Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending September 25, 1880:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 2,041, as follows, viz.: 3 public buildings, 730 tenement-houses, 111 private dwellings, 103 other dwellings, 8 manufactories and workshops, 13 stores and warehouses, 60 stables, 22 slaughter-houses, 1 dye house, 1 dangerous building, 1 lodging house, 3 public sewers, 119 sunken and vacant lots, 111 yards, courts and areas, 144 cellars and basements, 194 waste-pipes and drains, 291 privies and water-closets, 21 streets, gutters and sidewalks, 10 dangerous stairways, 9 smoky chimneys, 2 cess-pools, 64 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious disease, and 20 other nuisances.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 598.

During the past week 165 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 76 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

133 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 55 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 50 houses, 50 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 540 births, 43 still-births, 204 marriages, and 571 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, September 25, 1880; this shows an increase of 10 births, 68 marriages, and 38 deaths, and a decrease of 9 still-births, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1879, there was an increase of 42 births, and an increase of 11 still-births, 22 marriages, and 70 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from scarlatina, decreased 2; typhoid fever, 3; puerperal diseases, 3; rheumatism and gout, 1; cancer, 8; phthisis pulmonalis, 17; bronchitis, 2; convulsions, 4; apoplexy, 4; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 6; Bright's disease and nephritis, 4; premature and preterm births, 1; suicide, 2; drowning, 1; while the deaths from small pox increased 2; measles, 1; diphtheria, 4; croup, 3; whooping cough, 5; erysipelas, 2; cerebro-spinal fever, 2; malarial fevers, 10; diarrhoeal diseases, 6; inanition, 2; alcoholism, 1; pneumonia, 10; heart diseases, 2; aneurism, 3; marasmus, tabes mesenterica, and scrofula, 4; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 4; meningitis and encephalitis, 7; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 1; gastritis, enteritis, and peritonitis, 1; cyanosis and atelectasis, 4.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

The ages of 180 of the persons who died during the week were reported to be under one year; 235 under two years; 267 under five years, and 34 seventy years and over, which shows that the deaths of children under five years of age was 35 more than the number reported during last week, and represent 46.78 per cent. of the total weekly mortality.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 106 were in institutions, 362 in tenement houses, 91 in houses containing three families or less, 5 in hotels and boarding-houses, 5 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 5 were on the basement floor, 124 on the first, 154 on the second, 97 on the third, 55 on the fourth, 18 on the fifth, 4 on the sixth; 564 were stated to be residents of New York City and 7 non-residents; 62 were stated to be single, 136 married, 47 widowed, and the condition of 326 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week was as follows, viz.: City deaths, 571; still-births, 43; bodies in transit, 27; of the total burial permits issued for city deaths and still-births 64 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 540 births, 204 marriages, 43 still-births, 571 deaths, 27 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed and tabulated; 42 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and a transcript of the birth record, 15 of marriage, and 19 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending September 25, 1880, was 65.0 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 30.055, the mean humidity was 64, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 915, and the total amount of rain-fall was .0 inches depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 549 deaths and still-births, or 89.41 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 8; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 237; City pauper burial-ground (undenominational), 70; Greenwood (undenominational), 45; Lutheran (undenominational), 87; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 16; Evergreen (undenominational), 36; Woodlawn (undenominational), 14; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 9; Union (Methodist Protestant), 6; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 9; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 3; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 5; Washington (undenominational), 4.

The actual mortality for the week ending September 18, 1880, was 553; this is 51 more than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1879, and 20.6 more than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 23.62 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,217,496.

CHAPTER 195.

AN ACT in relation to the payment of assessments for local improvements in the City of New York.

Passed May 7, 1880; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. At any time before the first day of September, eighteen hundred and eighty, any person liable therefor may pay, to the officer authorized to receive the same, the amount of any assessment for any local improvement in the City of New York, heretofore confirmed and now unpaid, with interest thereon at the rate of seven per centum per annum from the date of confirmation to the date of payment and at any time on or after said first day of September, and before the first day of December, eighteen hundred and eighty, any such assessment may be paid as aforesaid, with interest at the rate of nine per centum per annum from the date of confirmation to the date of payment.

Sec. 2. Where any installment or installments of any assessments have been paid under the provisions of chapter one hundred and three of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-six, or of chapter one hundred and fifty-nine of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-seven, or of chapter two hundred and fifty-five of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-eight, the amount of such assessment or assessments remaining unpaid may be paid within the same periods prescribed in the first section of this act and upon the same terms and conditions therein prescribed.

Sec. 3. Upon such payment in full, as hereinbefore provided, such assessment or assessments shall cease to be a lien upon the property, and shall be deemed fully paid, satisfied and discharged; and there shall be no further interest or penalty by reason of such assessment or assessments not having been paid within the time heretofore required by law, or by reason of any statute heretofore requiring the payment of any penalty or interest over the rate hereinbefore provided for upon any unpaid assessment.

Sec. 4. No provision of this act hereinbefore contained shall be construed as applicable to or affecting any assessment for the collection of which assessment the property has been sold.

Sec. 5. This act shall take effect immediately.

ARREARS OF TAXES.

NOTICE TO TAXPAYERS.

CHAPTER 123.

AN ACT in relation to arrears of taxes in the City of New York, and to provide for the reissuing of revenue bonds in anticipation of such taxes.

Passed April 15, 1880; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. At any time after the passage of this act, and before the first day of October, eighteen hundred and eighty, any person may pay to the Comptroller of the City of New York the amount of any tax upon real property belonging to such person, heretofore laid or imposed and now remaining unpaid, together with interest thereon at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the time that such tax was imposed to the time of such payment, provided, also, that the time when said or imposed may be made on the amount of any such tax laid or imposed in the years eighteen hundred and seventy-seven, eighteen hundred and seventy-eight, and eighteen hundred and seventy-nine shall extend to the first day of April, eighteen hundred and eighty-one. The comptroller shall make and deliver to the person making any such payment a receipt therefor, and shall forthwith cancel the record of any such tax on the books of the finance department; and upon such payment being made such tax shall cease to be a lien upon the property and shall be deemed fully paid, satisfied and discharged, and there shall be no right to any further interest or penalty by reason of such tax not having been paid within the time heretofore required by law, or by reason of any statute passed requiring the payment heretofore of any penalty or interest over even per centum per annum upon any unpaid tax.

Sec. 2. Any revenue bond heretofore issued in anticipation of the taxes in the first section specified which may fall due and become payable before said taxes are collected, may be reissued by the comptroller of said city, in whole or in part, for such period as he may determine, not exceeding one year.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect immediately.
