Contagious and infectious diseases show a slight decrease, the number of cases reported of diphtheria, measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever and small-pox being respectively 199, 180, 53, 15 and 0, against 211, 155, 77, 22 and 0 for the previous week, a total of 447 against 465. The increase of diphtheria was mainly in the Sixteenth and Twenty-second Wards, and the decrease in the Nineteenth and Twentieth Wards. The increase of measles was most marked in the Tenth, Eleventh and Thirteenth Wards, and the decrease in the Seventhe, Twelfth and Twenty-fourth Wards. The decrease of scarlet tever was chiefly in the Seventeenth and Twenty-second Wards. Eight of the 15 cases of typhoid fever were above Fortieth street, and 4 were below Four-teenth street.
