DEAR SIR—In compliance with sec. 27, chap. 335, Act passed April 30, 1873, I herewith transmit a report of the operations of this Institution during the quarter ending June 30, 1879.

OUT-DOOR IMPROVEMENTS.

Repairing roads and walks, unloading and carting coal and brick, carting manure and spreading same on farm, planting and gathering vegetables, mowing, cutting, and housing hay, screening and carting sand for Blackwell's Island, paving pig-pen, filling excavations.

CARPENTERS' DEPARTMENT.

Building fence 300 feet long, 9 feet high; casing 50 feet steam-pipe, putting up partition in kitchen, laying floor 10 x 12 in annex; making 500 feet of benches for yard Ward H, shutters for Ward B, 8 collins, centres, circles and lintels for new wing, cell doors, 1 table, 14 towel rollers, extension to water-closet and new seats for same, panels in four doors, repairing sand barge, wash-house, locks, doors, and furniture throughout the building.

PAINTERS' DEPARTMENT.

Painting, calcimining, and varnishing Steward's Office and Library, calcimining 1 room in annex, painting and varnishing water-closets in Wards G, I, L, and N; painting 74 feet roof, 40 bedsteads, 25 bath-tubs, 34 benches, 20 dust pails, 4 step-ladders, outside sashes Wards B and H, and gutters, varnishing 35 doors and 13 towel-rollers, putting in 698 panes of glass, and whitewashing wall of chapel.

Wash-house—86,329 pieces clothing and bedding washed. The average number of males employed as clerks, mechanics, orderlies, etc., was 318; and females as nurses, laundresses, sewers, knitters, etc., was 205.

SIR—I have the honor to submit the following report of labor accomplished at this hospital during the quarter ending June 30, 1879.

Carpenters—Made new stoop and platform for office building and partition in same, drawer in office table, 7 seats in water-closets, 1 bed-room partition 8 x 10 ft., 1 ditto 11 x 15 ft., 2 ditto 9 x 9 ft., 1 coffin, 2 large clothes boxes, 4 doors. Altered clothes box in wash-house. Enlarge 1 boat-house (6 x 10 x 8 ft.) and made double door and slanting platform for same, also two brackets for stretchers. Nurses' room in Ward B and put up brackets for hose. Repaired 2 meat boxes, 3 stools, 5 chairs, 1 bed-spring, 1 bedstead, seats in water-closet, floor in kitchen, step-ladder, boat, 9 blinds, fence-railing, roof on straw house.

Plumbers and Tinsmiths—Work for Blackwell's Island Asylum: Putting up a glass gauge to tank, altering pipe to bath-tub, clearing out and repairing water-closets and supply and waste pipes and tanks in pavilion 1; putting up cistern pump, also glass gauge to kitchen tank, repairing gutter on roof, altering 6 oven pans, putting 2 leader pipes, done all the plumbing, as tanks, water-closets, bath-tubs and sinks in pavilion 2, and taking down fixtures in E and D. For Hospital—Putting up 2 pumps, repairing and felting roofs, completing work on tanks, water-closets, bath-tubs, new drain-pipe in Ward A, repairing water-closets, putting up clothes-wringer in wash-house, altering gas-pipes, in office building, repairing pump, made 20 new bottoms for tin pails, 1 quart dipper, 3 pint measures, 6 tin cups, taking down pump for Warden Dunphy.

Painters—Painted railing, stoops, and platform of office building, all 3 nurses' rooms, and base inside of wards and office; stained and varnished 30 medicine stands, painted outside of pavilions 5 and 6 and boat-house. Whitewashed 3 pavilions, wash-house, and boat-house. Tared 18 water-casks. Gas House—Made 36,400 feet of gas.

Farming and Gardening—Prepared and planted 2½ acres with corn and vegetables.

Sewing—Made 50 sheets, 50 shirts, 24 shrouds, 109 chemises, 60 pillow-cases, 2 spreads, 19 petticoats, 37 nightgowns, 86 dresses. Mended 230 sheets, 123 shirts, 109 chemises, 60 pillow-cases, 2 spreads, 19 petticoats, 37 nightgowns, 86 dresses. Knitted 57 pairs stockings.

The grass plots, walks, roads and grounds in general have been kept in good order by the male convalescents.

Patients are daily detailed to work, under supervision of attendants, in kitchen, paring vegetables, washing dishes, scrubbing, etc. Also in men's lodging-room, making beds, sweeping, etc.: the dining-room, pantry work, the pavilion, bed-making, sweeping, scrubbing, etc., occupy other patients.

New Pavilion No. 2—On April 23d the second new pavilion, then about completed, was opened and occupied by 81 patients from "The Hill." The remainder of the hill patients were placed in new pavilion No. 1, increasing the number of its inmates to 81. The four hill pavilions thus vacated were turned over by order of your Honorable Board to Hart's Island Hospital, in exchange for two large old pavilions on the lower part of the Island.

New Kitchen—The new kitchen under pavilion 2 was put into operation on the day the pavilion was opened. The large new range, with its three fireplaces, three ovens, and large boiler, has worked well. The new tank erected outside the kitchen has proved itself able to supply the range boiler under all draught thus far made upon it. The two new 60-gallon cauldrons, for boiling soups, tea, coffee, etc., have done good work; but their fires have smoked, owing to insufficiency of draught. The single and tortuous flue is overtaken by five fires. This evil can be remedied, and will require attention before the cooking shall be increased.

New Storeroom—This adjoins the kitchen, is large, light, and airy. Goods began to be placed in it first on March 7th, but, from want of fixtures, it did not get into regular working order until near the time of opening the pavilion. Later, bins, shelves, and counters, have systematized its operations.

New Cistern—A large rain-water cistern, near and for the use of pavilion 2, has been completed, the eaves-troughs and leaders placed to catch and conduct its supply, also a Cowing pump, pipes and other appliances to secure the transmission of the water to the tank.

Old Pavilions—About two months ago two old pavilions, each about 21 feet by 200 feet, were turned over by Hart's Island Hospital to this institution, to be put into condition for the reception of one hundred and fifty patients. Two little closet-like structures, connected with these, covering each a well, one bath-tub, and two water-closets, being not only useless but objectionable, were taken down and the plumbing fixtures laid aside for future use. The wells were cleaned out and walls built higher. The underpinning of these pavilions, which was badly crippled by decay, has been removed, the buildings raised to a level, and their proper supporting nearly accomplished; new tin roofs are to be put on; a part of the flooring is to be replaced. Each pavilion is to be divided into two wards of one hundred feet each, and to have an additional building erected to contain commodious bath-room, water-closets, tank, and heater. Every effort is being put forth to get these pavilions ready for reception of patients by an early day in August.

New Pavilion—Material is arriving and work is about to begin. This structure, one of two we had hoped to have seen well advanced by this time, is much like the last two erected as to general appearance, but materially improved as to plan.

Mason Work—The following at Pavilion No. 2, viz.: three stone steps and foundation therefor laid at western entrance, one step and foundation to receive the flight of steps from stoop at southerly entrance, and about 84 cubic feet of stone wall, being commencement of work needed at northerly entrance.

Inclosing under Pavilion No. 2—Carpenter work preparatory hereunto has been nearly completed.

Glass Water Gauges—Two of these, fitted with brass stop-cocks, have been connected, one with the tank which supplies the kitchen boiler, and the other with the hot-water tank in pavilion No. 2. These are for the safety of the heating fixtures. Pavilion No. 2, having a different arrangement of tanks, is to be furnished with a dial gauge.

Trees—One hundred deciduous trees, embracing many varieties, have been planted about the new pavilions.

The following improvements and repairs have been made at City Prisons from April 1 to June 30, 1879, by prison labor, and without expense to the Department of Public Charities and Correction, except the cost of the material:

FIRST DISTRICT PRISON.

Painted halls, ceiling, woodwork, iron railing, doors, and stairs of boys' prison (size, 45 feet long by 27 feet wide and two story high), also painted the outside walls and roof; painted the halls, woodwork, and iron railing of male prison (size, 586 feet long by 45 feet high); painted halls, woodwork, iron railing, and doors of female prison (size, 364 feet long by 21 feet high); painted the side-wall of female ten-day house (size, 28 feet high by 17½ feet wide); painted roof of new prison (size, 72 feet long by 47 feet wide), also repaired roof with ten sheets of tin; built an addition to storm-house at entrance to male prison, and a new storm-house on bridge at entrance to Special Sessions Court-room, also a new window in boys' prison and four new windows in female ten-day house, and two new skylights on roof of new prison and female ten-day house, also a new gutter on roof of female prison (size, 44 feet long by 6 inches wide); repaired water-pipes in fountain and in male prison, and placed five faucets in water-pipes in cells on first tier; placed a bath-tub in cells on second, third, and fourth tiers, on a brick inclosure, with a grated platform.

SECOND DISTRICT COURT.

Built 5 tables for prisoners, 8 horses for drying clothes, and repaired bunks, etc., in male and female prisons.

THIRD DISTRICT PRISON.

Built 47 bunks in cells, a table in kitchen, and a closet for Physician; repaired door-casing, ice-box, and window frames; painted wooden gate at entrance.

FOURTH DISTRICT PRISON.

Placed a new faucet in wash-basin, repaired floor of office, and built two partitions, windows, doors, etc.

FIFTH DISTRICT PRISON.

Repaired water-pipe and placed a gate in hall of prison.

Blacksmiths—Made 205 and repaired 69 iron bedsteads, 60 steel hand drills, 72 steel points, 144 chisels, 14 stone axes, 12 stone hammers, 150 cover posts, 136 feathers, 40 tub handles, 110 bucket handles, 130 straps, 1,200 rivets, 36 large butcher knives; also all necessary repairs on wagons, ambulances, carts, buggies, machinery, etc.

Tinsmiths—500 new tin mess pans, 703 new tin water cups, 12 new tin dishpans, 12 large tin dippers, 16 large tin cans, 224 sheet-iron bake-pans, 20 in. square; 250 wash-basins, 6 new galvanized iron water-coolers, 24 iron buckets, 15 milk cans, 4 gallons each; 14 sprinkling cans, each 3 gallons; 39 feet ridge iron for Hart's Island Pavilion, 8 large garbage cans; all necessary repairs to prison roof and adjacent buildings, also all tinware and utensils kept in order.

Carpenters and Painters—Have made 763 coffins, 33 wheelbarrows, 10 tables, 12 ft. long; 100 strips, 60 braces, 90 pulley frames, 36 head racks, 300 sawcutters handles, 51 ax handles, 40 straightedges, 201 stonebreaker handles, 125 new buckets, 20 tubs, 2 croquet sets, 700 brush backs, 4 ox carts, 1 hand cart, 188 round back chairs, etc.; repairs on all vehicles belonging to the Department, also all necessary repairs to buildings, etc.

At Tailors' and Coat Makers' Shop—351 new woolen jackets, 115 new woolen pants, 326 new woolen vests; repaired 629 jackets, 893 pants, 660 vests, 185 caps, 6 new coats, 222 coats repaired.

Broom and Brush Shop—151 dozen brooms, 178 dozen scrubs.
At the Sewing Room female prisoners have made 100 petticoats, 100 cloaks, 675 dresses, 100 wrappers, 412 towels, 300 aprons, 580 chemises, 100 men's shirts, 360 pairs men's pants, 21 dozen pairs socks knit, 1,964 pairs shoes bound, 3,078 shirts, 1,186 pairs socks, 234 dresses, 246 skirts, 571 chemises, 956 pillow-ticks, 55 bed-ticks, 162 pairs stockings, 40 towels, 355 pairs pants.

Shoe Shop—There has been made 1,227 pairs men's shoes, 2,408 pairs women's shoes; repaired 1,409 pairs men's shoes, 147 pairs women's shoes, 16 pairs slippers.

There has been cut and dressed at the Stone Shed 4,110 feet building stone, window jambs, lintels, light holes, hearthstones, bases, newel-caps, hand-rails, spandrels, door-steps, etc.

By prisoners employed at out-door labor the sea-wall has been kept in proper repairs, and the stone used has been quarried by the prisoners.

SIR—I have the honor to submit herewith Male and Female Labor reports of this Institution for the quarter ending June 30, 1879.

There has been 27,759 days' labor performed by the male inmates as follows, viz.:

A daily average of—

- 27 on steamboats, as firemen and deck hands.
- 54 in bakery, as bakers and assistants.
- 12 in stables, as drivers and hostlers.
- 19 in store department, as clerks and laborers.
- 2 in carpenter shop, repairing about institution.
- 10 in Almshouse shop, as carpenters, coopers, tinsmiths, etc.
- 2 in paint shop, painting and glazing in buildings.
- 1 in blacksmith shop, repairing for institution.
- 15 in engine-room and gas-house, as gasmen, mechanics, and firemen.
- 2 in barber shop, shaving and hair-cutting of inmates.
- 16 in male hall, as doorkeepers, messengers, and clerks.
- 26 in scrub gang, scrubbing and whitewashing.
- 2 in coat shop, making and repairing coats.
- 37 at gardening, cultivating vegetables, weeding, etc.
- 19 in kitchen, as cooks and assistants.
- 2 in cutting room, cutting clothing for department.

An average of 59 men have been employed daily at repairing and grading roads, unloading coal, and general outside labor; 3 mechanics have been detailed at the Lunatic Asylum, and 12 men have performed 602 days' labor at Bellevue Hospital.

In the shoe shop, with an average of 12 employed daily, there have been made 357 pairs women's and 13 pairs men's shoes, and repaired 1,441 pairs shoes, 16 pairs boots.

In the tailor shop, with an average of seven (7) employed, there have been made 907 pairs men's pants, 110 boys' ditto, 250 men's jackets, 200 boys' ditto, 65 boys' suits, 47 hospital gowns, 11 suits of clothing, 66 strait jackets, 12 restraining dresses, 5 awnings, and 2 boat covers; repaired 532 pairs pants, 182 jackets, 4 strait jackets, 1 restraining dress, 1 awning, 1 flag.

In the upholsterer's department, one man employed 60 days made 22 hair mattresses, 106 hair pillows, repaired 2 mattresses, 2 pillows, 1 lounge, and other articles of furniture.

In the harness shop there has been made 1 set express harness, 48 breeching straps, 43 restraining straps, 24 hames' straps, 12 mail bags, 10 saddle pads, 1 breast collar, and repaired all the harness for the several institutions in the Department.

In the loom-room, one man employed 54 days has woven 269½ yards rag carpet.

The female inmates have performed 23,684 days' labor, as follows, viz.:

In the sewing-room, with an average of 111 employed daily, there has been made 1,410 men's shirts, 200 boys' shirts, 50 men's jumpers, 1,550 pairs suspenders, 150 women's dresses, 750 women's chemises, 50 women's petticoats, 1,800 sheets, 986 pillow-cases, 258 bed-ticks, 191 pillow-ticks, 325 bed-spreads, 273 roller towels, 186 hand towels, 100 women's nightgowns, 50 women's hoods, 22 saddle pads, 208 pairs shoes bound, 680 pairs men's socks knit; repaired 1,670 men's shirts, 628 women's chemises, 1,580 dresses, 119 petticoats, 49 pillow-ticks, 188 pairs men's summer pants.

Forty-three have been employed daily in the laundry and an average of 8,000 pieces have been turned out weekly for City Prisons, Steamboats, Lunatic Asylum, B. I., and Workhouse.

Seventy-one have been employed in the female hall at scrubbing, whitewashing, waitresses in dining-rooms, tiers, and general work, and 25 in tailor shop, repairing and finishing garments.

Female help has been detailed daily on steamboats, at Bakery, and Maternity Hospital.

An average of 17 have been furnished daily to the Almshouse to do the washing and scrubbing at that institution, and 22 were detailed nightly as night watch in halls and pavilions of the Lunatic Asylum, B. I.

SIR—The following report of the operations of Branch Work-house, for the quarter ending June 30, is respectfully submitted to your Honorable Board.

The average number of male help for the quarter was 144, of which 74 have been working in the various gangs, in charge of six keepers, and the remainder, 70, have been employed variously, i.e., in carpenter's, blacksmith's, and tinsmith's shops, paint shop, bakery, kitchen, shoe and tailor shops, clothes room, etc., etc.

Subjoined will be found a detailed statement of the work performed.

Carpenters—Made 1 meat box, 13 wire screen frames, 2 wire screen doors, 1 water tank, 12 wooden spittoons, 3 window frames, 1 tool closet, 4 head boards, built 2 partitions, 120 days' work building ice house, 134 days' work completing the repairs on Dormitory No. 3, handles in 6 stone breaker's hammers, 3 sledges, 6 striking hammers, 5 picks, 2 shovels. Repaired 3 chairs, roofs and stoops of 2 buildings, sheathing of 1 building. For Hart's Island Hospital—Built 2 extensions to Pavilions, each containing 1 water tank, 1 bath-tub, 1 privy sink; also 2 extensions, each containing 1 orderly's room. Repaired 2 pavilions and built 1 pump platform. For Branch Lunatic Asylum—Made 2 provision bins, 450 feet oggee moulding, 1 elliptic arch. Built 1 stoop; thoroughly repaired house occupied by Medical Superintendent; 120 days' work raising, straightening, and repairing 2 old pavilions formerly used by Hart's Island Hospital.

Blacksmiths—Made 19 iron cot bedsteads, 21 pairs hinges, 34 bolts and nuts, 2 bolt plates, 214 rivets, 3 angle plates, 1 door latch, 5 pipe hooks, 21 staples, 1 sheet-iron door, 1 heavy hasp and staple, 1 heading tool, 1 horseshoe's hammer, 4 nose-rings for oxen, 7 pig rings, 40 wedges, 51 feathers, 2 cart bolts, 6 keys, 217 anchors for ice house, 1 nail cutting tool. Repaired 1 grate, 1 cleaver, 2 pair scissors, 2 screwdrivers, 1 hay fork, 6 shovels, 2 tubs, 1 stone boat, 3 carts, 12 bedsteads, 14 locks, 1 plowshare, 1 cooper's hammer, 1 hoe. Put on 4 sets horseshoes. Dressed and sharpened 752 drills, points, picks, and crowbars. Altered and repaired 16 locks on Dr. Franklin's house, 32 locks on Branch Lunatic Asylum.

Tinsmiths—Laid 5,458 square feet tin roofing, made 2 tin dippers, 1 funnel, 1 tin pan. Put 1 bath-tub, 1 water tank, and service pipes in dormitory No. 3. Repaired 6 coffee kettles, 2 wash boilers, 4 tin cans, 3 tin dippers. Kept pumps and connections in order. For Hart's Island Hospital—Altered water pipes in 4 pavilions. For Branch Lunatic Asylum—Laid 162 square feet tin roofing, made 14 stove-pipe elbows, 1 "T" elbow, 6 feet 4-inch stove-pipe, and put up 219 lineal feet galvanized gutter pipe, and 55 lineal feet of galvanized leader pipe.

Painters—Painted 3 rooms, 7 cells, Dormitory No. 3 inside and outside, stoops, doors, cornices, and iron window gratings of 4 buildings, 3,378 square feet tin roofing, 1 boat, 1 water tank, 7 ventilators, 2 partitions, 4 wash tubs, 1 meat box, 8 towel brackets, 10 pails, 14 wash kids, 4 desks, 16 spittoons, 18 iron cot bedsteads. For Hart's Island Hospital—Painted interior of 2 pavilions, 2 orderlies' rooms, 2 bath-rooms and water-closets. Primed exterior of 4 extensions to the above pavilions. For Branch Lunatic Asylum—Painted 1 bookcase, 219 lineal feet galvanized gutter pipe, and 55 lineal feet galvanized leader pipe.

Masons, Bricklayers, and Plasterers—Built 1 brick chimney, 1 brick culvert, 1 blacksmith's forge, 1,307 feet rubble masonry, cut 1 stone step, 203 yards plastering completed. For Branch Lunatic Asylum—Built 11 brick piers, 120 feet rubble masonry, 1 stoop. Miscellaneous—12 yards stone broken, 5 yards broken stone laid, 40 feet stone paving, 284 square yards ground sodded, 222 cubic yards ground filled in, 10 loads seaweed collected.

Tailor Shop—Repaired 892 pairs men's pants, 632 men's jackets, 189 pairs mittens.

Shoe Shop—Repaired 354 pairs men's and 104 pairs women's shoes.

Sewing Room—Made 36 hoods, 50 check spreads. Repaired 7 bed-ticks, 25 sheets, 89 dresses, 57 chemises, 320 undershirts, 1,080 pairs socks, 33 pairs stockings, 894 hickory shirts, 7 petticoats.

At City Cemetery—Dug two burial trenches 45 x 14 x 8 feet. Interred 658 bodies; interred 1 body in "Soldiers' Plot"; interred 1 body in separate grave; disinterred 6 bodies for burial elsewhere on Board of Health permits, indorsed by the Department.

At Hart's Island and Hospital—75 days' work done.

At Branch Lunatic Asylum—1,261 days' work done.
