missioner, Department of Correction: Dear Sir-I respectfully transmit herewith a quarterly report of improvements and other work done at District Prisons for the three months ended June 30, 1910. The installing of the new sterilizer in laundry work is now done in a sanitary employed 5,0011/2 days. manner. A number of repairs to boiler and fireplace were done by staff, and material to make these repairs thereto was furnished by the Department.

The furnishing of a new office desk at Essex Market Prison in place of the old one was very much needed, and the painting and renovating of prison on the male and female side was completed. The installing of a new 63-gallon galvanized iron nections and couplings from boiler to kitchen range has been satisfactorily done by paid labor. In the female prison the old 15 iron canvas cot beds were substituted with new iron-woven enameled ironspring beds, an improvement which was very much needed.

The furnishing of a new office desk at Yorkville Prison is one of the improvements which was very much needed. The l range in the kitchen was repaired and put electric gas-lighting system has been repaired and new burners furnished thereto.

The installing of a new "Richardson & Boynton" kitchen range, with hood and ventilator, at Harlem Prison has been completed. The entire renovating and painting of the male and female prison is nearing completion. The Rider Ericcson been installed to toilet in basement, and all necessary repairs thereto have been done by paid labor.

Renovating and painting of the temporary detention pens and office rooms (white), 781/4 bushels. at Morrisania Prison have been completed, and the work was done by prison labor 10 inches ashlars, 641 feet 8 inches copings,

At the West Side Prison repairs to hotwater lines have been done by staff, and

The female prisoners under sentence help are employed in cleaning and scrubbing in and around the female prisons and offices and doing laundry work in all

The male prisoners under sentence here transferred from the Workhouse are constantly employed in cleaning in and around the male prison, repairing, painting, kalsomining and doing such other work as is necessary for the transaction of the business of the District Prisons.

Attached herewith please find a statement showing disposition of prisoners for the three months ending June 30, 1910, the seed oil, 9 gals, turpentine, 1 lb. burnt amount of fines received from prisoners committed by the City Magistrates and paid over to the City Chamberlain and to the Health Department's Pension Fund. Dear Sir-I most respectfully submit a report of the City Prison, Borough of Brooklyn, for the quarter commencing April 1, 1910, and ending June 30, 1910.

The new stable and granite wall along Willoughby st. has been finished and the stable is now in use. Van No. 15 has been repaired, painted and lettered. Three electric fans have been put up, one in the Keeper's dining-room and two in the dormitory. New agate ware cups, mess pans and dinner plates are now in use, replacing the old tinware. Intercommunicating telephones were installed on all tiers, connecting with the prison office. A telephone from the administration office to the Head Keeper's quarters has been put in. The old stable is being demolished and the new Female Prison is now in course of construction. The female prisoners under sentence here are employed in cleaning and scrubbing in and around the Female Prison and Administration Building and working in the prison laundry. GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according

to law as soon thereafter as practicable. Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so inter-ested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the con-tract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or esti-mate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department. No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.
