Present—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Borough of Manhattan, the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, the President of the Borough of The Bronx, the President of the Borough of Queens and the President of the Borough of Richmond.

The Mayor, Hon. George B. McClellan, presided.

The minutes of the meetings of July 22, August 2 and August 9, 1904, were approved as printed.

CHANGE OF GRADES IN TERRITORY BOUNDED BY RIVERDALE, THATFORD, HEGEMAN AND SARATOGA AVENUES AND EAST NINETY-EIGHTH STREET, BROOKLYN.

In the matter of the proposed change of grades in the territory bounded by Riverdale, Thatford, Hegeman and Saratoga avenues and East Ninety-eighth street, in the Borough of Brooklyn, affidavit of publication was presented, showing that the matter had been duly advertised.

Nobody appearing in opposition to the proposed changes, the following resolution was adopted:

Whereas, At a meeting of this Board, held on the 17th day of June, 1904, resolutions were adopted proposing to change the map or plan of The City of New York so as to change the grade in the territory bounded by Riverdale avenue, Thatford avenue, Hegeman avenue, East Ninety-eighth street and Saratoga avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, and appointing a hearing at a meeting of this Board to be held on the 16th day of September, 1904, at 10.30 o'clock A. M., at which meeting such proposed action would be considered by this Board, and requesting a notice to all persons affected thereby of the aforesaid time and place at which such proposed action would be considered, to be published in the CITY RECORD and in the corporation newspapers for ten days prior to the 16th day of September, 1904; and

Whereas, It appears from the affidavits of the Supervisor of the City Record and the publishers of the corporation newspapers that the aforesaid resolutions and notice have been published in the CITY RECORD and in the corporation newspapers for ten days prior to the 16th day of September, 1904; and

Whereas, At the aforesaid time and place, a public hearing was given to all persons interested in such proposed change who have appeared, and such proposed change was duly considered by this Board; now therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 442 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, deeming it for the public interest to change the map or plan of The City of New York by changing the grade in the territory bounded by Riverdale avenue, Thatford avenue, Hegeman avenue, East Ninety-eighth street and Saratoga avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, does hereby favor the same so as to change the aforesaid grade as follows:

Newport Street.

Beginning at the intersection of Newport street and Douglass street, the elevation to be 24.67 feet, as heretofore;

Thence easterly to the intersection of Ames street, the elevation to be 22.60 feet;

Thence easterly to the intersection of Amboy street, the elevation to be 23.36 feet;

Thence easterly to the intersection of Hopkinson avenue, the elevation to be 24.06 feet, as heretofore;

Thence easterly to the intersection of Bristol street, the elevation to be 22.54 feet;

Thence easterly to the intersection of Chester street, the elevation to be 21.02 feet;

Thence easterly to the intersection of Rockaway avenue, the elevation to be 19.50 feet;

Thence easterly to the intersection of Thatford avenue, the elevation to be 20.09 feet, as heretofore.

Lott Avenue.

Beginning at the intersection of Lott avenue and East Ninety-eighth street, the elevation to be 22.39 feet, as heretofore;

Thence easterly to the intersection of Douglass street, the elevation to be 21.31 feet;

Thence easterly to the intersection of Ames street, the elevation to be 22.31 feet, as heretofore;

Thence easterly to the intersection of Amboy street, the elevation to be 19.26 feet;

Thence easterly to the intersection of Hopkinson avenue, the elevation to be 20.42 feet, as heretofore;

Thence easterly to the intersection of Bristol street, the elevation to be 19.55 feet;

Thence easterly to the intersection of Chester street, the elevation to be 18.68 feet;

Thence easterly to the intersection of Rockaway avenue, the elevation to be 17.80 feet;

Thence easterly to the intersection of Thatford avenue, the elevation to be 16.08 feet, as heretofore.

Ames Street.

Beginning at the intersection of Ames street and Lott avenue, the elevation to be 22.31 feet, as heretofore;

Thence northerly to the intersection of Newport street, the elevation to be 22.60 feet;

Thence northerly to the intersection of Riverdale avenue, the elevation to be 26.67 feet, as heretofore.

Amboy Street.

Beginning at the intersection of Amboy street and Hegeman avenue, the elevation to be 20.19 feet, as heretofore;

Thence northerly to the intersection of Lott avenue, the elevation to be 19.26 feet;

Thence northerly to the intersection of Newport street, the elevation to be 23.36 feet;

Thence northerly to the intersection of Riverdale avenue, the elevation to be 26.93 feet, as heretofore.

Bristol Street.

Beginning at the intersection of Bristol street and Hegeman avenue, the elevation to be 17.64 feet, as heretofore;

Thence northerly to the intersection of Lott avenue, the elevation to be 19.55 feet;

Thence northerly to the intersection of Newport street, the elevation to be 22.54 feet;

Thence northerly to the intersection of Riverdale avenue, the elevation to be 28.87 feet, as heretofore.

Chester Street.

Beginning at the intersection of Chester street and Hegeman avenue, the elevation to be 16.50 feet, as heretofore;

Thence northerly to the intersection of Lott avenue, the elevation to be 18.68 feet;

Thence northerly to the intersection of Newport street, the elevation to be 21.02 feet;

Thence northerly to the intersection of Riverdale avenue, the elevation to be 27.55 feet, as heretofore.

Rockaway Avenue.

Beginning at the intersection of Rockaway avenue and Hegeman avenue, the elevation to be 15.34 feet, as heretofore;

Thence northerly to the intersection of Lott avenue, the elevation to be 17.80 feet;

Thence northerly to the intersection of Newport street, the elevation to be 19.50 feet;

Thence northerly to the intersection of Riverdale avenue, the elevation to be 23.85 feet, as heretofore.

Douglass Street.

Beginning at the intersection of Douglass street and East Ninety-eighth street, the elevation to be 21.44 feet, as heretofore;

Thence northerly to the intersection of Lott avenue, the elevation to be 21.31 feet;

Thence northerly to the intersection of Newport street, the elevation to be 24.67 feet, as heretofore.

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Borough of Manhattan, the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, the President of the Borough of The Bronx and the President of the Borough of Queens—12.

PARK AT BEDFORD AND ATLANTIC AVENUES, ETC., BROOKLYN.

In the matter of the proposed park at Bedford and Atlantic avenues, Bedford place and Brevoort place, in the Borough of Brooklyn, affidavit of publication was presented, showing that the matter had been duly advertised.

The following report from the Park Commissioner was presented:

JUNE 30, 1904.

To the Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

GENTLEMEN—In compliance with your request of June 27, regarding a report on the desirability of a proposed site for a public park of the plot bounded by Bedford avenue, Atlantic avenue, Bedford place and Brevoort place, I beg to report that I have carefully examined the property in question and find that it is a desirable one, having quite a number of large, well grown trees and can be turned into a park at a nominal expense. It is already fenced in and could be thrown open to the public within two weeks after being turned over to this Department. There is one building on the corner of Brevoort and Bedford place which is now occupied by the officers of the public library. The neighborhood in which this property is located is thickly populated and the site itself is over one-half mile from the nearest park—Bedford Park at the corner of Brooklyn avenue and Prospect place.

In view of the above facts I hereby recommend the acquirement of this site for park purposes.

LAYING OUT JOSEPH RODMAN DRAKE PARK, THE BRONX.

In the matter of the proposed laying out as a park the territory bounded by Hunt's Point road, Eastern Boulevard and Whittier street, in the Borough of The Bronx, to preserve the grave of Joseph Rodman Drake, affidavit of publication was presented, showing that the matter had been duly advertised.

The following report from the Park Commissioner was presented:

DEAR SIR—In reply to your communication of the 27th ult., this Department has never been consulted in regard to the proposed park, bounded by the Eastern Boulevard and Whittier street, to include within its boundaries the grave of Joseph Rodman Drake. It is a historical spot, and I can see no objection to the favorable action of your Board.

LAYING OUT NEW STREET, THE BRONX.

In the matter of the proposed new street along the southern line of the proposed Joseph Rodman Drake Park, in the Borough of The Bronx, affidavit of publication was presented, showing that the matter had been duly advertised.

The matter was laid over pending action as to the proposed park.

EXTENDING BATHGATE AVENUE, THE BRONX.

In the matter of the proposed extension of Bathgate avenue, from East One Hundred and Eighty-eighth street to Pelham avenue, in the Borough of The Bronx, affidavit of publication was presented, showing that the matter had been duly advertised.

After hearing Mr. McLaughlin in favor of the proposed extension, nobody appearing in opposition, on motion of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, the following resolution was adopted:

Whereas, At a meeting of this Board, held on the 17th day of June, 1904, resolutions were adopted proposing to change the map or plan of The City of New York so as to lay out an extension of Bathgate avenue, from East One Hundred and Eighty-eighth street to Pelham avenue, in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York, and appointing a hearing at a meeting of this Board to be held on the 16th day of September, 1904, at 10.30 o'clock A. M., at which meeting such proposed action would be considered by this Board, and requesting a notice to all persons affected thereby, of the aforesaid time and place at which such proposed action would be considered, to be published in the CITY RECORD for ten days prior to the 16th day of September, 1904; and

Whereas, It appears from the affidavit of the Supervisor of the City Record that the aforesaid resolutions and notice have been published in the CITY RECORD for ten days prior to the 16th day of September, 1904; and

Whereas, At the aforesaid time and place, a public hearing was given to all persons interested in such proposed change who have appeared, and such proposed change was duly considered by this Board; now therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 442 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, deeming it for the public interest to change the map or plan of The City of New York by laying out an extension of Bathgate avenue, from East One Hundred and Eighty-eighth street to Pelham avenue, in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York, does hereby favor the same, so as to lay out the aforesaid extension as follows:

Laying Out.

Bathgate avenue, which is at the present time laid out northerly as far as East One Hundred and Eighty-eighth street, is to be extended northerly to Pelham avenue at a width of sixty (60) feet, and in such manner that it is a direct continuation of the lines in the block below East One Hundred and Eighty-eighth street.

Grades.

1. The elevation of the grade at the intersection of Bathgate avenue with East One Hundred and Eighty-eighth street to be 85.0 feet above mean high-water datum, as heretofore.

2. The elevation of the grade at the centre of the block between East One Hundred and Eighty-eighth street and East One Hundred and Eighty-ninth street to be 90.0 feet above mean high-water datum.

3. The elevation of the grade at the intersection of Bathgate avenue with East One Hundred and Eighty-ninth street to be 86.0 feet above mean high-water datum, and the grade established at a point 395 feet easterly of Washington avenue as 86.0 feet above mean high-water datum is to be abandoned, making a uniform grade in East One Hundred and Eighty-ninth street, from Bathgate avenue to Washington avenue.

4. The elevation of the grade at the intersection of Bathgate avenue and Pelham avenue to be the same as heretofore, Pelham avenue having been graded at a uniform grade between Lorillard place and Washington avenue.

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Borough of Manhattan, the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, the President of the Borough of The Bronx and the President of the Borough of Queens—12.

CHANGE OF GRADE OF HARRISON AVENUE, THE BRONX.

In the matter of the proposed change of grade of Harrison avenue, from Tremont avenue to Burnside avenue, in the Borough of The Bronx, affidavit of publication was presented, showing that the matter had been duly advertised.

Nobody appearing in opposition to the proposed change of grade, the following resolution was adopted:

Whereas, At a meeting of this Board, held on the 17th day of June, 1904, resolutions were adopted proposing to change the map or plan of The City of New York so as to change the grade of Harrison avenue, between Tremont avenue and Burnside avenue, in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York, and appointing a hearing at a meeting of this Board to be held on the 16th day of September, 1904, at 10.30 o'clock A. M., at which meeting such proposed action would be considered by this Board, and requesting a notice to all persons affected thereby of the aforesaid time and place at which such proposed action would be considered, to be published in the CITY RECORD for ten days prior to the 16th day of September, 1904; and

Whereas, It appears from the affidavit of the Supervisor of the City Record that the aforesaid resolutions and notice have been published in the CITY RECORD for ten days prior to the 16th day of September, 1904; and

Whereas, At the aforesaid time and place a public hearing was given to all persons interested in such proposed change who have appeared, and such proposed change was duly considered by this Board; now therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 442 of the Greater New York Charter as amended, deeming it for the public interest to change the map or plan of The City of New York by changing the grade of Harrison avenue, between Tremont avenue and Burnside avenue, in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York, does hereby favor the same so as to change the aforesaid grade as follows:

1. The elevation of the grade of Harrison avenue at Tremont avenue to be 117.0 feet above mean high-water datum, as heretofore;

2. The elevation of the grade at a point 400 feet southerly of the centre line of the Drainage street to be 122.0 feet above mean high-water datum;

3. The elevation of the grade at the centre line of Drainage street to be 112.0 feet above mean high-water datum;

4. The elevation of the grade at a point 500 feet southerly from the point of tangency at Burnside avenue to be 115.5 feet above mean high-water datum;

5. The elevation of the grade at the point of tangency where Harrison avenue connects with Burnside avenue to be 91.0 feet above mean high-water datum.

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Borough of Manhattan, the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, the President of the Borough of The Bronx, the President of the Borough of Queens and the President of the Borough of Richmond—13.

WIDENING THIRD AVENUE, THE BRONX.

In the matter of the proposed change of lines of Third avenue, from Willis avenue to East One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, in the Borough of The Bronx, affidavit of publication was presented, showing that the matter had been duly advertised.

Nobody appearing in opposition to the proposed widening, the following resolution was adopted:

Whereas, At a meeting of this Board held on the 19th day of August, 1904, resolutions were adopted proposing to change the map or plan of The City of New York so as to change the lines of Third avenue by widening said avenue on its easterly side, between Willis avenue and East One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York, and appointing a hearing at a meeting of this Board to be held on the 16th day of September, 1904, at 10.30 o'clock A. M., at which meeting such proposed action would be considered by this Board, and requesting a notice to all persons affected thereby of the aforesaid time and place at which such proposed action would be considered, to be published in the CITY RECORD for ten days prior to the 16th day of September, 1904; and

Whereas, It appears from the affidavit of the Supervisor of the City Record that the aforesaid resolutions and notice have been published in the CITY RECORD for ten days prior to the 16th day of September, 1904; and

Whereas, At the aforesaid time and place a public hearing was given to all persons interested in such proposed change who have appeared, and such proposed change was duly considered by this Board; now therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 442 of the Greater New York Charter as amended, deeming it for the public interest to change the map or plan of The City

of New York by changing the lines of Third avenue by widening said avenue on its easterly side, between Willis avenue and East One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York, does hereby favor the same so as to widen the aforesaid avenue as follows:

Third avenue to be widened from 80 feet to 100.9± feet on its easterly side, from East One Hundred and Forty-ninth street to Willis avenue, which affects three buildings on the easterly side of Third avenue and Willis avenue, directly south of East One Hundred and Forty-ninth street.

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Borough of Manhattan, the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, the President of the Borough of The Bronx, the President of the Borough of Queens and the President of the Borough of Richmond—13.

CHANGE OF GRADE OF HULST STREET, QUEENS.

In the matter of the proposed change of grade of Hulst street, between Greenpoint avenue and the Long Island Railroad tracks, in the Borough of Queens, affidavit of publication was presented, showing that the matter had been duly advertised.

The Long Island Railroad Company appeared in opposition to the proposed change, and asked that the matter be postponed until they had a chance to submit plans for street crossings.

On motion of the Comptroller, the matter was laid over.

LAYING OUT PARK AT FIRST AVENUE AND THE SHORE ROAD, BROOKLYN.

The matter of the proposed park at First avenue, the Shore road, Wakeman place, New York Bay, and Bay Ridge avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn, which was laid over on June 3, was laid over pending the Engineer's report on small parks.

LAYING OUT PARK AT BEDFORD AND FLUSHING AVENUES, BROOKLYN.

The matter of the proposed park bounded by Flushing, Bedford and Lee avenues and Lynch street, Borough of Brooklyn, which was laid over on June 17, was laid over pending the report of the Engineer.

PARK AT WASHINGTON BRIDGE, THE BRONX.

The following report from the Park Commissioner was presented:

NEW YORK, July 18, 1904.

Mr. JOHN H. MOONEY, Assistant Secretary, Board of Estimate and Apportionment, No. 280 Broadway, New York City:

DEAR SIR—In reply to your communication of June 27, in relation to the proposition of the Local Board of Morrisania, to lay out a public park at The Bronx approach to Washington Bridge, bounded by Boscobel avenue, Aqueduct avenue, Featherbed lane, Macomb's Dam road and Devoe street, would state I am advised that the proposed acquisition of the site originated with the property-owners in the immediate neighborhood. The approach on the Manhattan side has been laid out and is a handsome one. I see no objection to making a similar approach on The Bronx side.

LAYING OUT WEST ONE HUNDRED AND EIGHTY-SEVENTH STREET, MANHATTAN.

The matter of laying out West One Hundred and Eighty-seventh street, from Amsterdam avenue to the "new" avenue bounding High Bridge Park on the west at a width of either 60 feet or 80 feet, which was laid over on July 15, was taken up.

Mr. Flannery, attorney for petitioner, stated that he had been unable to obtain a deed of cession.

On motion of the Comptroller, the following resolution was then adopted:

Whereas, At a meeting of this Board, held on the 3d day of June, 1904, resolutions were adopted proposing to change the map or plan of The City of New York so as to lay out West One Hundred and Eighty-seventh street, at a width of 60 feet, from Amsterdam avenue to the "new avenue" bounding High Bridge Park on the west, in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, and appointing a hearing at a meeting of this Board to be held on the 1st day of July, 1904, at 10.30 o'clock A. M., at which meeting such proposed action would be considered by this Board, and requesting a notice to all persons affected thereby of the aforesaid time and place at which such proposed action would be considered, to be published in the CITY RECORD for ten days prior to the 1st day of July, 1904; and

Whereas, It appears from the affidavit of the Supervisor of the City Record that the aforesaid resolutions and notice have been published in the CITY RECORD for ten days prior to the 1st day of July, 1904; and

Whereas, At the aforesaid time and place, a public hearing was given to all persons interested in such proposed change who have appeared, and such proposed change was duly considered by this Board; now therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 442 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, deeming it for the public interest to change the map or plan of The City of New York by laying out West One Hundred and Eighty-seventh street, at a width of 60 feet, from Amsterdam avenue to the "new avenue" bounding High Bridge Park on the west, in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, does hereby favor the same so as to lay out the street and establish the aforesaid grades as follows:

Laying Out.

Beginning at a point in the easterly line of Amsterdam avenue distant 499.66 feet northerly from the northerly line of West One Hundred and Eighty-fifth street; thence easterly and parallel to said street, distance 264.58 feet to the westerly line of the new avenue west of High Bridge Park; thence northerly and curving to the left on the arc of a circle whose radius is 594.25 feet, distance 62.84 feet; thence westerly and parallel to the first course, distance 245.99 feet to the easterly line of Amsterdam avenue; thence southerly along said line, distance 60 feet to the point or place of beginning.

Grades.

Beginning at a point in the easterly line of Amsterdam avenue and the centre line of the new West One Hundred and Eighty-seventh street, elevation 191.88 feet above the City datum; thence easterly along the centre line, distance 256.04 feet to the westerly line of the new avenue west of High Bridge Park, elevation 173.48 feet.

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Borough of Manhattan, the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, the President of the Borough of The Bronx, the President of the Borough of Queens and the President of the Borough of Richmond—13.

REDUCTION OF ASSESSMENT ON NEW STREET, NEXT TO HALL OF RECORDS, MANHATTAN.

In accordance with the action taken on July 15, hearing was opened in the matter of the application to have the City assume a further portion of the expense of opening the new street west of the Hall of Records, running from Chambers street to Reade street, in the Borough of Manhattan.

Mr. John C. Shaw and others appeared in favor of the application.

On motion of the Comptroller, the matter was referred to him for investigation and report.

LAYING OUT ADDITION TO HIGHLAND PARK, BROOKLYN.

The matter of laying out as an addition to Highland Park the property bounded by Sunnyside avenue, the National Cemetery, Jamaica avenue and an irregular line about 65 feet west of Warwick street, Brooklyn, which was laid over on June 3, was taken up.

The President of the Borough of Brooklyn offered the following resolution:

Whereas, At a meeting of this Board, held on the 22d day of April, 1904, resolutions were adopted proposing to change the map or plan of The City of New York so as to lay out as an addition to Highland Park the property bounded by Sunnyside avenue, Force Tube avenue, Jamaica avenue, etc., in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, and appointing a hearing at a meeting of this Board to be held on the 20th day of May, 1904, at 10.30 o'clock A. M., at which meeting such proposed action would be considered by this Board, and requesting a notice to all persons affected thereby of the aforesaid time and place at which such proposed action would be considered, to be published in the CITY RECORD and in the corporation newspapers for ten days prior to the 20th day of May, 1904; and

Whereas, It appears from the affidavits of the Supervisor of the City Record and the publishers of the corporation newspapers that the aforesaid resolutions and notice have been published in the CITY RECORD and in the corporation newspapers for ten days prior to the 20th day of May, 1904; and

Whereas, At the aforesaid time and place, a public hearing was given to all persons interested in such proposed change who have appeared, and such proposed change was duly considered by this Board; now therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 442 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, deeming it for the public interest to change the map or plan of The City of New York by laying out as an addition to Highland Park the property bounded by Sunnyside avenue, Force Tube avenue, Jamaica avenue, etc., in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, does hereby favor the same so as to lay out the aforesaid addition as follows:

Beginning at a point in the northerly line of Sunnyside avenue distant 42.54 feet westerly from the westerly line of Warwick street;

1. Thence easterly along the northerly line of Sunnyside avenue 2,031.54 feet, more or less, to the westerly boundary line of the National Cemetery;
2. Thence southerly along the westerly boundary line of the National Cemetery 285 feet, more or less, to the northerly line of Jamaica avenue;
3. Thence westerly along the northerly line of Jamaica avenue 2,067 feet, more or less, to a point 400 feet easterly from the easterly line of Barbey street;
4. Thence northerly at right angles to Jamaica avenue 115 feet, more or less;
5. Thence easterly parallel with Jamaica avenue 7.21 feet, more or less;
6. Thence northerly 108 feet, more or less, to a point in the southerly line of Sunnyside avenue distant 57.69 feet westerly from the westerly line of Warwick street;
7. Thence northerly 62 feet, more or less, to the point of beginning.

The vote on the resolution was as follows:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the President of the Borough of Manhattan, the President of the Borough of Brooklyn and the President of the Borough of The Bronx—8.

Negative—None.

Present and not voting—3.

Not having received the necessary votes, the Mayor declared the resolution disagreed to.

The President of the Borough of Brooklyn requested unanimous consent for the matter to remain on the calendar, which was agreed to.

PARK AT EAST AND VAN ALST AVENUES, QUEENS.

The matter of acquiring the land necessary for the park at East and Van Alst avenues, Ninth and Twelfth streets, in the Borough of Queens, which was laid over on June 17, was laid over pending Engineer's report as to small parks.

OPENING EAST ONE HUNDRED AND SIXTY-SEVENTH STREET, THE BRONX.

The following communication from the Corporation Counsel was presented:

LAW DEPARTMENT,
OFFICE OF THE CORPORATION COUNSEL,
NEW YORK, August 19, 1904.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—I am in receipt of a communication from Mr. J. H. Mooney, Assistant Secretary of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, under date of July 19, in which he informs me that there has been presented to that Board a resolution of the Local Board of Morrisania, requesting the City to acquire title to East One Hundred and Sixty-seventh street across the tracks of the New York and Harlem Railroad. He also incloses a copy of the report of Mr. Nelson P. Lewis, Chief Engineer, raising the question as to whether the Board has the authority to take the usual condemnation proceedings or should proceed under the provisions of the Railroad Law, and asks that the Board be advised as to the proper procedure.

On January 11, 1888, the New York and Harlem Railroad Company entered into an agreement pursuant to chapter 721 of the Laws of 1887 for the depression of its tracks, with the Department of Parks, which then had jurisdiction of such matters in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, now the Borough of The Bronx, and in that agreement the railroad company undertook, at its own expense, to build bridges over its railroad at certain streets in the agreement specified, and at the request of the Department of Parks, the company further agreed "that additional crossings shall be made and maintained by the New York and Harlem Railroad Company whenever so directed by the Department of Public Parks, said crossings to be made in the manner and at such points as indicated by the said Department, but over such streets only as are now laid out and opened or may be laid out and opened across said railroad."

Since that time the Railroad Law has been enacted, chapter 565 of the Laws of 1890, as amended by chapter 754 of the Laws of 1897, and the amendments thereto. It has been held by the Courts that the provisions of section 61 and the following sections of the Railroad Law as enacted in 1897 supersede the Charters of the various cities and that in constructing or opening streets across steam surface railroads the procedure designated by the Railroad Law must be followed (Matter of Ludlow, 59 Appellate Division, 180, decided in March, 1901).

There is, therefore, no alternative but to follow the procedure specified by the Railroad Law.

It is provided by section 61 of the Railroad Law, that "when a new street, avenue or highway, or new portion of a street, avenue or highway shall hereafter be constructed

across a steam surface railroad other than pursuant to the provisions of section 62 of this act, such street, avenue or highway, or portion of such street, avenue or highway, shall pass over or under such railroad or at grade, as the Board of Railroad Commissioners shall direct."

The statute then proceeds to designate the procedure necessary to be carried out in such cases so far as the authorities of the municipal corporation are concerned, as follows:

"Notice of intention to lay out such street, avenue or highway, or new portion of a street, avenue or highway, across a steam surface railroad shall be given to such railroad company by the municipal corporation at least fifteen days prior to the making of the order laying out such street, avenue or highway, by service personally on the president or vice-president of the railroad corporation or any general officer thereof. Such notice shall designate the time and place and when and where a hearing will be given to such railroad company, and such railroad company, shall have the right to be heard before the authorities of such municipal corporation upon the question of the necessity of such street, avenue or highway. If the municipal corporation determines such street, avenue or highway to be necessary, it shall then apply to the Board of Railroad Commissioners before any further proceedings are taken to determine whether such street, avenue or highway shall pass over or under such railroad or at grade, whereupon the said Board of Railroad Commissioners shall appoint a time and place for hearing such application, and shall give such notice thereof as they judge reasonable, not, however, less than ten days, to the railroad company whose railroad is to be crossed by such new street, avenue or highway, or new portion of a street, avenue or highway, to the municipal corporation and to the owners of land adjoining the railroad and that part of the street, avenue or highway to be opened or extended."

Under these provisions, it will be necessary for your Board to give the required notice to the railroad company and then take such action as will bring the matter before the Railroad Commissioners.

There is a provision in the Railroad Law, as suggested by the Chief Engineer in his report, that where streets are opened across a railroad under its provisions the expense of the crossing is to be divided equally between the City and the railroad company, but I very much doubt whether the railroad company can successfully plead this provision as a release of its agreement with the City above referred to.

ACQUIRING ADDITION TO BRONX PARK, THE BRONX.

On motion of the Comptroller, the following resolution was adopted:

Whereas, At a meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, held on the 15th day of July, 1904, the following resolution was adopted:

"Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the acquisition, by purchase at private sale, of certain lands to be used for park purposes, situated in the Borough of The Bronx, which lands are bounded and described as follows:

"All those certain lots located within the area of the block bounded by Boston road and Bronx street, One Hundred and Eightieth and One Hundred and Eighty-first streets, together with all the right, title and interest of the owners of said premises of, in and to the streets, avenues and roads in front of said premises to the centre thereof, and being the same premises described in a deed dated August 22, 1901, from David Lydig to the Rapid Transit Realty Company, and also by another deed dated August 1, 1901, from James L. Wells to the Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company, —and the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized to enter into a contract for the acquisition of the same at private sale, at a price not exceeding eighty-four thousand three hundred and eighty-seven dollars and thirty-six cents (\$84,387.36), and interest thereon from the 24th day of June, 1904, said contracts to be submitted to the Corporation Counsel for his approval as to form."

Therefore be it Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 970 of the Greater New York Charter, deeming it for the public interest that the title to the lands and premises required for the opening and extending of an addition to Bronx Park, as laid out by this Board on December 11, 1903, in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York, should be acquired by The City of New York;

Resolved, That the cost and expense of said proceedings shall be borne and paid by The City of New York.

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Borough of Manhattan, the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, the President of the Borough of The Bronx, the President of the Borough of Queens and the President of the Borough of Richmond—13.

LAYING OUT PARK BETWEEN WEST TWENTY-SEVENTH AND WEST TWENTY-EIGHTH STREETS, MANHATTAN.

The following resolution of the Local Board of Chelsea, Borough of Manhattan, and report of the Chief Engineer were presented:

In the Local Board of the Chelsea District.

Whereas, A petition for a local improvement described below has been received by the President of the Borough of Manhattan; and

Whereas, He has appointed a time for a meeting of this Local Board not more than fifteen days after the receipt by him of the said petition, at which meeting the said petition would be submitted by him to the said Local Board, and he has caused a notice to be published in the CITY RECORD that said petition has been presented to him and is on file in his office for inspection, and of the time when and the place where there would be a meeting of this Local Board, at which the said petition would be submitted by him to the said Board, which time was not less than ten days after the publication of this notice; and

Whereas, The said petition was duly submitted thereafter to the said Local Board which did duly consider the same and give a full hearing thereon; now therefore it is

Resolved, By the Local Board of the Chelsea District that the said petition be and the same hereby is granted; and it is hereby

Resolved, That this Board does hereby recommend to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that the map or plan of The City of New York be changed by laying out on same for use as a public park so much of the land in block bounded by West Twenty-seventh and West Twenty-eighth streets, Ninth and Tenth avenues, as is described below:

Beginning at a point the northwesterly corner of Ninth avenue and West Twenty-seventh street; thence northerly along the westerly line of Ninth avenue, distance 197 feet 6 inches to the southerly line of West Twenty-eighth street; thence westerly along said southerly line, distance 175 feet, more or less; thence southerly and parallel to Ninth avenue, distance 98 feet 9 inches to the centre line of the block; thence westerly along said line, distance 225 feet; thence northerly and parallel to Ninth avenue, distance 98 feet 9 inches to the southerly line of West Twenty-eighth street; thence westerly along said line, distance 400 feet to the easterly line of Tenth avenue; thence southerly along said line, distance 197 feet 6 inches to the northerly line of West Twenty-seventh street; thence easterly along said line, distance 800 feet to the westerly line of Ninth avenue, the point or place of beginning.

And it is hereby further

Resolved, That a copy of this resolution be transmitted forthwith to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for its approval.

Adopted by the Local Board of the Chelsea District on the 11th day of August, 1904, all the members present voting in favor thereof.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—Herewith is submitted a resolution adopted by the Local Board of the Chelsea District, Borough of Manhattan, at a meeting held on August 11, 1904, providing for the laying out of a public park on the block bounded by West Twenty-seventh and West Twenty-eighth streets, Ninth and Tenth avenues. The proceeding is prompted by a petition signed by John McCauley and twenty others. It is accompanied by a communication from the Commissioner of Parks for the Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, stating that in his opinion the establishment of the proposed park is very desirable, and that he strongly recommends it. There was also a copy of a report from the Engineer of Street Openings of the Borough of Manhattan, in which there are outlined previous movements to establish a park in this neighborhood, it being stated in this report that such a park occupying the site now proposed was laid out in 1896, and proceedings to acquire the property were instituted, but that all proceedings were discontinued by the Board of Public Improvements and the park stricken from the map. The facts in the case may be briefly summarized as follows:

On April 9, 1896, the Board of Street Opening and Improvements, acting under the provisions of chapter 911 of the Laws of 1895, considered a proposition to lay out a public park in the block bounded by West Twenty-ninth and West Thirtieth streets, Ninth and Tenth avenues. The New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company protested against this action, this block being occupied by them for railroad purposes. The Corporation Counsel, in an opinion dated April 20, sustained the points raised by them. This opinion was presented to the Board of Street Opening and Improvement at a meeting held on May 8, 1896, and at that meeting the Board adopted a resolution laying out as a public park the block bounded by West Twenty-seventh and West Twenty-eighth streets, Ninth and Tenth avenues, the Comptroller alone opposing the resolution. The Park Board furnished the necessary maps and defined the district of assessment, and proceedings were instituted to acquire the property. All of these steps were taken under the provisions of the Small Park Act and the Special Act of 1895 referring to a park on the west side. At a meeting of the Board of Public Improvements, held on March 30, 1898, the President of the Board offered a resolution providing that the action of the Board of Street Opening and Improvement, relating to the selection, location and laying out of the park bounded by West Twenty-seventh and West Twenty-eighth streets, Ninth and Tenth avenues, be "repealed, revoked, rescinded and annulled, and that a public park shall not be located as and within the boundaries in said resolution provided, and that any and all proceedings and action as to or for the selection, location or laying out of a public park as so provided, and as to or for the acquisition of title to the lands or any part thereof embraced within the boundaries and description set forth in said resolution, be revoked, annulled, rescinded and abandoned." This resolution was adopted.

There can probably be no question as to the power of the Board of Public Improvements to discontinue the proceedings to acquire title to this public park. It seems to me, however, that there is grave doubt as to the power of the Board to strike the park from the map, as it attempted to do. Subsequent to the action of the Board of Street Opening and Improvement, and before the resolution of the Board of Public Improvements above referred to, the first Greater New York Charter had become a law. While this Charter gave full authority to the Board of Public Improvements to change the map of The City of New York, it specifically directed how such changes might be made. Section 436, which corresponded with section 442 of the present Charter, directed that a public hearing should be given, which should be advertised for ten days in the CITY RECORD and the corporation papers, and that if the Board concluded to change the map of the City, its resolution should be transmitted to the Municipal Assembly, the approval of both branches of which by a two-thirds vote was required to make the change effective. No hearing was given, and no notice of the proposed action by the Board appears to have been published, and the resolution was not presented to the Municipal Assembly for its concurrence. It seems to me very likely, therefore, that this park is now laid out upon the map of the City. If, however, the Board feels that there is any doubt that this is the case, it might be well to fix a date for a public hearing, map and technical description for which accompany the resolution.

The assessed valuation of the property included in the block is \$963,000, and there is a public school-house located within the limits of the proposed park.

Beginning at a point the northwesterly corner of Ninth Avenue and West Twenty-seventh street; thence northerly along the westerly line of Ninth avenue, distance 197 feet 6 inches, to the southerly line of West Twenty-eighth street; thence westerly along said southerly line, distance 175 feet, more or less; thence southerly and parallel to Ninth avenue, distance 98 feet 9 inches, to the centre line of the block; thence westerly along said line, distance 225 feet; thence northerly and parallel to Ninth avenue, distance 98 feet 9 inches, to the southerly line of West Twenty-eighth street; thence westerly along said line, distance 400 feet, to the easterly line of Tenth avenue; thence southerly along said line, distance 197 feet 6 inches, to the northerly line of West Twenty-seventh street; thence easterly along said line, distance 800 feet, to the westerly line of Ninth avenue, the point or place of beginning.

Resolved, That this Board consider the proposed change at a meeting of the Board, to be held in the City Hall, Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, on the 30th day of September, 1904, at 10.30 o'clock A. M.

Resolved, That the Secretary of this Board cause these resolutions and a notice to all persons affected thereby that the proposed change will be considered at a meeting of the Board, to be held at the aforesaid time and place, to be published in the CITY RECORD for ten days continuously, Sundays and legal holidays excepted, prior to the 30th day of September, 1904.

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Borough of Manhattan, the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, the President of the Borough of The Bronx, the President of the Borough of Queens and the President of the Borough of Richmond—13.

ACQUIRING PARK AT BROADWAY, WEST ONE HUNDRED AND THIRTY-EIGHTH STREET AND HAMILTON PLACE, MANHATTAN.

The following resolution of the Local Board of Washington Heights, Borough of Manhattan, and report of the Chief Engineer were presented, and the matter was laid over:

In the Local Board of the Washington Heights District.

Whereas, A petition for a local improvement described below has been received by the President of the Borough of Manhattan; and

Whereas, He has appointed a time for a meeting of this Local Board not more than fifteen days after the receipt by him of the said petition, at which meeting the said petition would be submitted by him to the said Local Board, and he has caused a notice to be published in the CITY RECORD that said petition has been presented to him and is on file in his office for inspection, and of the time when and the place where there would be a meeting of this Local Board, at which the said petition would be submitted by him to the said Board, which time was not less than ten days after the publication of this notice; and

Resolved, That this Board does hereby initiate proceedings for the said local improvement, to wit:

To acquire title to lands within the triangle at the intersection of Broadway, West One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street and Hamilton place, in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, for use as a public park.

And it is hereby further

Resolved, That a copy of this resolution be transmitted forthwith to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for its approval.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—Herewith is submitted a resolution adopted by the Local Board of the Washington Heights District, Borough of Manhattan, on August 2, 1904, initiating proceedings for acquiring title to the lands lying within the triangle bounded by Broadway, West One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street and Hamilton place, for the purpose of a public park.

This triangle was laid out on the map of the City as a public park by a resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on June 17, 1904. As was stated in my report to the Board when the laying out of this park was considered, it has a frontage of about 114 feet on West One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, about 260 feet on Broadway and about 217 feet on Hamilton place. A station of the Rapid Transit Railroad is located at West One Hundred and Thirty-seventh street, and this corner will undoubtedly be a very busy one. The Hebrew Benevolent and Orphan Asylum and the Montefiore Home for Chronic Invalids occupy the abutting property. Officers of both of these institutions and Mr. Samuel McMillan are the petitioners in the resolution now before the Board. The property has at present an assessed valuation of \$75,000 and is entirely unimproved.

Assuming that when the Board approved the laying out of this public place it contemplated that action would soon be taken to acquire title to the property, it is recommended that the resolution be approved. It has been the practice of the Board in acquiring small public places at important street intersections, to assess one-half the cost of the proceedings upon the property deemed to be benefited. If, however, this area is to be treated as a public park, and inclosed and improved as such, the Board would probably, following its practice in the case of small parks, assume the entire cost for the City.
