constructed of 1 1/4-inch flats on edge—space 1 1/4 inches centers. Tread brackets 1 1/4 inches by 1 1/4 inches by 1/4 L's riveted to strings.

(2) Premises affected, Auburn, 32-34 Water st.; appellant, Henderson & Lathrop. 2—Immediately cease employing, etc. 6—Provide additional exit from all floors. 11-13-17. Three-story nonfireproof factory building erected before Oct. 1, 1913; with open lofts; no sprinkler installed; combustibles carried; no fire alarm. Occupancy of building, 10; above 1st floor, 7; above 2nd floor, 1 to 4. Doors open out, but are not self-closing. One straight-run stair 1st to 3rd floors, each flight enclosed on side with wood sheeting.

Recommendation: Inasmuch as there are but seven people employed above the 1st floor, accept as a second means of exit a fire escape to be located on the rear wall of said building; said fire escape to conform in all respects to Paragraph "A," Rule 4, except that, owing to the small occupancy, nonfireproof windows will be accepted at the openings leading to balconies on said fire escape. It is understood, however, that should the occupancy be materially increased this fire escape is to be made to comply fully with Rule 4, paragraph "A" of the Labor Law.

(3) Premises affected, Buffalo, 12 Ash st.; appellant, Fisher Bros. Candy Co. 7—Provide proper safety on elevator car. 2-28-16. Hand-power elevator used by only one of owners. A device has been installed which must be worked by hand, but will catch and hold the car.

Recommendation: Accept as compliance with above order the device installed, while no employees are allowed to use the elevator and same is only handled by one of firm.

(4) Premises affected, Buffalo, 32 Court st.; appellant, P. B. McNaughton. 1—Provide additional exit. 2—Prohibit the operation of factory. 11-21-17. Five-story building with open lofts; no sprinkler; no combustibles; no fire alarms. Occupancy of building, 45; factory, 10; other, 35; above 1st floor, 18; above 2nd floor, 15. All factory work is being done on 5th floor of building. There is one interior unenclosed stairway running from 1st to 5th floors. There is also a fire escape balcony on 5th floor, leading from factory workroom and connecting with fire escape on the theatre building adjoining, which fire escape leads to ground.

Recommendation: Accept the fire escape as second means of exit while there is no increase in factory workers and no factory work done on 2nd, 3rd or 4th floors.

(5) Premises affected, Falconer; appellant, Jamestown Mantel Co. 25—Immediately prohibit use of new section of building for factory purposes until same is made to conform to all requirements of Section 79-a and 79-c. 26—Provide three fireproof enclosed stairways in new section of building remote from each other on all floors. 6-1-17. Three-story nonfireproof factory building erected before October 1, 1913; with open lofts; Class 83-b sprinkler installed; combustibles carried; no fire alarms. Occupancy of building about 270; above 1st floor, 207; above 2nd floor, 101. Three interior stairs enclosed in wood partitions. Doors open outwardly and are self-closing. Exits are remote. No safe egress from roof. This was originally a three-story building, 162 feet by 44 feet, with two-story wing, 97 feet by 50 feet. Addition consisted of raising wing one story and lengthening it 64 feet, making wing three stories high, 161 feet 6 inches by 50 feet. Total floor area of original building, 31,134 square feet. Total floor area of addition, 14,475 square feet. Addition erected after Oct. 1, 1913.

Recommendation: Inasmuch as area of addition does not exceed or equal 50 per cent. of original area, orders No. 25 and No. 26 be waived.

(6) Premises affected, Gloversville, Glove st.; appellant, James E. Kelly & Co. (Kingsborough Glove Co.). 1—Provide additional exit from 4th floor. 2—Prohibit operation of factories, 4th floor, until additional exit is provided. 1-31-17. Four-story nonfireproof factory building; with divided lofts; no sprinkler installed; no combustibles; no fire alarm. Occupancy of building, 19; above 1st floor, 15; above 2nd floor, 4. Two interior stairways. Doors open inwardly and are not self-closing. Exits are remote. No safe egress from roof. The 4th floor is an attic about 45 feet by 30 feet, used for the storage of skins, one man going there occasionally daily. Exits consist of one stairway at east end of building connecting all floors, and another stairway immediately beyond party wall between three and four-story parts and accessible from 2nd and 3rd floors; inside wooden ladder through scuttle hole in 4th floor to 3rd floor, connecting with last named stairs.

Recommendation: Accept ladder from 3rd to 4th floors and waive orders No. 1 and No. 2 while conditions and occupancy remain unchanged.

(7) Premises affected, Johnstown, 30 North Market st.; appellant, Mrs. Henrietta B. Cline. Appealing orders. 1—Provide additional means of exit. 3—Prohibit occupancy on 3rd floor. 10-24-16. Three-story nonfireproof factory building with divided lofts; no sprinkler; no combustibles; no fire alarm; occupancy above the 2nd floor, 1 occasionally. Exit consists of one interior stairway, doors to which open out but are not self-closing. No egress from roof. Exterior wooden stairway has been erected, but same is not enclosed.

Recommendation: Accept exterior wooden stairway unenclosed.

(8) Premises affected, Newburgh, 40 Grand st.; appellant, Newburgh News Printing and Publishing Company. 5—Provide at least two means of exit, remote from each other, from each floor of building; however, if fire escape exists at present on building and is made to conform with the requirements of the Labor Law, the same may be accepted as such required means of exit. 6-5-15. Appeal is made from that part of order requiring fireproofing of window on 1st floor. Four-story nonfireproof factory building, erected before Oct. 1, 1913; with divided lofts; sprinklered; combustibles carried; no fire alarm. Occupancy of building, 58; above 1st floor, 46; above 2nd floor, 29. One interior stairway, unenclosed, doors to which open out but are not self-closing. Perfect fire escape on rear, except fireproofing of one window on 1st floor. Openings to balconies are fireproof. Size, 6 1/2 feet high by 3 feet wide. Exits are remote. Height of ceiling, 1st floor and basement, 20 feet 9 inches; lower part of window 10 feet 10 inches above floor. Sprinkler head directly over window; side walls of room plaster; floor brick. Fire escape is located 10 feet from building. This window is under the passageway leading from 2nd floor to fire escape. First floor is used for printing.

Recommendation: Waive the order relating to the fireproofing of the window on the first floor.

(9) Premises affected, Oswego, W. 2nd and Schuyler sts.; appellant, Hayes Knitting Co. 8—Continue exit stairway to roof. 6-13-17. Two-story fireproof factory building erected after October 1, 1913; with open lofts; sprinkler installed; combustibles carried; no fire alarm signal system. Occupancy of building, 82, 61 of whom are employed above the 1st floor. Two interior stairways enclosed in fireproof partitions. Doors open out and are self-closing. Exits are remote. No safe egress from the roof. Building is isolated and there is no egress from roof of the building to any adjoining building.

Recommendation: Waive order No. 8, requiring that exit stairs be continued to the roof.

(10) Premises affected, Rochester, 12 Brown's Race; appellant, Rochester Heel Company. Provide an approved fire alarm signal system. Building is three stories high; of nonfireproof construction; no automatic sprinkler system; no combustibles carried, and at time of inspection and issuance of order no fire alarm system installed. The occupancy above the 1st floor at the time of inspection was 150 people. The fire alarm signal system installed as a result of the order issued has Klaxon D. C. signals properly guarded and sufficient in size and number to be distinctly heard throughout the building. The mechanism is enclosed dustproof. The stations are equipped with H. & H. flash switches. These stations are accessible and are in the path of escape. No point on the floor is more than 100 feet from a station. There is no means provided of silent test. The system is of the Pull Lever type and is protected by glass. The source of energy is the Public Service Railroad and Lighting Company.

Recommendation: Inasmuch as the system installed is of a type which is acceptable only where there are not more than 150 people employed above the 1st floor, accept the system while the occupancy above the first floor does not exceed 150.

(11) Premises affected, Rome, 506-512 W. Liberty st.; appellant, Columbia Knitting Mills. 5—Cease employing above 2nd floor. 7—Provide one additional approved means of exit from all floors of building, remote from existing one. 11-5-17. Three-story nonfireproof building erected before Oct. 1, 1913; with open lofts; sprinklered; combustibles carried; fire alarm signal installed. Occupancy of building, 76; factory, 75; other, 1. Above 1st floor, 50; above 2nd floor, 7. One unenclosed interior stairway. There is also a fire escape stairway provided with a fireproof door leading from the balcony at the 3rd floor to the roof of the one-story extension; at the 2nd floor there is an entrance to this one-story roof through a fireproof door and from said roof to an iron stairs leading to the ground. A railing has been installed around the one-story building.

Recommendation: Accept as a second means of exit the fire escape from the 3rd floor leading to the one-story roof, and the entrance to said roof from the 2nd floor with the iron stairway leading from the roof to ground.

(12) Premises affected, Rome, East Park st.; appellant, Harry Ackley. 1—Cease employing above the 1st floor. 2—Provide two fireproof stairways remote from each other from all floors of building. 10-29-17. Two-story nonfireproof building erected after October 1, 1913; with open lofts; no sprinklers; no combustibles; no fire alarms; occupancy of building, 20, 14 of whom are above the 1st floor. One interior stairway not properly enclosed in fireproof partitions. No safe egress from roof. Building erected for dwelling purposes, afterwards changed to be used as factory. One stairway from 1st to 2nd floors. Building not yet entirely completed. Same is approximately 25 by 40.

Recommendation: Accept the present interior stairway if same is enclosed with asbestos fireproof wall board, extending continuously from the cellar to the underside of the roof. If there be windows to the outer air from said stairway enclosure, you will be exempted from providing a skylight in the roof of said enclosure, measuring three-quarters the area of the enclosure. The openings on the 1st and 2nd floors to this stairway enclosure may be provided with heavy, self-closing wooden doors in lieu of fireproof doors. As a second means of exit accept a 30-inch outside iron stairway with balcony, same to be provided in the northwest corner of the building, extending from the 2nd floor to grade with nonfireproof openings on the course of said stairway on the 1st floor to be fireproofed. When the exits above called for have been provided, same will be accepted as a compliance with order No. 2 and order No. 1 will be automatically waived.

(13) Premises affected, Rushville; appellant, Colonial Canning Company. Orders issued 8-16-16. 1—Provide additional means of exit. 2—Enclose stairway as per 79-a. Orders issued 8-30-17. 2—Reconstruct present stair of combustible material. 3—Extend stair to roof. 4—Extend stair enclosure 3 feet above roof and provide skylight. 5—Provide openings in stair enclosure with fire doors. Two-story nonfireproof factory building erected after Oct. 1, 1913; with open lofts; no sprinklers; no combustibles; no fire alarm. Occupancy of building, 100; above 1st floor, 12 to 30. Interior stairs, northwest corner, 45 inches wide, enclosed on side from 1st floor to underside of 2nd floor with 7/8-inch matched sheeting covered with wood lath and cement plaster on the workroom side. Door at bottom of stair is covered with plaster board on workroom side only. Outside wood stair or fire escape at northwest side 30 inches wide, unenclosed, with balcony at 2nd floor level and door to balcony 2 feet 6 inches wide by 6 feet high. Stair extends to right angle of building. Building is constructed of tile walls with cement flooring on 1st floor. Exits are remote.

Recommendation: Accept the inside stair as first required exit, provided same is enclosed on side and bottom with metal lath and Portland cement mortar. In lieu of providing fireproof door at opening from 1st floor workroom to stair enclosure, grant permission to close up door opening on the 1st floor, leading from workroom to stair enclosure with fire resisting material, and provide opening direct to outer air within enclosure. When the above work is done, accept the outside stair as a second exit and waive items No. 2, No. 3, No. 4 and No. 5 of orders issued on Aug. 30, 1917.

(14) Premises affected, White Plains, 155 Main st.; appellant, F. D. Hopkins (Wm. A. Hanson). Request for permission to reopen a cellar bakery room which has not been used as a bakery for some six years, without making same 10 feet high. Cellar entirely below level of street in front of building, but the floor is at grade in the rear. Two windows open from bakery room to outer air at rear; bakery room is in rear of building. Ceiling now 8 feet.

Recommendation: Inasmuch as bakery room is in rear of building, recommend that variation be granted permitting the same to be again used for bakery on condition that premises be placed in compliance with the law in all other respects.

AND it appearing that there are practical difficulties and unnecessary hardship in complying with the strict letter of the law and of the rules and regulations of the Industrial Code on the premises noted herein, and that in granting the variations recommended in each case the spirit of the law and of the rules and regulations will be observed and public safety insured; and

It further appearing that each of the appellants herein has been advised that he would be given an opportunity to appear and be heard at this time and place if he desired to appear, and such of the appellants who appeared having been heard by the Commission, therefore

Be it resolved, that the State Industrial Commission grant the variations noted in each case to the appellants herein specified with the understanding that said variations be effective so long as conditions and occupancy remain as of this date.

WHEREAS, THE DIVISION OF FACTORY INSPECTION has submitted to this Commission the following appeals filed by the parties noted herein against the premises stated below, from orders issued by said Division of Inspection, granting of which appeals would necessitate a variation of law; and

Whereas, the said Division of Factory Inspection has had a reinspection made in each case, and upon the reports submitted gives the following conditions and recommends accordingly:

(1) Premises affected, East Rochester; appellant, Merchants Despatch Transportation Co. 1—Additional exit. 3-story nonfireproof office building; divided lofts; no sprinkler; no combustibles; no fire alarm. Occupancy of building, 26; above 1st floor, 19; above 2nd floor, 5. One interior stairway enclosed with wooden partitions; no safe egress from roof; imperfect horizontal exit on 3d floor; this bridge in the form of a horizontal exit was erected as the result of an order issued by this Department to provide additional means of exit from 3d floor; said bridge is uncovered and nonfireproof.

Recommendation: Accept bridge as exit from 3d floor if an outside iron stairway be erected from 2d floor to grade at about the same location as the bridge is on 3d floor.

(2) Premises affected, Gloversville, 7 West st., rear; appellant, H. Van Dricesche Co. 1—Additional exit. 4-story nonfireproof building; divided lofts; no sprinkler; no combustibles; no fire alarm. Occupancy of building, 20; above 1st floor, 10; above 3d floor, 6; exit, one interior stairway, doors to which open outwardly but are not self-closing; one imperfect fire escape on side of building, with openings to balconies not fireproofed on outside; exits roomy; no safe egress from roof; 4th floor is attic under eaves, used for storage of old furniture and equipment; fire escape extends to 3d floor only; when windows are fireproofed on outside the same will comply with the law, except that it does not extend to the 4th floor.

Recommendation: Accept fire escape as second means of exit from 2nd and 3rd floors when windows on outside have been fireproofed. In granting the order in so far as it relates to attic if attic be locked and key in possession of proprietor and no one but a proprietor allowed to go to the attic floor. If door be found unlocked at any time upon inspection, additional exit to be required from attic floor.

(3) Premises affected, Jamestown, 335 Harrison st.; appellant, Jamestown Worsteds Mills. Properly guard perpendicular driving rod on looms. (93257)—Properly guard perpendicular driving rod on looms (File 93256). Machines are located fully six feet apart for aisles—do not move fast and have to be adjusted frequently.

Recommendation: Waiver of orders. Nov., 1917.

(4) Premises affected, Jamestown, 335 Harrison st.; appellant, Jamestown Worsteds Mills. 1—Extend present position of guard rail at flywheel so that it will be out at least two feet from wheel. Nov., 1917. Present guards are placed about 10 inches from flywheel, about 3 feet 6 inches high; if same were moved out to a distance of two feet it would be impracticable for engineer to move around engine; same would be more dangerous, as someone would be apt to go between guard and flywheel.

Recommendation: Accept as compliance with order the raising of the present guard to a height of 6 feet and covering of sides with wire mesh, not over 1 1/2-inch.

(5) Premises affected, Jamestown, 335 Harrison st.; appellant, Jamestown Worsteds Mills. 2—Extend partitions of water closets to ceiling or cover same. 3—Provide proper safety device on elevator car. Water closet located in storage room which is used for storage of baled raw wool, and no one being employed therein, enclosure is at present 7 feet high and takes in part of window to outer air. Mr. Broadhead will visit the Openheim & Collins building in Buffalo as soon as possible to see the safety device installed there and will apply same. (Nov. 21, 1917.)

Recommendation: Order No. 2 to be waived. Order No. 3 to be complied within ten days.

(6) Premises affected, North Tonawanda, 82 Main st.; appellant, The News Publishing Co. Provides hoods and pipes over all linotype machines to remove fumes. Sept. 24, 1917. There are three linotype machines installed, two of which are electrically heated and the third is heated by gas. Chemical determinations made in various plants by our Chemical Engineer show that no lead dross is thrown off from the pots which are electrically heated. Hoods are therefore unnecessary for the pots that are electrically heated, as no gas is generated or products of combustion thrown off when heating the metal. Chemical tests made of cord taken from pipe immediately suspended above lead melting pot of machine heated by gas reveals .1 mg. lead, which shows necessity for hood.

Recommendation: Order to be waived in so far as it applied to the pots heated by electricity, and to be enforced in so far as it applies to pot which is gas heated. Accept installation of hood and pipe, the pipe and main duct to take a course as short a distance as possible from the machine to the chimney; old piece of pipe at present suspended from ceiling over linotype machine and extending to chimney should not be used as it takes too long a course. New pipe should be installed, same to be pitched as much as possible in its course from the machine to the chimney, inasmuch as the natural aspiration would be lost if the pipe were horizontal.

(7) Premises affected, New York City, 318-326 W. 39th st.; appellant, Wm. A. White & Sons. J. L. Stanford appeared for the petitioner. Representative of the owner states that the appeal would be withdrawn and that arrangements will be made to take care of the situation until Feb. 1, when there will be a change in the occupancy and only males employed.

(8) Premises affected, Solvay, Oxalic Acid Plant; appellant, Solvay Process Co., Syracuse. 1—Prohibit occupancy. 2—Additional exit. (File No. 74744.) 3-story building erected prior to Oct. 1, 1913; no sprinkler; no fire alarm; no combustibles. Occupancy above 1st floor, 15; above 2d floor, 2; exits, one interior unenclosed stairway from 1st to 3d floors, located about centre of southerly wall.

Recommendation: Accept fire escape balconies on the westerly wall, at the location designated on plan submitted if same be connected with 22-inch iron stairways, pitched not greater than 60 degrees, same to be provided with proper handrails; door openings at balconies to be nonfireproof.

(9) Premises affected, Troy, 206-16, First st.; appellant, Neemes Brothers, (3-15-17) 1—Prohibit occupancy. 2—Additional exit, 3d floor. 1, 2 and 3-story nonfireproof brick building; no sprinkler; no combustibles; no fire alarm.

Occupancy of building, 43; above 1st floor, 4; above 2d floor, 1 occasionally; exit, one interior stairway, doors to which open in and are not self-closing; imperfect rear fire escape with nonfireproof openings 6 feet high by 2 feet wide; exits remote; safe egress from roof. Since issuance of order a straight ladder has been erected from roof to two-story section to driveway; roof can be reached through window of 3d floor workroom.

Recommendation: Accept ladder while present occupancy and conditions obtain, if drop ladder be provided from bottom of present ladder fire escape.

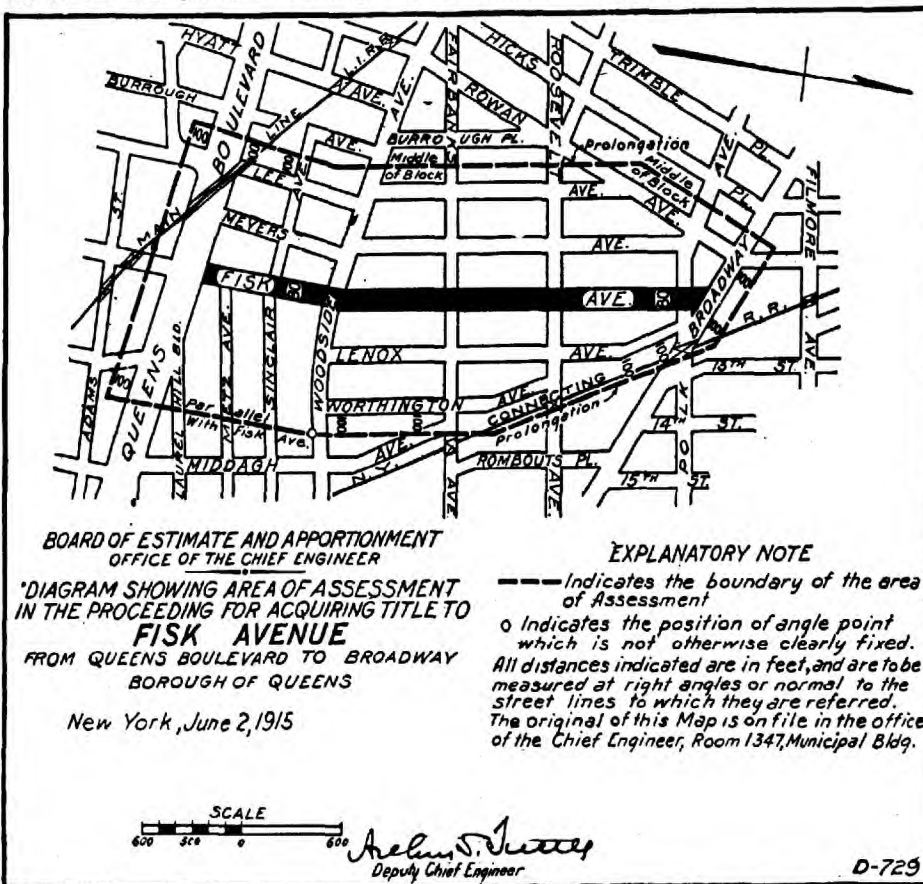

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation of the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done or the supplies are to be furnished. Plans and drawings of construction work may be seen there.
