That the use of said premises as a stable in its present condition be discontinued; that the said premises be cleaned; that the filth-saturated soil be removed and replaced with fresh earth, and the surface so graded that all surface water shall be freely discharged therefrom; that all offensive earth be removed from beneath the stable floor, and said stable be cemented and so graded and drained as to discharge all liquid matter into cesspool thereat through a tight earthenware drain; that the milkhouse be properly drained to cesspool thereat; that the floor of milkhouse be made water tight, and the door opening from milkhouse into stable boarded up and permanently sealed; that the backs and udders of cows be cleaned before milking; that the number of cows be reduced to thirty-two; that the walls and ceiling of milkhouse be cleaned and whitewashed.

Whereas, The premises Fresh Pond road, near Metropolitan avenue, north of railroad, Borough of Queens, in The City of New York, and the business pursuit specified in this case, being in the opinion of the Board in a condition and in effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance, and the Board having taken and filed among its records the reports of the Sanitary Superintendent and the Inspectors relating thereto, and what it regards as sufficient proof to authorize its declaration that the premises and business pursuit in this case are in condition and effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance—the Board hereby enters in its records the said premises as a nuisance, and declares the same to be a public nuisance dangerous to life and health, and in respect thereto orders, viz.:

That the use of said premises as a stable in its present condition be discontinued; that the said premises be cleaned; that the filth-saturated soil be removed and replaced with fresh earth, and the surface so graded that all surface water shall be freely discharged therefrom; that all offensive earth be removed from beneath the stable floor, and said stable be cemented and so graded and drained as to discharge all liquid matter into a properly constructed cesspool through a tight earthen or iron drain; that the walls and ceiling of stable be whitewashed and ceiling made dust tight; that the udders of cows be cleaned before milking and said cows exercised daily; that the stable be properly lighted and ventilated; that all communication between the milk room and living apartment be permanently sealed; that all utensils used for milk be cleaned in hot soda solution before reusing; that a water-tight manure box with tight-fitting cover be provided.

Whereas, The premises No. 1441 Metropolitan avenue, Metropolitan, Borough of Queens, in The City of New York, and the business pursuit specified in this case, being in the opinion of the Board in a condition and in effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance, and the Board having taken and filed among its records the reports of the Sanitary Superintendent and the Inspectors relating thereto, and what it regards as sufficient proof to authorize its declaration that the premises and business pursuit in this case are in condition and effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance—the Board hereby enters in its records the said premises as a nuisance, and declares the same to be a public nuisance dangerous to life and health, and in respect thereto orders, viz.:

That the use of said premises as a stable in its present condition be discontinued; that the said premises be cleaned; that the filth-saturated soil be removed and replaced with fresh earth, and the surface so graded that all surface water shall be freely discharged therefrom; that the stable and milk house be cleaned and whitewashed,

and the premises cleaned; that the small stable have a gutter behind the cows with a proper pitch to completely drain the stable, and the number of cows kept therein be reduced to three or the stable enlarged so as to give each cow 600 cubic feet of air space; that the number of cows in the large stable be reduced to sixteen or the stable enlarged so as to give each cow 600 cubic feet of air space; that an air-tight cover be put on the cesspool.

Whereas, The premises Metropolitan avenue, near Newtown Creek, Metropolitan, Borough of Queens, in The City of New York, and the business pursuit specified in this case, being in the opinion of the Board in a condition and in effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance, and the Board having taken and filed among its records the reports of the Sanitary Superintendent and the Inspectors relating thereto, and what it regards as sufficient proof to authorize its declaration that the premises and business pursuit in this case are in condition and effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance, the Board hereby enters in its records the said premises as a nuisance, and declares the same to be a public nuisance dangerous to life and health, and in respect thereto orders, viz.:

That the use of said premises as a stable in its present condition be discontinued; that the said premises be cleaned; that the filth-saturated soil be removed and replaced with fresh earth, and the surface so graded that all surface water shall be freely discharged therefrom; that all offensive earth be removed from beneath the stable and said stable be cemented and so graded and drained as to discharge all liquid matter into a properly-constructed cesspool through a tight iron drain; that the cows and utensils be thoroughly cleaned daily with hot water; that a milk room with cement floor be provided entirely separate from stable; that a proper manure box be provided with a tight-fitting cover; that the number of cows be reduced to nineteen.

Whereas, The premises, Old South road, Aqueduct, Borough of Queens, in The City of New York, and the business pursuit specified in this case being, in the opinion of the Board, in a condition and in effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance, and the Board having taken and filed among its records the reports of the Sanitary Superintendent and the Inspectors relating thereto, and what it regards as sufficient proof to authorize its declaration that the premises and business pursuit in this case are in condition and effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance, the Board hereby enters in its records the said premises as a nuisance, and declares the same to be a public nuisance, dangerous to life and health, and in respect thereto orders, viz.:

That the use of said premises as a stable, in its present condition, be discontinued; that the said premises be cleaned; that the filth-saturated soil be removed and replaced with fresh earth, and the surface so graded that all surface water shall be freely discharged therefrom; that the stable and premises be cleaned and stable whitewashed; that the manure be removed at once, and properly covered water-tight manure boxes be built; that a cesspool, with bottom and sides cemented, be built, the broken flooring be removed and the earth beneath disinfected, and the floor replaced by a cement floor, with valley drains with sufficient pitch to carry all the liquid matter to a tight iron pipe (properly screened), and the pipe to lead to the cesspool; that a milk house, entirely separate from either house or stable, be constructed, and the same be provided with a cement floor, and the walls be properly whitewashed; that the milk be handled in the milk house exclusively; that the keeping of cows on the premises without a permit from this Department be discontinued; that the number of cows in the large stable be reduced from forty-one to thirty. Fry & Lyle of No. 1550 Fulton street, Borough of Brooklyn, offering the premises situated on the east side of the Flushing and Jamaica turnpike, consisting of a plot of 229-10 acres, known as the Haacke farm, in the Borough of Queens, as a site for a contagious disease hospital, for the sum of eighteen thousand dollars (\$18,000); and

Whereas, After careful investigation said premises have been found to meet the requirements of this Department for the purpose mentioned in the Borough of Queens; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and is hereby respectfully requested to amend the resolution adopted on the 19th day of December, 1902, as aforesaid, so as to read as follows:

That a properly constructed runway be provided and each cow be exercised at least once in each day; that the walls and ceiling of the stable be thoroughly cleaned and whitewashed; that the udders of the cows and the hands of the milkmen be thoroughly cleaned before each milking; that the ceiling of the stable be made dust proof; that all offensive earth be removed from beneath the stable floor, its site cleaned, disinfected and filled with fresh earth; that the defective wooden flooring be replaced by a cement floor, provided with properly constructed valley drains so graded as to discharge all liquid matter into a water tight covered cesspool located on the premises, by and through a properly trapped earthenware or iron drain protected by strainers; that a proper tight fitting manure box be provided; that the use of well thereat be discontinued; that a milk house with cement floor be provided, to be entirely separate from dwelling and stable; that the number of cows be reduced to four.

Whereas, The premises corner Park place and Pleasure avenue, Long Island City, Borough of Queens, in The City of New York, and the business pursuit specified in this case, being, in the opinion of the Board, in a condition and in effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance, and the Board having taken and filed among its records the reports of the Sanitary Superintendent and the Inspectors relating thereto, and what it regards as sufficient proof to authorize its declaration that the premises and business pursuit in this case are in a condition and effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance, the Board hereby enters in its records the said premises as a nuisance, and declares the same to be a public nuisance, dangerous to life and health, and in respect thereto orders, viz.:

That the use of said premises as a stable, in its present condition, be discontinued; that the said premises be cleaned; that the filth-saturated soil be removed and replaced with fresh earth, and the surface so graded that all surface water shall be freely discharged therefrom; that the keeping of cows thereat without a permit from this Department be discontinued; that the number of cows be reduced to two; that a properly constructed runway be provided and each cow be exercised at least once in each day; that the walls and ceiling of the stable be thoroughly cleaned and whitewashed; that the udders of the cows and the hands of the milkmen be thoroughly cleaned before each milking; that the ceiling of the stable be made dust proof; that all offensive earth be removed from beneath the stable floor, its site cleaned, disinfected and filled with fresh earth; that the defective wooden flooring be replaced by a cement floor provided with properly constructed valley drains so graded as to discharge all liquid matter into the street sewer by and through a properly trapped earthenware or iron drain protected by strainers; that a properly constructed milk-house be provided having no connection with dwelling or stable, and milk-house to have a cement floor so graded as to discharge all liquid matter into the street sewer by and through an earthenware or iron drain.

Whereas, The premises Harmon avenue, between Myrtle and Cooper avenues, Evergreen, Borough of Queens, in The City of New York, and the business pursuit specified in this case, being, in the opinion of the Board, in a condition and in effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance, and the Board having taken and filed among its records the reports of the Sanitary Superintendent and the Inspectors relating thereto, and what it regards as sufficient proof to authorize its declaration that the premises and business pursuit in this case are in a condition and effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance, the Board hereby enters in its records the said premises as a nuisance, and declares the same to be a public nuisance, dangerous to life and health, and in respect thereto orders, viz.:

That the use of said premises as a stable, in its present condition, be discontinued; that the said premises be cleaned; that the filth-saturated soil be removed and replaced with fresh earth, and the surface so graded that all surface water shall be freely discharged therefrom; that all offensive earth be removed from beneath the stable floor, said stable to be cemented and so graded and drained as to discharge

all liquid matter into the cesspool thereat through a tight earthen or iron drain; that the ceiling of the stable be made dust tight; that the milk-room be entirely separate from the stable, and door from milk-room to stable be permanently sealed; that the floor of milk-room be cemented; that the udders of the cows be cleaned before milking; that tight manure boxes be provided, with tight fitting covers; that the cows be exercised daily.

Nor shall any owner, lessee, tenant, manager, engineer, fireman or any other person cause or allow any smoke, cinders, dust, gas, steam or offensive odor to escape or be discharged from any such building, place or premises, and every furnace employed in the working of engines by steam, or in any mill, factory, printing house, dye factory, iron foundry, glass house, distillery, brew house, sugar refinery, bake house, gas works, or in any other buildings used for the purposes of trade or manufacture, shall be so constructed as to consume or burn the smoke arising therefrom.

Nor shall any such owner, lessee, tenant, occupant, manager, engineer, fireman or any other person cause, suffer or allow any smoke to escape or be discharged from any such building, place or premises, or from any engine or locomotive used therein or thereon.

349. Regulating and Grading and Paving with Asphalt on a Concrete Foundation East One Hundred and Forty-sixth Street, from Mott Avenue to Walton Avenue, and Setting Curb and Flagging Thereon.

Petition of Marion W. Lawson and of Widney R. Walker, Secretary of the Local School Board, Twenty-third District, were read. No opposition.

Laid over and referred to the Chief Engineer of the Borough of The Bronx for his estimate of the cost of the proposed work or improvement and a statement of the assessed value of the real estate included within the probable area of assessment.

350. Regulating and Grading, Etc., Broadway, from the Spuyten Duyvil Creek, at Two Hundred and Thirtieth Street, to the Northerly Line of The City of New York.

Petition of John Gilbert and others was read. No one appeared in opposition. Laid over and referred to the Chief Engineer of the Borough of The Bronx for his estimate of the cost of the proposed work or improvement and a statement of the assessed value of the real estate included within the probable area of assessment.

#### BOARD OF ALDERMEN.

**AN ORDINANCE GRANTING TO THE** Union Railway Company of New York City the right or franchise to construct and operate a street surface railway as an extension of its existing railway in, upon and along the surface of certain streets, avenues and highways, and to, upon and across a bridge and viaduct con-

structed in and owned and maintained by The City of New York.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. The Board of Aldermen of The City of New York hereby grants to the Union Railway Company of New York City, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinabove set forth, the franchise or right to extend its railway and to use the streets, avenues, highways, bridge and viaducts of the city, and to construct, maintain and operate a double-track street surface railway, as an extension of its existing railway for street railway purposes in the conveyance of persons and property, in, upon and along the following-named streets, avenues, highways, bridge and viaduct, viz.:

Commencing at the intersection of Jerome and Sedgwick avenues at the terminus of the tracks of this company's Jerome avenue line; thence upon and along the westerly approach, known as the Sedgwick avenue approach, formerly called Ogden avenue approach, to Central or Macomb's Dam Bridge; thence southerly upon and along said bridge and the One Hundred and Fifty-fifth Street Viaduct and Macomb's Dam road to the terminus of the railway of the Eighth Avenue Railroad Company, between West One Hundred and Fifty-fourth and West One Hundred and Fifty-fifth streets; also from the intersection of said Central or Macomb's Dam Bridge and the One Hundred and Fifty-fifth Street Viaduct; thence westerly upon and along said viaduct to the station, depot or terminus of the Manhattan Elevated Railway Company, situated between said bridge and Bradhurst avenue, together with the necessary connections, switches, sidings, turnouts, turn-tables, cross-overs and suitable stands necessary for the accommodation and operation of said railroad by the overhead system of electricity or any other motive power which may be lawfully employed upon the same; all in the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, City, County and State of New York. The phrases "said railroad" or "said railway" hereinafter used, shall be construed to mean the railroad constructed under this ordinance.

Section 2. The grant of said franchise or right to use said streets, avenues, highways, bridge and viaduct is made subject to the following conditions:

First.—The consent in writing of the owners of half in value of the property bounded on said streets, avenues, highways, parkways and public places to the construction and operation of said railroad shall be obtained by the grantee, or in the event that such consent cannot be obtained, the grantee shall obtain the favorable determination, confirmed by the Court, of three Commissioners, appointed by the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court, in the manner provided by the Railroad Law, before said railroad is built or operated.

Second.—The said right, privilege and franchise to construct and operate said railway shall be held and enjoyed by said railway company, its lessee or successors, for the term of twenty-five years, with the privilege of renewal of said grant for a further period of twenty-five years upon a fair revaluation of said right, privilege and franchise. Such revaluation shall be of the right, privilege and franchise to maintain and operate said railroad by itself, and not to include any valuation derived from the ownership, operation or control of any other railroad by the grantee, its successor or assigns. It shall be in the following manner:

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment or its successor in authority; one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the railway company; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder. The three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluations aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six months prior to the expiration of the grant, and their report shall be filed with the Comptroller or his successor in authority within three months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience, and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine the books of the railway company. The valuations so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties, but shall not in any event be less than the minimum amount fixed as the sum to be paid annually for the last five years of the original franchise.

Third.—Upon the termination of said franchise or right, whether original or renewed, the plant and property of the grantee, its successor or assigns, in such streets, avenues and highways, and upon such bridge and viaduct, with its appurtenances constructed under this ordinance, shall be and become the property of The City of New York upon the repayment to the grantee of the fair value of the said plant and property constructed in the streets and on the bridge and its approaches and on the viaduct under this ordinance, which valuation shall be the fair value thereof as property, excluding any value derived from the franchise, and such value shall be determined by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment or its successors in authority.

Fourth.—The said Union Railway Company of New York City, its successors or assigns, shall pay into the Treasury of The City of New York for this franchise the following sums of money: During the first term of five years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than \$4,000, and which shall be equal to three per cent. of the gross annual receipts of the railroad constructed under this ordinance, computed in the manner provided by the Railroad Law, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of \$4,000; during the next five years of the term an annual sum which shall in no case be less than \$4,500, and which shall be equal to five per cent. of the gross annual receipts of the railroad constructed under this ordinance computed in the manner provided by the Railroad Law, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of \$5,000; during the next five years of the term an annual sum which shall in no case be less than \$5,500, and which shall be equal to five per cent. of the gross annual receipts of the railroad constructed under this ordinance, computed in the manner provided by the Railroad Law, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of \$5,500; during the next five years of the term an annual sum which shall in no case be less than \$6,000, and which shall be equal to five per cent. of the gross annual receipts of the railroad constructed under this ordinance, computed in the manner provided by the Railroad Law, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of \$6,000, and the terms hereafter to be fixed for any renewal term of such franchise shall not be less than \$6,000 per annum, and no renewal of the franchise shall provide for a further renewal.

Such sums shall be paid into the treasury of The City of New York on November 1st in each year after the commencement of the operation of any portion of the said railroad, provided, however, that the first payment shall only be for that proportion of the above sum as the time of commencement of operation of any portion of the said railroad, before September 30th next preceding, shall bear to the whole of one year. The fiscal year shall end on September 30th next preceding date of payment, and the provisions

of the Railroad Law as it now exists, or as it may hereafter be amended, relating to the manner of payments and statements of percentages of gross receipts of street railway companies shall, as to said railroad, be strictly followed. The intention of this paragraph is to fix an annual charge to be paid by the grantee, its successors or assigns, to The City of New York for the rights and franchise hereby granted, and it shall not be construed as providing for the payment by the grantee, its successor or assigns, for said franchise, of a percentage of gross receipts within the meaning of any general or special statute, referring particularly to chapter 340 of the Laws of 1892.

Fifth.—The said annual charge or payments shall continue throughout the whole term of the franchise hereby granted, whether original or renewal, notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other railway company providing for payments for street railway rights or franchises at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sub-lease of the rights of franchise hereby granted, whether original or renewal, or of any part thereof, or of any of the routes mentioned herein, or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sub-lease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this grant, and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said condition as to payments, anything in any statute or the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives, so far as this franchise is concerned, any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof, or otherwise, exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this grant.

Sixth.—The rights and franchises granted hereby shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sub-let in any manner, nor shall title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Union Railway Company of New York City, its successors or assigns, or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations, or otherwise, without the consent of The City of New York acting by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successor in authority, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Seventh.—The said railway may be operated by verhead electrical power substantially similar to the system of overhead electrical traction now in use by the Union Railway Company, or by the underground electric system now in use by the Metropolitan Street Railway Company, and by any other motive power except locomotive steam power or horse power which may be approved by the Board of Railroad Commissioners, and consented to by the owners of property in accordance with the provisions of the Railroad Law.

Eighth.—The said railway shall be constructed, maintained and operated subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of The City of New York, who have jurisdiction in such matters under the Charter of the City.

Ninth.—Said railway shall be constructed and operated in the latest improved manner of street railway construction and operation, and the railway and property of said company shall be maintained in good condition throughout the term of this grant.

Tenth.—The rate of fare for any passenger upon said railway shall be five cents, and said company shall not charge any passenger more than said sum for one continuous ride from any point on said railway or a line or branch operated in connection therewith to any point thereof, or of any connecting line or branch thereof, within the limits of The City of New York. The rates for the carrying of property over said railroad upon the cars of the grantee shall in all cases be reasonable in amount and shall be subject to the control of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successor in authority, and may be fixed by such Board after notice and hearing to the grantee, and when so fixed such rate shall be binding upon said grantee, its successor or assigns, and no greater sums shall be charged for such services than provided for by it.

Fourteenth.—The said company shall at all times keep the streets, bridge and viaduct upon which said railroad is constructed, between its tracks, and for a distance of two feet beyond the rails upon either side of said streets, free and clear from ice and snow.

Fifteenth.—The said railway company, as long as it shall continue to use any of the tracks upon said streets, avenues, highways, parkways, public places, bridge or viaduct, upon which said railroad is constructed, shall have and keep in permanent repair that portion of the surface of said streets, avenues, highways, parkways, bridge and viaduct, between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and two feet in width outside of its tracks, under the supervision of the proper local authorities, and whenever required by them to do so, and in such manner as they may prescribe. And the City of New York shall have the right to change the material or character of the pavement of any street, highway, parkway, public place, bridge and viaduct upon which said railroad is constructed, and in that event the grantee, its successors or assigns, shall be bound to replace such pavement in the manner directed by the proper City officer at its own expense, and the provision as to repairs herein contained shall apply to such renewed or altered pavement.

Sixteenth.—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained, this grant may be forfeited by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel on notice of ten days to the said railway company.

Section 3. This grant is also upon the further and express condition that the provisions of Article 4 of the Railroad Law applicable thereto, and all laws or ordinances now in force or which may be adopted affecting the surface railroads operating in the City of New York, shall be strictly complied with as to said railroad.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bid required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done.
