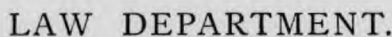

9th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5744, in reference to depth of water in front of the bulkhead between One Hundred and Twenty-ninth and One Hundred and Thirtieth streets, North river.



10th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5386, as to the dredging required at Pier foot of West Twentieth street, North river, and reporting that the whole of the water-front from the northerly side of Thirteenth street to the northerly line of West Twenty-third street, North river, requires dredging in all the slips to the depth of twenty feet at mean low water, and recommending that the Department dredge all the slips between West Thirteenth and West Twenty-third streets, to a depth of twenty feet at mean low water by contract as required by law, except the West Fourteenth street ferry slip and the West Twenty-third street ferry slip, the lessees of which are bound by the terms of lease to do such dredging as the Department may direct; and also recommending that the lessees of said ferries be directed to dredge the area in front of their respective premises to a depth of twenty feet at mean low water, and that the owners of the bulkheads from Thirteenth to Twenty-third street be directed and required to dredge the usual bulkhead areas to a depth of fifteen feet at mean low water.

On motion, the report was received, the recommendations adopted, and the Engineer-in-Chief directed to prepare specifications and form of contract for dredging all the slips between West Thirteenth and West Twenty-third streets to a depth of twenty feet at mean low water, and the President authorized to notify the Hoboken Land and Improvement Co. and the New York, Lake Erie & Western Railroad Co. to dredge the area in front of their respective ferry premises at West Fourteenth and West Twenty-third streets, North river, to a depth of twenty feet at mean low water, and the alleged owner or owners of the bulkheads between the northerly side of West Thirteenth street to the northerly line of West Twenty-third street, to commence to dredge the usual bulkhead areas within ten days, under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, or the penalty for violation of the rules will be imposed.

11th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5718, that he had repaired bulkhead foot of Thirty-eighth street, East river.

12th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5738, that he had made requisition for dredging required at dumping-board foot of West Nineteenth street, North river.

13th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5754, that he had repaired Pier at Bethune street, North river.

14th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5756, that he had repaired Pier at Little West Twelfth street, North river.

15th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5746, that he had superintended erecting a dumping-board at bulkhead between Bogart and Bloomfield streets, North river.

16th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5778, that he had repaired fence at that portion of bulkhead adjoining and west of Pier 40, East river.

17th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5779, that he had repaired sheathing on south side of Pier 57, East river.

18th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5533, that he had superintended the construction of crib dock north of One Hundred and Seventy-eighth street, on the west side of Harlem river.

19th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5753, that he had repaired Pier, new 43, North river.

20th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5784, that he had repaired deck of Pier at Thirty-fourth street, North river.

21st. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5783, that he had repaired deck of Pier at Eighteenth street, North river.

22d. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5615, that he had superintended fastening spring-piles in front of bulkhead platform between Piers, old 21 and 23, North river.

23d. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5721, that he had superintended replacing spring-piles at outer southerly corner of Pier, old 28, North river.

24th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5737, that he had repaired Pier, old 42, North river, and the approach thereto.

25th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5751, that he had repaired surface of deck of Pier at One Hundred and Ninth street, Harlem river.

26th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5752, that he had repaired deck of Pier at foot of One Hundred and Seventeenth street, Harlem river.

27th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5755, that he had repaired Pier north of Bloomfield street, North river.

28th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5759, that he had repaired deck north side of Pier, old 34, North river.

29th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5760, that he had repaired deck of Pier foot of Eighty-sixth street, East river.

30th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5763, that he had repaired deck of Pier foot of Eighteenth street, North river.

31st. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5741, that he had made requisition for dredging at the dumping-board at Pier 37, East river, and had supervised the work thereat, which was done by the Union Dredging Company.

32d. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5692, that he had supervised filling in north of One Hundred and Fiftieth street, Harlem river.

From Edward Abeel, Dock Master:

1st. Reporting that bulkhead west of Pier 40, East river, is washing out and fence is in need of repairing. The action of Commissioner Matthews in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to make the fence and premises safe was approved.

2d. Reporting that the spring-pile on upper corner of Pier 41, East river, requires fastening. The action of Commissioner Matthews in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to repair was approved.

3d. Reporting damage to lower side Pier 41, East river. The action of Commissioner Koch in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report was approved.

4th. Reporting hole in deck of Pier 37, East river. The action of Commissioner Koch in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to repair was approved.

From Eugene McCarthy, Dock Master—Reporting that the north side of Pier 62, East river, has settled. The action of Commissioner Matthews in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report was approved.

From Charles P. Blake, Dock Master—Reporting hole in bulkhead foot of Thirty-second street, East river. The action of Commissioner Matthews in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to repair was approved.

The penalty for violation of the Department Rules was imposed upon the following persons: \$100 on W. H. Barnes, foot of Thirtieth street, North river, for violation of Rule No. 3, for continuing to pile brick on Pier at Fifty-fifth street, North river, after being notified to stop by Dock Master Joseph B. Erwin; \$25 on T. Cunningham, of Thirteenth avenue and Eighteenth street, for violation of Rule 7, in using horses on Pier foot of Eighteenth street, North river, on September 18th and 20th instant, without a platform; \$5 on Richard Fitzpatrick, of No. 407 West Thirteenth street, for violation of Rule 7, in using horse on Pier 60, North river, without a platform, on September 18th instant, reported by Dock Master Patrick J. Brady.

The President authorized to notify the above parties to call and pay the amounts to the Treasurer of this Department within ten days, or the claims will be sent to the Counsel to the Corporation for collection.

A communication from the Engineer-in-Chief, reporting dredging required at various premises of which the leases were sold on 15th April, 1886, was, on motion, ordered to be placed on file, and the Engineer-in-Chief directed to prepare specifications and form of contract for dredging, as follows: South side Pier, old 29, North river, to a depth of twenty feet at mean low water, about 9,500 cubic yards.

Pier, new 47, North river, to a depth of twenty-five feet at mean low water, about 16,000 cubic yards.

Pier at West Fifty-eighth street, North river, to a depth of fifteen feet at mean low water, about 20,000 cubic yards.

East side Pier 4, East river, to a depth of fifteen feet at mean low water, about 7,000 cubic yards.

Bulkhead between Piers 4 and 5, East river, to a depth of ten feet at mean low water, about 900 cubic yards.

Pier 5, East river, to a depth of fifteen feet at mean low water, about 13,000 cubic yards.

Bulkhead between Piers 5 and 6, East river, to a depth of ten feet at mean low water, about 650 cubic yards.

Pier 6, East river, to a depth of fifteen feet at mean low water, about 17,100 cubic yards.

Pier at Fifth street, East river, to a depth of fifteen feet at mean low water, about 24,500 cubic yards.

The Engineer-in-Chief was also directed to make requisition for dredging at the following places:

Bulkhead along approach to Pier, new 47, North river, to a depth of ten feet at mean low water, about 2,000 cubic yards.

West side Pier 21, East river, to a depth of fifteen feet at mean low water, about 4,000 cubic yards.

East side Pier 24, East river, and half bulkhead adjoining, to a depth of fifteen feet at mean low water, about 4,500 cubic yards.

A communication from the Engineer-in-Chief, recommending that a Captain, two Deck-hands, Engineer and Fireman be appointed for the tug "Manhattan," and that she be put in commission, was received and,

On motion, ordered to be placed on file, and the following resolution, offered by Commissioner Matthews, was adopted:

Resolved, That the tug "Manhattan" be placed in commission on and after September 27, 1886, under charge of John Sloan, Pilot, who is hereby reinstated; and that Edward Lasher, Engineer, John Heenan, Fireman, Daniel McCullough, Deck-hand, be and are hereby reinstated, to take effect on said date.

On motion, the permit issued to P. Ciancimino & Brother, to use dumping-board at bulkhead foot of Seventieth street, East river, was revoked, to take effect Monday, September 27, 1886.

The communication from Robert Gordon, requesting permission to repair bulkhead platform between Forty-sixth and Forty-seventh streets, North river, was,

On motion, taken from the table, and with the report of the Engineer-in-Chief on Secretary's Order No. 5771, ordered to be placed on file, and the President authorized to advise that the F. B. Cutting Estate have been directed to make the repairs required thereat.

A communication from the Engineer-in-Chief, submitting plans and specifications for the purchase of about 20,000 cubic feet of granite, was received, read, and ordered to be placed on file, and the following resolution, offered by Commissioner Koch, was adopted:

Resolved, That the plans and specifications as prepared by the Engineer-in-Chief, for the purchase of about 20,000 cubic feet of granite, be and hereby are approved, subject to the opinion of the Counsel to the Corporation as to form, and the Secretary be and hereby is directed to have a sufficient number of blank forms of proposals printed, and proper advertisements inviting bids for furnishing the same inserted in the papers designated by law.

The petition of Henry A. Cram, for permission to build a bulkhead between One Hundred and Thirty-seventh and One Hundred and Thirty-eighth streets, Harlem river, was,

On motion, taken from the table, and with the report of the Engineer-in-Chief on Secretary's Order No. 5205, ordered to be placed on file, and the following resolution, offered by Commissioner Koch, was adopted:

Whereas, By petition to the Board governing the Department of Docks from Henry A. Cram, of No. 56 Wall street, dated April 14, 1886, it is represented that the said Henry A. Cram is the owner in fee simple of the premises in the Twelfth Ward of the City of New York, bounded on the south by One Hundred and Thirty-seventh street, on the north by One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, on the west by Madison avenue, and on the east by the bulkhead line of the Harlem river, as shown by the diagram annexed to said petition, and that the said Henry A. Cram is the holder of the water grant from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, bearing date the 12th day of November, 1867, and recorded in the office of the Register of the City and County of New York in Liber 1026 of Conveyances, page 366; and

Whereas, In said petition the said Henry A. Cram requests and petitions to build a bulkhead line on said premises in accordance with the law and ordinances and regulations of the Dock Department of the City of New York; and

Whereas, The said Board of Docks deem it just and proper that said request be granted upon said petition;

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted to Henry A. Cram to build a good and proper bulkhead from the northerly side of the bulkhead line of the Harlem river at One Hundred and Thirty-seventh street to the southerly side of the bulkhead line on the Harlem river at One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, upon plans and specifications to be submitted to and approved by the Commissioners of Docks, the work to be done under the supervision and direction of the Engineer-in-Chief of the Department of Docks.

And provided that no part of the said structure shall be built beyond or outside of the established bulkhead and pier line or the line of the Harlem River Improvement as laid down by the United States Engineers.

And further provided, that within ten days after receipt of this communication the said Henry A. Cram, or his duly accredited attorney, shall by communication in writing accept the terms and conditions hereinbefore laid down in this resolution.

The Treasurer, Commissioner Matthews, presented his report of receipts for the week ending September 21, 1886, amounting to \$2,922.42, which was received and ordered to be spread in full on the minutes, as follows:

REPORTED MORTALITY \* for the week ending September 18, 1886, together with the ACTUAL MORTALITY for the week ending September 11, 1886.

SIR—There were 661 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, September 18, 1886, which is an increase of 8, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 2 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1885. The actual mortality for the week ending September 11, 1886, was 655, which is 43.2 below the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 23.54 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,447,492.
