Appeal 91 of 1904—New building 651 of 1904, coal pocket west side of Avenue A, south from Ninety-second street, Manhattan, Geo. Haiss Manufacturing Company, appellant.

This case having been referred to Chief Croker for examination and report, and his report recommending that the application be granted, the same was, on motion, approved, on condition that the location of the pocket be moved forward on the lot so that there shall be an open space between the rear of the pocket and the rear line of the lot of not less than ten feet.

Appeal 94—New building 675 of 1904, premises No. 29 West Thirty-fourth street, Manhattan, Chas. E. Birge, appellant.

Building should be classified as a 13-story building and conform to section 105 of the Code as to fireproofing.

The provisions of the law do not apply to this case. The amount involved will exceed the sum of \$1,000.

Can a pent-house of less than 50 per cent. of the area be built on roof of this 12-story "light manufacturing building," to be used as janitor's quarters; the height of the roof of such pent-house being more than 150 feet above curb.

It is desirable that the building have janitor's quarters as a protection against fire. The area of the pent-house is less than 50 per cent. of the roof.

The expense of conforming to section 105 of the Code is excessive.

The height of roof of pent-house above curb is but slightly in excess of 150 feet.

The pent-house will be made completely fireproof, using fireproof wood, wire glass, cement floor and stand-pipe.

Mr. Chas. E. Birge appeared before the Board.

On motion, denied.

Letter presented from Thos. W. Lamb, architect for the Edison Electric Company, requesting reconsideration of Appeal 67 of 1904, affecting premises Nos. 335 to 345 Rider avenue, The Bronx (said appeal having been denied May 10, 1904).

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.
