D., Sanitary Superintendent and Register: SIR-There were 565 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, November 5, 1887, which is a decrease of 99, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 115 less than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1886. The actual mortality for the week ending October 29, 1887, was 664, which is 76.0 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 23.07 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,496,506.
