SIR—There were 661 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, September 18, 1886, which is an increase of 8, as compared with the number reported here preceding week, and 2 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1885. The actual mortality for the week ending September 11, 1886, was 655, which is 43.2 below he average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 23.54 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,447,492.
