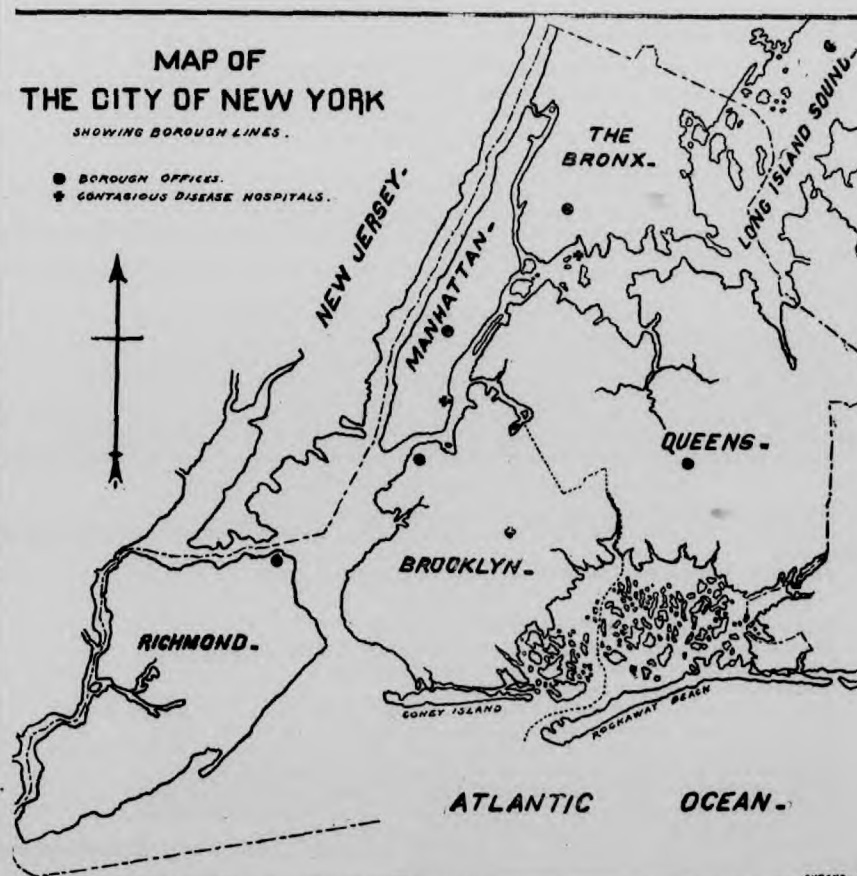

Plan 2811, Alterations to Buildings, 1899—Petition to allow a reconsideration of decision of Board at meeting held January 16, 1900, so as to permit the roof construction to be of wooden beams instead of iron; also to allow the additional story to be placed in rear of building instead of in center, as formerly proposed; roof over housing of water-tank also to be constructed of wood instead of iron beams, all as stated in petition; Nos. 314 and 316 East Forty-eighth street. Petitioner, C. F. Hattinger & Co. Reconsidered and laid over.
