was performed on three large safes in the Register's office. The two master clocks and 140 dials were cared for and maintained under orders during the quarter. The railing around the sidewalk elevator on the Reade street side of building, which was in a dangerous condition, was repaired, straightened and securely braced and made safe. An improved regulator, with all necessary ammonia connections, including steam regulating valve, with links and levers complete, was furnished and installed, ready for use. Three hundred and fifty Union enclosed fuses, one hundred carbons, one half-dozen rolls 3/4-inch black competition tape and one steel snake wire were furnished for the use of the Electrician. Three 1-inch by 18-inch vacuum cleaner screen renovators, with 2-foot handles, were furnished for use in connection with the vacuum cleaner system. Four wearing plates, with bolts, were furnished for doors of sidewalk elevator. The sidewalk elevator was repacked and the governor rope connections were repaired; also repairs were made to the steam pump, rocker stem renewed, three fire hose furnished, two fire hose repaired, one damper lever renewed, the piston operating valves and the pilot valve of No. 6 were repacked, all the cut-offs were adjusted, the cut-off rope on No. 6 was renewed, the operating ropes shortened, the piston operating valves of No. 1 and No. 5 repacked and the main cable on No. 2 and No. 4 shortened, and all elevators left in safe condition.

Criminal Courts Building.

The usual orders for Janitor's and Engineer's supplies, consisting of cleaning material, rubber hose, disinfectant, electric lamps, etc., were issued. The stone steps and platforms at the three entrances of above building on White, Lafayette and Franklin streets, were recut, the flagging brought up to grade and all necessary filling to bring same to proper grade put in and new flagging laid where necessary. The defective parts of the automatic cutoff device on elevator No. 2 were replaced and all repairs required to place elevator in good condition were made. A new operating cable was installed on elevator No. 5. The walls, ceilings and woodwork were cleaned off, Grand Jury room, plastering repaired and painted as required. Also the walls and ceiling of the prison pens, corridors, private halls, etc., leading to Part 3, Court of General Sessions, were cleaned, prepared and painted with four coats of oil paint, and the iron work painted with aluminum. All of the wiring required for a complete annunciator system from the District Attorney's office and his Assistants to the County Detectives' room was installed. One quartered oak wardrobe, with mirror door, one quartered oak library table, six quartered oak armchairs with leather backs and one special desk armchair were furnished and delivered for the District Attorney's office. Bookcases in the office of Judge Rosalsky were arranged as directed, new locks were put in the Library of the Court of General Sessions and all of the labor, rigging, tackle, etc., necessary for the removal of twenty sections of steel document filing cabinets, from the second to the third floor, was furnished. The document files were taken apart to facilitate the work and reset in proper working order. The electric fans in Justice Foster's chambers and Mr. Butlet's office of the District Attorney's department were repaired and eight new 16-inch fans furnished.

County Court House.

The usual Janitor's and Engineer's supplies of soap, powder, oils, etc., were furnished, together with a supply of mineral water for the use of the Justices of the Supreme Court. All of the electric fans in the various offices and court rooms of this building were repaired. One nine-drop annunciator system, with buttons, wiring, batteries, etc., was furnished and installed on the ground floor of the Judges' chambers. A new water closet cistern was furnished and installed with all connections in the basement of the building. The toilet tanks in the Judges' room were taken down and properly fastened and supply pipes cleared. Two safes were repaired, painted and decorated and placed in position in the Calendar Clerk's office. The safe in Mr. Early's office was moved and properly set. All the steel filing cases, heavy furniture, documents, books and belongings of the Calendar Clerk and Mr. McNierney, Clerk of the Supreme Court, were removed from old offices to new offices on lower floor. Ten lights of Florentine glass were furnished and installed in the entrance door and vestibule to Judges' chambers on the ground floor. Three Yale cylinders were reset and seventy-five new keys were furnished for same, for use of new toilet room in Judges' chambers, ground floor, and for the doors of two new court rooms. One No. 5 Underwood typewriter was furnished for Special Term, Part III. One Smith Premier typewriter No. 4, one desk No. 20, and one stenographer's chair were furnished for Judge Hendrick's chambers. One Underwood typewriter desk and chair for same were furnished for the Calendar Clerk. New shades were installed for Part III, Trial Term, and Part IX., Trial Term, made of the best hand painted opaque shading and mounted on Hartshorn's tin spring rollers. Six japanned tin signs were furnished and set in the Judges' chambers, also a number of wooden signs, lettered in gold, designating the Justices' room. The piston and operating valves of elevator were repacked and repairs made to the stop-arms on the north passenger elevator.

City Hall.

The usual orders were issued for the Janitor of the building for cleaning purposes. Six American flags of the best quality bunting were also furnished. Two hundred copying pads, two hundred Eureka copying cloths and fifty oil sheets were furnished for the Borough President's office. One hat tree, one flat top desk, four office chairs and one revolving chair were furnished for the Bureau of Weights and Measures. Labor and material were furnished, and repairs made to the electric clocks, and the same placed in good running order. The motor was examined, defective parts removed and new furnished, and the same left in good running order; also repairs made to the pump. The steps leading to the police station in the basement of above building, which were in a dangerous condition, were taken up, and all the mason work necessary to make same safe was done.

Children's Court.

The customary supplies were furnished for cleaning during the quarter.

Harlem Court House.

The supplies for the Janitor and Engineer were furnished as usual, together with a supply of ice. Three fire hose for the use of the Engineer were supplied, and repairs made to old ones. The roof, where same was leaking, was repaired and painted and repairs also made to flashing.

West Fifty-fourth Street Court House.

The Janitor's and Engineer's supplies were furnished as usual. All the defective piping and connections were removed and replaced with new. Leaks at flanges were repaired. One new injector for boiler was furnished and installed and all check and globe valves for feed pipe were furnished and put on, and repairs made to old valve as required. Leaks in the toilet fixtures of the Clerk's office, Municipal Court, were repaired, basin reset, waste pipes cleaned out, leak at sink repaired and two new faucets put on in wash room, Police Court floor. The defective parts to the air pump connected with the elevators were removed, repaired and new parts furnished and properly adjusted. Fourteen 12-foot benches without inside arms were furnished for the use of the Magistrates' Court. A Worthington pump was repaired and put in proper condition.

Brown Stone Building (City Court).

The defective tiling in the hallways throughout building was taken up and replaced with new. Leaks in the Croton supply to toilet fixtures in basement were repaired. Repairs were also made to flush valve. One high revolving desk stool was furnished for the use of the Court Clerk.

First District Municipal Court.

Janitor's and Engineer's supplies were furnished as required. Three iron gates were repaired and six spring hinges and three new locks and braces put on. Nineteen chairs were repaired and put in good order.

Second District Municipal Court.

Janitor's supplies were furnished as required, and six strips of carpet runner furnished and laid.

Jefferson Market Court House (Third District Municipal).

Janitor's and Engineer's supplies were furnished as required; also, one roll top typewriter desk for the Magistrates' Court was furnished.

Essex Market Court House.

Janitor's supplies were furnished as required; also, one American flag, with pole and fixtures complete, and 75 feet of garden hose.

Eighth District Court House.

The water pipe in Judges' toilet was repaired.

New York County Jail.

Janitor's supplies were furnished as required.

PUBLIC BATHS.

Rivington Street Bath.

Cleaning supplies were furnished to the Janitor; also, Engineer's supplies, as required. Repairs were made to the pipes to boiler, where the same were defective, and a new 2-inch pipe with fittings was installed and same covered to match adjoining one. Repairs were also made to the water main, where the same was leaking, and all excavating necessary was performed to complete the job.

Allen Street Bath.

Cleaning and Engineer's supplies were furnished as required.

East Eleventh Street Bath.

All supplies were furnished as required for cleaning, etc.

West Forty-first Street Bath.

Cleaning supplies were furnished as required, also supplies for the Engineer. Waste and soil pipes were cleared and the piping connected with water closets and tubs on second floor, men's side, and the four outlets on same side were also properly connected. Sections of the marble work on the north and east sides of the building were removed and the defective parts of pipe taken out and replaced with new, the marble reset, and the job left in a finished state. Seventeen new 5-inch heavy brass shower heads with ball joint ground unions were installed, with approved mixing valves, together with all necessary fittings and connections for same, and the job left in first class condition.

East Seventy-sixth Street Bath.

Cleaning supplies were furnished as required. The waste pipes of showers were thoroughly clean and obstructions in toilets removed and cistern regulated. One No. 2 automatic water heater of standard manufacture, and all valves, fittings, etc., were furnished.

West Sixtieth Street Bath.

Cleaning and Engineer's supplies were furnished as usual. About 10 feet of chain were furnished for the sidewalk grating.

Free Floating Baths.

Orders were issued for all the supplies required to place these institutions in commission. Contracts were let for building new pontoons, repairing old pontoons, making good all damaged portions of the baths, painting same, doing all roofing work, and in fact everything required for which a specification could be prepared, to make the baths ready for service. The pumps on the baths were thoroughly repaired and placed in perfect working order, and coal was supplied as required during the winter season. The necessary quantity of rope for handling the baths and tying same to their berths was furnished. Orders were issued for towing the baths to their several stations. Twenty-four canal pumps complete, 3-feet by 9 inches over all, No. 24, gauge rivetted and soldered, were furnished. All of the baths will be located as soon as permission is received from the Departments of Docks and Ferries and Health.

PUBLIC COMFORT STATIONS.

City Hall Park.

All of the defective steam piping and return pipes under floors were removed and replaced in trench and a slate cover put over same to make it less difficult to make repairs. Repairs were also made to the steam coils, valves, etc. All of the cisterns, from automatic to chain and pull, were changed and new heavy chains and pulls supplied in place of same. Rope and seats were replaced and the present bowls, which were loose, were reset, also new fixtures supplied on the women's side.

Chatham Square.

The superstructure of this station, which was demolished by the accident to the elevated railroad, was restored to its original condition, in accordance with plan and specification.

Hanover Square.

The electric motors in above station were rewound, new commutators installed and motors placed in good condition. An order was issued for an examination of the electric motors at this station to furnish a remedy to keep same in working order.

Greeley Square.

Waste pipes of the urinals were cleared and 32 urinals regulated, with the tanks over same. Five toilet fixtures cleared, also soil pipes in male and female departments.

Toilet supplies were furnished as required for the use of the various stations, also necessary cleaning material.

THE MARKETS.

Fulton Market.

The necessary cleaning supplies were furnished as required.

Washington Market.

The necessary cleaning supplies were furnished as required.

West Washington Market.

Cleaning supplies were furnished as required and the defective leaders and gutters at the following stands were removed and replaced with new material: Nos. 16 and 17 Grace avenue, No. 33 Thompson avenue, Nos. 28, 29 and 55 Lawton avenue, Nos. 1, 18 and 19 Loew avenue, No. 18 Hewitt avenue, No. 9 West street and No. 15 Gansevoort street were removed and replaced with new material. The gutters at the following stands were repaired: Nos. 3, 9, 2 and 28 Hewitt avenue, Nos. 22, 23 and 24 West street, Nos. 15 and 17 Gansevoort street, Nos. 3, 9, 21 and 27 Grace avenue. Lumber was supplied for the use of the Bureau Carpenter to make repairs to stand No. 17. One wire screen was set in roofers' workshop at the above market.

Gansevoort Market.

Cleaning supplies were furnished as required.

Jefferson Market.

Cleaning supplies were furnished as required.

Tompkins Market.

Cleaning supplies were furnished as required.

Finance Department.

About sixty electric fans were repaired, cleaned and put in complete working order and distributed to the various bureaus for their use in the above Department. Iron braces to hold rail in room 81 were properly installed. Stool, closets, counter and file case were removed and placed in position in room 2. Two safes, stool, and filing cases were removed from room 181, fourth floor, to the second floor of same building, safes repainted, striped and varnished equal to new. All the labor, rigging and apparatus required for removal of the office furniture, books, records, documents and belongings of every description, including safes, from their old offices to their new offices on the second floor, were supplied. All of the belongings of the Bureau of Assessments and Arrears were also removed from their old offices to their new offices in the same building. About twenty-nine opaque shades, mounted on Harts-horn tin spring rollers, were installed in this office, and one dozen enamelled iron self-righting cuspidors, one dozen waste paper baskets, two quartered oak stools with backs, saddle seat, two quartered oak arm chairs, plain back, with arm and saddle seats, five quartered oak revolving desk chairs, with arms and saddle seats, one quartered oak 5-foot high roll top desk, with square edges, two letter files and special large lock partition were furnished. Two centre cross walls on the first floor in the room formerly occupied by the Tax Department were removed to suit the requirements of the occupants. Six shades were installed in room 11. The railing in room 4 was altered and opening cut in same as directed. Two counters made of quartered oak, about 18 feet 6 inches long, with drawers on top and cover under same, provided with partitions for books, and one counter, 11 feet long, with drawers, covers and shelves made to match counters at present in use, together with 11 feet of wire and scroll work in oak frame were put in. All of the office furniture, records and belongings, including safes of the bookkeeping department, were removed from their old offices to their new offices, and the following articles furnished: One card index cabinet, containing four drawers to carry cards of same size as sample submitted; one No. 12 Yost typewriter, nine revolving chairs, one 60-inch roll top desk, one wardrobe, one 8-foot settee, one stenographer's chair and two tables.

Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Two rugs, 10 by 10 feet; six rugs, 3 by 6 feet; six office chairs, seven revolving wooden seat chairs, two revolving stools with backs, one 12-foot stepladder, one 8-foot stepladder, one dozen waste paper baskets, two dozen desk baskets, one dozen office baskets, one dozen whisk brooms, one quartered oak library table, two polished oak library tables, one quartered oak table, one office chair, one No. 21 flat top desk, one 6-foot flat top desk for Chief Engineer were furnished. About 500 yards of best quality plain linoleum were furnished and laid in these offices, as directed.

Commissioners of Accounts.

Considerable work was performed in the new offices of the Engineering Bureau of the Commissioners of Accounts by the mechanics employed in this bureau in erecting the machinery of the laboratories. In addition five electric fans, one drop light telephone booth, four desk lights, six drop lights in the chemical laboratory, two 1-light fixtures in the toilets, two 4-light clusters, one 1-light fixture, twelve canopy extensions, one drop light in the corridor and one 5-button enunciator call system were installed, as directed, together with a supply of moulding, wiring and soldering paste and one snap switch were furnished. The refrigerating machinery was removed from the old quarters and taken apart and properly reset in the new offices.

Offices of the Commissioner of Public Works.

One forty-five horse power 1907 Peerless touring car, with all equipments, was furnished for the use of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices.

Cleaning supplies were furnished and delivered from the storeroom to the various public buildings and offices as required. The order for the use of horse and wagon and driver for the Superintendent was renewed during the months of April and May. The windows on the various public buildings were cleaned under contract. The following supplies were distributed as needed: Coal and wood for heating, ice, brooms, pails, soap powder, waste paper baskets, sapolio, sponges, mop handles, feather dusters, scrubbing brushes, ash cans, etc. Among the many items of repair made to the various buildings and offices not hereinbefore mentioned were plumbing, steam-fitting, carpentering, roofing, plastering, mason work, painting, electrical work, repairs to safes, machinery, elevators and office furniture, also covering steam pipe and erecting awnings, all of which work was done under small bureau orders, as required from time to time.

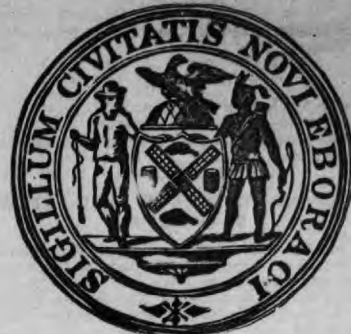

No milk which has been heated, pasteurized, sterilized or subjected to heat in any manner for the purpose of preservation, shall be received, prepared, held, kept or offered for sale or delivered in the city of New York, unless the receptacle in which it is contained bears a label stating plainly the process to which the milk has been subjected.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof.
