Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 59 of the Laws of 1897, as amended by chapter 793 of the Laws of 1897, and sections 169 and 170 of the Greater New York Charter, the Comptroller be and hereby is authorized to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York, in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, to the amount of one million four hundred thousand dollars (\$1,400,000), the proceeds whereof to be applied to the payment of the expenses authorized to be incurred pursuant to said chapter 59 of the Laws of 1897, as amended by chapter 793 of the Laws of 1897, in connection with the construction and equipment of the New Hall of Records of The City of New York.

DEPARTMENT OF PARKS.

BOROUGHS OF MANHATTAN AND RICHMOND.

Quarterly Report for the Period Ending March 31, 1905.

The unfavorable conditions prevailing this quarter made removal of snow and ice and regular routine work troublesome. The season was one of frequent and severe snowstorms and changeable weather, which required much greater effort and expense on the part of the Department than for many previous years. It was only by constant care and strict attention that the work was accomplished without inconvenience to the park visitors or injury to park property. Walks in all parks were cleaned regularly, together with drives, bridle paths, parkways and transverse roads coming under the park jurisdiction. When found necessary the drives and bridle roads were sanded and roughened, giving better foothold to horses. The ordinary work belonging to sections in Central Park was promptly attended to, such as the removal of sweepings, care of comfort stations, repairs to washouts, etc., and in the spreading of manure special care and attention was given to select lawns where the strain of last year was most distinguishable.

Riverside Park was given a very generous application of manure along the slopes, embankments and borders of the driveway from Seventy-second to One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street. The severe storms of the winter left their traces in this section. The routine work was regularly cared for, together with the removal of snow and ice from drives, parkways and walks. Attention was also given to the roughening of drives and bridle paths where ice had formed, and to the spreading of sand where required, which gave favorable results.

The mechanical force has been mainly employed on construction and improvement of parks. Included in this force are the Plumbers, who have been employed making repairs, alterations and improvements. The Carpenters, besides making repairs, have been engaged in constructing rolling stock, buildings, settees, etc. The Masons and Stonecutters have been, almost without exception, on construction work. The Blacksmiths, Steamfitters, Engineers and the helping forces were at their respective employ

struction work.

The parks south of Fifty-ninth street have received the usual care during this quarter, the principal features of the work being the removal of snow and ice from the walks, sweeping walks, picking paper, carting away rubbish, care of comfort stations, etc. The baths at William H. Seward Park gave the Department considerable trouble,

which has not as yet been thoroughly overcome. The baths are well patronized, each bather having twenty minutes. The baths are open daily, Sundays included.

Parks north of Fifty-ninth street, outside of Central Park, were very thoroughly

provided for and given every attention and care in regular routine work, besides the attention to the many other features called for by the severe winter. All repairs possible were attended to, fertilizers spread, pruning of trees and shrubs attended to, raking of leaves and such other work as was required to improve the parks for the spring

The first part of this quarter the Arboriculturist's force was largely employed in assisting in the removal of snow and ice from the walks, lakes and parkways, but whenever the opportunity occurred the regular routine work was attended to. All recently planted trees were given a mulching of manure, dead trees were taken down and removed, tree holes dug and refilled with mould and manure ready for April planting. Many of the shrubberies were thinned out, the Ligustrums and other shrubs on Park avenue parks, from Sixty-first to Seventy-seventh street, were pruned. The deadwood and overhanging branches were removed from trees and shrubs along the bridle paths in Central Park.

The general greenhouse work, such as potting, watering, cleaning, firing, etc. was

The general greenhouse work, such as potting, watering, cleaning, firing, etc., was attended to. The propagation of 40,000 bedding plants from seed and cuttings, forcing of bulbs and other flowering plants for display, preparing compost for hotbeds, etc.,

There were removed from Japanese Point, on Large Lake, Central Park, about one hundred loads of refuse, and from lawns and slopes were carted to yards about one hundred and fifty loads of leaves, besides a considerable amount of manure, which was spread last winter over the lawns, embankments and slopes. Many hundred loads of snow and ice were carted away from important centres where traffic was interrupted or conditions had become unsightly, including City Hall Park, Washington square, Columbus Circle and Fifth avenue plaza, Central Park, Riverside drive, Ninety-sixth street west of West End avenue and the four transverse roads of Central Park.

To provide necessary accommodations for visitors during the skating season, the Department annually erects suitable buildings on the two large lakes in Central Park for the convenience and comfort of the skaters. During the twenty-four days and nights that the lakes were open to the public this winter no case of serious injury occurred. This in a very large measure was due to the excellent police arrangements and to the care and interest taken by the departmental force assigned to this duty. At night the lakes were provided with calcium lights, giving continued entertainment to the skaters. There were many difficulties to overcome before the ice could be put in condition for skating this season. These were not only occasioned by the many snowfalls, but were enhanced by the severe weather, which rendered work by the men more tedious and consequently required a much longer time in which to prepare the ice for good skating. ice for good skating.

During the months of January, February and March six playgrounds were kept open, employing fourteen Playground Attendants and eight Gymnasium Attendants. Monthly schedules were issued as a feature to encourage and arouse the interest of the boys and to create a spirit of friendly rivalry, the result of which has been a decided improvement and great advantage to class work. The kindergarten games for girls and children have been carefully arranged by the Attendants in charge, and have proven the necessity of having greater facilities for more extended work. All holidays were celebrated on the playgrounds and appropriate exercises for the entertainment of children were conducted. The days celebrated were Lincoln's birthday, Washington's birthday, St. Valentine's day, St. Patrick's day and Inauguration day. The attendance of children at the grounds was, approximately, 16,000. For the first time in the Department a regular repair shop was installed at Seward Park for the purpose of arranging for the many repairs needed to apparatus and appliances generally throughout the playgrounds. This work has been under the charge of a Foreman and thus far has proven efficient and satisfactory.

The Jumel Mansion was found, upon investigation, to be in need of considerable repair and the department forces were ordered to place it in good condition. This has been done, including in the work new roof, chimneys, gutters, windows, plastering, flooring, stairway, furnaces, etc. On Washington's birthday, under the auspices of the Daughters of the Revolution, exercises were given commemorative of the day. The old mansion was filled to overflowing, many prominent citizens being present. Noted speakers addressed the assemblage, which was presided over by the President of the Park Board. The grounds were prepared and the mansion beautifully decorated on the interior and exterior, and patriotic airs were rendered by the band engaged f

tally decorated on the interior and exterior, and patriotic airs were rendered by the band engaged for the occasion.

Thomas Jefferson Park was turned over for care and maintenance in the early winter, since which time work has been prosecuted to the very utmost by the Department, and the park will probably be open to the public about the end of May next. In the meantime, however, the visitors to this park can be accommodated with seats, as a number of them have been placed in the park for such purpose. The routine work, such as cleaning, etc., has been attended to.

In March, while the lakes were at a low winter level, advantage was taken to have the shores and their rubbish and drift removed. This work included all the small streams and ponds.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.
