

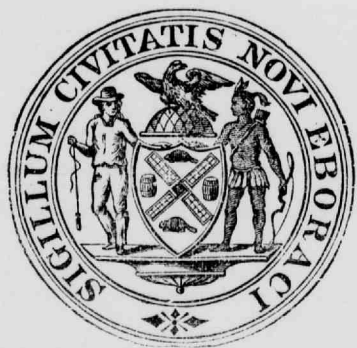

APPROVED PAPERS.

Ordinances, Resolutions etc., approved by the Mayor during the week ending September 8, 1877.

Whereas, An order of judgment of the Superior Court of this city, dated the eleventh day of January, eighteen hundred and seventy-six, was served on the officers of this Board, declaring or in some manner pertaining to the rights and powers of the New York City Central Underground Railway Company and its successors, to make an underground railway in this city, and an application is now pending before this Board for certain privileges in connection therewith; it is therefore

Resolved, That his Honor the Mayor be requested to obtain the opinion of the Corporation Counsel concerning the rights and powers claimed as aforesaid, for the information and guidance of this Board in any action it may take in relation thereto.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, August 16, 1877.

Approved by the Mayor, September 3, 1877.

Whereas, The importance to this city, and many of its inhabitants, of direct communication by water, between the upper, lower, and intermediate portions of this city, cannot be overestimated; be it therefore

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be and are hereby directed, in advertising the sale of the franchise for a ferry between Harlem and Peck slip, and from Mott Haven to Fulton Market slip, to stipulate for a landing at or near the foot of Eighty-fourth street, East river, by the boats used by both ferries, each way, as often as the public convenience may require, but not less than once every hour, between the hours of 7 and 9 A. M. and 3 and 7 P. M.; and the said Commissioners of the Sinking Fund are hereby directed not to execute any lease for either of said ferries unless the stipulation above mentioned is included in such lease.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, August 16, 1877.

Received from his Honor the Mayor, September 3, 1877, without his approval or objections thereto; therefore, as provided in section 11, chapter 335, Laws of 1873, the same became adopted.

Whereas, In a large portion of the arrests made by the police for disorderly conduct, or intoxication, the persons so arrested, are found to have on them at the time, a pistol of some kind, and as the records of the criminal courts will show that in the largest portion of the arrests for murder or felonious assault the criminal claims he was drunk; and, was therefore unfit to carry any weapon of any kind, particularly as the majority of those arrested are under twenty-five years of age, and as such persons are always ready and willing to insult respectable citizens and draw a pistol on any and every occasion, while the better and law abiding class try to obey the laws and protect themselves with nothing but nature's weapons; therefore be it

Resolved, That any person arrested for disorderly conduct or intoxication, and having on the person at the time of arrest a pistol of any kind, the fact shall be stated to the police magistrate, and the officer shall state the fact in the complaint sworn to by him, and on the complaint being proven to the court, a fine shall be imposed not exceeding one hundred dollars or to stand committed not exceeding one hundred days.

Any person, however, who has occasion to carry a pistol for his protection, shall apply to the officer in command at the station-house of the precinct wherein he resides, and he, if satisfied that the applicant is a proper and law abiding person, shall give said person a recommendation to the Superintendent of Police or the Inspector in command at the Central Office in the absence of the Superintendent, who shall issue a permit to the said person allowing him to carry a weapon of the above description, and any person carrying one without a permit, shall be arrested for violation of this ordinance, and shall be fined or imprisoned the same as if he was also disorderly or intoxicated.

This ordinance to take effect immediately.

Resolved, That the Corporation Counsel be requested to give this Board an opinion, whether, under the general powers conferred on the Common Council, by section 17, sub-division 13, of the "Laws of 1873," this Board has not full power to pass and enforce this ordinance, prohibiting the carrying of pistols of any kind, with the penalties attached to the breaking of it.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, September 4, 1877.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to the "Original Sporting Social Club," to suspend and display a banner-sign across Third avenue and One Hundred and Forty-sixth street, such permission to continue only until September 24, 1877.

Resolved, That the name of Robert Pratti, recently appointed a Commissioner of Deeds, be corrected so as to read, when so amended, Robert Prati.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to A. L. Ashman to place and keep an ornamental lamp and post in front of his premises, No. 134 East Eighth street, the post not to exceed the usual dimensions, the work to be done at his own expense and gas to be supplied from his own meter, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Abstract of Proceedings for the week ending September 1, 1877.

WEDNESDAY, AUGUST 29.

Foreman Thos. Hodges, and John Beckett, special laborer, were allowed full time for absence; the former 3 days on account of death in his family, the latter 2 days on account of sickness.

The following material and extra work were ordered for the Museum of Art building, viz.:

1. Cloth to be hung in picture galleries, as provided in the carpenter's contract, at a cost not exceeding..... \$1,925 00
2. Kalsomining, at a cost not exceeding..... 420 00
3. Leader connections, at a cost not exceeding..... 35 00
4. Cement flooring in basement, at a cost not exceeding..... 2,000 00

Application was ordered to be made to the Common Council for an ordinance to authorize the setting of curb and gutter stones on One Hundred and Forty-fourth street, between Third and College avenues.

Permission was granted, conditionally, to Mr. Thomas Rac, Treasurer of the Morrisania Steamboat Company, to lay a small pipe across One Hundred and Thirty-third street and Lincoln avenue. Cornelius Westervelt was employed as carpenter in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, at \$2.75 per day.

The Director of the Menagerie was authorized to purchase an alligator, two gophers, and some skins for a price not exceeding \$10.

Messrs. Conrad Knaus and Hugh Williamson were granted permission to set curb and gutter stones on Elton avenue, opposite their property.

Permission was refused Mr. Jacob Rosenberg to sell fruit, etc., on the margin of the sidewalk of Reservoir square.

The proposition of Mr. Edward Van Orden, President of the Swiss Asphalte Rock Paving Co., to lay down \$1,500 worth of Neuchatel Asphalte Rock pavement, at the price of \$2.90 per square yard, and to take in payment the fifty tons of Neuchatel rock which the Department has and \$1,000 in cash, was accepted.

The following resolution, relating to the removal of fruit stands at the Battery, was adopted, viz.: Resolved, That all permits which may heretofore have been given to Mrs. Dolberg, Mr. or Mrs. McCarthy, or Mrs. Clifford, or to any one from whom they claim, be, and hereby are, revoked, and that they be directed to remove their stands from the Battery park, on or before November 1, 1877.

The licenses of certain water boys in Central Park were revoked.

Patrolmen Richard W. Morgan and George Walker, having been found guilty upon the charge of conversing together for half an hour while on duty, were each fined two days' pay.

Commissioner Wetmore reported verbally concerning the condition of certain streets and roads in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, viz.: One Hundred and Sixty-seventh street, Boston avenue, Sedgwick avenue, and Kingsbridge road, and presented a communication from the Superintendent of those Wards, giving in detail the repairs needed to them, and he recommended that the Superintendent be directed to have such repairs made to the extent that the appropriation for this year will permit, and that the materials necessary for that purpose be purchased on orders issued by the Treasurer.

Received and adopted.

The President reported that the Hon. August Belmont offered to give an eagle to the Department in exchange for a ram lamb. That he had reserved one of the ram lambs from the recent sale for Mr. Belmont. The action of the President was approved, and the lamb ordered to be delivered to Mr. Belmont, in exchange for the eagle.

The President stated that Mr. Alfred Edwards and other gentlemen, who took a deep interest in the subject of introducing small birds into the country, had requested that a half acre of the Central Park be sown with buckwheat, and allowed to grow and shed its seed, and he recommended that their request be granted.

The request was granted, and it was referred to the President, with power to determine to what extent, and in what location of the park, the buckwheat shall be sown.

Resolved, That, under the power conferred by law upon
the Health Department, the following additional section
of the Sanitary Code, for the security of life and health,
be and the same is hereby adopted and declared to form
a portion of the Sanitary Code:

Section 188. That hereafter, no Texas, Colorado, or
other dangerous cattle shall be driven through or along
the public streets, except in those cases only where the
cattle shall be landed at the foot of the street leading to
the slaughter-house to which such cattle shall be destined,
and where the street shall be effectually barred or closed,
so as to permit the escape of such cattle during the transfer
from the dock to such slaughter-house, and no such cattle
shall be landed except in accordance with the provisions
and restrictions of this ordinance.
