

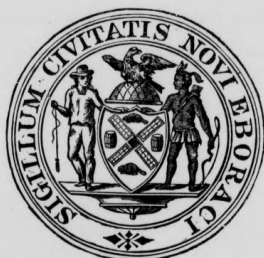

On motion, ordered to be placed on file, action being taken where necessary, as stated, to wit:

From Counsel to the Corporation—Approving contract for sawed yellow pine timber.

From J. H. Olhausen, General Superintendent Central Railroad Company of New Jersey—

Stating that the required repairs will be made to Pier 13, North river.

From Engineer-in-Chief:

1st. Reporting that he had suspended, pending an investigation, Watchman John McDougal,

for being off his post.

2d. Reporting that he had ordered that Laborers and Acting Watchmen Robert Mularkey,

Michael Broderick and Joseph Devlin, shall not be again assigned to duty as Acting Watchmen, for

being found asleep while on duty, and recommending that his action be approved.

On motion, the action of the Engineer-in-Chief was approved.

3d. Recommending that Dock Builder Andrew Higgins and William O'Brien, Laborer, be

discharged.

On motion, the recommendation of the Engineer-in-Chief was adopted.
