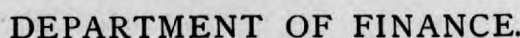

BOROUGH OF QUEENS.

The Local Board of the Borough of Queens assembled at the office of the President, in Hackett's Building, Long Island City, on January 13, 1899.
Present thereat were Councilman David L. Van Nostrand, Alderman Joseph Geiser and President Frederick Bowley.

Minutes of the previous meeting duly approved.

The Secretary, having read the petition of the Property Owners' Association of Rockaway Beach and others for special meeting of this Board to devise ways and means whereby the sidewalks in such district may be put in proper condition, the President announced to the large delegation present the necessity of giving definite expression to their wishes by petition to this Board, setting forth therein the particular streets and the points between which such improvements are required.

The next matter taken up was the petition for the construction of sewers in Eldert avenue, from Jamaica Bay to Atlantic Ocean, and Chase avenue, from Jamaica Bay to Atlantic Ocean. As there was no opposition to this request of the Property Owners' Association and others at Rockaway Beach, Councilman Van Nostrand offered the following, which was duly adopted:

Whereas, Petition has been filed with the President of the Borough of Queens by the property-owners in Rockaway Beach, Fifth Ward, borough aforesaid, for the construction of sewer in Eldert avenue, from Jamaica Bay to Atlantic Ocean, and Chase avenue, from Jamaica Bay to Atlantic Ocean, of said place; and

Whereas, After the publication of notice thereof, as required by the City Charter, public hearing before the Local Board was this day had thereon; now be and it is hereby

Resolved, That this Board approve of said petition and recommend to the Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York that it take prompt and favorable action towards affecting a speedy construction of said sewers, as asked for therein.

For the information of those present from Rockaway Beach, the President made announcement that the public hearing on the application of the Postal Telegraph Cable Company (office, New York City) for franchise to erect poles, etc., through the Fourth and Fifth Wards, this borough, would take place on the 20th instant, and caused the Secretary to read such petition.

BOARD OF LOCAL IMPROVEMENTS.

BOROUGH OF QUEENS.

The Local Board of the Borough of Queens held its regular weekly meeting at the Hackett Building, Jackson avenue and Fifth street, Long Island City, January 20, 1899.

Present—Councilmen David L. Van Nostrand and Joseph Cassidy, Alderman Joseph Geiser and President Frederick Bowley.

In accordance with public notice given through CITY RECORD, public hearing on the application of the Postal Telegraph Cable Company for approval in recommendation to the Municipal Assembly, City of New York, that it adopt an ordinance granting to the Postal Telegraph Cable Company right to construct and maintain its telegraph lines along certain streets in the Borough of Queens, City of New York, with resolutions in relation thereto.

Commencing at the end of the Kings County Elevated Railroad on Liberty avenue in the Borough of Queens, City of New York, State of New York, over and along Liberty avenue to Rockaway road, over and along Rockaway road to Jamaica Turnpike, over and along Jamaica Turnpike to Lawrence avenue, over and along Lawrence avenue to Bay View avenue, over and along Bay View avenue to McNeil avenue, over and along McNeil avenue to Central avenue, over and along Central avenue to Mott avenue, over and along Mott avenue to White street, over and along White street to Carnago avenue, over and along Carnago avenue to Central avenue, over and along Central avenue to South street, over and along South street to Tackapoucha Hotel; thence along private property to Edgemere street, over and along Edgemere street to Edgemere avenue, over and along Edgemere avenue to the Boulevard, over and along the Boulevard to the Arverne Hotel at Rockaway Beach; also from a point on Jamaica Turnpike where Farmers' avenue to the Merrick road, over and along the Merrick road to the Nassau County line.

Eight protests were received by mail against the approval of the aforesaid and from amongst the large number of persons present in opposition thereto, the following gentlemen addressed the Board, viz.:

M. J. Mulqueen, President Arverne-by-the-Sea Association; William Scheer; William H. Armerman, President Anti-Barren-Island League; Abe Stein, R. Vernon, Ebon Dimon, J. J. Lennahan, and Messrs. Costigan, Avery and Summerfield.

C. J. Hubbard appeared on behalf of the company and after making his statement offered to eliminate that portion of the proposed route which is set forth as "over and along the Boulevard to the Arverne Hotel at Rockaway Beach." The President ruled that the record of the matter before the Board, together with the notice of public hearing thereon as published embraced the whole route described by the company, and whatsoever action the Board would take upon the application of the company, it would be on same in its entirety.

At the close of the hearing, the consideration by the Board toward arriving at a conclusion was postponed.

Announcement was made by the President that at next meeting, 27th instant, public hearing will be had upon the petitions to recommend the legal opening of the following: Van Alst avenue, from Nott avenue to Hoyt avenue; Academy street, from Hunter avenue to Grand avenue; Crescent street, from Nott avenue to Berrian's Creek; Hoyt avenue, from Flushing avenue to East river; DeBevoise avenue, from Jackson avenue to Berrian's Creek, all in First Ward this borough.

Upon motion of Councilman Cassidy the following was duly adopted:

Whereas, It appears that the Board of Public Improvements has recommended to the Municipal Assembly for its approval the authorization of advertising and entering into contract for the laying of asphalt strips on certain streets in the First Ward of this Borough, including Thomson avenue; and

Whereas, It appears that the roadway of said Thomson avenue can be put in good condition by repaving same with macadam pavement at about the same cost, and it appears doubtful if the asphalt strips can be maintained without great cost; therefore be it

Resolved, by the Local Board of the Borough of Queens, That the repaving with macadam instead of the laying of asphalt strips be recommended and the Board of Public Improvements be requested to amend their proposed ordinance to comply with this resolution.

The following was introduced by Councilman Cassidy and, upon motion, duly adopted:

Whereas, It appears from complaint and investigation that the roadways leading to some of the principal schools in this borough are at present and have been for some time in bad condition; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Commissioner of Highways be requested to give same his immediate attention and have said sidewalks and roadways put in good condition as soon as possible.

The following was also adopted:

Resolved, That the copy of petition of private property-owners for permit to construct sewer along Norman street and Summerfield street, Ridgewood, Second Ward, this borough, and to connect with sewer now laid in Wyckoff avenue, and which petition has attached thereto communication of Deputy Sewer Commissioner, this borough, setting forth that no objection thereto exists, be and the same is hereby approved by this Board.

Communication from John P. Madden, Deputy Commissioner of Highways, dated January 17, 1899, in relation to repairing Henry street, from Crescent to Ely avenue, First Ward, this borough, was read, ordered to be filed, and the petitioner to be furnished with copy thereof.

Communication from Board of Public Improvements, relative to petition for sewer in Park place, First Ward, this borough, was read, filed and directions given that the property-owners who signed the petition be acquainted with the substance thereof.

Communication from City Clerk of New York, dated January 17, 1899, was read and placed on file and is in part as follows:

"I have been requested by the Committee on Water Supply of the Council to inquire as to whether an ordinance presented by the Board of Public Improvements, to improve the pumping plant at College Point, meets with the approval of your Board."

In relation with the foregoing the following was adopted:

Resolved, That the Local Board of the Borough of Queens in meeting assembled the 20th day of January, 1899, does hereby approve of the following to be adopted by the Municipal Assembly.

No. 1079.

Be it Ordained by the Municipal Assembly of The City of New York as follows:

That, in pursuance of Section 413 of the Greater New York Charter, the following resolution of the Board of Public Improvements, adopted by that Board on the 5th day of December, 1898, be and the same is hereby approved, and the public work or improvement therein provided for is hereby authorized, viz.:

Resolved, by the Board of Public Improvements, That, in pursuance of section 413 of the Greater New York Charter, the improvement of the pumping plant at College Point, Borough of Queens, under the direction of the Commissioner of Water Supply, be and the same is hereby

authorized and approved, the cost of said public work or improvement to be paid for from funds now in the hands of the Comptroller, obtained by the issue of bonds for that purpose.

Copy of communication by the President of this Board to the Health Board, City of New York, dated 19th inst. (see letter press, page 343), in reference to Barren Island nuisance was read, and thus made a part of this record.
