The following is a record of the work performed in the Saintary Duread for the work here a September 25, 1880 : The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 2,041, as follows, viz. : 3 public buildings, 730 tenement-houses, 111 private dwellings, 103 other dwellings, 8 manufactories and workshops, 13 stores and warehouses, 60 stables, 22 slaughter-houses, 1 dye house, 1 dangerous building, 1 lodging house, 3 public sewers, 119 sunken and vacant lots, 111 yards, courts and areas, 144 cellars and basements, 194 waste-pipes and drains, 201 privies and water-closets, 21 streets, gutters and sidewalks, 10 dangerous stairways, 9 smoky chimneys, 2 cesspools, 64 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious disease, and 20 other nuisances. The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 598. During the past week 165 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary

.

During the past week 165 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 76 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

133 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks. The Disinfecting Corps have visited 55 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 50 houses, 50 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

Bureau of Vital Statistics. The certificates of 540 births, 43 still-births, 204 marriages, and 571 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, September 25, 1880; this shows an increase of to births, 68 marriages, and 38 deaths, and a decrease of 9 still-births, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when com-pared with the corresponding week of the year 1879, there was an decrease of 42 births, and an increase of 11 still-births, 22 marriages, and 70 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from scarlatina, decreased 2; typhoid fever, 3; puerperal diseases, 3; rheumatism and gout, 1; cancer, 8; phthisis pulmonalis, 17; bronchitis, 2; convulsions, 4; apoplexy, 4; all diseases of the bram and nervous system, 6; Bright's disease and nephritis, 4; pre-mature and preternatural births, 1; suicide, 2; drowning, 1; while the deaths from small pox increased 2; mealses, 1; diphtheria, 4; croup, 3; whooping cough, 5; eryspelas, 2; cerebro-spinal fever, 2; malarial fevers, 10; diarrhoeal diseases, 6; inanition, 2; alcoholism, 1; pneumonia, 10; heart diseases, 2; aneurism, 3; marasmus, tabes mesenterica, and scrofula, 4; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 4; meningitis and encephalitis, 7; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 1; gastruis, enteritis, and peritonitis, 1; cyanosis and atelectasis, 4. MORRISON, ESQ., Secretary to the Mayor: SIR—I am in receipt of your letter of the 20th, communicating the request of the Mayor, for my opinion as to "whether section 3 of chapter 521 of the Laws of 1880, which provides for a reduction of salaries, is restricted in its application to heads of departments, and the departments under their control, and whether the Mayor is the head of a department, and the Board of Aaldermen the head of a department, in view of this law."

a department, in view of this law." In answer I advise you: Ist. That the provisions of the section cited apply only to the heads of departments, and pre-scribe their duty in making "the next departmental estimate of the amount required for the support of such department during the ensuing fiscal year." 2d. That the Mayor is not the head of any department constituted by the charter. 3d. That the Board of Aldermen is not the head of any department constituted by the charter. In Jones v. The Mayor, 7 Robertson, 209, the question whether restrictive provisions of the charter relating to departments of the city government limited the power of the Common Council, was discussed, and the Court held that the Common Council was not subject to limitations prescribed by law applicable only to "departments."

law applicable only to " departments." am therefore of the opinion that the statute in question does not comprehend the Mayor and the Board of Aldermen.
