

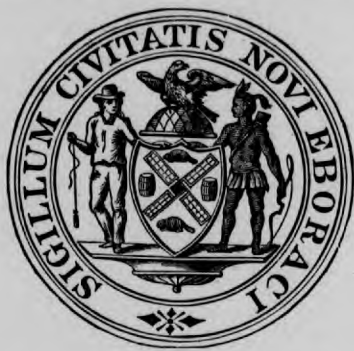

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LAWS OF NEW YORK, 1880.

CHAPTER 66.

AN ACT to confer power upon the common council of the city of New York to complete the restoration of Tompkins square as a public park.

Passed March 18, 1880; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. The common council of the city of New York is hereby authorized to direct the department of public parks of the city of New York to complete the restoration of Tompkins square as a public park or square.

Sec. 2. To provide the means for the work authorized by the first section of this act, the board of estimate and apportionment of the city of New York is hereby authorized and directed, within twenty days after requisition is made upon said board by the head of the department of public parks, to add to and include in the final estimate of the amounts required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business of the city and county of New York for the year eighteen hundred and eighty, an appropriation of twenty-five thousand dollars for the purpose, and it shall be the duty of the head of the said department of public parks to fully and entirely complete the work authorized by this act, within the amount appropriated for the purpose, before the close of the year eighteen hundred and eighty.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect immediately.

CHAPTER 67.

AN ACT to amend the Code of Civil Procedure.

Passed March 18, 1880; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. Subdivision two of section one thousand and eighty-one of "The Code of Civil Procedure" is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

§ 2. A practicing physician, surgeon, or surgeon dentist having patients requiring his daily professional attention, and not following any other calling, and a licensed pharmacist or pharmacist while actually engaged in his profession as a means of livelihood.

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

CHAPTER 73.

AN ACT to authorize the Ogdensburgh and Lake Champlain Railroad Company to issue bonds and to execute a mortgage to raise funds to provide for the retirement of its preferred stock and other purposes.

Passed March 23, 1880; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. The Ogdensburgh and Lake Champlain Railroad Company, a corporation duly organized and incorporated under and pursuant to the laws of the state of New York, is hereby authorized and empowered to issue its bonds to an amount not exceeding four millions five hundred thousand dollars, in such form and payable at such place and time as its directors may determine and to secure the payment of the whole or any part of said bonds by a mortgage upon its franchise, railroad and other property, both real and personal.

Sec. 2. The said bonds, or the proceeds thereof, shall be used only in the purchase, exchange or retirement of its preferred stock as hereinafter provided, in the purchase, exchange or payment of its present mortgage and other bonds, and in the construction of an elevator, building or purchasing new cars and engines, relaying its track with new rails, and other improvements to its property.

Sec. 3. The said company is hereby authorized and empowered, with the proceeds of said bonds, to purchase the whole or any part of its preferred stock or to exchange said bonds for the whole or any part of said preferred stock upon such terms as may be agreed on hereafter. And said stock, when so purchased or exchanged, shall be canceled by said company, and shall not thereafter be reissued. And said company shall, in its annual report to the state engineer and surveyor, state the amount of such stock so canceled until the whole of said preferred stock shall be so canceled.

Sec. 4. The directors of said Ogdensburgh and Lake Champlain Railroad Company shall not issue any of said bonds or execute such mortgage until the same shall be authorized by the vote of a majority of the stock of said company, represented and voted upon by the holders thereof in person or by proxy, as at an election for directors, at an annual meeting or special meeting called for that purpose, of which annual or special meeting a written or printed notice distinctly specifying its object, shall have been given at least thirty days previous to the time designated for holding the same, to all stockholders whose addresses shall be known to said company. Said notice may be served personally or by mail by depositing copies thereof in the post-office at Boston, Massachusetts, postage paid, and directed to the stockholders intended to be served at their respective places of residence or business, so far as known, and by publishing the same in the Boston Daily Journal, a newspaper published in the city of Boston, and in one newspaper in each of the counties of St. Lawrence, Franklin and Clinton, in this state, at least once in each week for thirty days prior to the day designated for said meeting.

Sec. 5. The said company shall keep a book, in which the ownership of any of the bonds issued under this act may be registered, which shall be open at all reasonable times during the usual hours of transacting business, to the examination of every stockholder or owner of said bonds issued under this act, for thirty days previous to the election of directors, and every owner of said bonds, the ownership of which in his name shall have been entered in said book at least thirty days previous to such election, shall have one vote, either personally or by proxy, for each one hundred dollars of said bonds, in the election of directors of said company, under the same regulations as apply to the votes of stockholders. The said book shall be kept in the office where the stock book of said company shall be kept, and shall be produced for the use of the inspectors of election at every meeting for the election of directors. The production of said bonds to the officer of said company in charge of said book shall entitle the holder thereof to the registry thereof in his name upon said book.

Sec. 6. This act shall take effect immediately.

CHAPTER 74.

AN ACT relative to lands under water in front of lands devised by James Morris, deceased.

Passed March 23, 1880; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. On the petition of William Henry Morris and his descendants in being, in person if of age, and by a next friend if infants, the supreme court, at a general or special term thereof,

held in the city and county of New York, may authorize the sale in fee simple absolute, or the lease for a term of years not to exceed twenty-one years, of all lands including lands between high and low-water mark, which have been heretofore granted or may hereafter be granted by the people of the state of New York to the said William Henry Morris and to his descendants, originally lying under the waters of the Harlem river in front of and adjacent to other lands which, in the will of James Morris, deceased, dated the twenty-seventh day of January, eighteen hundred and twenty-five, are known and described as the said testator's mansion house, and the residue of the farm of land whereon he then resided, and of all rights to, and interests in, the said land or other land under water in front of and adjacent to the said lands in said will described, whether such rights or interests are pre-emptive or otherwise, or of any part or parts of such lands, rights and interests from time to time as may be judged expedient and calculated to promote the interests of the descendants of the said James Morris, whether yet in being or not, to whom or for whose benefit the upland adjoining the said land under water is devised by said will after the death of the said William H. Morris. The court, upon the petition of the said William H. Morris, or of any other adult descendant of the said William H. Morris, shall appoint one or more suitable persons as the next friend or guardian, or next friends or guardians of such of the descendants of the said William H. Morris as may be infants, in relation to the proceedings on such application.

Sec. 2. The court shall, in respect to each sale, either authorize and direct the same to be by auction, on such terms as the court may prescribe, or shall ascertain, by the report of a referee or otherwise, the terms on which such sale shall be proposed to be made at private sale, and in every sale shall ascertain what portion of the price to be paid thereon is the proceeds of the interest, legal or equitable, of said William Henry Morris in the premises to be sold, and, if it shall seem proper, may direct such proposal to be confirmed, and the sale, if by auction, shall be reported to the court, and, if approved, the court may confirm the same and direct the sale to be made and a conveyance for the premises to be executed accordingly, by the said William H. Morris and a referee acting on behalf of his descendants in the premises. And in case of a lease of such lands, or any part thereof, the court shall, in like manner, ascertain the terms upon which said lease shall be proposed to be made, and may direct such proposal to be confirmed, and may authorize the said lease to be made and to be executed by the said William H. Morris, and a referee acting in behalf of his descendants in the premises.

Sec. 3. The portion of the proceeds of each sale which shall so appear to be produced from the interest of said William H. Morris shall be directed to be paid to him, and the residue thereof, after the payment of the necessary expenses and charges connected with the said sale, and said proceedings, shall be invested under the direction of the court for the benefit of such descendants of the said William H. Morris as may become interested therein under the said will; all or any part of such investment may be made by taking the bond of a purchaser for part of the purchase-money on any such sale, secured by a mortgage on the premises sold. And in case of a lease of the said premises, or of any part thereof, the rent reserved thereby may be directed to be paid to the said William H. Morris during his life-time, and, after his death, to such of his descendants as may be owner or owners of said premises.

Sec. 4. All sales and conveyances made as aforesaid in pursuance of such authority or direction shall be valid and effectual to vest the said lands sold or conveyed in the purchaser and his assigns in fee simple absolute; and all leases made as aforesaid in pursuance of such authority or direction shall be valid and effectual to vest the lands leased in the lessee and his assigns for the term of years thereby granted as against the said William Henry Morris, and as against all his descendants, whether in being or not, who might become entitled under the said will.

Sec. 5. This act shall take effect immediately.

CHAPTER 76.

AN ACT to amend section one of chapter two hundred and twelve of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-nine, entitled "An act to provide for the distribution of the acts passed by the legislature to town clerks' offices."

Passed March 23, 1880; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. Section one of chapter two hundred and twelve of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-nine, entitled "An act to provide for the distribution of the acts passed by the legislature to town clerks' offices," is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

§ 1. It shall be the duty of the secretary of state to forward by mail, or by express, to the clerks of each of the counties of this state a sufficient number of printed slips of the acts passed by the legislature at each session, as soon as approved by the governor, to supply the clerk of each town and incorporated village in their respective counties with one copy thereof.

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

Abstract of Proceedings for week ending with March 27, 1880.

Meeting held Tuesday, March 23, 1880. Special Meeting, 10 A. M.

The Board met in pursuance to a call to take action in reference to the death of the late Commissioner Wetmore.

Present—Commissioner Wenman, (President), Conover, and Lane.

The reading of the minutes of the previous meeting was dispensed with.

The President officially notified the Board of the death of Commissioner William C. Wetmore, and moved that the following be entered on the minutes:

The members of the Board governing the Department of Public Parks have learned with feelings of profound regret of the death of their late associate and fellow Commissioner William C. Wetmore, and are moved by the event to record upon the minutes an expression of their sorrow, and that in our deceased co-worker we have ever found a zealous promoter of the best interests of the public welfare, a judicious counselor, a warm friend, and a constant advocate of harmony in our midst; that while remembering that he died at a ripe age, leaving behind him an honorable name and an enduring legacy in the record of a useful and honorably spent life, we offer this simple testimonial to the memory of our departed friend. As a tribute of respect to our late associate, it is ordered that the offices of the Department be closed and all work suspended on the day of the funeral, and that a copy of these proceedings be suitably engrossed, duly authenticated, and forwarded to his family. Seconded by Commissioner Lane, and unanimously adopted.

On motion of Commissioner Conover, the Board adjourned out of respect to the memory of the late Commissioner Wetmore.

From William Kyle, asking that renewal of privilege for keeping boats on Harlem Meer be granted him. Granted for one year.

From Daniel O'Callaghan, desiring permission to occupy house on Riverside Drive when vacated. Ordered filed.

From Thomas D. Cathman, desiring to furnish tree-guards for Tompkins Square and elsewhere similar to those in use at Worth Monument; whereupon the Treasurer was authorized to place two new tree-guards around trees at Worth Monument.

The President was directed to prepare and submit to the Mayor the quarterly report of the Department for the three months ending March 31, 1880.

From Mr. Lemuel Bang, suggesting necessary repairs to Mount Morris Park. Referred to Superintending Architect to report upon.

From Mr. Gustav Schwab, relative to the construction of suspension bridge over Harlem river. Laid over.

P. J. Masterson was appointed Assistant Foreman under Foreman Hodges, at \$3 per day.
J. J. Purroy was appointed Inspector on bridge over Harlem river, at \$4 per day, to be paid by Yonkers and West Side Railway Company.

John B. Shay was appointed Inspector on sewer in One Hundred and Forty-second street, at \$4 per day.

Twenty-one laborers were appointed for duty on the Central Park.
Fifteen laborers were appointed for duty in Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards.
Three double teams were employed for duty in Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards.
Twelve laborers were appointed for duty on Manhattan square.

The Secretary was directed to advertise for proposals for furnishing and delivering on the Central and City Parks and on the Southern Boulevard, screened gravel from the Roa Hook bank, bids to be received on a basis of 20,000 yards, the Department reserving the right to increase or diminish the amount to the extent of 25 per cent.

The Treasurer was authorized to issue an order for two hundred park settees of the same pattern as those now in use on the city parks.

A communication was received from Bertha C. L. Shedler, asking for a renewal of lease of High Bridge Hotel for five years. Laid on table.

BOARD OF STREET OPENING AND IMPROVEMENT.

The Board of Street Opening and Improvement met in the Mayor's Office at 2 P. M., on Tuesday, March 23d, 1880.

All were present, viz.: Edward Cooper, Mayor; John Kelly, Comptroller; Allan Campbell, Commissioner of Public Works; James F. Wenman, President of the Department of Public Parks; John J. Morris, President of the Board of Aldermen.

The minutes of January 21, 1880, were read and approved.

The Mayor presented a communication dated March 4, 1880, from Abner Bartlett, Esq., on behalf of Messrs J. J. and William Astor, opposing the proposed extension of Washington street, from Little West Twelfth street to West Fourteenth street.

Which was read and ordered on file.

The Secretary presented affidavits from the office of the Supervisor of the CITY RECORD of the publication for ten days of the notices signed by the members of the Board of Street Opening and Improvement of their proposed action relative to the extension of Washington street, from Little West Twelfth to West Fourteenth streets, and to West Fifty-third street from the Tenth avenue to Eleventh avenue, and West Fifty-fourth street from the Tenth avenue to the established bulkhead line on the Hudson river.

Dr. Jaynes, representing the Board of Health, stated that a private sewer existed in West Fifty-fourth street, and he would like to again examine the said street.

The subject of opening and laying out West Fifty-fourth street was then laid over for future consideration.

The Mayor offered for adoption the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Board of Street Opening and Improvement, deeming it to be for the public interest to lay out and open West Fifty-third street as laid down on the map or plan of the City of New York, from the Tenth avenue to the Eleventh avenue, and its proposed action relative thereto having been laid before the Board of Aldermen and published for ten days in the CITY RECORD, hereby lays out and opens said streets as above set forth and described.

The Chairman put the question upon the adoption of said resolution.

Affirmative—The Mayor, Comptroller, Commissioner of Public Works, President of the Department of Public Parks, and President of the Board of Aldermen.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to cause to be prepared the necessary papers and maps in accordance with section 105 of chapter 335 of the Laws of 1873.

Resolved, That Boulevard lamps be substituted for the ordinary street-lamps in Pleasant avenue, from One Hundred and Sixteenth street to the Harlem river, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Resolved, That the grade of Ninety-fifth street, between Fourth and Fifth avenues, be so changed and established as to form a straight line between the present grade of Fifth avenue at its intersection with Ninety-fifth street, which is seventy-nine (79) feet above high water, and the present grade of Madison avenue at its intersection of Ninety-fifth street, which is ninety-one sixteen one-hundredths (91 16-100) feet above high water, and the present grade of Fourth avenue, at its intersection of Ninety-fifth street, which is one hundred and one (101) feet above high water, as shown by the blue line on the accompanying diagram, and under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, March 16, 1880.

Resolved, That the vacant lots in Sixtieth street, between Tenth and Eleventh avenues, be fenced in, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Approved by the Mayor, March 23, 1880.

Whereas, In the construction of the elevated railroads in the Second, Third, Sixth, and other avenues and streets of this city, some of the posts are so placed as to be directly in or near the centre of the space formed by the intersecting streets and avenues, rendering travel in the night time extremely dangerous, from the liability of vehicles to collide with such posts; and

Whereas, The dropping of oil, grease, water, coals, scraps of iron, tools, or other liquid or solid substances from the elevated railways into the streets and avenues beneath, is a source of much annoyance, damage and even positive danger to the persons and property of large numbers of our citizens; therefore be it

Ordnained by the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. There shall be placed or suspended and lighted, on or from every elevated railroad post, column, or pillar standing in or near the intersection of every street or avenue, on the outer side of such post, column or pillar facing the street or avenue which intersects the street or avenue through which such elevated railroad is constructed, a gas-light inclosed in a glass globe, or lamp of such pattern and construction as shall be approved by the Commissioner of Public Works, the work to be done and the gas used for the purpose of lighting the said lamps to be furnished at the expense of the elevated railroad company aforesaid; said gas to be kept burning during the same hours as the ordinary street lamps. Every failure to comply with the provisions of this section of this ordinance, on the part of the president, superintendent, directors, or other officers of every such railroad company, shall be deemed a misdemeanor, and shall be punished, on conviction before any of the Police Magistrates of this city, by a fine not exceeding ten dollars (\$10) for each offense, or in default of payment of such fine, by imprisonment not exceeding ten days.

Sec. 2. It shall not be lawful to permit any oil, grease, water, coals, scraps of iron, tools, or other liquid or solid substances to fall or be dropped or be thrown from any engine, car, track, depot, or other part or portion of the elevated railroads, into or upon any street, avenue, or public place in this city; and every person offending against the above provisions of this section, and the president, superintendent, directors, or other officers of every such railroad company who shall permit or allow any of the employees, agents, or servants of any such railroad company to violate any of said provisions of this section shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction thereof before any of the Police Justices of this city, shall pay a fine not exceeding ten dollars (\$10) for each offense, or in default of payment of said fine, shall be punished by imprisonment not exceeding ten (10) days.

Sec. 3. The Commissioners of Police are hereby specially instructed to carry into effect and rigidly enforce the provisions of this ordinance.

Sec. 4. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 5. Section 1 of this ordinance shall take effect on the first day of July, 1880, and section 2, immediately.
