This year, the benefit will also support NYCHA youth initiatives, including literacy and health programs for youth aged one to three and afterschool activities for grades K through three.

Mayor's Fund and Center for Economic Opportunity Receive Social Innovation Fund Federal Grant

On July 22, the Mayor's Fund, in partnership with the Mayor's Center for Economic Opportunity (CEO), was selected by the Corporation for National and Community Service as one of eleven grantees nationally to receive an inaugural Social Innovation Fund (SIF) award. With this grant, five CEO anti-poverty programs that have been proven as effective models in New York City will be expanded and replicated in seven cities throughout the country. The SIF programs include: Jobs-*Plus.* a site-based employment initiative for public housing residents: Family Rewards, a conditional cash transfer program to reduce current and future poverty; *\$aveUSA*, a savings program linked to the Earned Income Tax Credit; Young Adult Internship Program, a paid work exploration and education program for disconnected youth; and WorkAdvance, a sector-focused training and advancement program for low-wage workers.
