To the Honorable the Common Council of the City of New York:

The Public Administrator in the City of New York, pursuant to section 39 of article 1, entitled "Of the Public Administrator in the City of New York," title 6, chapter 6, part 2 of the Revised Statutes, herewith exhibits to the Common Council of the City of New York, a statement on oath of the moneys received by him for commissions and expenses, and the total amount of his receipts and expenditures in each case in which he took charge of and collected any effects, or on which he administered on any estate during the year 1880, with the name of the deceased, his occupation, the place of his residence at the time of his death, where known, and the country or place from which he came if he were not a resident of this State at the time of his death.

And in compliance with the Revised Ordinances of the Common Council he also transmits a transcript of such of his accounts as has been closed or finally settled during the year 1880.

The statement heretofore referred to shows in what estates any money was received by him during the past year and the amount so received.

The following is a report of the balances standing to the credit of the following estates unclaimed by next of kin or otherwise, and paid into the City Treasury by the Public Administrator during the year 1880:

(Checks for commissions and intestate estates in the three cases last above mentioned were drawn in December, 1880, and now remain at the Comptroller's office for signature or countersigning by him.)

The balance of moneys standing to the credit of the Public Administrator and the Comptroller on the first day of January, 1881:

In the Importers' and Traders' National Bank was the sum of fifty-seven thousand nine hundred and ninety dollars and twenty-two cents (\$57,990.22), and in The Continental National Bank the sum of seventy-one thousand six hundred and three dollars and thirty-eight cents (\$71,603.38), making together the sum of one hundred and twenty-nine thousand five hundred and ninety-three dollars and sixty cents (\$129,593.60), which includes interest allowed by said banks on deposits, and the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,000) received from the Receiver of the Guardian Savings Institution.

The total amount of moneys which came into the hands of the Public Administrator during the year 1880, was the sum of one hundred and thirty-nine thousand four hundred and fifty-one dollars and sixty-six cents (\$139,451.66), and the amount distributed by him for expenses, payments to creditors, and to next of kin, was the sum of ninety-eight thousand four hundred and one dollar and eighty-four cents (\$98,401.84).

The total amount paid into the city treasury during the year 1880, was the sum of six thousand nine hundred and fifty dollars and twenty-eight cents (\$6,950.28), being for commissions and intestate estates.

When the undersigned took possession of his office, he found that the account of the Public Administrator and Comptroller with The Guardian Savings Institution showed a balance due from that bank of fourteen thousand two hundred and thirty-three dollars and sixty cents (\$14,233.60).

The undersigned has made diligent efforts to collect the amount from the Receiver of the said institution, and has succeeded in collecting the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,000), leaving a balance still due amounting to the sum of twelve thousand two hundred and thirty-three dollars and sixty cents (\$12,233.60) exclusive of interest. By reason of such uncollected balance a number of estates cannot be finally closed.

The above fact except as to the payment of two thousand dollars (\$2,000), has been included in each of my previous annual statements.

THE COMPTROLLER OF THE CITY OF NEW York hereby gives notice to owners of Real Estate in said city, that, as provided by chapter 123 of the Laws of 1880, they may now pay any arrears of taxes for the years 1877, 1878, and 1879, with interest thereon at the rate of seven per cent. per annum, until the first day of April, 1881, and if not paid before that date, interest will be payable at the rate of twelve per cent. per annum.

The Act, chapter 123, Laws of 1880, containing this provision of law, is published below.

## CHAPTER 123.

AN ACT in relation to arrears of taxes in the City of New York, and to provide for the reissuing of revenue bonds in anticipation of such taxes.

Passed April 15, 1880; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. At any time after the passage of this act, and before the first day of October, eighteen hundred and eighty, any person may pay to the Comptroller of the City of New York the amount of any tax upon real property belonging to such person, heretofore laid or imposed and now remaining unpaid, together with interest thereon at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the time that such tax was imposed to the time of such payment, provided, also, that the time when such payment may be made on the amount of any such tax laid or imposed in the years eighteen hundred and seventy-seven, eighteen hundred and seventy-eight, and eighteen hundred and seventy-nine shall extend to the first day of April, eighteen hundred and eighty-one. The comptroller shall make and deliver to the person making any such payment a receipt therefor, and shall forthwith cancel the record of any such tax on the books of the finance department; and upon such payment being made such tax shall cease to be a lien upon the property and shall be deemed fully paid, satisfied and discharged, and there shall be no right to any further interest or penalty by reason of such tax not having been paid within the time heretofore required by law, or by reason of any statute passed requiring the payment heretofore of any penalty or interest over seven per centum per annum upon any unpaid tax.

Sec. 2. Any revenue bond heretofore issued in anticipation of the taxes in the first section specified which may fall due and become payable before said taxes are collected, may be reissued by the comptroller of said city, in whole or in part, for such period as he may determine, not exceeding one year.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect immediately.

ORDER OF THE COMPTROLLER OF THE CITY  
OF NEW YORK, CONSOLIDATING CERTAIN  
BUREAUX IN THE FINANCE DEPARTMENT.

SECTION 3 OF CHAPTER 521 OF THE LAWS of 1880, requires that heads of departments shall reduce the aggregate expenses of their respective departments by a reduction of salaries, and confers upon them authority to consolidate bureaux and offices for that purpose, as follows, to wit:

"In making the reduction herein required, every head of department may abolish and consolidate offices and bureaux, and discharge subordinates in the same department."

The Comptroller of the City of New York, in pursuance of the duty imposed and the authority thus conferred upon him, hereby orders and directs that the following Bureaux in the Finance Department shall be consolidated, the consolidation thereof to take effect on the first day of January, 1881, viz.:

First—"The Bureau of the Collection of Assessments," and "The Bureau for the Collection of Arrears of Taxes and Assessments and of Water Rents," shall be consolidated as one bureau, and on and after January 1, 1881, shall be known as "The Bureau for the Collection of Assessments and of Arrears of Taxes and Assessments and of Water Rents," and possess all the power conferred and perform all the duties imposed by law and ordinance upon both of said bureaux, and the officers thereof, the chief officer of which consolidated bureau shall be called "Collector of Assessments and Clerk of Arrears."

Second—"The Bureau for the Collection of the Revenue accruing from rents, and interest on bonds and mortgages, revenue arising from the use or sale of property belonging to or managed by the city," and "the Bureau of Markets," shall be consolidated as one Bureau, and on and after January 1, 1881, shall be known as "the Bureau for the Collection of City Revenue and of Markets," and possess all the powers conferred and perform all the duties imposed by law and ordinance upon both said Bureaux, and the officers thereof; the chief officer of which said consolidated Bureau shall be called "Collector of City Revenue and Superintendent of Markets."
