COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at a Meeting Held in Room 16, City Hall, at 11 o'clock a. m., on Monday, July 26, 1909.

Present—George B. McClellan, Mayor; John H. McCooey, Deputy and Acting Comptroller; James J. Martin, Chamberlain, and Patrick F. McGowan, President, Board of Aldermen.

The minutes of the meetings held June 30 and July 2, 1909, were approved as printed.

The Chair called for a hearing in the matter of the request of the Commissioner of Docks that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approve of and consent to the institution of condemnation proceedings for the acquisition of property between the foot of South Sixth street and Broadway, in the Borough of Brooklyn.

(See minutes of July 2, 1909, pages 909 to 1001.)

No one appeared either in favor of or in opposition to the same. The Chair then declared the hearing closed.

The Secretary submitted the following:

Public notice is hereby given that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, in accordance with the provisions of chapter 372 of the Laws of 1907, will hold a public hearing in Room 16, City Hall, Borough of Manhattan, at 11 o'clock in the forenoon, on Monday, July 26, 1909, relative to the request of the Commissioner of Docks that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorize and assent to the institution of condemnation proceedings for the acquisition of the following described property:

Beginning at the intersection of the northerly side of the northerly waiting room with the limiting line of City property at the foot of Broadway;

Running thence westerly along the northerly side of said northerly waiting room 118 feet, more or less, to the northwest corner of said waiting room;

Running thence northerly along the northerly prolongation of the westerly side of said northerly waiting room 6 feet, more or less, to the northerly side of the crib pier between the northerly ferry slip to East Forty-second street and the southerly ferry slip to East Twenty-third street, Manhattan;

Running thence westerly in a meandering line along the northerly side of the said crib pier 247 feet, more or less, to the pierhead line established 1857, and approved by the Secretary of War February 8, 1890;

Running thence northerly along said pierhead line 446 feet, more or less, to the southerly line of City property under the jurisdiction of the Department of Bridges;

Running thence easterly along the southerly side of said property to its intersection with the westerly prolongation of the northerly line of South Sixth street, and thence still easterly and along said northerly line of South Sixth street and its prolongation to the bulkhead line established by the Secretary of War February 8, 1890;

Running thence southerly along said bulkhead line 60 feet, more or less, to the westerly prolongation of the southerly line of South Sixth street;

Running thence easterly along the westerly prolongation of the southerly line of South Sixth street and along the southerly line of South Sixth street 118 feet, more or less, to a line 100 feet, more or less, from and parallel with the westerly line of Kent avenue;

Running thence southerly along said line 233 feet, more or less, to the westerly prolongation of the northerly side of the two-story brick building on the westerly side of Kent avenue, about 127 feet, more or less, northerly from the westerly prolongation of the northerly line of Broadway;

Running thence easterly along the westerly prolongation of the northerly side of said two-story brick building 36 feet, more or less, to the westerly side of said building;

Running thence southerly along the westerly side of said two-story brick building 25 feet, more or less, to the southerly side of said two-story brick building;

Running thence easterly along the southerly side of said two-story brick building 69 feet, more or less, to the westerly line of Kent avenue;

Running thence southerly along said limiting line of City property 28 feet, more or less, to the point or place of beginning.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of and consent to the institution of condemnation proceedings for the acquisition of property between the foot of South Sixth street and Broadway, in the Borough of Brooklyn, described as follows:

Beginning at the intersection of the northerly side of the northerly waiting room with the limiting line of City property at the foot of Broadway; running thence westerly along the northerly side of said northerly waiting room 118 feet, more or less, to the northwest corner of said waiting room;

Running thence northerly along the northerly prolongation of the westerly side of said northerly waiting room 6 feet, more or less, to the northerly side of the crib pier between the northerly ferry slip to East Forty-second street and the southerly ferry slip to East Twenty-third street, Manhattan;

Running thence westerly in a meandering line along the northerly side of the said crib pier 247 feet, more or less, to the pierhead line established 1857, and approved by the Secretary of War, February 8, 1890;

Running thence northerly along said pierhead line 446 feet, more or less, to the southerly line of City property under the jurisdiction of the Department of Bridges;

Running thence easterly along the southerly side of said property to its intersection with the westerly prolongation of the northerly line of South Sixth street, and thence still easterly and along said northerly line of South Sixth street and its

prolongation to the bulkhead line established by the Secretary of War, February 8, 1890;

Running thence southerly along said bulkhead line 60 feet, more or less, to the westerly prolongation of the southerly line of South Sixth street;

Running thence easterly along the westerly prolongation of the southerly line of South Sixth street and along the southerly line of South Sixth street 118 feet, more or less, to a line 100 feet, more or less, from and parallel with the westerly line of Kent avenue;

Running thence southerly along said line 233 feet, more or less, to the westerly prolongation of the northerly side of the two-story brick building on the westerly side of Kent avenue, about 127 feet, more or less, northerly from the westerly prolongation of the northerly line of Broadway;

Running thence easterly along the westerly prolongation of the northerly side of said two-story brick building 36 feet, more or less, to the westerly side of said building;

Running thence southerly along the westerly side of said two-story brick building 25 feet, more or less, to the southerly side of said two-story brick building;

Running thence easterly along the southerly side of said two-story brick building 69 feet, more or less, to the westerly line of Kent avenue;

Running thence southerly along the westerly line of Kent avenue 74 feet, more or less, to the northerly side of the three-story brick building at the corner of Broadway;

Running thence westerly along said three-story brick building 71 feet, more or less, to the westerly side of said three-story brick building;

Running thence southerly along the westerly side of said three-story brick building 20 feet, more or less, to the southerly side of said three-story brick building;

Running thence westerly along the westerly prolongation of the southerly side of said three-story brick building 13 feet, more or less, to the northerly prolongation of the limiting line of City property at the foot of Broadway;

Running thence southerly along said limiting line of City property 28 feet, more or less, to the point or place of beginning.

Which resolution was unanimously adopted.

A communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks, requesting that he be authorized to enter into a supplemental agreement with Warren & Wetmore, Architects, for additional services in connection with their contract for the preparation of the general plans for the pier and bulkhead sheds between Bloomfield and West Twenty-third streets, North River, Borough of Manhattan, together with the detailed plan of one shed and the bulkhead structures appertaining to same.

Which was referred to a Select Committee, consisting of the President of the Board of Aldermen and the Chamberlain.

The following communication was received from the Law Department, relative to the lease of rooms in the Gerken Building, Nos. 90 and 92 West Broadway, Borough of Manhattan:

CITY OF NEW YORK, LAW DEPARTMENT,
OFFICE OF THE CORPORATION COUNSEL,
NEW YORK, April 28, 1909.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN—The Bureau of Street Openings, Law Department, requires additional room for use of the Examiners in condemnation proceedings.

Mr. Frederick Gerken, the owner of the premises Nos. 90 and 92 West Broadway, has consented to cancel the lease of Room 86, on the eighth floor (which does not become operative until May 1, 1909), the rental of which is \$425 per annum, and contains 210 square feet, and enter into a lease of Rooms 48 and 49 on the fourth floor, at an annual rental of \$600, and which contain 374 square feet, thereby giving the Bureau 164 additional square feet of office room at an increase of \$175 per annum.

I recommend that your Commission adopt a resolution cancelling the lease of Room 86, No. 90 and 92 West Broadway, and obtain a lease from Mr. Gerken of Rooms 48 and 49, in the same building, terminating at the same time as the present leases of the Bureau, to wit, October 1, 1911, and that authority be given to occupy these rooms in advance of the execution of the lease therefor, if your Board approves the arrangement.

Pendleton, Esq., Corporation Counsel, addressed to your Commission on April 28, 1909, I hereby consent to the cancellation of the lease of Room 86, in the Gerken Building, Nos. 90 and 92 West Broadway, which lease would become operative on May 1, 1909, and in consideration of the cancelling of the above lease I also agree to enter into a lease with The City of New York for Rooms 48 and 49 in the Gerken Building, Nos. 90 and 92 West Broadway, at the annual rental of \$600.

In connection therewith the Deputy Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolutions:

July 10, 1909.

Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, Comptroller:

SIR—The Corporation Counsel in a communication under date of April 28, 1909, requests that the lease heretofore authorized to be made for Rooms 86 and 87 on the eighth floor of the Gerken Building, Nos. 90 and 92 West Broadway, Borough of Manhattan, for the use of the Law Department, be cancelled, and that in place of Rooms 86 and 87 on the eighth floor, in order to provide more room for said Department, Room 87 on the eighth floor and Rooms 48 and 49 on the fourth floor of said building be leased by the City at an annual rental of \$1,025.

Mr. Frederick Gerken the lessor and owner of the Gerken Building has cancelled the lease heretofore executed by him on April 21, 1909, to the City, for Rooms 86 and 87 on the eighth floor of said building, at an annual rental of \$850 for a period of two years and five months, from May 1, 1909, to October 1, 1911.

The rental of \$1,025 per annum for Room 87 on the eighth floor and Rooms 48 and 49 on the fourth floor being reasonable and just, and in order that proper provision may be made for the requirements of the Law Department, I would respectfully recommend that a resolution be adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, rescinding the resolution of February 11, 1909, authorizing the lease of Rooms 86 and 87 on the eighth floor, and that a new lease be entered into by the City with Frederick Gerken for Room 87 on the eighth floor and Rooms 48 and 49 on the fourth floor of the Gerken Building, Nos. 90 and 92 West Broadway, for a period of two years and five months, from May 1, 1909, to October 1, 1911, at an annual rental of \$1,025, payable quarterly, the lessor to make repairs and to furnish light, heat, elevator and janitor service.

Resolved, That the resolution adopted by this Board at meeting held February 11, 1909, authorizing a lease of Rooms 86 and 87 on the eighth floor of the Gerken Building, Nos. 90 and 92 West Broadway, Borough of Manhattan, for use of the Law Department, be and the same is hereby rescinded.

Resolved, That the Corporation Counsel be and is hereby requested to prepare a lease to the City from Frederick Gerken, of Room 87 on the eighth floor and Rooms 48 and 49 on the fourth floor of the Gerken Building, Nos. 90 and 92 West Broadway, Borough of Manhattan, for use of the Law Department, for a period of two years and five months, from May 1, 1909, at an annual rental of ten hundred and twenty-five dollars (\$1,025), payable quarterly; the lessor to make repairs and to furnish light, heat, elevator and janitor service; and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the said rent fair and reasonable and that it would be for the interests of the City that such lease be made, the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized and directed to execute the same when prepared and approved by the Corporation Counsel, as provided by sections 149 and 217 of the Greater New York Charter.

The report was accepted and the resolutions severally unanimously adopted.

The Deputy Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution relative to the rental of premises at Nos. 128 to 132 Mott street, Borough of Manhattan, occupied by the Board of Elections:

July 10, 1909.

Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, Comptroller:

SIR—The Board of Elections have used and occupied for a number of years the sixth loft of the premises known as Nos. 128 to 132 Mott street, Borough of Manhattan, under a lease to the City from August Mietz, at an annual rental of \$1,600, the lease for said premises having expired December 1, 1908.

The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund by a resolution adopted March 1, 1909, authorized the payment of the rent for said premises for the month of December, 1908, amounting to the sum of \$133.34.

Under date of April 21, 1909, a resolution was adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorizing a lease of the above mentioned premises from March 1, 1909, for a term of five years, at an annual rental of \$1,600. At a subsequent meeting under date of May 5, 1909, the resolution of April 21, 1909, authorizing said renewal, was reconsidered and referred to a Select Committee, consisting of the President of the Board of Aldermen and the City Chamberlain. At a meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund held on June 30, 1909, said Committee reported back, recommending that a renewal of the lease of the premises known as Nos. 128 to 132 Mott street, Borough of Manhattan, be made with August Mietz, for a period of five years from March 1, 1909.

You will note that the original lease having expired December 1, 1908, and that a resolution was adopted March 1, 1909, authorizing the payment of the rent for the month of December, 1908, no provision was made for the two months intervening, January and February, 1909, as between the expiration of the old lease and the beginning of the new one on March 1, 1909. In view of these conditions, I would respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorize the Comptroller to pay, without the necessity of entering into a lease, to August Mietz, the sum of \$266.67, rental for the premises Nos. 128 to 132 Mott street, Borough of Manhattan, for the months of January and February, 1909, the same being at the rate of \$1,600 per annum, the premises being occupied by the Board of Elections.

The lowest bid, that of the Rhode Island Elevator and Machine Company, after examination by the Corporation Counsel and the Comptroller, was declared informal on the ground that the check for the deposit was not in the form required by the advertisement.

The owner of the property had increased the rent on the property, Nos. 102 and 104 Court street, and it was not renewed upon the same terms and conditions; the two propositions, namely, the old lease and the new one, were to be made one lease, and my report requesting a renewal of the lease was to indicate to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund that it was not, all of it, a new proposition.

I respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund amend the resolution adopted at said meeting, by requesting that the Corporation Counsel prepare a lease to the City of the second and third floors of the building, Nos. 102 and 104 Court street, Borough of Brooklyn, for the use of the Children's Court, Second Division, and also for the second, third and fourth floors of the premises, No. 100 Court street, Borough of Brooklyn, for the use of the Children's Court, Second Division, in said Borough, for a period of three years, seven months and fifteen days, from July 1, 1909, at an annual rental of \$3,500, payable quarterly, the owner to repair the roof and make the same tight, and keep in good condition throughout the term of the lease, and redecorate and repaint the same where necessary to be done, at the direction of the presiding Justice, of the premises, Nos. 102 and 104 Court street, now occupied as a Children's Court, and to cut an archway door between Nos. 100 and 102 Court street, on the floor one flight up, arranged either by door or some other manner, to close up the stair entrance to No. 100 Court street to the floor one flight up, same being done in accordance with the requirements of the Fire Department; the plumbing in the premises, No. 100 Court street, to be removed from its present location to the back of the building, in accordance with the requirements of the Building Department, and to install the necessary toilet facilities for men in the back of building; to cut archway between the back room and the middle room so as to give light and air on the first flight up; to remove and rearrange partition so as to make the back of the house as one room, except where it is used for toilet facilities; on the third floor, or on floor two flights up, to take down present partition in back room and rearrange it so as to provide toilet facilities for women; on the fourth floor, or three flights up, to arrange rooms in the back of house so that it shall be one room, except where toilet room is; to rearrange toilets on that floor, in accordance with the requirements of the Building Department; all of the rooms to be painted and papered

and the window shutters to be removed from the front of the building; and also to make such other alterations and repairs, at the request of the presiding Justice, as may be necessary for the purposes for which it is intended to be used, although not herein specifically mentioned; all of the work to be done in accordance with the requirements of the Building Department and in accordance with the ordinance of the City; and anything to be done, not herein specifically mentioned, that the ordinances or Departments require, must and shall be done by the owner of the property at his own cost and expense; and in addition, he shall pay the taxes, make the repairs inside and outside of the building during the term of the lease, and shall pay for the water used on the premises. There are one or two clauses in the leases which were left out of the report and resolution and which Mr. Hirschman desires to have inserted. In the fourth paragraph of the said resolution, after the words "the lease to contain a clause that in the event of the owner erecting a building greater in height than the three stories mentioned herein to be under lease, and any portion of the upper stories to be rented," after the word "rented" insert the words "by the said Stuard Hirschman, his successors or assigns." Also to amend said resolution by inserting three additional paragraphs:

"That no alterations or additions or improvements shall be made by the City upon that part occupied by the City without the written consent of the owner."

"That in the case of any damage or injury occurring to the glass in that part of the building occupied by the City, or damage or injury to said premises so occupied, of any nature or kind whatsoever, said damage or injury being caused by the carelessness, negligence or improper conduct on the part of the City, its agents or employees, the City shall cause the said damage or injury to be repaired as speedily as possible at its own cost and expense."

"The owner shall not be liable, in case the City shall sustain any damage or injury to its personal property by carelessness, negligence or improper conduct on the part of its employees or agents, or on the part of any other tenant, by reason of the leakage, leakage or obstruction of the croton water or soil pipes, or other leakage in or about said building, except that which would be caused from the defects in the roof of said building, but the said owner shall cause the said damage or injury to be repaired as speedily as possible, at his own cost and expense."

SIR—Bills of William B. Tubby, in amount five hundred and seventeen dollars and sixty-four cents (\$517.64), for services as architect in the matter of constructing buildings on Wallabout Market lands, in the Borough of Brooklyn, are awaiting payment in Auditing Bureau.

Under the original contract with the City of Brooklyn such bills were paid from the market revenues. Since consolidation these revenues have been paid into the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt, No. 1, and transfers have been made from time to time to the City Treasury of amounts to meet such bills when presented.

A resolution for a similar transfer to meet the above bills is herewith submitted.

Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, Comptroller:

SIR—I am in receipt of a communication from N. Taylor Phillips, Deputy Comptroller, bearing date April 26, 1909, and enclosing a contract made September 18, 1897, between the City of Brooklyn and W. B. Tubby, for architectural services in designing plans and supervising the construction of buildings to be erected upon the Wallabout Market property. Authority to enter into such a contract was, by section 3, chapter 569 of the Laws of 1894, vested in the Commissioner of City Works of the City of Brooklyn, and the expense was made payable by the same act, as amended by chapter 85 of the Laws of 1906, from the rental and fees derived from Wallabout Market.

The Deputy Comptroller calls my attention to the fact that such rentals and fees were, prior to consolidation, paid into the general Revenue Fund of the City of Brooklyn, but since consolidation following the New York City Ordinances governing market rents and fees, they have been deposited in the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt No. 1. He also informs me that Mr. Tubby has, from time to time, presented bills for services rendered under this contract, and that an amount to meet the same has been, by resolution of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, transferred from the Sinking Fund Redemption No. 1 to the City Treasury account, Wallabout Market, Borough of Brooklyn, Expenses for Designs and Superintendence of Construction of Buildings.

I am requested to advise you whether this action of the Sinking Fund Commissioners is legal.

I think it is. The statute and ordinance contemplates that only those fees and rentals from the Wallabout Market shall be paid into the City Treasury to which no prior charge or lien has attached. I think that it is clear that, pursuant to the contract between the Commissioner of City Works and Mr. Tubby, made by authority of statute, the moneys due Mr. Tubby should be deducted from the amount of fees and rentals paid into the Sinking Fund. Since it is probably impossible from year to year to foresee the exact amount which may be due the architect, I can see no irregularity in payment into the Sinking Fund of the entire fees and rentals derived from the Wallabout Market property and the subsequent payment to the architect by resolution of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, when the amounts due Mr. Tubby have been ascertained.

I return herewith the copy of the contract, forwarded by the Deputy Comptroller, and advise you that the two bills amounting to \$517.64 may properly be paid from the City Treasury account entitled Wallabout Market, Borough of Brooklyn, Expenses for Designs and Superintendence of Construction of Buildings.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of and consent to the execution by the Board of Education, only after such repairs as required by the Superintendent of Buildings have been completed, of a renewal of the lease to the City of the front and rear rooms on the second floor of the Maxwell House, No. 245 Concord street, Borough of Brooklyn, occupied as an annex to Public School 14, for a period of one year from July 1, 1909, with the privilege of renewal for an additional year, at an annual rental of four hundred and fifty dollars (\$450), otherwise upon the same terms and conditions as contained in the existing lease; lessors, Brooklyn Guild Association, Mr. Hamilton Holt, President; the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the said rent fair and reasonable and that it would be for the interests of the City that such lease be made.

BROOKLYN, July 20, 1909.

The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, New York City.

GENTLEMEN—The Jamaica Bay Improvement Commission requests permission be given for the rental of an office at No. 180 Montague street, Borough of Brooklyn, for the use of this Commission.

This Commission has made inquiry for office space in the public buildings of the Borough of Brooklyn but is informed that none is available.

1. The owner or lessor of the office in question is the Academy Realty Corporation.

2. The room is on the second floor of the building on the south side just west of the stairway. It contains about 540 square feet, which makes the rental about \$1.11 per square foot per annum.

3. The term of the proposed lease is one year.

4. The rental would be \$600 per annum, payable monthly.

5. There appear to be no alterations or repairs necessary.

6. The owner pays the water rent.

7. The owner pays for light, heat and janitor service.

8. The necessity for the lease is that this Commission may have a suitable office for the prosecution of the work for which it was appointed. It needs space for drawing tables, for the filing of records and for the accommodation of draughtsmen and other employees.

9. The Commission recommends the premises and believes that the rental is as reasonable as can be secured in the neighborhood for the purposes desired.

10. The rental will be paid from the appropriation of \$75,000 passed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on July 2, 1909, and by the Board of Aldermen on July 13, 1909.

SIR—Philip P. Farley, President of the Jamaica Bay Improvement Commission, in a communication dated July 20, 1909, requests a lease for a period of one year of the second floor of the building, No. 180 Montague street, Borough of Brooklyn, being that portion thereof on the south side just west of the stairway. He states that it contains about 540 square feet, the rental being \$600 per annum, which is at the rate of about \$1.11 per square foot, and that the necessity for the lease is that this Commission may have suitable office room for the prosecution of the work for which it was appointed; that it needs space for drawing tables, for the filing of records, and for the accommodation of draughtsmen and other employees; and that the rental rate will be paid from the appropriation of \$75,000 Corporate Stock passed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on July 2, 1909, and approved by the Board of Aldermen on July 13, 1909.

The Sinking Fund Commissioners have heretofore approved of two leases for the use of this Jamaica Bay Improvement Commission prior to their submitting report upon the work to be done by the City and by the Government. On June 15, 1906, and November 21, 1906, the Sinking Fund Commissioners approved of the hiring of Room 913 in the Mechanics' Bank Building, corner of Court and Montague streets, Brooklyn. All of these leases expired on June 1, 1907, so that for two years last past the Commission has been without an office. The necessity of now making this change from Room 913 to the second floor in this building is so that the surveyors or other employees attached to the Commission will be enabled at all hours of the day or night returning to the office, to reach the room after the elevators in other buildings have closed for the night—simply means the climbing of one flight of stairs.

I respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approve of the request of the President of the Jamaica Bay Improvement Commission, and authorize a lease of a room on the second floor on the south side just west of the stairway in the building, No. 180 Montague street, Borough of Brooklyn, for the use of said Commission, for a period of one year from the date of occupation, at an annual rental of \$600, payable quarterly, the owner to pay water rent, to furnish light, heat and

janitor's service. Lessor, Academy Realty Corporation, D. & M. Chauncey Realty Company, agents.

To pave Fifty-second street with asphalt on concrete foundation, between Tenth and Eleventh avenues, and between New Utrecht avenue and West street. Unanimously adopted.

4. Approving of and consenting to the execution of a lease to the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western Railroad Company of Pier 68, North River, foot of West Twenty-eighth street, and the half bulkhead southerly of said pier, together with the right to use the shed on said pier, for a term of ten years from May 1, 1912, with the privilege of renewal for a further term of ten years; rental for the first term to be at the rate of \$23,000 per annum, and for the renewal term at an advance of 10 per cent.; the lessee to agree to the cancellation of the existing lease of the half bulkhead south of Pier 68 on May 1, 1912; the remaining terms and conditions of the lease to be similar to those contained in leases of wharf property now in use by the Department.

5. Approving of and consenting to the execution of a lease to the Central Railroad Company of New Jersey of the outer 700 feet of the pier foot of West Fortieth street, North River, when said pier shall be extended out to the pierhead line established by the Secretary of War in 1897, for a term of ten years from the date that said extension shall be completed and ready for occupation, with privilege of two renewals of ten years each; the rental for the first term to be at the rate of \$18,900 per annum, and the rental for each renewal term to be ten per cent. in advance of the rental for the preceding term; the lessee shall have the right to erect a shed upon said pier in accordance with plans and specifications to be submitted to and approved by the Chief Engineer of the Department of Docks, the said shed to revert to and become the property of The City of New York at the expiration or sooner termination of the lease; the remaining terms and conditions of the lease to be similar to those contained in leases of wharf property now in use by the Department.

6. Approving of and consenting to the execution of a lease to the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company of the following described land under water on the East River, in the Borough of Manhattan:

Lot No. 1—Beginning at a point in the bulkhead line adopted by the Commissioner of Docks March 2, 1908, and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, April 14, 1908, where the easterly line of Pier 39 intersects the same and running thence easterly along said bulkhead line to the westerly line of Pier 40; thence southerly and at right angles to the said bulkhead line 10 feet; thence westerly and on a line parallel with the said bulkhead line to the easterly line of Pier 39; thence northerly along said easterly line 10 feet to the point or place of beginning.

The lease to be for a period commencing the same date as the lease of the land under water for the widening and extensions of Piers 39, 40 and 41, East River, dated August 7, 1908, which lease was approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund August 4, 1908, and shall be for a period coterminous with said lease of the land under water for the widening and extensions of Piers 39, 40 and 41, East River, or any renewal thereof.

The rental for the first term to be at the rate of 25 cents per square foot per annum, and the rental for each renewal term to be at an advance of 10 per cent. over the rental for the preceding term; the lessee to have the privilege of erecting platforms and sheds upon the said land under water; all the work of construction to be done at the sole cost and expense of the lessee and under the direction and supervision of the Chief Engineer of the Department of Docks and Ferries and in accordance with plans and specifications to be first submitted to and approved by the

Commissioner of Docks. All the improvements made under the lease are to revert to and become the property of The City of New York at the expiration or sooner termination of the lease or any renewal thereof, free from all incumbrances of any kind whatsoever; the lease to contain the following provision: "It is understood and agreed that this lease shall be of no force or effect unless the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company shall file in this Department a written agreement to be approved as to form by the Corporation Counsel, that the rental of the property leased to said company by indenture made this 7th day of August, 1908, and the rental under the lease of the land under water, as recommended by the Commissioner of Docks in communication to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund dated June 14, 1909, shall commence upon the completion of the structures in said leases provided for, in accordance with the new plan for the improvement of the water-front, adopted by the Commissioner of Docks April 29, 1909, and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund May 26, 1909, or any modification or amendment thereof, but in any event, the said rental shall commence not later than August 7, 1911." The remaining terms and conditions of the lease to be similar to those contained in the lease dated August 7, 1908, by and between The City of New York, by the Commissioner of Docks, party of the first part, and the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company, party of the second part, in so far as said provisions are applicable to the lease now recommended, which lease shall be approved as to form by the Corporation Counsel.


