



To the Honorable FRANKLIN EDSON, Mayor of the City of New York:

SIR—For the quarter ending December 31, 1882, the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments respectfully report:

On the first Monday of September, 1882, according to law, the Deputy Tax Commissioners, under direction of the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments, commenced to assess all the taxable property in their several districts; that said assessments are now substantially finished, and the books of "The Annual Record of the Assessed Valuation of Real and Personal Estate," for the year 1883, will be open for examination and correction on and after the second Monday of January, 1883, and that advertisement of said opening of the books has been made in the CITY RECORD and other daily papers.

In accordance with a resolution of the Board of Aldermen, passed April 11, 1882, and a resolution of the Board of Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, passed April 26, 1882, the offices of the Department of Taxes and Assessments were removed from No. 32 Chambers street to the "Staats Zeitung" building, on the 20th of October, 1882.

The decision of the Court of Appeals, rendered October 10, 1882, in "The People ex rel. Leonard, etc., vs. The Board of Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments," wherein it was held that the premium on bonds of the United States is exempt from taxation, will necessarily disturb the aggregate assessed valuation of personal estate for the year 1882; but to what amount cannot be definitely stated at this time. The aggregate valuation of taxable property will be correspondingly decreased for the year 1883.

GENTLEMEN—I have the honor to inform you
that the following work has been done during the
last week upon the Bridge, viz.:

There has been erected 66 pieces of top chords,
638 main truss pins, 2 posts, 24 main truss diago-
nals and 2 over floor stays.

A very large part of the force has been em-
ployed this week in adjusting the roadway, so
that the pins could be put in place in the top
chords. Arrangements have also been com-
pleted for planking the bridge, and the work
will commence this week. On the New York
approach the ballasting of the railroad has been
going on, and in Brooklyn the foundations for
machinery and the boiler house are progressing
satisfactorily.

Thirty-eighth and One Hundred and Thirty-ninth
streets.

Avenue D flagging, east side, between Thirteenth and
Fourteenth streets.

Fifth Avenue basin, west side, opposite One Hundred

Courtland Avenue crosswalks, between Third Avenue
and One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street.

Section 5 of the said act provides that, "If any such
assessment shall remain unpaid for the period of sixty
days after the date of entry thereof in the said record of
titles of assessments, it shall be the duty of the officer
authorized to collect and receive the amount of such as-
sessment, to charge, collect and receive legal interest thereon
at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calcu-
lated from the date of such entry to the date of pay-
ment."

The above assessments are payable to the Collector of
