The President laid before the Board the following communication from the District Attorney of Richmond County:

District Attorney's Office, Richmond County, Borough Hall, New Brighton, N. Y., May 3, 1911.

Hon. JOHN PURROY MITCHEL, President of the Board of Aldermen, 51 Chambers st., New York City, N. Y.:

Sir—On March 16, 1911, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment passed a resolution recommending the establishment of the position of Process Server in this office, with a salary at the rate of one thousand dollars per annum for one incumbent. This resolution was approved and concurred in by the Board of Aldermen on April 11, 1911.

The establishment of this position is made necessary by chapter 659, Laws of 1910, section 20, which provided that on and after January 1, 1911, it should be the duty of the District Attorney in the various counties comprised within The City of New York to cause to be served all subpoenas on behalf of the People for appearance before the Court of Special Sessions, and that thereafter said Court shall be relieved from the duty of serving the subpoenas.

I respectfully request that a resolution be presented to the Board of Aldermen authorizing the issue of special revenue bonds as provided by subdivision 8, of section 188, of the Charter, to the amount of six hundred and sixty-six dollars and sixty-four cents to defray the salary of this incumbent for the balance of the year, to wit: from May 1st to December 31st.

The President laid before the Board the following communication from the Superintendent of Buildings, Borough of Manhattan:

No. 3498.

The Bureau of Buildings for the Borough of Manhattan, 220 4th ave., S. W. Corner 18th st., New York City, May 5, 1911.

To the Honorable, the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

Gentlemen—In accordance with the resolution adopted by your honorable Board on April 18, 1911, requesting the Superintendent of Buildings of the Borough of Manhattan to report in detail the number of inspections of buildings in use for business purposes made by the Bureau during the past fifteen months, I would say that the information as requested cannot well be given in detail without considerable time and trouble. The records of the Bureau are not in such shape that this information can be readily given.

Over 150,000 inspections were made in 1910 by the construction inspectors alone. To determine how many of these inspections were made in existing buildings would necessitate an examination of every entry made in the inspectors' journals, or an examination of every report placed on file during the period specified. This would require the services of a dozen clerks for at least one month, and the information would be practically a transcript of these entries or reports for the period specified.

I take it that this was hardly contemplated in the request, especially as at the present time a part of the personnel of the Bureau is working overtime on account of the pressure of extra work occasioned by the flood of complaints received since the Asch building fire.

If, however, your Board is still desirous of having this information in detail, I should request in turn that you ask the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to appropriate the necessary money to engage the requisite temporary clerical services.

As an approximation, it may be stated that during the period specified, namely, from the 1st of January, 1910, to the 1st of April, 1911, about two thousand inspections of buildings used for business purposes have been made with special reference to fire escape matters. That in addition to this about a thousand more inspections have been made of buildings used for business purposes with respect to other matters, such as the overloading of floors, and other violations of the law.

This estimate does not include the inspections that have been made of business buildings in connection with proposed alterations or new buildings. It does not include the inspections that have been made during the erection of new buildings or the alteration of existing ones. It does not include inspections made by the inspectors of elevators; nor inspections made by the inspectors of plumbing and drainage; nor the inspections made by the inspectors of iron and steel.

Incidentally it might be interesting to see how the inspections of 1910, with the same inspection force, compare with those of the five years previous, as shown in the following statement:

The President laid before the Board the following communication from the Board of Coroners, Borough of Manhattan:

Board of Coroners', Borough of Manhattan, New York 70-74 Lafayette st., May 6, 1911.

Hon. JOHN PURROY MITCHEL, President, Board of Aldermen, Aldermanic Chamber, City Hall, New York:

Dear Sir—We are forwarding herewith a copy of the verdict found Monday, April 17th, by a coroner's jury, sitting in inquest on deaths occasioned by the fire in the Asch building on March 25th last.

The Board of Coroners for Manhattan have not been content with the performance of their routine duty in this case. The disaster was of such terrible extent, the loss of life so great, and, to our minds, so totally unnecessary had proper precautions been taken, that we feel that such a sacrifice should not be allowed to pass with the mere punishment of the men responsible. It will double the awfulness of the disaster if no less is learned from the 146 lives sacrificed to modern business greed; the inefficiency of the building laws or the inefficiency of the enforcement of those laws.

A jury composed of architects, builders, engineers, contractors and others interested in the real estate business have rendered their verdict and accompanied it by recommendations of changes in the laws which shall insure against a repetition of this holocaust. Their recommendations, based on the findings of fact as to the cause of the loss of life in the Asch building fire and on their knowledge of what the requirements should be in building a structure that shall not afterwards prove a menace to the human beings employed therein, are, we believe, entitled to an unusual consideration.

In making the selection for this jury the Board of Coroners believed that the results now at hand, and which had been anticipated by us, would be but a slight portion of the total results. We hoped that future generations might profit from our work; we believed that factory conditions would be bettered by increased protection against fire; we believed that the conditions for factory workers would be ameliorated by compelling all buildings in which workers were to be crowded to be so arranged that there should not be added to the ordinary danger of the employment the additional danger of fire or panic. We hoped to see the effort to increase building and factory profits a fraction of a per cent. by skipping stairways, huddling the workers into confined spaces, providing inadequate fire escapes and seeking ever some new way to evade the strict letter of the law, subordinated to the efforts of architects, builders and factory proprietors to provide for others such conditions as they would want for themselves.

We appeal to you to give the recommendations of this jury your most careful consideration and to cooperate with the proper authorities in securing their adoption into laws, to the end that the 146 persons who lost their lives shall not have died in vain. Yours respectfully,

We find that the said Mary Herman came to her death on the 25th day of March, 1911, at premises 23-29 Washington place, by asphyxia by smoke, charred, caused by conflagration which originated on the eighth floor of said premises, consuming the interior of the eighth, ninth and tenth floors, in a manner unknown to the jury, and that the body of deceased was found on the ninth floor of said premises close to the doorway of the stairs on the Washington place side, which door, according to the evidence presented to the jury, was found to be locked at the time of and during said conflagration.

We find that the deceased attempted to escape by the said door, and that her failure to so escape from smoke and flame which caused her death is due to the fact that said door was locked.

We find that Isaac Harris and Max Blanck, doing business under the firm name and style of The Triangle Waist Company, lessees and occupants of said floors, are responsible for the death of the deceased, because of culpable and criminal negligence in failing to observe the required legal precaution of leaving the said door unlocked.

Legislation cannot eliminate all loss of life by fire or panic, but proper laws, properly enforced can certainly lessen the loss of life from these causes. The evidence submitted to this jury shows that there were employed on the eighth, ninth and tenth floors of said premises about five hundred persons, of whom about eighty per cent. were females, and of whom about two hundred and thirty-five were employed on the ninth floor, where nearly all the loss of life by flames and smoke occurred.

We are convinced by the evidence that not only had no attention been given to, and no means provided for, the hasty exit of those employed in the said premises, but on the contrary, their safety had been utterly disregarded.

We find that one of the tables on which the machines were attached, at which the employees worked, was seventy-six feet long; that it extended from within thirteen and one-quarter (13 1/4) inches of the front wall, at one end, to within sixteen (16) inches of a partition at the other end, thus leaving only two passageways of about thirteen and one-quarter (13 1/4) inches, and one of sixteen (16) inches through which the said employees were obliged to pass to reach the stairs and elevators.

The foregoing is a condition that certainly should not obtain. If there is any law that permits it it should be immediately repealed. If there is no law governing it, such a law should at once be enacted, which will prohibit such a condition; and the law should be so framed that its enforcement should rest upon one single department of the City government. There should be no divided responsibility.

It is the opinion of this jury that all fire escapes should be regularly inspected by the Fire Department, and when such inspection reveals nonconformity with the law it should be immediately reported in writing to the Bureau of Buildings, which shall at once order the owner of the building on which said fire escape is installed to have such changes made as to make it conform to the law, and the Bureau of Buildings shall have power to enforce such order.

We recommend that where plans are filed with the Bureau of Buildings for the erection of a new building, or for alterations to a building, the application for such sets forth for what purpose said building is to be used; that the use of said building, or any part thereof, should not be permitted for any purpose other than stated in such application, without the written consent of the Superintendent of Buildings, who shall not give such consent unless the building shall be so constructed as to conform to the law governing that class of buildings, and for which purpose it is to be used when so altered that it will conform to such law.

We recommend that before any building, or part thereof, shall be used for manufacturing purposes, plans shall be filed with the Bureau of Buildings showing the location of machinery, stationary tables, work benches, etc., with exits, and stating the number of employees; that these plans shall meet the approval of the Superintendent of Buildings, who, before approval shall issue, shall find that the means of exit are such as will enable the escape of employees in case of emergency.

We recommend that in all buildings where a large number of employees are engaged a compulsory fire drill shall be established under a system to be approved by the Fire Department.

We recommend that a system of inspection of buildings used for factory purposes, at intervals not exceeding six months, shall be established, to insure conformity with the laws and regulations of the Fire and Building Departments.

We recommend extending use of automatic sprinklers.
We recommend that all stairways to the top floors of all buildings used for manufacturing purposes hereafter constructed shall be extended to the roof.

We recommend the requirement that in all buildings where there are more than twenty occupants, and more than an average of one person per one hundred (100) square feet of floor area there shall be posted rules to be followed in case of fire, and that a copy of such rules shall be required by the Fire Department.

We further recommend that a suitable axe be placed at each exit door in all lofts used for manufacturing purposes.

Be It Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. The Board of Aldermen hereby approves of and concurs in the following resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment May 4, 1911, and authorizes the Comptroller to issue corporate stock of The City of New York to the amount and for the purposes therein specified:

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On March 24, 1911, the Commissioner of Bridges requested corporate stock to the amount of \$15,000 for removal of the old Pelham Bridge, over Eastchester Bay in Pelham Bay Park, and the restoration of the site and construction work incidental thereto.

In connection therewith we report as follows:

The request is based upon the following communication to the Commissioner, under date of March 21, 1911, from Colonel W. M. Black, Corps of Engineers, War Department, New York, District No. 1:

Referring to the approval by the Secretary of War, May 18, 1903, of plans of the bridge over Eastchester Bay in Pelham Park, N. Y., attention is invited to condition 3 of this approval which requires that,

"All parts of the old bridge, including the approaches, shall be completely removed, except those parts of the approaches that are in front of the approaches of the proposed bridge."

Funds being now available for deepening the channel as provided under a project approved by Congress, June 25, 1910, it is necessary to commence the work of improvement at an early date, and since the amount of the funds available is sufficient to accomplish only part of the work, it is intended to first remove the worst obstructions to navigation. Among these is a ledge of rock lying in the channel on the line of the old bridge.

In order that the commerce of the creek may receive the benefits to be derived from improvements to be made above the bridge, it is necessary that the removal of this ledge be included in the work first to be done. I have therefore the honor to request early action in the matter of removing at least such part of the old bridge as projects into the channel authorized by Congress for improvement.

The request of the War Department covers the greater part of the removal and restoring work. A contract for the entire work, therefore, would appear to be desirable on the grounds of economy. The Commissioner estimates that the work will cost \$14,700, exclusive of contingent expenses.

In the 1910 corporate stock estimate for the Department, \$60,000 was requested for the removal of the old bridge and the completion of the new. The removal of the old bridge did not then appear to be an immediate necessity and only \$48,000 was made available for the completion of the new bridge and the necessary engineering expenses. The original appropriation for the bridge was \$250,000. In June, 1910, \$30,078.97 of the amount was rescinded.

The old bridge has not been in use for about two and a half years. To prevent delay in the improvements about to be begun by the Federal government, the immediate removal of the old structure appears to be necessary.

We recommend the adoption of the attached resolution granting the request.

The Budget for 1911 provides for one Foreman Steamfitter and three Steamfitters at the rate of \$5 per diem. The Board of Aldermen on February 28, 1911, on the recommendation of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, fixed the rate for Steamfitters in City departments at \$5.50 per diem. In the Fire Department the increased compensation is to be provided for by schedule modifications. The \$6.50 rate for Foreman Steamfitter would give \$1 more than the rate to be paid to Journeymen Steamfitters. The incumbent, Charles Manley, was appointed on May 1 1895, as a Steamfitter, at \$3 a day. On November 11, 1897, his wage was fixed at \$5 a day, as Acting Foreman of the repair shops. On July 1, 1898, he returned to work as Steamfitter at \$3 a day, and was increased to \$3.50 on January 1, 1900. On January 2, 1903, he was designated as Foreman Steamfitter at \$4 a day. On January 1, 1909, his compensation was fixed at \$5 a day, the prevailing rate for Steamfitters at that time.

The usual practice in private employ and City departments is to pay Foremen in mechanical trades fifty cents a day more than employees under their supervision. It appears that a \$6 rate for the one incumbent would be reasonable.

The established grade for Saw Filer is \$4 a day, for one incumbent in the Department. Saw Filers in the Department of Docks and Ferries and the Department of Parks are paid at the rate of \$4 and \$3.50 a day, respectively. We recommend that this item in the request be not approved.

The prevailing rate for licensed Firemen, Firemen and Stokers in City departments is \$3 a day. The rate is paid to the incumbent for whom the \$3.50 grade is requested. We recommend that this item in the request be not approved.

We recommend the adoption of the attached resolution approving of establishment of the grade of Foreman Steamfitter, at \$6 a day, for one incumbent.

Gentlemen—On February 23, 1911, the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity requested the establishment in his Department, pursuant to the provisions of section 56 of the Greater New York Charter, of the grades of position of Inspector of Meters and Water Consumption, at \$1,950, \$2,100 and \$2,250 per annum. In connection therewith we report as follows:

It is stated that the establishment is to equalize the compensation of Inspectors in different divisions, but performing services of equal importance, and to make possible the promotion of employees on merit. In the Bureau of Lamps and Lighting and the Bureau of Electrical Inspection there are \$2,250 and \$2,500 grades of Inspector, for an unlimited number of incumbents.

The Commissioner states that the qualifications for Water Meter Inspector are yearly becoming more technical, requiring practical experience in plumbing and some knowledge of hydraulics; and that the maximum grade of \$1,800 for the position is only equivalent to the daily rate of wages paid for the work in 1885.

A representative of the Commissioner states as follows:

It is proposed eventually to classify the Inspectors into the four following grades.

(a) Inspectors who read meters and make ordinary inspections. Compensation from \$1,200 to \$1,350 per annum.

(b) Inspectors of a higher order who are capable of making a complete re-examination of a premises and who have served three years or over in the first grade. Compensation from \$1,500 to \$1,650 per annum.

(c) Inspectors, Supervisors (limited as to number), who are handling men and in charge of an allotted section and having passed through the other grades and served not less than six years, and promoted for merit. Compensation from \$1,800 to \$1,950 per annum.

(d) Inspectors, Chief (five in number), one for each Borough, in charge of the inspection division. Compensation from \$2,100 to \$2,250 per annum.

There are to be twenty-five Supervising Inspectors, graded from \$1,800 to \$1,950 and distributed as follows: Manhattan, 10; The Bronx, 4; Brooklyn, 7; Queens, 2; and Richmond, 2. The \$2,100 and \$2,500 grades are for five Chief Inspectors, one for each Borough. It would appear sufficient, therefore, to limit the grade at \$1,950 to twenty-five incumbents, and the grades at \$2,100 to \$2,250 to five and three incumbents each, respectively.

It is stated that the only immediate promotion proposed is for Charles W. Rennie, Chief Inspector, Brooklyn, from \$1,800 to \$2,100 per annum. Mr. Rennie was appointed on March 29, 1897, as an Inspector of Meters and Water Consumption, at \$3 per diem. On November 15, 1901, his compensation was fixed at \$1,000 per annum; on June 1, 1905, he was increased to \$1,200; on May 1, 1906, to \$1,350; on April 1, 1907, to \$1,500, and on July 1, 1909, to the present rate.

We recommend the adoption of the attached resolution approving of the requested grades, for limited establishment as previously noted.

The comparing now is done by the Recording Clerks. There are 510 wills and 2,230 accountings unrecorded, and it is stated that the full staff of ten Clerks is needed exclusively for the work of recording. The Surrogate states the following:

"The plan of having the comparing done by the Recording Clerks themselves has proved unsatisfactory. After trying various other ways of having this work compared, I am of the opinion that it is absolutely necessary that it should be done by Clerks who devote their entire time to the comparing of all records. The Register of Kings County has seven Comparers, and the County Clerk has two.

"It is of the utmost importance that the records in this Court should be absolutely accurate, especially as to wills, since, after one year from probate, the original will can be taken from the Court, and we have no means of making corrections thereafter."

Four Comparers and three Assistant Comparers in the office of the Register of Kings County are at \$1,500 per annum each. Two Comparers in the office of the County Clerk of Kings County receive \$1,000 per annum each. In the Surrogate's Court, County of New York, the comparing is done by a Chief Examiner, at \$1,500 per annum, and an Assistant Examiner at \$1,200.

It appears from examination that there is no necessity at this time for establishment of the position of Assistant Index Clerk. The work is done by an Index Clerk at \$1,800 per annum, and it is stated that assistance may be given, whenever necessary, by other Clerks in the office.

We recommend the adoption of the attached resolution approving of establishment for two Comparers at the requested rate. Respectfully,

The President laid before the Board the following communication from the President, Borough of Queens:

No. 3512.

The City of New York, Office of The President of the Borough of Queens, Long Island City, May 8, 1911.

Hon. JOHN PURROY MITCHEL, President of the Board of Aldermen:

Dear Sir—This Department, for the proper and efficient supervision of the laboring force of the Bureau of Highways, has found it necessary since consolidation and at the present time to assign Foremen, known as General Foremen, to the different Wards of this Borough. The men holding these positions, by virtue of length of service and experience, were entitled to and did receive, up to December 31, 1910, a higher salary than the ordinary Foreman, and our estimates made in the Budget for the year 1911 were on that basis and our requisitions were for the same salaries as the men were receiving at that time. The Committee of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the principal member of which was the Comptroller, in their final recommendations to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, eliminated all positions of Foremen paid on a per annum basis, and substituted therefore the line, Foreman, at \$4 per diem, notwithstanding the fact that a large number of our employees of that title received a larger salary, and some were paid on a per annum basis. The attention of the Comptroller was called to the fact that a great percentage of our Foremen were veteran firemen and by virtue thereof were entitled to certain legal privileges.

The claim was made that the positions had not been established in accordance with section 56 of the Charter of The City of New York. In connection therewith we beg to say that under date of December 17, 1909, in a communication addressed to Hon. George B. McClellan, Mayor, and Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, this office did (in accordance with instructions contained in special notice to the heads of departments from the Department of Finance, dated June 18, 1909, issued, pursuant to an opinion from the Corporation Counsel dated June 14, 1909), apply for the establishment of all the positions in this office not heretofore established in accordance with section 56, for the reason that it was generally understood that the positions in the labor class were exempted from the provisions of this law. Among the positions applied for were the positions of Foremen, at \$3, \$5, \$4.50 and \$4 per diem; and \$1,800, \$1,500, \$1,200 and \$1,050 per annum. Our application took the usual course and in due time, on recommendation of the Comptroller, was referred back for modification.

The report did not contain any suggestions as to what modifications might be desired, we, consequently, let the subject lay in abeyance in as much as the positions we desired established were at that time in vogue and were being honored on the payrolls of this Department, we, therefore, could not consistently meet the request of the Board.

It is a well known fact that the Budget requisitions for all departments for moneys, with which to pay the laboring force, are based on the payrolls of the Department as of the particular month in which the papers are prepared, and that the fluctuations in force are so numerous and of such character to necessitate in most instances an application for revisions to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment at the first of the year, or immediately subsequent thereto.

On this subject we have received the following self explanatory communication, to wit:

"May 5, 1911.

"Hon. WALTER H. BUNN, Commissioner of Public Works:

"Dear Sir—Under date of March 13, 1911, a request was made upon you for a revision of the Budget allotment of this Bureau, entitled 'Bureau of Highways, Maintenance of Highways, Code 1829, Wages, Regular Employees,' as follows:

"You will note by comparison of the two schedules that it was our intention to provide moneys to pay six foremen, in addition to the two provided for, it being understood that in providing for two incumbents the intent was to provide for two of these men, Messrs. Conroy and Allen, who had been paid at the rate of \$1,800 and \$1,500 per annum, respectively, up to December 31, 1910, the Department of Finance holding that these positions had not been established under section 56 of the Greater New York Charter. Five of these six men, who, by the way, are practically the oldest men in point of service in the Bureau, were designated as Ward Foremen in charge of districts, and whose duties are similar to those of district Superintendents in the Department of Street Cleaning, and the sixth man was placed in charge of the Corporation Yard in Long Island City, where a force of mechanics is employed in repairing apparatus, tools, etc., and which is used as a distributing station for the whole Borough.

"When the application reached the Finance Department, however, exception was taken to the proposed revision, and the surplus in the fund was designated as an unassigned balance instead of being allotted to the line Foreman. The Department of Finance now holds that this unassigned balance reverts back to the Sinking Fund, and the proper procedure is to apply for an issue of revenue bonds to provide for the wages of these men. You, of course, being familiar with the routine of this Bureau, can readily understand the need for men to act in this capacity, in assigning gangs on complaints and supervising the work in their respective districts, passing on the reports of the gang foremen, etc., and I know will agree with me that men in this capacity are absolutely necessary.

"In view of the action of the Department of Finance as above stated, and their statement that the unassigned balance of \$7,235.75 will revert back to the Sinking Fund, you are requested to apply to the Board of Aldermen for an issue of revenue bonds in that sum to provide for the wages of these six Foremen. Respectfully submitted,

Reports of Committee on Buildings—

Nos. 2525 and 3333.

The Committee on Buildings, to which was referred on January 3 and April 18, 1911 (Minutes, pages 5 and 113), the annexed documents, Introductory Nos. 2525 and 3333, respectfully

REPORTS:

That these papers require no further consideration. It, therefore, recommends that the said papers be placed on file.

To the Honorable, the Board of Aldermen:

We, the undersigned petitioners, do hereby ask that your Honorable Board take under consideration and repeal the section of the present building laws now in force in The City of New York relating to the use of fireproof wood in buildings of over 150 feet in height, and for the following reasons, viz.:

First—That the fireproofing of said woodwork is an unnecessary expense to the owner, in that the fireproofing process does not necessarily render the wood fireproof when put in the building, and after comparatively few years (about four to five years) very little of such fireproofed wood is non-inflammable.

Second—That the cost of such process is excessive, owing to the limited number of firms engaged in the business and the lack of competition therein.

Third—That in case of fire in such a building it is practically always the case that the furnishings, stock, etc., contained therein are the first to catch fire and that the trim of the building forms such a small porportion of the contents as to have little or no effect in the final outcome of the fire.

Fourth—That all fire insurance companies engaged in business in New York City and also the Board of Fire Underwriters, now recognize so decidedly the uselessness of fireproofed wood in buildings that they now charge the same rate for buildings where such wood is used, the same as if none of the woodwork had been fireproofed.

Fifth—That the cost of building operations in this City is thus greatly increased, and that neither the owner of the building nor the public receives any benefit whatever from such increased cost.

Sixth—That the said ordinance was introduced into the Building Code principally for the benefit of a single industry controlled by patents and in the hands of two or three firms.

Dear Sirs—At the monthly meeting of the Wyckoff Heights Taxpayers' Association held Tuesday, April 4, 1911, the enclosed resolutions were unanimously approved and a copy ordered to be forwarded to your honorable body for your favorable consideration. Yours very truly,

Whereas, The recent disastrous fire at Washington place and Greene st., whereby more than 140 lives were lost, has shown the inadequacy of the recent Building Code, especially as relates to those sections of the Code pertaining to exits, stairs and fire-escapes, egress from rear yards, courts, shafts, etc.; and

Whereas, This lack of proper exit facilities available in case of fire or panic in connection with all classes of buildings, and especially in the cases of the so-called fireproof buildings, many of which lack proper and adequate stairs as required by the present Code, whereby a false security has been engendered in the public mind with regard to such buildings; and

Whereas, Repeated efforts on the part of numerous bodies, including the former Code Revision Committees, and of Fire Chief Croker, who have repeatedly called attention to the inadequacy of the present law as respects the section governing the construction of fire-escapes now being erected on buildings; and

Whereas, The present Code permits the erection of flimsy and dangerous outside balcony fire-escapes, totally inadequate and unsuitable in case of fire and panic; be it therefore

Resolved, That the Wyckoff Heights Taxpayers' Association recommend that the Building Code be so amended that all existing buildings in use for factory, warehouse, storehouse, loft or office purposes, and more than two stories above the sidewalk, shall be provided with fire-resisting stairs enclosed in brick walls on all sides and to extend from ground floor to bulkhead above the roof; the said fire-resisting stairs to be placed on street side of the building. No door or other opening to lead directly on to the stairway but on to a separate fireproof landing open on the street side of building with railing across the said landings.

Resolved, That where such fire-resisting stairs cannot be placed on the street side of the building a fireproof passageway not less than four feet wide to be installed on the sidewalk, or first tier level, said passageway to be constructed of brick walls, steel beams and brick floor arches.

Resolved, That all rear yards or courts to be connected to the above mentioned fire passage as to allow of proper egress in case of fire or panic.

Resolved, That as this matter is of vital importance to the community, the recurrence of such calamities being liable to happen at any moment, the matter of proper and adequate fire stairs, exits and passageways to be taken up immediately without regard to other points of the Building Code which are in need of revision.

Resolved, That the Superintendents of the various Boroughs be instructed to vigorously inspect all buildings of the class enumerated above, and order such additional exits, fire stairs and passageways to be installed as may be necessary to safeguard the public.

Resolved, That the honorable Board of Aldermen be requested to pass such ordinance as will cover these points and that the same take place immediately.

The Committee on Finance, to which was referred on May 2, 1911 (Minutes, page 226), the annexed request from the Board of Education for \$2,000 special revenue bonds for payment of a judgment, respectfully

REPORTS:

That under the provisions of subdivision 3 of section 188 of the Charter the payment of judgments is left to the Comptroller, who has authority to issue bonds for such purposes. It, therefore, recommends that the said request be referred to the Comptroller.

To the Board of Education:

The Committee on Finance respectfully reports that on March 7, 1911, a judgment for \$2,821.36 was entered against the Board of Education in favor of Eva R. Levy, a teacher in Public School 54, Borough of Brooklyn, on account of injuries sustained by her on June 12, 1906, at the above-named school, by reason of the falling of a rolling door at the rear of her desk.

The judgment and related documents were transmitted by Deputy Comptroller Fisher to the President of the Board on April 11, 1911, with the request that a voucher be prepared and transmitted to the office of the Comptroller in the usual manner.

Under date of April 4, 1911, Acting Corporation Counsel Sterling advised the Comptroller that stipulation was agreed upon between the parties wherein the plaintiff and her attorneys consented to accept the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,000) in full payment, discharge and satisfaction of the judgment. The Acting Corporation Counsel advised that the judgment had been properly obtained to the extent of \$2,000.

There are no funds available to meet this unforeseen liability; it therefore becomes necessary to secure the issue of special revenue bonds to the amount requisite to pay the judgment.

The following resolution is submitted for adoption:

Resolved, That the Board of Aldermen be and it is hereby respectfully requested to adopt a resolution requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the issue of special revenue bonds to the amount of two thousand dollars (\$2,000), pursuant to the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Revised Charter, said

Gentlemen—As Clerk of the County of Queens, I am required by the provisions of the various laws affecting this office to perform certain services. These services have been performed by former County Clerks for some time prior to consolidation and have been paid for by the County Treasurer under authority from the Boards of Supervisors. Since consolidation (1898), the Comptroller of The City of New York has audited and paid these bills until recently, the question has been raised as to the authority to fix the amounts charged for various services.

An examination of the laws and the Charter fails to disclose the proper authority, but as this function was performed by the Board of Supervisors, the general opinion seems to be that the Board of Aldermen succeed to the duties of the Board of Supervisors in this particular and has the right to fix the charges.

Accordingly, I am submitting herewith a statement showing the amounts as charged and paid since consolidation and prior thereto down to my term as County Clerk.

Also submitted is the statement showing the nature of the services performed and the laws requiring them.

I would, therefore, ask that your Board approve these charges as per the statement enclosed.

Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, Commissioner's Office, 13-21 Park Row, City of New York, April 25, 1911.

The Hon. JOHN PURROY MITCHEL, President, The Board of Aldermen, City of New York:

Dear Sir:—On or about March 1, 1910, the Hon. William A. Prendergast, Comptroller, advised this Department that the settlement of the accounts of the Consolidated Gas Company of New York, together with its affiliated companies, gas and electric, doing business in the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Queens, had been effected with the City by the execution of a Compromise Agreement, in which the said companies agreed to accept certain reduced rates on account of the services rendered by the said companies in lighting public streets and buildings and furnishing

power, by gas and electricity, in the said Boroughs for the period from November, 1902, to the date of the said communication.

The Honorable Comptroller also instructed this Department, on account of its familiarity with the lighting problems, to prepare the vouchers, documents, etc., with a view to certifying for payment the said moneys involved in this compromise settlement, as well as to compute and prepare for the Department of Finance statements of the amounts involved for account of interest charges accrued and accruing on the basis of the said compromise rates.

This Department thereupon began the work and, with the assistance of three employees detailed by the Comptroller to assist in this computation, made great progress, until December 1, 1910, when the said employees were reluctantly recalled by the Comptroller.

Since December 1, 1910, the Bureau of Lamps and Lighting of this Department has continued in its work, but is unable to make the progress that is desired, owing to the lack of sufficient employees to do the work, there being only two employees in the Bureau of Lamps and Lighting whom I can assign to do this work. Inasmuch as the terms of settlement include the verification, audit and figuring of the original bills (some \$7,000,000) rendered by the said companies, on which the rates had been questioned by former officials of The City of New York as being exorbitant and unconstitutional, it is absolutely necessary that this Department obtain the services of temporary employees whose qualifications must be above the ordinary. Such qualifications must include familiarity and experience with the accounts of the Department of Finance, because of the necessary research and examination of the records of that Department and the locating of many of the vouchers and other documents that have been transmitted by this Department and other Departments, to which services in lighting were rendered in the period involved. Again, the said temporary employees should have the necessary qualifications of the accountant or bookkeeper.

In view of the above conditions, this Department is unable to make as much expedition in the settlement of these accounts as desired, and would respectfully request that your Honorable Board authorize the issuance of special revenue bonds, in accordance with the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter as amended, to provide the funds for the payment of the salaries of the employees necessary to be hired to complete this work. Owing to the great mass of detail and the extensive research necessary on this work, it is difficult to state definitely how long the services of these extra employees will be required, but from information obtained from the Chief Engineer of Light and Power, who is in charge of this work, I would respectfully request the issuance of special revenue bonds for \$8,400, it being my opinion that it will take at least that sum to pay the salaries from the first of May, 1911, to December 31, 1911, of the six temporary Accountants or Bookkeepers, whose salaries will average about forty dollars per week, the same as is now and has been paid by the Department of Finance to employees doing similar work.

At present, the Park Commissioner is obliged to make his trips to Department, and over the parks of the City, in a single-seated carriage. Time and again we have been subjected to the ridiculous necessity of going forth on important park errands, myself in the first single-seated carriage, the Chief Engineer following in another single-seated carriage, and after him the Landscape Architect in another single-seated carriage.

I might dwell also on the vast loss of time due not only to such a condition of affairs, but to the fact that I, myself, in attempting to cope with the vast activities of this office, must attempt to cover long distances and reach numerous points behind a slow-going team of horses.

In brief, I consider the automobile which I now ask your Honorable Body to permit me to purchase without public letting, an absolute necessity. I, therefore, beg leave to submit to your Board the following resolution for your consideration:

A communication was presented from the Chief Examiner, dated April 7, relative to the appeal of Daniel M. Mullen, a candidate for promotion to Assistant Foreman, Department of Street Cleaning, stating that evidently no injustice had been done the candidate as he was on the eligible list with a percentage of 81. The communication was ordered filed.

A report was presented from the Chief Examiner, dated April 7, relative to the complaint of Julia M. Cavanagh, a candidate for Attendance Officer, stating that the candidate was on the list with a percentage of 85 and a standing of 24th. The report was ordered filed.

A report was presented from the Chief Examiner, dated April 7, relative to the appeal of Francis Callaghan, a candidate in the examination for promotion to Assistant Foreman, Department of Street Cleaning, stating that his papers were all right apparently as he was on the eligible list with a percentage of 79.50. The report was ordered filed.

A report was presented from the Chief Examiner, dated April 11, relative to a complaint of Michael Murphy, a candidate for promotion to Assistant Foreman, Department of Street Cleaning, stating that no injustice had been done the candidate and that his name appeared upon the eligible list with a percentage of 82. The report was ordered filed.

A report was presented from the Chief Examiner, dated April 6, forwarding a report of Mr. Ihseng on the examination originally ordered for Assistant Electrical Engineer, approving Mr. Ihseng's recommendations and stating that he was decidedly of the opinion that the examination should not be held merely for the Fire Department, but to provide a list for any department needing an Electrical Engineer. The recommendations were adopted.

A report was presented from the Chief Examiner, dated April 6, suggesting the following subjects and weights for the examination for Instructor of Plumbing at the Reformatory, Department of Correction: Technical, 6 (oral 3, mental 3); experience, 4. A report was presented from the Labor Clerk, dated April 10, relative to the request of the Commissioner of Public Works, Borough of The Bronx, that the name of Giuseppe Gentile, of 2388 Arthur avenue, be placed on the preferred list of Laborer for the Borough of The Bronx. It appearing from the doctor's certificate furnished that the absence for which Mr. Gentile had been dismissed on March 2, 1911, had been due to illness, the request was granted.

The matter was laid over pending the receipt of additional information.

A report was presented from the Assistant Chief Examiner in Charge of Promotions, dated April 12, relative to the request of the Commissioner of Parks, Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, for approval of the change of title of Miss Mary Kennedy from Attendant to Inspectress. On motion, the request was denied.

A report was presented from the Assistant Chief Examiner in Charge of Promotions, dated April 6, relative to the request of the Acting President of the Borough of Brooklyn, that an examination be held for promotion from the positions of Stoker and Licensed Fireman to that of Stationary Engineer, in the Bureau of Highways and the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices of his Department. On motion, the request was granted in accordance with Rule XV, paragraph 17, the examination to be open to all Stokers and Licensed Firemen who had served for not less than three years and who were otherwise eligible.

Cavanagh and Thorpe, Examiners, who had reexamined all ratings on record in the examination for promotion to Captain of Police. It appeared from the report that two of the candidates, Lieutenants James M. After careful consideration of the matter, it was

Resolved, That the Secretary be and he hereby is directed to proceed with an examination for promotion to the position of Fire Marshal in the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, such examination to be restricted to the Assistant Fire Marshals serving in those Boroughs.

A report was presented from the Assistant Chief Examiner in Charge of Promotions, dated April 10, relative to the request of the Corporation Counsel that an examination be held for promotion from the position of Second Grade Stenographer and Typewriter to that of Third Grade Stenographer and Typewriter, in the Bureau of Street Openings under his jurisdiction. The request was granted in accordance with Rule XV., paragraph 8a.

A report was presented from the Assistant Chief Examiner in Charge of Promotions, dated April 6, relative to the request of the Acting President of the Borough of Brooklyn that an examination be held by which Topographical Draftsmen employed in the Bureau of Sewers might qualify for promotion from Grade C to Grade D. It was certified that the examination was requested for the purpose of meeting the requirements of the department for the ensuing year. The request was granted in accordance with Rule XV, paragraph 9.

A report was presented from Mr. James A. Rafferty, Examiner, dated April 5, stating that Charles T. H. Llewellyn, of 114 West 134th street, whose name appeared on the eligible list of Probation Officer, had been arraigned in the City Magistrates' Court on May 18, 1910, charged with abandonment and nonsupport. A report was presented from Mr. James A. Rafferty, Examiner, dated April 5, relative to the application of Daniel J. Gillespie, of 1056 East 95th street, Brooklyn, for the position of Inspector of Carpentry and Masonry, and recommending that Mr.

Gillespie should be marked qualified on the eligible list upon which his name appeared with a rating of 92. The recommendation was adopted.

A report was presented from the Assistant Chief Examiner in Charge of Promotions, dated April 6, relative to the request of the President of the Borough of The Bronx that an examination be held by which Mr. Arthur C. Faulhaber, a Second Grade Clerk in the Bureau of Highways, Maintenance, might qualify for promotion to the Third Grade. The report stated that, according to the records of the Commission, Mr. Faulhaber entered the Second Grade on November 18, 1908, and would not be eligible for examination for promotion until November 18, 1911. The request was denied for lack of power.

A report was presented from Mr. James P. Conway, Assistant and Acting Chief Examiner, dated April 10, recommending the following subjects and weights for the examination for Inspector of Iron and Steel Construction: Technical, 50; experience, 20; mathematics, 10; report, 20; 75 per cent. to be required on the technical. The recommendation was adopted.

Resolved, That the eligible list of Gymnasium Attendant, male, be and the same hereby is established as of April 7, 1911, the date on which the rating of the papers was completed.

The action of the Secretary in permitting James J. Hickman, of 230 7th avenue, New York City, a candidate for Inspector of Electric Lighting and Conductors, to amend his statements as to the date of birth was approved.

The Secretary stated that owing to the various changes made in the office of the Commission it would be necessary to have some of the furniture repaired and to purchase some new articles for the use of the Examining Division. On motion, the Secretary was authorized to make the necessary expenditure.

A communication was presented from the Secretary of the State Civil Service Commission, dated April 7, stating that at a meeting of that Board held on April 5, the resolution of the Commission, excepting from examination, pursuant to the provisions of paragraph 6 of Rule XII., Dr. Herbert D. Pease and Mr. A. J. Provost, Jr., had been approved. The communication was ordered filed.

On motion, it was Resolved, That, subject to the approval of the Mayor and the State Civil Service Commission, the limitation of compensation (\$750), fixed by clause 6 of Rule XII, be and the same hereby is waived in so far as it applies to Mr. Allan J. Gray, "Temporary Expert Accountant," in the Finance Department; provided, however, that his total compensation shall not exceed \$1,050.

A letter was presented from the Assistant Secretary of the Board of Education, dated April 6, requesting approval of the assignment of Charles H. Roberts, as Janitor of Public School 98, E. Manhattan. It appeared that Roberts had been unassigned since September 21, 1910, on which date he had been reinstated in the position of Janitor, with the approval of the Commission, under the provisions of paragraph 3 of Rule XIII. 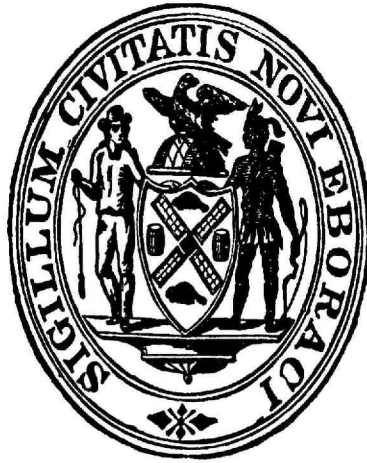
