



HEADQUARTERS FIRE DEPARTMENT,
CITY OF NEW YORK, October 13, 1875.

The Board of Commissioners met this day.
Present—President Joseph L. Perley, in the chair, and Commissioners Roswell D. Hatch and Vincent C. King.

Abstract of the proceedings of the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks for the week ending October 23, 1875.

\$6,600 was set apart for the keeping, preservation, and exhibition of the collections of the Museum of Art for the year 1875, in addition to the amount already expended.

It was directed that the draw of Central bridge be closed on and after the 25th inst., for the purpose of repairing it, and that the work be prosecuted with all practicable speed.
