BOARD OF EXAMINERS.

MINUTES OF THE BOARD OF EXAMINERS.

Meeting held at the office of the Board, Rooms Nos. 516 and 517, No. 1 Madison avenue, New York, April 15, 1902. Meeting called to order at 3 p. m.

Present—Messrs. Francis C. Moore, William J. Fryer, Warren A. Conover, William C. Smith, Cornelius O'Reilly, Chief Croker and A. E. D'Oench (Chairman).

The Clerk called the meeting to order and stated that the Chairman was detained, and had requested by telephone that the Board proceed with the order of business for the day. Whereupon, on motion duly made and seconded, Mr. William J. Fryer was named as Chairman pro tem.

Mr. Fryer then took the chair.

Appeal No. 45 of 1902, New Building 1042 of 1901, premises north side of Thirty-fourth street, about 175 feet from the westerly corner of Eighth avenue, and extending through to Thirty-fifth street; Oscar Hammerstein, appellant; William E. Mowbray, architect (laid over March 18, 1902).

Mr. Mowbray appeared in explanation of the detailed drawings submitted by request of the Board.

On motion, duly made and seconded, approved on condition that the construction be found of adequate strength for the purpose by the Superintendent of Buildings.

Appeal No. 57 of 1902, New Building 128 of 1902, premises Eighty-first and 1 Eighty-second streets, East End avenue and East river (laid over April 8, 1902); George Haiss, appellant; Mr. Haiss appeared in explanation.

The appellant having filed new application, stating location correctly, and on verbal recommendation of Chief Croker, motion was duly made and seconded that appeal be approved.

Appeal No. 60 of 1902, New Building 157 of 1902, premises southeast corner of One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street and Eighth avenue; J. F. Kelly, appellant (laid over April 8, 1902).

On motion, duly made and seconded, denied.

Appeal No. 66 of 1902, New Building 270 of 1902, Queens, east side of West avenue, about 35 feet south of Flushing street, Long Island City, Roscoe Lumber Company, appellant; (referred to Superintendent of Buildings, Borough of Queens, April 8, 1902).

The Chairman presented a communication from the Superintendent of Buildings for the Borough of Queens in regard to said appeal, which was ordered on file.

On motion, duly made and seconded, approved.

Appeal No. 71 of 1902, Alteration (no number), Brooklyn, south side of Herkimer street, southeast corner of Dewey place; Charles Brann, architect and appellant.

"To allow new frame portion as per plans and on account of roofing over the arch of present building to fulfill the intentions of interior alterations, and that the portion of alteration only protrudes through roof of present frame building similar to what now exists, only somewhat longer; also the locality is not built up. There are other frame buildings in the vicinity."

Mr. Brann appeared before the Board in explanation.

On motion, duly made and seconded, approved on condition that the interior portion of the building changed by proposed alterations be wire-lathed and plastered on the inside, and that the outside of the added portion be covered with metal.

Chief Croker recorded as voting no.

Mr. D'Oench then arrived and took the chair.

Appeal No. 72 of 1902, New Building 417 of 1902, premises northwest corner of Berry street and North Tenth street, Brooklyn, Hecla Iron Works, owner A. W. Sandblom, architect and appellant.

"I. As the walls are to be built with Rosendale cement (no lime will be used) it is desired to reduce said walls 4 inches in thickness."

"II. It is desired to place on the north and south longitudinal walls galvanized iron gutters instead of parapet walls."

Mr. William Lamb appeared before the Board in explanation of the appeal.

On motion, duly made and seconded, approved.

Appeal No. 73 of 1902, New Building 104 of 1902, Manhattan, Nos. 28 to 32 West Twenty-second street; Messrs. Schickel & Ditmars, architects and appellants.

"In the matter of staircases required to comply with section 75 of the Building Code: The building is divided through the middle by a brick wall which separates the two stairways shown on plans. The area covered is 7,292 square feet and two separate and distinct fire-escapes are provided at extremes of the building. It is contended that with the two exterior fire-escapes and the two exterior stairways the building is practically as safe for tenants as it can well be made, and complies with the spirit of the law in the section mentioned. As each floor is divided into only two lots it would seem as though the two staircases are sufficient, and the owner is willing to make the fire-escapes of design approved by the Honorable Board and the Superintendent of Buildings."

Mr. Ditmar appeared before the Board in explanation.

On motion, duly made and seconded, approved on condition that the building be provided with iron outside staircases in the rear, landing in the first story; that behind all grill work inclosing first-story elevator shall be wire glass in metal frames; and that the doors at each floor shall be fireproof, with wire glass panels.

Appeal No. 74 of 1902, New Building 159 of 1902, premises No. 14 East Sixtieth street, Raleigh C. Gildersleeve, architect and appellant.

"1st—To allow a pent-house to be built upon the roof of said building according to plans submitted, using the same materials for interior trim, doors and windows, etc., as are permitted in case of buildings 150 feet or 12 stories in height; and that the lot area to be left uncovered at the second floor level shall be as shown on plans of building, viz., 72½ per cent. of total lot area."

"2d—To permit the front (north) wall of pent-house to be made of 4-inch hollow terracotta blocks covered with cement for the reason that a 12-inch brick wall would impose upon the steel columns and girders below an unnecessary load, and that this wall not being directly on the street the requirements as to front walls are not necessary for the safety of the building."

"All the materials and the work of construction will be in all respects similar to those specified for the building proper."

Mr. Alfred F. Evans appeared in explanation.

On motion, duly made and seconded, denied.

Appeal No. 75 of 1902, New Building 118 of 1902, premises Sixty-second to Sixty-third street, Central Park, West; J. B. McElpatrick & Son, architects and appellants. "With reference to the stores shown on the plans as extending 40 feet from the building line, we request that a modification of the Building Law be permitted on account of the character of the building, which, although one for public amusement, is of the nature of a fireproof baseball stand and shed rather than a theatre.

"The stores are completely cut off from the rest of the building by brick walls and by ceilings of Roebbling fireproof construction of steel beams and concrete arches.

"There is nothing of an inflammable nature in the whole building in the way of hangings or decorative features.

"The exits provided in the event of panic are amply sufficient. The whole audience from the first tier of seats can get down immediately into the court and playing-court, that are level with the streets, and thence to the streets by the exit doors provided, besides having the main doors and exit stairs to the front of the building and the fire escapes."

Mr. Bonsfield and Mr. Miles appeared in explanation.

On motion, duly made and seconded, approved on condition (a) that the brick walls inclosing the stairs be made twelve inches thick; (b) that the ceilings over stores be made of iron beams, filled in with fireproof arches; (c) that staircases leading from restaurants to kitchen be inclosed with fireproof materials, with fireproof self-closing doors at top and bottom; (d) that partitions surrounding cafe and restaurant be made of wire glass in metal frames; (e) that the aisles on the first gallery be carried through the line of boxes (to permit ready escape of inmates); and (f) that the floor surface of cafe, restaurant and kitchen be of incombustible material.

Appeal No. 76 of 1902, Alteration 393 of 1902, premises No. 239 Lexington avenue, John W. Ingle, Esq., architect and appellant:

"Permission is requested to cover 93 3/4 per cent. of the lot area with a building as shown by plans, for the following reasons: The building will be used as stores on the basement and first floor; the second, third and fourth floors are to be used as bachelor apartments, containing a total of eleven (11) sleeping rooms, all of which have large outward windows and high ceilings. No cooking will be done; no coal grates will be provided; gas logs used in open fireplaces. On account of the size of the lot, 23 feet by 80 feet, and being situated on the corner of two wide streets, every portion of the building will be exceptionally well lighted and ventilated. It is not proposed to carry the building higher than at present."

On motion, duly made and seconded, approved.

Ordered, That General Order No. 358, issued June 15, 1897, establishing headquarters for a Bicycle Squad at No. 1786 Broadway, Borough of Manhattan, is rescinded, and the Bicycle Squad is abolished as a separate command, to take effect at 8 a. m. April 17, 1902.

The members of the force heretofore comprising the Bicycle Squad of Manhattan and Brooklyn have been assigned to various precincts, the Sergeants, Roundsmen and Doormen to perform the duties appropriate to their several ranks in the precincts to which they are assigned, and the Patrolmen to perform patrol duty in the precincts to which they are assigned, on bicycles or on foot, accordingly as circumstances make either method practicable or necessary.

The commanding officer of a precinct to which Bicycle Patrolmen may be assigned will arrange their posts within his precinct in such manner as to cover as effectively as possible the streets and avenues upon which the services of Bicycle Police-men are the most useful.

Except in winter, the tours of duty for the Bicycle Patrolmen will be from 10 a. m. to 5 p. m. and from 5 p. m. to 12 midnight, the men alternating with one another at regular intervals on day and night duty, and so far as practicable the same number of men doing each tour. When the season is so far advanced as in the judgment of the precinct commander to make it impracticable to continue the use of bicycles for patrol duty on account of snow and stormy weather, the Bicycle Patrolmen will be assigned by the precinct commander to sections, and will so remain, doing patrol duty by regular tours, until such time as it is again practicable to use bicycles for patrol duty, when the special tours above described will be resumed by the Bicycle Patrolmen.

Members of the Bicycle Squad assigned to precincts will take their bicycles with them, and will be responsible for the proper care of same. When transferred to another precinct they will take their bicycles with them, unless otherwise ordered, or unless assigned to other than bicycle duty.

Ordered, That Rule 13 of the Rules and Regulations, so far as the same applies to the Bicycle Squad as a separate command, be and is hereby abrogated.

Ordered, That Sergeant Thomas McCormick, in charge of the Bicycle Squad, be directed to deliver to the Chief Clerk of the Police Department at 8 a. m. April 17, 1902, all the records of the Bicycle Squad in his possession as commanding officer of such squad.
